TO THE PEOPLE OF SCHLEICHER COUNTY.

The campaign is over and according to my promise to the people all the way through, I have no complaint to make, feeling sure that the great majority of the voters in the county cast their votes in good conscience as to them seemed best.

Naturally I think they have made a mistake—but an honest mistake is no discredit to any man, and I take this opportunity of saying to those who conscientiously voted against me, that such action on their part will in no wise affect my personal feelings towards them.

While I lost my fight and naturally regret it both on my own account and on the account of the many warm, life-time friends who stood shoulder to shoulder with me all the way, I can say to day with a clear conscience, that I would have made the fight just as I did, had I known in advance that it would be a losing fight, because in my best judgment it has done my county good. Our people needed an awakening on their county affairs and they will, for awhile at least, take note of the manner in which our county government is administered.

The result will necessarily be beneficial—Our schools and school interests will have more attention than they have had heretofore—Taxes will not be levied except as needed for the expenses of the County—Our County business will likely in a short time be conducted at the court house where it belongs, and our quarterly reports showing the financial transactions of the county will be regularly made by the commissioners court and such as are required to be posted and published will be posted and published as required by Statute, and numerous other important county matters will have more attention than they have ever had before.

The attention of the people has been called to these matters and it is now up to the people to see that our county affairs are administered according.

All these things will mean a better government for the county, no matter who may be its official head.

Politically speaking, the campaign has had another good effect—it has made Schleicher County, practically a solid democratic county—it has utterly annihilated the Socialist party in this county—they have never exceeded four or five in number in this county, but they teach and promulgate a doctrine that is a menace to any community in which they live and we ought to be pleased to know that they have been converted to democratic belief.

I am proud indeed that in Precinct No. 1, where we both live, where the people know us both the best, both in our business and in our daily life, the people gave me a fair majority.

In conclusion, I want to say to all the people who voted their own convictions, whether for me or against me, that I can look you in the face as an honest man and say that there is no bitterness in my heart towards you: I made, as I promised, a fair, straightforward, honest fight, and looking

back can say that I took no part in any other mans race, nor did I do any one single thing that I am ashamed for all the people to know.

You will find me in the future as in the past, doing business at the old stand, working all the time for good government, and supporting everything that leads to the up-building of the county and its people along material, moral, social and educational lines.

LIVE STOCK NOTES.

Kingsville, Texas, July 21.—One of the boldest cattle thefts that has been perpetrated in the Lower Rio Grande country since the days of Cortinas, the noted Mexican bandit, was committed in the neighborhood of Samfordyce, terminus of the western branch of the St. Louis, Brownsville & Mexico railroad. Some 300 head of cattle belonging to Ramon Vela and other ranchmen in that section were driven off, and it is believed were safely in Mexico before they were missed.

E. & A. Briggs sold about 150 head of steer yearlings to J. M. Shannon last week for \$14.

Todd & Childress sold on the St. Louis market last Thursday 209 steers at \$3.15.

W. H. Augustine bought last week from M. Seitz about 100 head of stock cattle, but at this writing we are unable to learn the price.

J. E. Boog-Scott and E. B. Harrison of Coleman bought 500 head of 2 and 3-year-old steers from Dick Sellman of Brady. No prices quoted.

San Angelo Standard.

Bob Carruthers returned last Saturday from a trip to St. Louis and Chicago. At Chicago he sold 3'00 head of sheep, averaging from 93 to 100 pounds at prices ranging from \$2.60 to \$4.35.

A solid train load of beef cattle left San Angelo last week for Ft. Worth. It was composed of one car of cows and four of calves shipped by Thomson Bros., two cars of calves shipped by Felix Mann, and five cars of cattle shipped by J. W. Lawhon.

Thirty five head of calves averaging 176 pounds, and 25 head of cows averaging 760 pounds were shipped from San Angelo last week to Fort Worth. The cows sold for \$2.50 and calves \$4.50 per hundred pounds.

J. B. Moore and J. D. O'Daniel sold 179 calves at \$8.50 per head. These were some of the Hume cattle and one of the best bunches of calves recently sold in San Angelo. They were shipped to Ft. Worth.

B. M. Barbee of Eldorado was in the city Wednesday and reported that about eight inches of rain had fallen in the Eldorado country since the first of July and that grass and stock were in as fine shape as could be desired. Mr. Barbee is running several thousand head of sheep on the Robert Bailey land, eight miles from Eldorado.—San Angelo Standard

When recently in company with Mr. Jack Beasley, a pioneer settler of McCulloch county, he drove to a large live oak tree standing near the foot of the mountains on the west side of Salt Creek and directed our attention to a spot at the root of the oak that is only marked by a few small stones such as are found on every mountain side, but are now marking the last resting place of Sebe Goen who was killed by the Indians in the year 1865. Mr. Beasley informed us that Goen, with three comrades, had camped on the top of the mountains and had built a fire to dry their clothing after a rain and that at night had lain down to sleep when the savage crept up and sent an arrow into Goen, the others of his party narrowly escaping with their lives. He also stated that Mr. Warren Hudson of Mercury, was one of the party who returned to lay the remains away where they now rest. We were caused to reflect upon the small consideration with which we view the sacrifices of those who faced danger and death to make way for our civilization, and how neglectful we are in manifesting our gratitude for those who have fallen for the cause. Sebe Goen deserves an enduring monument instead of a few small, rough stones, and a dime from every one in our county would be ample to let the future generations know that our civilization, our peace, our happiness and our safety has been bought with blood, and heroes memory commemorated by an appreciative people.

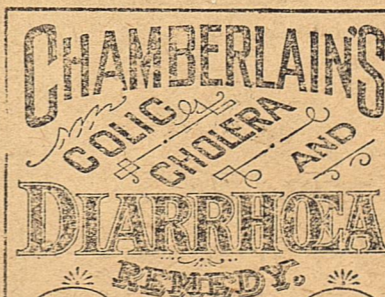
