Austin, Tex.—The debate goes on over whether the legislature will be faced with a billion dollar tax bill in 1977—or none at all.

Comptroller Bob Bullock stated that if lawmakers continue their recent spending patterns they will have to pass a record tax measure. But House Speaker Bill Clayton predicted the legislature will be "trying to maintain the status quo" and will avoid growth of the bureaucracy. In spite of Bullock's repeated warnings, Clayton said he is not convinced that a major tax bill will be required.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe at a governmental conference in San Antonio stated government at all levels must become more efficient and economical. He called specifically for "redirection" of spending for education.

State Sen. Peyton McKnight of Tyler, speaking more harshly, said runaway spending in education may bankrupt the state if it isn't brought under control. He called for a lid on education spending.

Meanwhile, the new Joint Advisory Commission of Government Operations (Little Hoover Commission) help its second meeting and adopted a time-table for a year's inquiry into 250 state units of government. Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby warned members to keep their eyes on the big spending areas and avoid "rabbit hunts."

Postponed Again

The Senate for the third time postponed the impeachment trial of District Judge O. P. Carrillo. By a 16-10 vote, senators delayed the trial until January 5 to await outcome of a Judicial Qualifications Commission hearing and federal court final action on Carrillo's income tax conviction.

Carrillo said he will never resign his post on the Duval-Star-Jim Hogg counties bench, although he has been suspended since last August following House passage of articles of impeachment.

Short Snorts

Governor Briscoe told a student group he is still thinking about running for a third term.

The Secretary of State's office is looking into corporate contributions to Texas politicians by major oil companies.

Texas Utilities Commission adopted new procedural rules.

Lo-Vaca Gathering Co., which sometimes had trouble supplying its own Texas customers, can start selling surplus gas out of state, under a Texas Railroad Commission ruling.

The State Democratic Executive Committee will meet December 8 in Fort Worth and consider rules which would speed the pace of slow-moving party conventions.

Blue Cross officials resisted a state audit of the insurance firm's internal practices as long as they deliver Medicaid services as contracted.

Texas Education Agency will launch a survey to determine how many Mexican pupils are attending the largest schools in Texas.

Schleicher Extender

Suburban Propane Gas Corp. No. 2-B Doris M. Rousselot, 5/8 mile west and 3/4 mile south and slightly east extension on the west side of the Turkey Roost (upper Pennsylvania gas) field of Schleicher County, 18 1/2 miles southwest of Eldorado, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 455,000 cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 84,104-1. Gravity of the gas is 66.4 degrees.

Location is 660 feet from the south and west lines of 99-5-P. H. Lee.

Another Gas Plant To Be Located In Schleicher Area

CRA, Inc., will install a 25-million-cubic-foot-per-day "grass roots" cryogenic-type gas processing plant, along with some 100 miles of gas gathering lines, near Eldorado, Texas according to Ken Harrald, director, gas plant operations.

The plant, when operating at designed capacity, will recover some 120,000 gallons per day of liquefied petroleum products. The pipeline and plant construction are under way. Plant start-up is scheduled for November, 1976. Tulsa Pro-Quip, Tulsa, Oklahoma, has been awarded the contract for the plant's design and construction.

A twin cryogenic plant also is being installed at CRA's gas products plant in Mertzon, Texas. It is scheduled for completion in December, 1976.

"This new cryogenic plant will increase the ethane, propane, and butane recovery, providing more liquid petroleum gas liquids for our patrons while improving the plant's operating efficiency," Harrald said.

Eldorado is about 45 miles south of San Angelo in western Texas. Mertzon is about 40 miles southwest of San Angelo.

CRA operates refineries at Coffeyville and Phillipsburg, Kansas, and Scottsbluff, Nebraska; as well as gas products plants at Gillette, Wyoming; Lamont, Oklahoma; and Quitman, Texas.

CRA, Inc., is a refining subsidiary of Farmland Industries, Inc., headquartered in Kansas City, Missouri. Farmland Industries is a regional farm supply and marketing cooperative and it serves some 2,100 local associations in 15 Mid-western states.

The understanding here is that the plant will be located on the Tisdale ranch in the Huldale area, of this county.

