

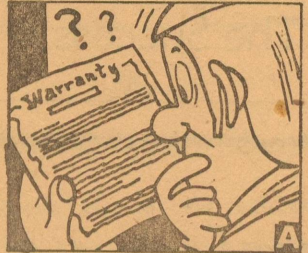


TO SAVE YOU TIME AND MONEY

YOUR AIR CONDITIONER WARRANTY

Before you buy an air conditioner, review the warranty. Does it cover both parts and labor? What parts and for how long? The sealed refrigeration system may have a longer warranty period than other parts.

Who stands behind the warranty—the manufacturer

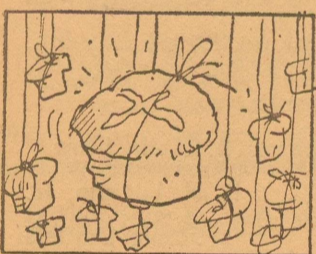


or the dealer? Be sure that if a dealer goes out of business, you aren't without a warranty.

When shopping, it is a good idea to ask the following questions, according to Whirlpool Corporation consumer affairs experts, who administer the company's Cool-Line, a toll-free, 24-hour telephone service for customers with service problems.

- 1. What specific installation procedures are necessary for warranty coverage?
2. Is the warranty in effect if I move?
3. Do I need to save my sales receipt or mail a registration card?
4. Does the warranty cover in-home service...
5. What damages are excluded from warranty coverage?
6. Does the warranty cover second and subsequent owners?
7. If the work must be done by an authorized company, where is the nearest one?

Although warranties differ from brand to brand, the language used should be clear, concise, and simple. Printing should be well-spaced and easy to read.

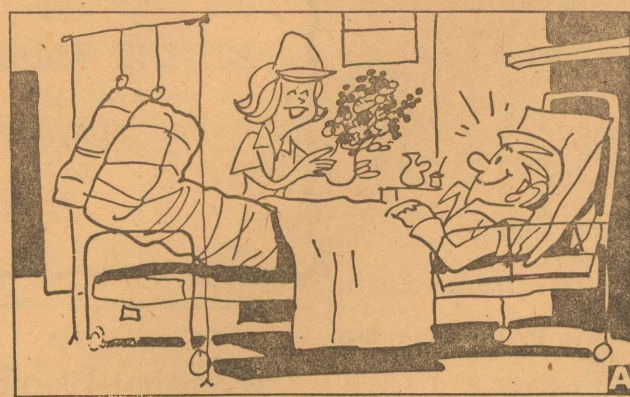


Some people believe that "hot cross buns" will keep for a year without becoming moldy, and hang them up for good luck!

Avoid These Well-Intentioned Boners



Some people who visit hospitalized friends and relatives, while hoping to help the patients get well, may make them worse—without knowing it!

Here are a few things you should NOT do:

- 1. Don't bring exotic things to eat or drink...
2. Don't go in to see someone if he already has several visitors...
3. Don't be embarrassed about bringing flowers...
4. Don't touch a patient's oxygen, intravenous, Miller-Abbot tubes, etc.

5. Don't bring any medicines to a hospital patient...
6. Don't visit a hospital patient if you have a cold...
7. Don't bring patients large heavy books.

If you avoid these in-hospital errors, the patient is much less likely to get sick of seeing you!

Screening Important In Health Services

Early detection is one of the best weapons in the hands of medical personnel for combatting short-term or possible long-term illness.

For this reason, screening services play a vital role in State Health Department services. Screening turns up diseases in persons who are unaware of any difficulty...

Diabetes was the fifth leading cause of death in Texas in 1972 and second cause of blindness.

Screening services are channeled to those at high risk of getting the disease. Experience has shown those at high risk to be close blood relatives of diabetes victims...

In diabetes screening, a blood sample is taken and deposited in a vial which contains a preservative to protect the blood sugar.

Screening services are provided for other diseases by other divisions of the State Health Department.

Preventive services may be classed as primary—averting the occurrence of the disease; secondary—prevention controlling progression of a disease from its early stage...

Providers of preventive medical services include such major groups as doctors, dentists, veterinarians and other professionals.

One of the easiest preventive services to recognize is in the field of immunization. A look at the State Health Department's morbidity reports emphasizes the drop in such diseases as diphtheria, measles, rubella, polio, pertussis...

There has been another change in the health field in the direction of prevention. This is in the field of epidemiology. To the layman, an epidemiologist can best be described as a disease detective.

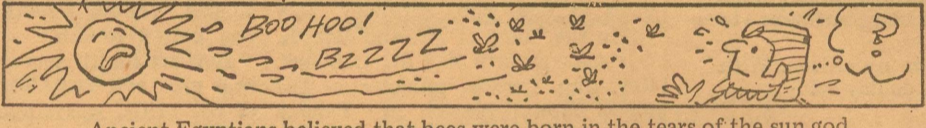
Historically, epidemiology had its birth in relation to the study of the great epidemic diseases such as cholera, plague, smallpox, yellow fever and typhus.

The so-called new epidemiology has extended the concept of public health control to encompass all causes of illness, disability and death. The Health Department's Divisions of Occupational Safety and Occupational Health and Radiation Control are, in a large sense, practicing preventive medicine...

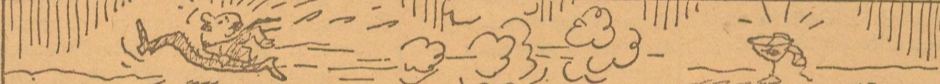
So it is that the State Health Department, through its many different offices, is taking the lead in helping prevent disease and disability in Texas.

SCHLEICHER COUNTY RAINFALL RECORDS SINCE 1936

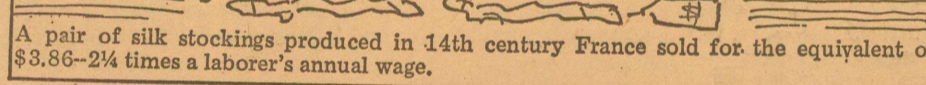
