J. B. MURRAH BUYS RANCH.
J. B. Murrah, for many years a prominent cattleman of the San Angela country, but now heavily interested in live stock and lands out in Val Verde county, is in the city, having arrived yesterday from Del Rio. He was joined by Mrs. Murrah and they will spend a few days at the fair. Mr. Murrah has just bought from I. A. Wilson 3000 sheep, 1400 cattle and 33,000 acres of land and succeeded to the lease of 7000 acres additional, also held by Mr. Wilson. Mr. Murrah closed out his live stock interest in the Concho country something over a year ago, as well as his land interests with the exception of his holdings in San Angelo property. "My home is still in San Angelo," said he yesterday, "but if I find that I am too inconveniently situated to give the proper attention to my interests out West, I will remove to San Antonio. Some of my friends here construe this as an admission that I will move here shortly, but I have not said so. San Antonio is, no doubt, a delightful residence city, but San Angelo is putting on a good many city airs now, and, like San Antonio, has a great scope of country tributary that is being rapidly developed. Conditions in the Del Rio country are quite satisfactory just now and I have demonstrated my faith in the future of that section by making my investments there recently."—San Antonio Express.

Messers James Ford, T. H. Ivey Mrs. Ivey and Miss Ola Kilpatrick were shopping in San Angelo the first of the week.

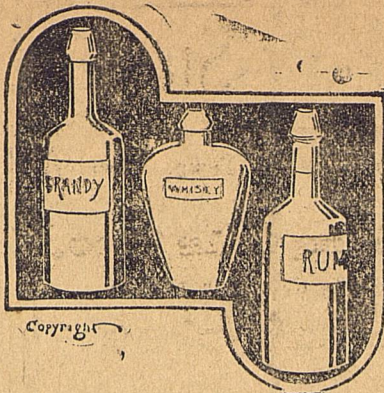
Mr. and Mrs. McCarty returned to their home this week in San Angelo, they have been visiting friends in these parts for the last several days.

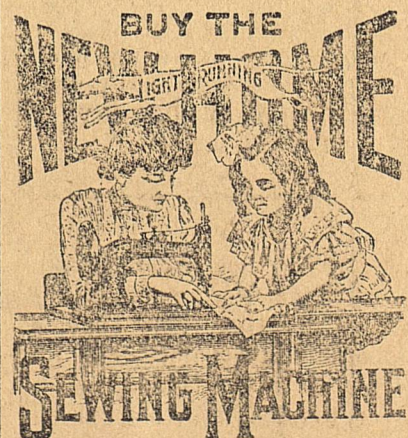

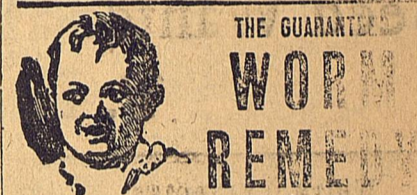

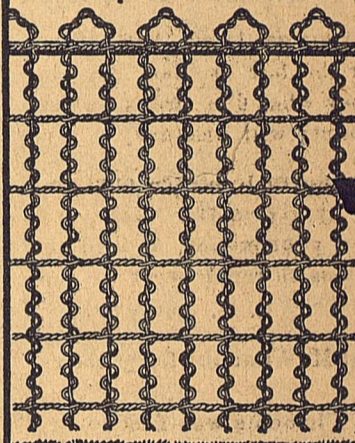