NUCLEAR ENERGY GETS TOP PRIORITY

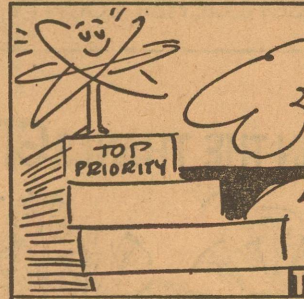
Because many scientists and economists feel that increases in fuel prices will hamper the U.S. economic recovery, a recent government-sponsored energy development plan has given top priority to coal and harnessing the energy of the atom to generate electricity.

Actually, the United States and the world are running out of oil and gas, which now account for more than three-quarters of our energy usage. Therefore, many scientists feel that we must switch to more abundant fuels, coal and uranium, which are utilized in the form of electricity.

Many scientists predict that this country's energy consumption will double by the year 2000 and that major new sources of domestic energy supply must be developed to replace oil and gas.

We do not have a short-

age of energy resources, but a shortage of two particular resources — oil and natural gas. These furnish 78 per cent of our energy usage but constitute only a small fraction of our resource base.



Solar energy and nuclear fusion appear to be promising solutions to our long-term needs, but their feasibility has not been demonstrated. In the next 20 to 30 years, coal and nuclear power are our most plentiful resources.

Because nuclear power is cheaper than electricity generated from coal, it will help hold down energy costs.

LET'S TALK TURKEY

For good reason, Benjamin Franklin suggested the turkey as a more fitting emblem for America than the eagle: Wild turkey fed both the Virginia and New England colonists. It was the main dish at that first Thanksgiving. Few colonists had ever seen an eagle.

When an American says: "Let's talk turkey," you know what he means is, "Let's get down to the main issue of what is yours and what is mine and how we can share fairly."



All of which leads us to Thanksgiving dinner and one of the recipes traditionally used—Old Fashioned Stuffing, made with packaged herb seasoned stuffing to which only onions and celery have been added.

Old Fashioned Stuffing

- 1/2 pound butter or margarine
- 3/4 cup chopped onion
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 2 cups water
- 1 package (1 pound) herb seasoned stuffing

Looking Back

Miss Chris Enochs

Miss Chris Enochs came to this county in the fall of 1901 at the age of 19. They (her family) came to see the Lowmans who were good friends of the family. They sold their property in Travis county and moved to Schleicher county. Right after coming to Schleicher county her mother, sister and herself all came down with typhoid fever. They all made it through okay with the help of Dr. Taylor.

The family settled in town but when they first came out here they had planned on filing for some land but the cattlemen had leased it all at that time. Miss Enochs stated that they finally got a place which is now where Oran Enochs lives.

There wasn't any water or anything and they had to stay on it to keep it. Miss Chris's dad used to haul the surveying crew that was building the railroad to Del Rio.

In fact the whole family worked including Miss Enochs who cooked for the crew. Before they saved enough to build a house they lived in a wood floored tent but when the railroad was finished they built they home and drilled a well. In 1905 they filed on four sections of land, but a cattleman claimed it was the wrong four sections. They went to court and lost the claim. After that Miss Enochs filed on 160 acres where they built their home and drilled their well. It cost \$300 back then to drill a well.

In about 1908 Miss Enochs worked for the Telephone office in Eldorado and she and Miss Mildren Jones lived above the office. They were good friends and visited often until Miss Jones married Wren Jackson and moved away. Miss Enochs quit the telephone company and moved home when the drought hit in 1918.

Miss Enochs tells the story of her and Edna her sister; they were coming back from Del Rio in the hack and the wheel came off. She stated that they were really stuck. They chased the wheel down and managed to put it back on themselves. Miss Chris stated that it was wild country back then and everyone carried a gun and they were really scared.

Miss Chris told me about the dances she used to attend in Fort McKavett. They went by a stage-coach drawn by four horses. Miss Chris thinks it took them about three hours to get there.

Miss Chris is a citizen that we all can be proud to have here in Schleicher county and we in the Nursing Home are enjoying having her live with us. -Ruthie Dacy, AD

ANSWERS TO TURKEY QUESTIONS

Home Economics At A Glance

Can Sale-Priced Turkey For Later Use

Wise consumers can take advantage of turkey bargains by canning about half of a large bird bought on sale and freezing the other half for a holiday dinner.

