Carroll In Germany Has No Kin Here

Attracting considerable attention in the news recently has been the case of Army Lt. Matthew Carroll, a Texas A&M graduate who has been threatened in Frankfurt, Germany, with court martial for his refusal to cut his long hair. The erroneous report was also out that his home town was Eldorado, Texas.

Local Carroll families as a result received telephone calls of inquiry. Mr. and Mrs. Tom Carroll and Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Carroll received some calls from out of state.

Lt. Carroll's real home town is Mason City, Iowa, and he is scheduled to be discharged soon from the Army, in lieu of court martial action.

Carroll said he planned to go to Laredo, Texas, with his wife and two small children. That could have been basis for the similarity of names: "Laredo" and "Eldorado" causing the false home town report.

School holidays for the Spring Break have been on this past week.

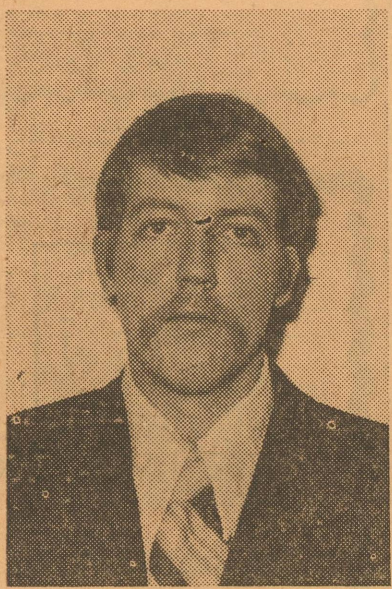
Around the business district:

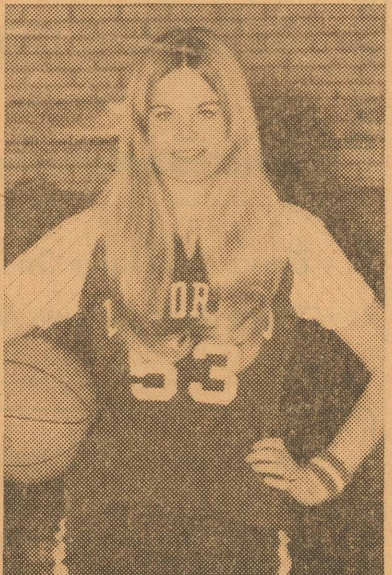

New Eyes Are Free For The Blind

Gov. Dolph Briscoe has proclaimed March, 1975 Eye Bank Month in Texas, and added: "The Eye Banks of our State—as exemplified by the District 2A-1 Lions Eye Bank, Inc., that serves the Permian Basin area—have done much to help combat the problems of sight in Texas by research and assistance in eye surgery."

To the thousands of blind individuals in America today, the best thing that life could offer is the ability to see again. Would you mind if, after your death, your eyes were used to give some totally blind person the precious gift of sight... making it possible for one or more persons to emerge from constant darkness?

The gift is made possible by the 65 Lions Club in West Texas by the organization of the District 2A-1 Lions Eye Bank, Inc. This is not a drive for financial donations. The eye bank is sponsored and supported by the Lions Clubs in the 25 County area of West Texas which are in Lions District 2A-1. This is a drive inaugurated by the eye bank to obtain eye donors so that we may provide physicians with the needed eye tissue—to restore vision through corneal transplant surgery.

Remember, it costs you nothing to give your fellow person your eyes after death.

The quality of your vision makes no difference whatsoever. If the cornea, sclera and vitreous are not diseased, the tissue can be used. Actually, six people can be helped by one pair of eyes. Two corneal transplants can be performed, two sclera (white part of the eye) can be utilized for ruptures, and vitreous (fluid in the eye) can be used for two vitreous transplants.

It is not possible to buy or sell eyes. They must be donated by some generous person to be used at his death. The eyes are furnished to the ophthalmologist and his patient free. Of course there is the usual hospital charges, and the surgeon will charge his usual fee. More than 30,000 persons in the U. S. remain on physicians' waiting lists for donated eyes. Many of them will become totally blind unless we can provide the needed tissue. Now, as never before the opportunity exists to help at least a portion of this number to become employed, tax paying citizens.

Since July 1, 1974 our Lions Eye Bank has helped with 4 corneal transplants. Since 1972 14 persons have regained their vision as a result of our assistance. We have 791 eye donor pledges on file.

