MORE STEEL FOR ORIENT

President A. E. Stilwell to Leave for Europe to Close Large Deals

LINE TO SAN ANGELO

Stilwell Writes Sweetwater Business Men That Gap Between That Place and Angelo Will Be Completed by Fall

A special from Sweetwater to the Fort Worth Telegram reads as follows:

President A. E. Stilwell, of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient, writes to Sweetwater business men that affairs of the railroad are in splendid shape; that the gap north is to be rapidly laid with steel and that the line from here to San Angelo will be completed by fall. Trains will be running between San Angelo and Wichita Kan., in less than six months.

More rails and more ties are needed and Mr. Stilwell is making propositions to several towns to offer subscriptions and help complete the road. Mr. Stilwell's letter is as follows:

"Kansas City, Mo., May 20, 1908.

—Sweetwater Commercial Club, Sweetwater, Texas: The postal card sent you on Tuesday explains the start made on the sixty-seven mile gap north of Sweetwater. Twenty miles of this steel has already arrived at Sweetwater, and the work will be completed in October.

"Owing to the favorable news from our foreign correspondents, I have thought best to leave for Europe and attempt to close the sales which we had under way when the panic started. Nothing could help me more over there than to be able to state that while this gap was being closed we were also closing the gap south of Sweet

water to San Angelo.

"This would give us 500 miles of continuous road from Wichita to San Angelo Texas. For this work we need 200,000 ties and 65 miles of rail. We have already accumulated at Sweetwater and San Angelo 105,000 ties and 12 miles of rails. To enable us to carry out this plan, I hope you will see your way clear to subscribe to one of the three offers made on the enclosed sheet.

"In six months of as bad time as this country has ever seen, we have finished the line across Oklahoma, have secured the money to finish north of Sweetwater, and have kept work going both east and west of Chihuahua, in Mexico, which is certainly something to be proud of.

"I now believe that with the large production of gold in the world and the promise of great crops in the West, we are on the verge of a splendid bond market and we want to put the Orient where we can take advantage of this and have 1000 miles of our line in operation this year, and our bonds and shares listed in all the markets of the world. 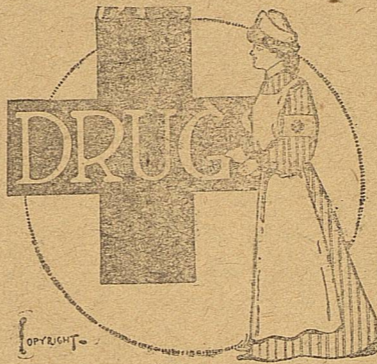

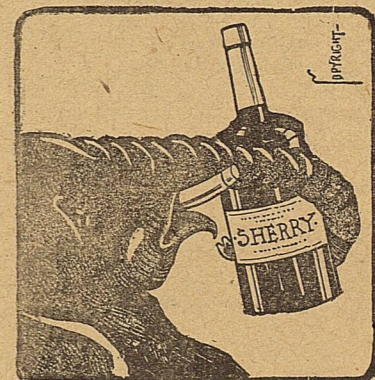

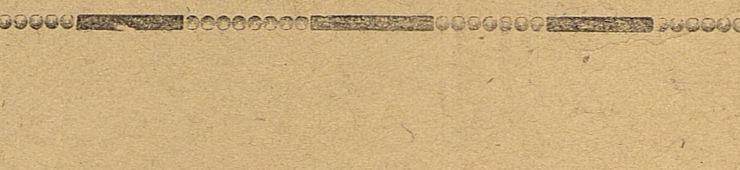

COMMISSIONERS COURT PROCEEDINGS.
On June the 8 A. D. 1908, the commissioners court met as a board of equalization with all members of the court present. The tax roll as assessed by Tax Assessor C. C. Doty was taken in hand and various tracts of land was raised and some reduced, but the total rendition was not changed much as the amount of land raised will offset the amt. reduced.
The Clerk was ordered to notify all persons who's property had been raised in value, that the court would meet on June 26 h 1908, to hear complaints if any might be made, why said property should not be raised. The court also ordered ejection to be held in school district No. 8 and school district No. 5 to see whether or not the tax payers of said districts would abolish their school tax. The court ordered that the county school superintendent pay to the Eldorado Independent School District the sum of \$265.00 out of the general county school fund.
The court ordered that J. A. Whitten be authorized to have the roof of both the Jail and court house repaired and painted.
Since the commissioners court has transferred \$265.00 from the general school fund of the county to the Eldorado Independent school District, the teachers who taught in our last school will get their pay for the last month teaching on last term.


