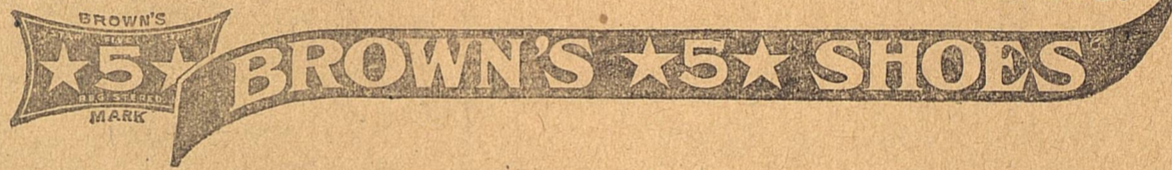

FIRST BALE OF COTTON
RAISED BY J. E. ESTES
Bought By T. L. Benson Co.
Price 9 1-10. Cents.

J. E. Estes one of our most prominent farmers brought in the first bale of cotton of the season, it was ginned Monday, a premium of about \$25 was given by the enterprising citizens and business men of town. After the cotton made its appearance on main street our local cotton buyers were seen to mount the wagon and begin to bid, the buyers were E. M. Barbee, W. L. McWhorter and T. L. Benson Co. The cotton was sold to Benson Co. at 9:10. Mr. Estes also disposed of the seed at 70 cents per hundred. The amount of seed cotton was 1560 pounds, the bale of leaf weighed 540 lbs and brought \$49.14, 1020 pounds of seed at 70 cents per hundred, brought \$7.14 which made the cotton bring \$56.28, a premium of \$25 was given which gave Mr. Estes \$81.28 for being first. Mr. Estes was the first farmer to town with cotton, and T. L. Benson Co. was the first cotton buyers to buy for the season. There will be no need of any of our farmers having to go to San Angelo to sell cotton with the present cotton buyers in our city, our buyers believe in keeping Schleicher money at home.

In addition to these inspections by the Government the Directors must meet once a month and confer on the affairs of the bank, and examine its loans and securities. These are only a few of the safeguards thrown around a National Bank depositor by the Government. 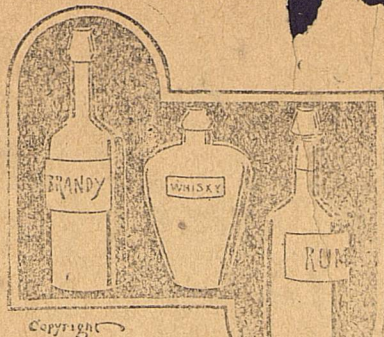
