SCHOOL BONDS CARRIED BY A VOTE OF 77 FOR AND NOTHING AGAINST.

Again the Eldorado Independent School District, voted on bonds for the purpose of erecting a new school building. The amount being \$20,000 and the vote was 77 for the bonds and nothing against them. We wish to congratulate the people of this district by being a united people, and all favor good schools and good school building. Eldorado, with the exception of Christoval has done better than any of our neighbors, by voting by a unanimous vote, a bond issue for school purposes. Saturday was a fair day and the people began to come in early and all worked for one end and that was to make our vote unanimous.

BIDS FOR SCHOOL BUILDING.

Monday was the day set by the School Board to open bids for the erection of our new school building, the following bids were opened.

Mr. Williams of San Angelo was awarded the contract, as he was the lowest bidder. The building will be a brick veneer built of red brick, will be built from the foundation to the bottom of the windows, with white stone, from their up will be brick veneered, and furrowed on inside, work will begin by August 1st, and will be finished by Jan. 1st, every day after January 1st, that the building is completed, the contractor is not due the School Board \$25 per day.

WHAT SHEEP WILL PRODUCE.

Earl Booth, last year bought 25 head of yearling ewes for \$100.00, and from the 25 ewes he raised 21 lambs this spring, he sheared his sheep which had a 12 month clip and got 335 pounds of wool off of 36 head. He sold his wool for 23 cents per pound, which brought him \$77.05, he sold his sheep to Mr. Douglass for \$3 per head, having 46 head, the flock brought \$138, which makes counting what the wool brought \$115.05 profit on the 25 ewes. Earl is a son of one of our prominent stock-farmers, J. H. Booth, and will probably go back in the sheep business on a larger scale, the sheep were kept on a small 60 acre pasture most of the time and were well cared for by the owner.

Railroad Meeting Saturday Night, \$14,875 Raised in Few Minutes, Committee Selected To Solicit More, LANIN To Be Here About August 5th.

As was published in last issue of THE SUCCESS a rail road meeting was held at the court house Saturday night for the purpose of discussing a proposition from J. Lanin, a man who has contracted with San Angelo and Sterling City to build a rail road between those two cities. He proposes to come this way if the people of this city and county will do the right thing. Mr. Lanin is going to build his road to Kerville and extend north from Sterling City. The road when finished is said, to be the longest road in the world. The citizens here are very much enthused over the matter and a committee of eight are busy now canvassing the county in getting up a liberal bonus. Mr. Lanin has promised to meet our committee about August 5th and look over the route through our city and county. The route through Eldorado to Kerville is the most feasible one that can be selected between these two points, and will traverse one of the best farming sections in the state. Mr. Lanin said while in conversation with Sam H. Hill, of this county, that he wanted a route that would not have many bridges, and one that would pass through some good country. Eldorado and Schleicher county will offer Mr. Lanin about \$50,000 to come this way and with the many advantages that this route contains, it is thought by our people that the road can be secured. Below is the proceedings of the meeting held Saturday night, which shows that these people are interested in Mr. Lanin and his proposition. The amount raised at meeting Saturday night was \$14,875.00.

Railroad meeting called at Court House, Eldorado, Texas. Meeting called to order by O. C.

Doty. He was then elected chairman and E. A. Nall Sec. Object of meeting stated by M. B. McKnight, viz., Mr. Lanin, promoter of the Sterling City and San Angelo Railroad under contract, proposes to build said road south from San Angelo through Schleicher County and the town of Eldorado, if the people of Schleicher county will give right-of-way and a liberal bonus. Discussion on the subject by those present. Moved and carried that subscriptions for raising bonus for railroad be taken, said cash bonus and any inducement that may be offered Mr. Lanin if he agree to complete his rail road into Eldorado within 12 months. Should he decline to accept the proposition, same is then open for any other who would construct a railroad into Eldorado within a above named time 12 month. \$14,875 was subscribed by those present as a starter. Moved and carried that there be a soliciting committee of 8 men to canvas the county, and that the chair appoint the committee. The following were appointed, J. S. Pelt, E. A. Nall, John Roach Sol Mayer, J. Keeney, J. E. Dayton, O. C. Roberts and Lee Williams, J. B. Christian and M. B. McKnight are also requested to write nonresidents for subscriptions to said railroad bonus. The soliciting committee is to appoint an entertainment committee at their meeting Saturday July 24th. Entertainment committee to meet Mr. Lanin at San Angelo, Aug. 5th and show him the most practical route through Schleicher county. Moved and carried that W. F. Ford and Joab Campbell, be appointed to get up subscription list for committeemen. Moved and carried that each of

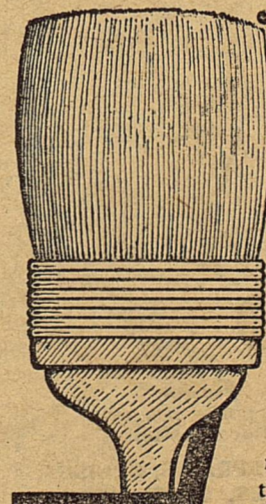

VOTE FOR SCHOOL AMENDMENT AUG. 3

Texas should not be satisfied with anything less than the best educational facilities for its children; and to this end, the patriotic citizens of the State should lend their support to all measures that promise educational progress.

It is not only important to have good schools and good school buildings for a large per cent of the children of Texas, but it is even necessary to place good schools within reach of every child in the State. The State will not do its full duty until all of its children are accessible to good schools, and so far as practicable, are in regular attendance upon school. The multiplication of good schools is, therefore, a vital question, to which progressive citizens should give serious attention.

The amendment to Section 3 Article VII, authorizing the formation of county-line school districts, and the amendment to Article VII, adding thereto Section 3, validating the school districts of Texas and the bonded indebtedness thereof, will contribute much to the movement for the improvement of schools in Texas.

No community should be denied the right to organize a school district merely because such community embraces territory in more than one county; and no district should be without constitutional warrant to provide for the payment of honest debts. These amendments are absolutely necessary in order to give relief to districts embracing territory in two or more counties and to other districts that have school bonds technically invalid.

Many experiences teach that constitutional amendments are defeated at the polls unless they are thoroughly explained to the voters and intelligently advocated. THE SUCCESS in its last issue tried to explain the difference in the old law and the law that is to be voted upon, and urged the support of these amendments. We again ask the voters to try and familiarize themselves with these amendments and after doing so we are confident you will support them by your vote.

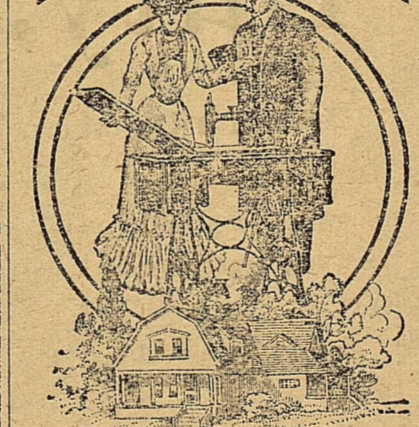