Canning the turkey is also a way to extend the use of the pressure canner when vegetable canning is done.

To prepare turkey for canning, rinse the bird thoroughly in cold water and wipe dry. Use a sharp knife to disjoint the bird; then sort into meaty and bony pieces. Set aside giblets to can separately.

Pour enough hot water or broth over raw, meaty pieces in a pan to cover the meat. Put lid on and cook until pieces show almost no pink in the center when cut.

Cut turkey parts small enough to fit loosely into the jars. Leave one inch headspace at the top of the jar. Add one-half teaspoon salt per pint if desired, or it may be left out for people on low-salt diets.

Cover the turkey with boiling broth, again leaving one inch headspace at the top of the jar. Avoid overfilling the jar to prevent loss of liquid during processing.

Wipe the jar rim clean. Fat left there will interfere with sealing. Place the lid with the sealing compound next to the glass. Screw the metal band tightly.

Have two to three inches of boiling water in the pressure canner to prevent it from boiling dry during processing. Place jars in canner on rack and fasten lid securely.

Let steam escape from open petcock or weighted gaug opening for 10 minutes. Shut the petcock or put on the weighted gauge. When pressure rises to 10 pounds, start counting time. Adjust heat to keep pressure steady.

Process pint jars of turkey with bone for one hour and five minutes and quarts for one hour and 15 minutes. Process turkey without bone in pint jars for one hour and 15 minutes for 1 1/2 hours.

Slide canner off the heat when time is up. Let pressure fall to zero. This takes about 30 minutes. Wait a minute or two and open petcock slowly. Unfasten cover, tilting far side up to keep steam away from the face.

Cool jars overnight, wipe clean and label.

Canned turkey may be used in casseroles, soups and stews. For dishes requiring cold turkey, heat the turkey for 20 minutes to insure safety against botulism. Then chill and use in salads and sandwiches.

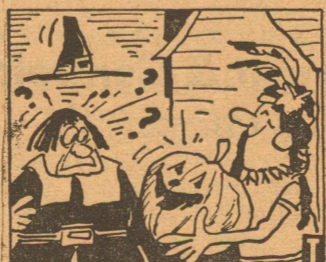

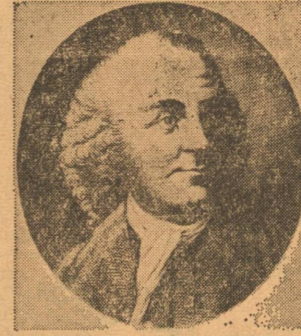

The POWER of PRINT in AMERICAN HISTORY 1776-1976

BEN FRANKLIN AND THE COLONIAL PRINTING INDUSTRY

This article is adapted from an original and unusual historical program of monographs entitled *The Power of Print in American History—1776 to 1976*. The program was created by the St. Regis Paper Company in an effort to rededicate our heritage and renew our pride in our country's achievements.

Although the first printing done in the American Colonies occurred in 1638, it wasn't until nearly 100 years later that, largely due



to the efforts of Benjamin Franklin, the American printing industry really developed.

After an apprenticeship here and in England that began when he was 12, Franklin opened his first printing office in 1728. In the 1730's he became involved in the

paper-making side of the business and helped increase greatly the output of colonial paper mills.

Another aspect of printing on which Franklin exerted far-reaching influence was in typefaces, typography, and the changing styles of letter design. He created the first type foundry in the colonies and developed one-of-a-kind designs for Pennsylvania's paper money by printing from a mold made from an actual leaf.

He established print shops in several cities and had them all carry the same type fonts, so he could run off large printing assignments quickly and uniformly.

Franklin's special combination of writing and printing talents not only made him a success and eventually an international celebrity, it helped to create basic and long-lasting factors in American culture and history. He had the advantage of being able to put his ideas into print where they gained the widest possible circulation and response.

