**SCHLEICHER COUNTY SCHOOL LAND INTEREST COMING IN.**  
W. T. Conner, Treasurer of Schleicher county, received last week from parties who have bought small tracts of land from Ben Long of Ballinger, (he having bought same from W. L. Saye of Comanche) the interest on the portion they bought. But owing to the fact that W. L. Saye failed to file a plat of the land according to contract, (as the man who bought the land from Saye has failed to comply with the contract) the interest had to be returned. Mr. Saye claims that he filed the plat, but the record doesn't show it, and without the plat of the land the treasurer can not receive any interest on any one portion of the land. He could however receive the interest on the whole 4 leagues. It can be plainly seen now that this county will have the same trouble handling these sales as if she had made them herself, the only difference is Saye receiving the profit, which was something over \$100,000, and this county will have to deal with the small buyers just the same as if she had subdivided the land and sold it to home-seekers. Sabe?

### DEL RIO WANTS ORIENT.

Del Rio, Texas, July 11, 1909.

Dear Sirs: We have been corresponding with Mr. Stillwell in regard to the extension of his railroad from San Angelo to Del Rio, and he gives us no hope short of two years.

### STATE ELECTION ON AUGUST 3.

There will be held in every county in Texas on the first Tuesday in August an election to amend the state constitution.

The amendment to Article 11, Sec. 4 and 5 of the constitution is for following purpose and reads: Any town or city that has a population of ten thousand or less may be chartered alone by general law. They may levy, assess and collect an annual tax to defray the current expenses of this local government, etc. This article by amending will read five thousand instead of ten thousand inhabitants.

Section 5 reads: "Cities having more than ten thousand inhabitants may have their charter granted or amended by special act of the legislature, and may levy, assess and collect taxes." There is no change in the above article and section except as to the population of the towns and cities, and the proposed change is from ten thousand to five thousand population.

Article 7 is to be amended so as to validate all school bonds that have heretofore been issued, and authorizing the assessing and collecting of the interest and principal of same, by adding thereto section 3. In other words, it is to make all bonds that have been previously voted, become legal. THE SUCCESS would urge the support of this amendment.

See 3 of Art. 7 of the constitution of the state of Texas is to be amended so as to give Independent School Districts, that is composed out of two or more counties; the right to levy, assess and collect any special tax that may be voted by a majority of the qualified tax payers of the district. The former law requires all districts to be in one county.

THE SUCCESS would like to see all of the above proposed amendments carry, but especially do we urge the support of those appertaining to the advancement of education—namely, Art. 7, section 3 as also the additions of Section 24 to Art. 7.

With more rain these farms will yield an abundance of feed, such as corn, maize, Kaffir corn and cane.

The best country in Texas is along this route, and hence we cannot see any reason why railroad builders could not be induced to come our way.

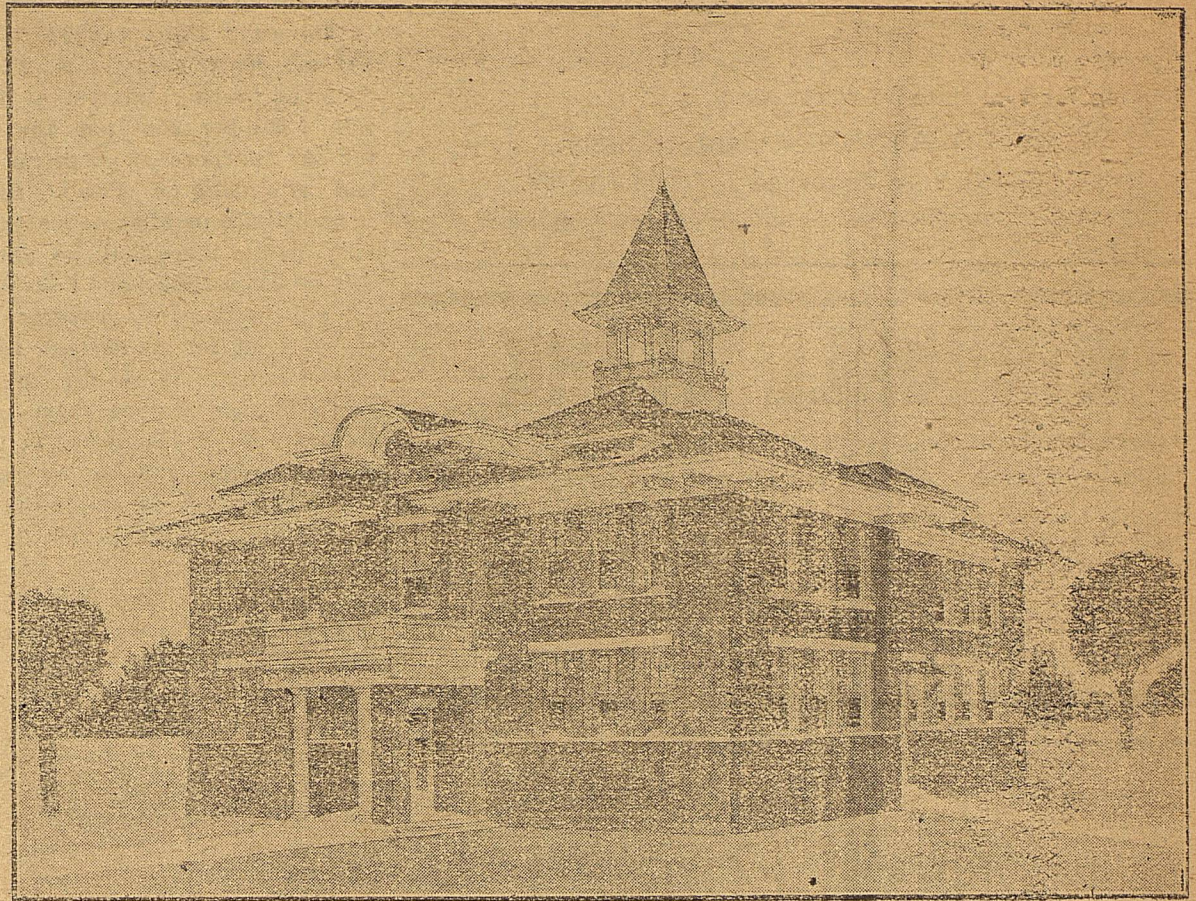

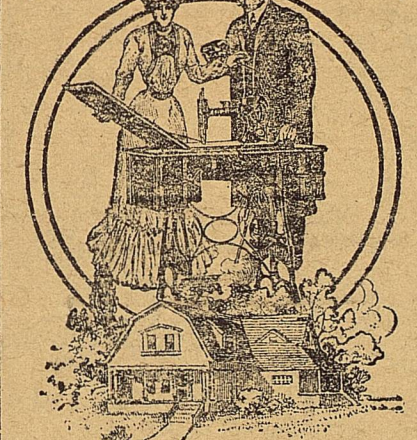
