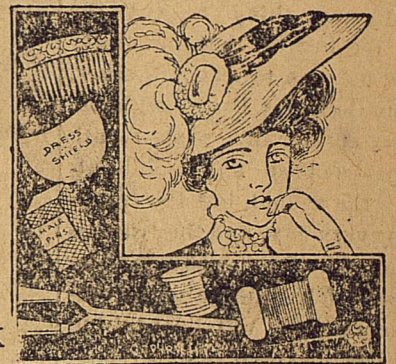

For Independent District
Will Be Approved.

March 13, 1908.

Dear Sir:

In reply to yours letter of the 6th instant, I wish to advise that in my opinion the special act of the Thirtieth Legislature creating your independent school district authorizes the submission of the tax rate for a bond issue in the manner submitted by your district as stated in your letter. The opinion by the Court of Civil

Appeals at Dallas was predicated upon the general law applicable to a tax levy in an independent school district for bond issues which requires a specific tax rate to be fixed. The provisions of the special act creating your district applicable thereto does not so require, and I think your election legal as was submitted and voted upon.

Well back to our meeting, shortly after our arrival the good people began to arrive from every direction, and services were held at 11:15, the house was well filled and Rev. Earls as he always does, delivered the gospel as it is written in the good Book, to a well attentive audience, after the morning services, the organization of the church was taken up, officers were elected a membership taken, which were 14 in number.

As it was announced that dinner would be had on the ground, most every one remained for dinner, every lady got their basket and all spread dinner to gether, and everything in the way of good eatables were there and Oh! that chicken pie, we have always been told to get chicken pie was to attend a Methodist meeting, but we find that the good Baptist folks are also fond of chicken pie, after dinner was spread Rev. Earls asked the blessing, and the hungry crowd feasted for 30 or 40 minutes on the innumerable good things after noon a couple of hours were spent pleasantly talking, when the meeting was called to order by Rev. Earls and the organization of the church resumed. She holds Indian claim for several thousand dollars, this is for stock driven off and stolen by the Indians, part of these claims have already been approved. At the age of 18 she gave her heart to God, her maiden name was Young, two years later she was married to J. A. Whitten and to this union there were born four children of which two survives her, a daughter Mrs. M. A. Ray, N. M., and Judge J. A. Whitten of our city. Her husband died in 1868, ten years after their marriage and left her with four children to battle through life with, and with God assistance she reached the goal. In 1889 her son J. A. Whitten was married and with him she has lived every since. After a long, busy and useful life she died as he had lived—honored, trusted and loved. She reared her own monument while she lived in the hearts of all who knew her. Her life was completed if work all done and well done constitutes completion. Her Christian life was beautiful from its beginning to its close, and through all the vicissitude and sorrows that she met in the way, her faith in God never wavered. But she has left us and today the flowers grow around another grave that hides from our sight all that is mortal of a true and noble woman. Funeral services were held at the Baptist church at 3 o'clock Saturday by Rev. J. M. Earls. Her remains were followed to the city cemetery by her many friends and was a large procession.