In his weekly newspaper, *The Pennsylvania Gazette*, and in a great variety of printed pieces, he helped to inform and to create wide discussion on a range of

public and political matters. Of all Franklin's writing and publishing ventures, however, none were so popular, and likely none so profitable, as his *Poor Richard's Almanacs*. Almanacs were the most universally owned and read books in the colonial household except for the Bible. Franklin's almanac played a powerful role in shaping American attitudes, moral precepts and personal goals.

In his later years, he advocated a number of causes,



and published papers supporting the abolition of slavery more than 75 years before Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation.

Ben Franklin died in 1790, but the power of his mind and thinking still lives in his printed and reprinted words.

HOW TO REDUCE YOUR HOME FUEL BILLS

Chances are good that your home's annual heating and cooling costs are a lot higher than they need to be.

Care to find out how much higher?

Then take an hour to give your home a top-to-bottom energy efficiency check up. You may be surprised at the amount of



insulating your attic can reduce fuel and energy waste by as much as 30%.

fuel and money you are wasting—fuel and money you could save, simply by installing such readily available home improvements as building insulation, storm doors and windows, and caulking and weatherstripping.

To begin diagnosing your home's saving potential, you'll need the following tools: a flashlight, a ruler, two thermometers, a screwdriver and a candle.

First Stop—The Attic

Since the roof or attic accounts for a major percentage of a home's energy waste, it makes good sense to begin the check up in the attic. Here the first thing you'll want to check is the amount of insulation you have—or don't have.

Simply take your ruler and measure the thickness of the insulation you find.

Don't be alarmed if you don't find any. If your house is like 35 million others, built before 1960 when energy was cheap and plentiful, there's a good chance that the attic has little or no insulation, or contains only three to four inches. If your house is newer, say built within the last 10 years, you could find six or more inches.

Insulating your attic is probably the best home-energy-efficiency investment you can make.

Even as little as just six inches of Fiberglas insulation can save from \$50 to \$200 a year in home fuel costs.

Interior Living Spaces

The next step in the energy-efficiency check up is to inspect interior living spaces for fuel waste.

But before you walk away from the attic door, stop. Is the door tightly sealed around all four edges? To find out, light the candle and hold it near where the door meets the frame. If the candle flickers, you're wasting fuel. Even a 1/4-inch crack can cost you as much as \$4.50 a year.

Now, while you have the candle, perform the same test on all other doors and windows between heated and unheated spaces. If the candle flickers, your doors and windows probably need weatherstripping and caulking.

Weatherstripping comes in a variety of forms, rang-

ing from the more permanent interlocking metal variety, to a wide selection of easy-to-install, flexible felt, foam and vinyl materials. Weatherstripping should be applied around the perimeter of all exterior doors and around the inside of all window frames.

Caulking should be applied outside around window and door frames, and to all corners or joints where wood and masonry, or metal masonry come together.

By caulking and weatherstripping your home, you'll cut up to 10 percent annually off the fuel you waste.

Storm Windows And Doors

While you're checking the doors and windows, you might want to give some thought to two other important energy-saving improvements—storm windows and doors.

If you already have storm sash all around, take comfort in knowing that you're using about 15 per-

cent less energy than you'd be using without them. If you don't have storm windows and doors, but do have double-glazed or "thermo-pane" type windows, storm windows may still provide a good way to lower fuel bills and cut down on drafts, especially if you live in a severe climate.

Insulating Walls One of the best ways to avoid drafts — and reduce your fuel waste still further — is to insulate your walls.

Here is a simple way to check the amount of wall insulation you have. On a cold day tape one thermometer against an outside wall and the second in the center of the room. Four hours later, if the reading at the outside wall is more than five degrees below the one in the middle of the room, it's a good sign your home needs wall insulation.

Insulating walls is not a do-it-yourself job. It's best done by a professional insulation contractor who has the expertise and special pneumatic equipment to perform the work quickly and efficiently.

Last Stop—The Basement

The last stop on the energy-efficiency check up tour is the basement, an area that wastes more of your home's energy than you think.

Be sure to check your furnace and central air-conditioning unit. For maximum operating efficiency,

these should be inspected regularly and maintained in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions. Also, be sure to check the filters. During peak operating seasons, they should be changed at least once a month. Dirty filters cause your furnace and air-conditioner to work overtime.