Are You Plated? Or Belated?

That's the question motorists may be facing after midnight, April 1st, deadline for motor vehicle registration in Texas. After that time, law enforcement agencies have been instructed to stop motorists not displaying the 1975 plates to remind them of their licensing responsibilities.

Since February 1, county tax offices and selected substations throughout the state have been conducting registration business as usual. Early reports indicate the annual procedure, required of the state's 9.2 million motor vehicle owners, is running smoothly. However, many registrants traditionally wait until the "last minute" to react, resulting in longer lines and necessary delays.

According to a Highway Department spokesman, public response to the new five-year license plate, being issued for the first time in Texas, has been good. In fact, motorists have shown an uncommon interest in the "lab-1" their motor vehicle will wear through 1979.

In lieu of annual replacement, motorists will be issued an adhesive type sticker beginning in 1976 that will update their plate for another year of driving. The sticker will be placed in the debossed upper left corner of the plate. The following year, the tag will be stuck in the upper right corner to cover the debossed "75" and alternated for the ensuing years. Once in place, the tags cannot be easily removed without deterioration, a part of the plan to discourage vandalism or theft.



San Angelo, Tex.—The Texas Highway Department has honored two men from the office of Resident Engineer Joe W. Lane of Sonora.

Cesario M. (Cecil) Martinez has received a 25 year service award, and James C. (Jimmy) Doyle, has received a 20 year service award.

These two men have participated in what might be termed a "great leap forward" in transportation in the Sonora area, during the past 20-25 years. Beginning with a post-war system badly in need of repair and expansion, and going through many improvement and extension projects to culminate in modern interstate Highway 10, these men have had their part in building for the future of Sutton and surrounding counties.

Cecil, a U. S. citizen by choice, was born in Rosales, Mexico, becoming a citizen in 1942. Entering the U. S. Infantry in 1941, Cecil climbed to Staff Sergeant before his discharge in 1945, as the most decorated soldier in Sutton county.

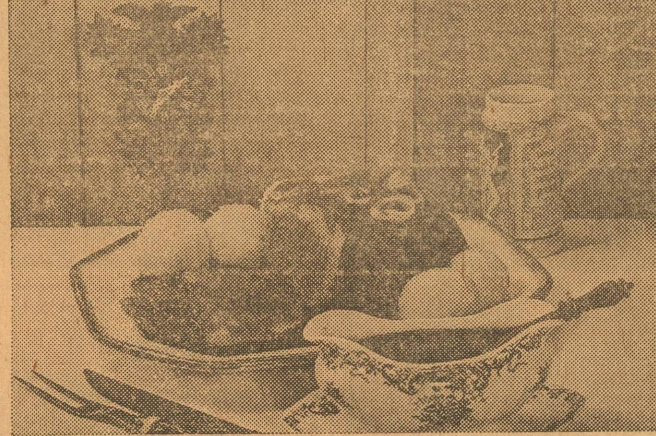

Sauerbraten—A German Contribution

In the three centuries since the first German immigrants arrived in America, several other waves have followed. Germans settled first in Pennsylvania, then in North Carolina, Virginia, Ohio, Illinois, Iowa, Wisconsin, Minnesota, the Dakotas, Kansas and Texas. They brought with them their culture and cuisine. High on the list of favorite German foods which have been added to the American melting pot is the sweet-sour pot roast known as Sauerbraten. In the version here, the gravy is thickened with Argo corn starch, a readily available ingredient which replaces potato flour or cookie crumbs.

- Sauerbraten
- 1 cup red wine vinegar
 - 2 cups water
 - ½ cup dark corn syrup
 - 2 cups chopped celery
 - 1 cup chopped carrot
 - 1 medium onion, sliced
 - 12 peppercorns
 - 4 bay leaves
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 5 pounds beef rump roast
 - 2 cups beef stock or bouillon

Bring to boil vinegar, water, corn syrup, celery, carrot, onion, peppercorns, bay leaves and salt; cool. Place meat in large deep crock, or enamel or stainless steel pot. Add marinade; cover. Marinate in refrigerator 5 to 7 days, turning occasionally. Remove meat; reserve marinade. Dry meat thoroughly. Beginning with fatty side, brown meat slowly. Drain off excess fat. Add 1 cup of the beef stock and the marinade. Cover tightly. Cook over low heat 2 hours or until tender, adding remaining beef stock as needed. Remove meat to hot platter. Prepare gravy. Makes 10 to 12 servings.

