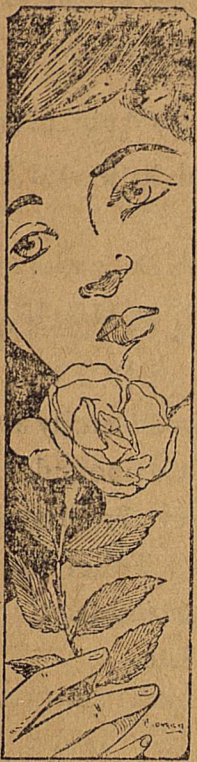

Benefit to be Derived from a Mother and Teachers Cooperative Club.

A Mother and Teacher's Cooperative Club would be one composed of mothers and teachers of children having for its chief aim the uniting of their efforts in educating the child.

Two persons having unmistakable opportunity for knowing the child are the teacher and the child and his mother. Granted, this is a true statement and knowing that it is a fact, that poor work in the schoolroom is often due to a wrong conception of a child's nature held by his teacher. The Mother and Teacher's Cooperative Club should be encouraged. The mother who has the care of the child from infancy to the beginning of school-life can be of inestimable value to the teacher and of great benefit to her own child.

Since all mothers and teachers agree that no two children are of exactly the same temperament; that no two can be approached in the same way; that without an acquaintance of the child and his peculiarities no teacher can accomplish the work planned to her own, or the mother's satisfaction; then could teachers and mothers cooperate in matters that are of such interest to both, many unpleasant things occurring in the school life of their children might be avoided and each would know what may be expected of the other.

Not every mother knows that the school-room is not the place where presidents or statesmen are made; that it isn't the mold in which great characters are cast; but is simply a supplement to home training. She does not realize perhaps; that on her depends, greatly, his future success or failure; that a careless, indifferent mother may expect a careless, indifferent child.

That one who sends her child to the school-room as to a day nursery, simply to be rid of him, will in the end be greatly disappointed to find, when too late, perhaps, a stupid, careless pupil. She should have known that the school existed to help and not to upbraid her; and that her services are necessary.

Could teachers and mothers cooperate in their work the indifferent mother might be encouraged and the enthusiastic one, who is so ready to assist her child, know better how she may do so without interrupting or hindering the work she is so anxious to promote.

Many ways may be discussed that would be of great benefit to both, but from the teacher's point of view, some very common, may be mentioned. As for example, mothers are not expected to teach at home even though they are competent, their home duties are of importance to them, the time should not be taken that belongs to home for school work, but by being interested in what is of interest to her child by asking questions having him discuss his work she may help to broaden his views and impress his work more forcibly upon him. She can also be of great value in upholding school rules and by being, always, just to the teacher.

Perhaps mothers do not realize when they place their children in school they there by promise to uphold school rules, especially those in regard to attendance, and in great measure, those in regard to conduct. Every teacher should be able to control the pupil while directly under her, but the mother often makes this hard to successfully accomplish, by a lack of discretion in criticizing the teacher because of stories of misbehavior and modes of punishment brought to her by her child. She doubtless realizes that she is hindering the very purpose of every conscientious teacher, viz.

The making of each pupil, at least, a true citizen. This can not be attained without inspiring in
