### SOUP AND BREAD SATISFY "THE BASIC FOUR"

Food preferences change with the seasons and nothing appeases cold weather appetites like a steaming bowl of hearty chowder.

Most people associate chowder with New England, but the real origin of this thick fish soup is the coast of France. To celebrate a good catch the fishermen would prepare huge quantities of fish stew in heavy cauldrons (chaudieres) from which the name "chowder" was eventually derived.

A robust soup can easily be a meal in itself. Organic Matter Improves Soil

The soil's fertility and physical condition can be greatly improved by adding organic matter. Such matter includes lawn clippings, leaf rakings, and other plant material that is free of disease and nema-

To aid decomposition, add about two pounds of a complete fertilizer per 100 square feet of bed area. Organic matter improves the soil's physical properties by causing better soil structure, increasing pore volume, increasing moisture retention, and allowing more efficient utilization of fertilizer applications. This means that sticky clay soils can be changed into a more manageable loamy soil. Adding organic matter to loose, droughty sand will help it hold plant nutrients and moisture, thus improving plant growth.

About 20% of the agricultural work injuries occur in farm and ranch buildings. The way to prevent these accidents is to spot and correct potential trouble situations

Here are some general precautions to take when working around farm and ranch buildings:

1. Keep buildings clean and free of trash and litter that could cause

2. Keep buildings well lighted

3. Make sure stairs and ladders are in good condition, dry and un-

littered. 4. Mark low ceilings, beams and passageways with warning signs, and close doors and gates to hazardous places to keep children out.

5. Shield power equipment properly and be sure shields are in place when using the equipment. 6. Post and enforce no smok-

ing signs. 7. Store flammable liquids in UL approved metal containers and keep toxic materials locked up and out of the reach of children.

As far as animal facilities are concerned, we advise keepin ggates closed and floors clean. Pens, gates, chutes and lot fences should all be In both clay and sandy soils, or sturdy and in good shape.