Sauerbraten Gravy: Strain stock and vegetables through food mill or sieve. Return to skillet. Add ½ cup dark corn syrup, 1 teaspoon ground ginger and ¼ teaspoon ground cloves. Stir together 6 tablespoons Argo corn starch and 6 tablespoons water. Stir into stock mixture. Stirring constantly, bring to full boil and boil 1 minute. Makes about 5 cups gravy.

Portuguese Sweet Bread For Easter Celebration

Easter, a time for re-awakening, is one of the important Feast Days of the Old World. Most countries have a traditional bread, something important in appearance and taste to celebrate breaking the fast of Lent.

The Azores, a Portuguese Colony off the Coast of North Africa, incorporate an Easter egg into the dough as a symbol of the beginning of life. The egg, hard cooked in the shell, is placed in individual portions of the dough, then secured with a cross fashioned of more dough. It looks special and appropriate for the season.

The bread dough is sturdy and satisfying, made rich with sugar, margarine and eggs. The same dough is also used for the fragrant breakfast rolls that tourists remember nostalgically returning from travels to Portugal. For everyday eating the dough is shaped in a gently rounding roll about six inches in diameter. It is brushed with beaten egg, then sprinkled with coarse sugar before baking. The dough is easy to handle and can be shaped into an impressive braid or coil.

Method for making the traditional bread is the updated Rapidmix method developed by the Test Kitchens of Fleischmann's Yeast. It eliminates the step of dissolving yeast in warm water. Instead the undissolved yeast is added with part of the dry ingredients. Milk, water and margarine are heated over low heat until very warm (120° F. - 130° F.). The margarine does not need to melt. After two minutes of beating, three eggs go into the batter, followed by an additional two minutes of beating with an electric mixer before the last of the flour is stirred in. Kneading the dough requires 8 to 10 minutes.



While the dough rises, hard cook 8 eggs to be inserted when shaping the dough. The eggs may be dyed with vegetable coloring. They are peeled and eaten with the bread for Easter breakfast.

PORTUGUESE SWEET BREAD

- Makes 8 individual breads
- 6 1/2 to 7 1/2 cups unsifted flour
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 packages Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast
- 1 cup milk
- 1/4 cup water
- 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) Fleischmann's Margarine
- 3 eggs (at room temperature)
- 8 hard-cooked eggs

In a large bowl thoroughly mix 2 cups flour, sugar, salt and undissolved Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast.

Combine milk, water and Fleischmann's Margarine in a saucepan. Heat over low heat until liquids are very warm (120° F. - 130° F.). Margarine does not need to melt. Gradually add to dry ingredients and beat 2 minutes at medium speed of electric mixer, scraping bowl

occasionally. Add 3 eggs and 3/4 cup flour. Beat at high speed 2 minutes, scraping bowl occasionally. Stir in enough additional flour to make a soft dough. Turn out onto lightly floured board; knead until smooth and elastic, about 8 to 10 minutes. Place in bowl, turning to grease top. Cover; let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour.

Punch dough down; turn out onto lightly floured board. Divide dough into 8 equal pieces. Take about 1/4 of each piece and set aside. Shape larger pieces into round balls. On greased baking sheets, press large pieces of dough down into circles, about 1/2-inch thick. Place a hard-cooked egg in center of each. Divide each of the remaining 8 pieces of dough in half. Shape each into a 6-inch rope. Using 2 ropes, cross in an "X" over each egg and seal ends underneath dough. Cover; let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour.

Bake at 350° F. 20 to 25 minutes, or until done. Remove from baking sheets and cool on wire racks.

Home Economics At A Glance

Nutritionists will fight food fads in March—to celebrate March, Nutrition Month. Faddism and nutrition nonsense have created a major public health problem, with Americans squandering \$2 billion on food fads every year.

These people are fooled, because they don't know—or won't—accept scientific facts about foods and nutrition.

Ignorance, indifference and fear are the major factors that contribute to the situation.

Victims are persuaded that health foods, wonder diets or super pills can produce magical results.

These people accept false promises of the quack and believe they can regain "youth vigor and charm" or "lose ugly fat, no counting of calories, no exercise."

They also believe claims, such as those having "nerves soothed while miraculously being cured of whatever ails" them.

Food fads are dangerous for several reasons.

