Dear Sir: One of the ways to get rich is to make a quarter look like thirty cents.

There will be no more bond approvals by the attorney general's department until Sept. 1. Office Assistant Attorney General Sluder, who has charge of the approvals, left tonight on his vacation, to be gone until that time, and no action will be taken in his absence.

During the first twelve days of this month Judge Sluder approved approximately \$1,000,000 in bond issues, while up to this time he has approved bonds amounting to \$8,000,000.—Fort Worth Record.
