FINE RAINS
Saturday evening about 6:30 o'clock a good rain visited Schleicher county, coming from the North west, the rain was accompanied by a heavy dust storm and a very strong wind, during considerable damage to small out houses and fences, and blew down several wind-mills, a heavy hail went through the Porter neighborhood, knocking the small limbs and bark from the timber, in some places the hail drifts were two feet deep. The large draws near Green Chaney was away out of its banks, and lots of stock is thought to have been lost in the ice cold water. Lee Williams who owns a ranch about 16 miles north of town reports losing 63 head of high graded cows out of about 83 head he had in a small pasture, together with a Registered bull that cost about \$300. The rain was a much needed thing and all faces are wearing smiles, the fall in Eldorado was about 2 inches, being lighter to the south and much heavier to the north but covering most all portions of the county. Lots of stockmen were preparing to move their stock to grass, but this rain will insure grass to nearly all the stockmen of this county. And will bring up the crops and keep that which was already up from dying, everything looks lovely and every body is all smiles and much elated over the recent down pour of rain.

J. E. Dayton and family, E. A. Nall and family and A. M. Nall and wife, all went to Christoval Saturday to fish and take their father who has been visiting them, to San Angelo. They camped near the Anson ranch Saturday evening, and were out in the heavy rain and hail that fell Saturday eve. Mr. Dayton on his return Sunday eve, reported hailstone falling on them as large as hen eggs, after the rain and hail, they went to the Anson ranch and spent the night. Mr. Dayton also reports the river on a big rise Sunday morning, it liked about 4 feet getting up to the Anson ranch house, he also reports that the dam at Christoval being washed away, and also the dam at Cole Creek. Mr. Dayton got lot's of nice fish after the water began to go down, and through his kindness and some of our Christoval friends we had an over dose of fish Sunday, for which our thanks can not be express in words. Mr. Dayton says the rain was heavy at Christoval and lasted all the way to Eldorado, but was not so heavy here as at Christoval. We were glad to see their return with out no one hurt as their many friends here were uneasy about them.

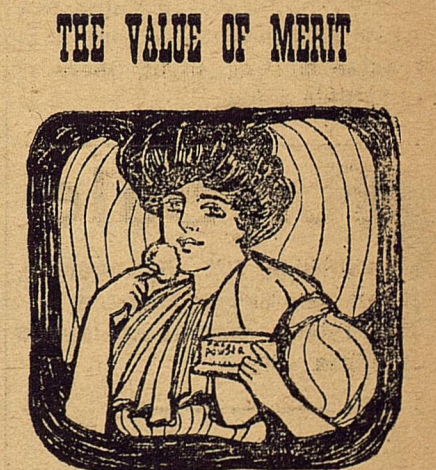
HEAVY HAIL AT RUDD.
Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Jones and family and Miss Allis Pool went to the J. F. Craig ranch Saturday and returned Monday, they report that the hail storm in that neighborhood Saturday was a disaster a fair, the hail were washed up in drifts to a depth of 4 feet deep, 20 feet wide and several hundred yards long, and is reported to have killed several head of stock.

G. H. Farrington was in from his ranch Monday, and say the hail did lot's of damage in his neighborhood, he brought in a peach tree limb that had been beaten up by the hail, he reports an 8 inch rain on his ranch.

Lee Williams was in the city Monday attending commissioners court, Mr. Williams report the loss of about \$1,500 worth of stock on his ranch, by the rise in the draw, he had 83 cows and a registered bull in a small pasture and 63 head of the cows and the five bull drowned, the bull cost \$300. Mr. Williams says the water only liked about a foot getting into his house. It is thought that Anson was also a heavy loser by the turbulent water of the Concho.

PROHIBITION SPEAKING.
Elder Jessie P. Sewell of San Angelo lectured the people of our town Tuesday night on Prohibition, Mr. Sewell is a gifted speaker and can handle his subject with credibility, this is his second lecture to the people of this county, as he spoke here last year, besides showing the evils of the saloons in Texas to ward immorality, he plainly showed how they managed to defeat the demand of the people, in our 31st legislature, and urged upon the people of this county to support men who they knew would stand by the demands of the people. He said in reference to our representative of the 102nd district, (Mr. Brown F. Lee) he had stood by the demands of this people, not only stood by their demands but introduced the best prohibition bill that was introduced before the 31st legislature, but said that Hon. Claud Hudspeth, had betrayed his people, voted against the will of the people, and also voted against any law that was for the upbuilding of humanity, and supported all laws that were immoral, and he urged the people here to vote for some body besides Claud Hudspeth.

Mr. Sewell lectured lasted about an hour, and at the close of his lecture, he organized a Club that pledged to do all in their power for State Wide Prohibition with County Judge J. A. Whiten as Chairman and A. T. Wright Secretary.

E. Stanley Field, of the firm of Waller, Shaw & Field, architects, has returned from Eldorado. He met the school board Wednesday morning, and submitted his plans which were adopted by the trustees. The plans are for a two-story stone structure that will entail a cost of approximately \$16,000. It is hoped to have the new building ready for occupancy by the first of January. NOTICE OF BOND ELECTION.

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held at Court house in the town of Eldorado, within the Eldorado Independent School Districts, on the 17th day of July, 1909, to determine whether the bonds of said district shall be issued to the amount of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20 000.00) payable forty years from their date and bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, for the purpose of constructing and equipping a Public Free School Building of stone material and whether there shall be annually levied, assessed and collected on all the taxable property in said district, for the current year and annually thereafter while said bond, or any of them, are outstanding, a tax sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal at maturity.

C. C. Doty has been appointed manager of said election, which shall be held as nearly as may be possible in conformity with the general laws of the State.

No persons shall vote at said election unless he be a qualified voter under the Constitution of the laws of this State, and a tax payer in said Eldorado Independent School District.

Those in favor of the issuance of the bonds and levying of the tax shall write or print on their ballots "For The Bond and Tax" and those against the issuance of the bonds and the levying of the tax shall write or print on their ballots "Against the Bonds and the Tax".

Said election was ordered by the board of trustees of said Eldorado Independent School District by order passed on the 16th day of June, 1909 and this notice is issued pursuant to said order. Dated this 16th day of June, 1909

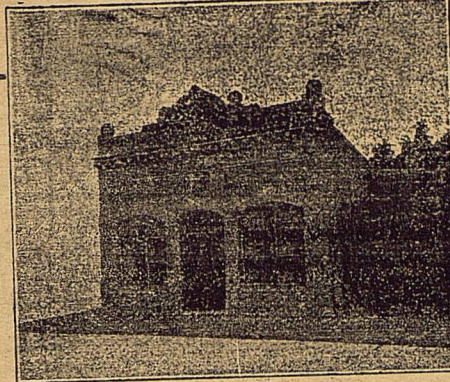