Food fads and nutrition quackery are dangerous because essential nutrients may be lacking from the fad diet—malnutrition could result.

Instead, a variety of foods will produce a wholesome diet.

Also, children following a fad diet may not get the nutrients they need for growth and development.

In addition, attention to a serious ailment may be delayed while a food faddist or quack attempts to treat the condition. And faddish foods and treatments are always expensive.

It is never too early to start teaching children good food habits.

Make eating a pleasant experience for children. Children can benefit from eating meals with the family because children are great imitators and learn good eating habits from adults. However, at first it may be desirable for a child to eat at his own table in the kitchen where spills and splatters make no difference. Make mealtime a happy time for children.

—Give the child a chance to quiet down before mealtime. He cannot enjoy his meal if he is tired or overexcited.

—Use child-size dishes and utensils the child can handle. He will enjoy feeding himself.

—Allow the child some freedom in the choice of foods served. This enables him to develop independence and feel grown up like the other family members.

—Serve small servings. A plate heaped with food is discouraging to a child. It is better to serve sec-

onds than to have food left on the plate.

—Do not force-feed a child. If he is not hungry, do not make a fuss over it. His appetite may lag, and he will eat when hungry.

—Serve attractive and colorful foods. Serve foods in a form that the child can handle and chew easily.

—Serve meals at regular times. Make mealtime a relaxed and calm time. Do not rush through the meal.

—Allow the child to eat by himself. He will spill food and finger food with his hands. This is how a child learns the feel and texture of foods.

—Introduce new foods in small amounts along with the favorite foods.

—Have a positive attitude about the food. If the child does not like the food, do not make an issue of it; serve it again in a different way.

Raymond D. Hall of Eldorado serves as Easter Seal Appeal Treasurer for the County.

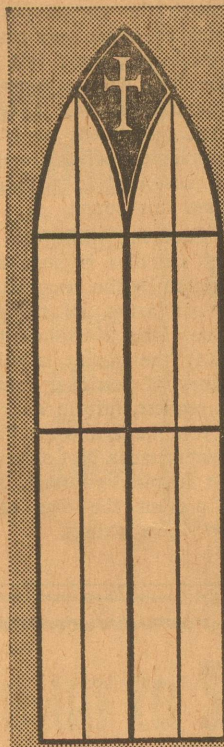

BANKING IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

Flimflam And Bunco-Not Very Funny Games Call it "flimflam" or "bunco," it's still a fraud or a swindle. While the names may sound like the latest TV-advertised parlor game, the player is actually a "con artist" or confidence man, and the victim is likely to be YOU.

The American Bankers Association (ABA) reports that the current economic situation has multiplied the number of con games in operation. Not only are crooks working harder to make a fast buck, consumers, it seems, are less cautious about withdrawing their savings in hopes of beating inflation. And, with the likelihood of tax rebates this spring, the number and variety of swindles is not likely to diminish.

It's unfortunately true that senior citizens seem to be the biggest group of victims. In fact, it's been estimated that 90 per cent of the people taken in are over 70 years of age. Within this group, those approached most often are older ladies living alone. And yet, no one is immune.

How can you protect yourself? It helps to be aware of certain key words that usually tip off a con game. Be on guard, says the ABA, whenever you hear the words: "get rich quick," "something for nothing," "secret plan," or "this opportunity won't be here tomorrow."

Two common swindles involving bank savings are the Pigeon Drop and the Bank Examiner schemes. In the Pigeon Drop, two criminals obtain the confidence of a likely victim and claim they would like to share with him a large find of money. The victim is then asked to donate some "good faith money" to them while waiting for his share of the find. During the wait, of course, the criminals run off with the cash they have been given.

The Bank Examiner swindle is put into operation by a person claiming to be a bank examiner who needs help in catching a dishonest teller. To cooperate with the examiner, the victim is asked to withdraw from his savings account a large amount of money. The con artist then promises to return the cash to the bank, but instead takes off with it.

Although the person posing as a bank examiner may sound very convincing, don't fall for that line. The ABA says under no circumstances will a bank examiner, FBI agent or other law enforcement official request a bank customer to withdraw cash from an account.

One final tip: while the variety of swindles is huge and only limited by the imagination of the con artist, all swindles have one thing in common - eventually the victim is asked for money. If you ever receive such a request, inform an officer of your bank and the local police department. Not only will you be helping yourself, you might prevent the loss of a neighbor's life savings.