—AT 55 MILES per hour, driver fatigue can be a very real hazard. A four-day holiday is a poor time for a cross-country trip, especially if you have to drive into night to make your destination. Either plan shorter trips or have another licensed driver with you to trade stints in the driver's seat. Wear your seat belts and shoulder harnesses, and don't let the speedometer needle creep over the posted limit. A traffic ticket can cost you the price of a couple of Tom Turkeys—and a high-speed accident can cost more than you can ever recover. Neither one is worth the

risk!

County Ag. Agent's Column

House and Yard Safety

A bottle of common household cleaning detergent is left out and a child opens it and drinks it. A grandmother trips on carpeting that is not secured to the floor.

These accidents, which could result in serious injury or death, can be prevented by giving a little attention to safety precautions.

Here are a few precautions concerning household safety:

1. Keep all pesticides, poisons, medicines, matches and firearms locked up and out of reach of children. Have a definite storage place for tools, appliances, knives and toys and put them away after each use.
2. Make sure steps and stairs are sturdy and clean and have strong handrails.
3. Be sure carpeting is secured to the floor and rugs are skidproof.
4. Have a sturdy step stool and step ladder available for maintenance chores and for reaching high places.
5. Have ashtrays available for smokers. Keep a fire extinguisher on hand and make sure everyone in the family knows how to use it and what to do in case of fire.
6. Keep all floor surfaces clean and use a non-skid wax on polished floors. Have stairways, porches and entrances well lighted and keep outdoor walks clear of ice, snow and mud.
7. Use all electrical appliances according to the instruction manuals and have any repairs made immediately. Keep electrical cords and appliances away from bathtubs.
8. Make sure extension cords are heavy enough for the required wattage, and safeguard unused electric sockets to avoid shock hazards.
9. Keep the heating system clean and in good operating condition.
10. Clear the yard, house and garage of any trash, tools or loose articles that could cause falls or be a fire hazard.
11. Put all flammable liquids in metal containers and out of reach of children.
12. Always open the garage door when an engine is running inside to prevent carbon monoxide poisoning.

Roast Stuffed Duckling With Cranberry Orange Sauce

- 1 frozen duckling (4½ to 5 pounds) defrosted
 - ¾ teaspoon salt
 - 1½ cups thinly sliced celery
 - ¼ cup chopped onion
 - 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
 - 2½ cups ½-inch bread cubes
 - ½ cup chopped pecans
 - 2 tablespoons orange juice
 - 1 teaspoon sugar
 - 1 teaspoon grated orange rind
- Cranberry Orange Sauce**
- 1 cup water
 - ½ cup sugar
 - 2 cups cranberries
 - ¼ cup orange juice
 - 2 teaspoons cornstarch
 - 2 teaspoons grated orange rind
 - ½ cup orange sections



Wash and drain duckling; dry skin gently with paper toweling. Sprinkle body and neck cavities with ½ teaspoon salt. Cook celery and onion in butter or margarine until onion is soft. Add bread cubes, pecans, orange juice, sugar, orange rind and remaining ¼ teaspoon salt; toss lightly. Fill neck and body cavities loosely with stuffing. Skewer neck skin to back. Cover opening of body cavity with aluminum foil and tie legs together loosely. Place on rack

in shallow roasting pan. Bake at 350°F. until drumstick meat is tender, about 3 hours. To make sauce, combine water and sugar and bring to boil; boil 5 minutes. Add cranberries and cook until they pop, about 5 minutes. Combine orange juice and cornstarch; stir until smooth. Add to cranberries; cook until clear and thickened. Stir in orange rind and sections. Serve duckling with sauce. Makes 3 to 4 servings.

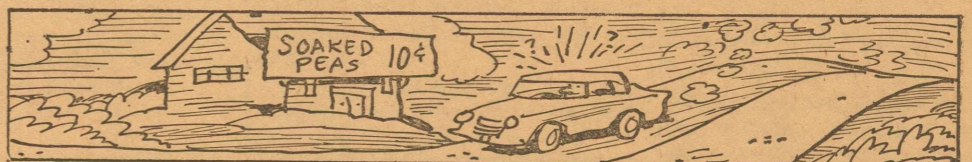
