The court ordered that Mrs. A. W. Noguess be allowed to change the road running from Sonora to Ft. McKayette, provided that the new road be put in good condition by Mrs. A. W. Noguess.

The quarterly reports of the different county officer were approved by the court.

The court rejected the report of the jury of view here to fore appointed to view out a road from Eldorado to the Adams school house, the court rejected said report believing that said route was not the most practical route. The court set a side \$100 each for commissioners, J. T. Jones and Lee Williams to be spent in improving the public highways in their respective precinct.

The Eldorado and Ozona road proposition was postponed until the next term of court in order to give commissioner John Rae time to converse with the people who live along the road from Jule Ramseys residence on West.

The court ordered that all county officers leading stationary, put in their orders with the county clerk and he is to receive bids on same, and let said work to the lowest and best bid from stationary firms.

The court ordered that the county printing of such orders and notices as the law requires to be published be awarded to the Eldorado Times, free of charge as per bid filed on Nov. 11 1908.

The commissioners were allowed pay for sitting as commissioner and the court adjourned.
