

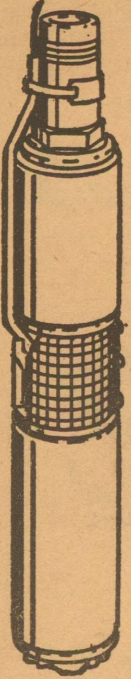

Tested Tips To Help You

CASSEROLE WIPES CLEAN
There's nothing so good and warm and filling for a winter lunch as tuna casserole. The recipe below is a quick and easy one to make, and what's more, cleanup is easy, too.

What makes cleanup easy is spraying the casserole dish with Mazola No Stick cooking spray.  - 2 cups cooked, drained vegetables
- In saucepan melt margarine. Stir in corn starch, salt and pepper. Gradually stir in milk until smooth. Bring to boil, stirring constantly; boil 1 minute. Spray 1 1/2-quart casserole with cooking spray. In casserole, mix macaroni, white sauce, tuna and vegetables. Bake in 375°F oven 25 minutes. Makes 6 servings.

Check For Stored Grain Pests
Stored grain pests can eat away at your stockpile of grain and you'll never know it unless you make frequent inspections of storage bins.

Even if the bin was cleaned before grain was put in, it's a good idea to make frequent bin inspections.

Insect pests damage grain by eating the entire kernel or by damaging the seed kernel which prevents it from germinating after planting.

Primary stored grain pests attack whole kernel grain and develop inside the kernel. These include corn or rice weevils, lesser grain borers and Angoumois grain moths.

Because they develop inside the grain kernel, these pests can be easily overlooked. That's why seeds should always be split open when inspecting for pests.

Secondary pests include the rice moth, Indian meal moth, flat grain beetle, confused flour beetle and sawtoothed grain beetle. These insects attack cracked or broken grain kernels.

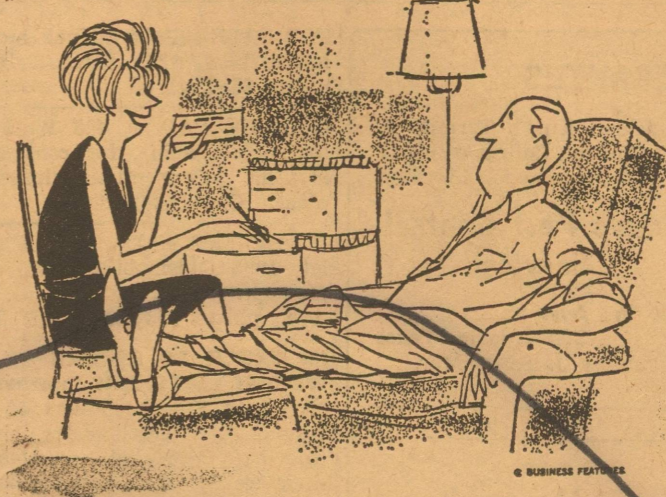
When inspecting for pests, take grain samples of each lot of grain and at various depths throughout the bin. If you find one rice weevil or one lesser grain borer or up to five of any other pest per quart of grain sampled, then treatment is needed.

Fumigants can be used to treat the grain; however, extreme caution is necessary as the fumigants are toxic and highly flammable.

Detailed information on controlling stored grain pests is available at the county Extension office.

LEGAL NOTICE

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Mohair Council of America, 516 Central National Bank Building, San Angelo, Texas 76901, proposes a referendum election on February 10, 1976, under provisions of Article 55C, Vernon's Civil Statutes on the proposition of whether or not mohair producers in the following counties shall assess themselves an amount not to exceed 2½ cents per pound on all mohair sold to be collected at the first point of sale, and to elect members for a 12-person commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for advertising, promotion, market, product development, education and research programs designed to encourage production, marketing and use of Texas mohair.

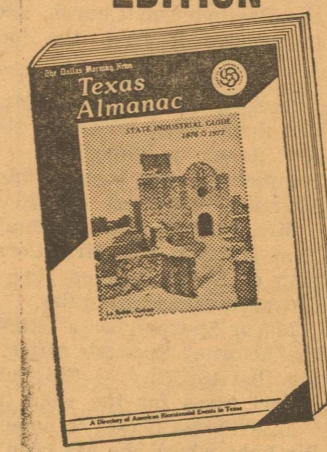
Counties included in the referendum are: District 1—Terrell, Crockett, Pecos, Brewster, Presidio and Jeff Davis; District 2—Val Verde, Kinney; District 3—Edwards; District 4—Bandera, Real, Medina, Uvalde; District 5—Mason, Llano, Gillespie, Kerr, Kendall, Comal, Blanco; District 6—Schleicher, Menard, Sutton, Kimble; District 7—Mills, Hamilton, San Saba, Coryell, Lampasas, Burnet, Hays, Travis, Williamson, Bell; District 8—Irion, Sterling, Coke, Tom Green, Concho, McCulloch, Coleman, Runnels, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan; District 9—Brown, Eastland, Comanche, Erath, Stephens, Palo Pinto, Jack, Parker, Hood.

The referendum and election will be held by physical ballot with voting place to be at each county ASCS office in the referendum area or in the county courthouse in counties that do not have ASCS office facilities. Polls will be open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Producers who will be away from their particular voting box location on election day may obtain an absentee ballot from county agent offices, wool and mohair warehouses or from the Mohair Council of America. Absentee ballots must be mailed in the self-addressed envelope to the central balloting place at P. O. Box 222, San Angelo, Texas 76901, before midnight three days prior to the election date.

Any person within this referendum area engaged in the business of producing or causing to be produced mohair for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of ranches and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

LEMON STICKY BUNS

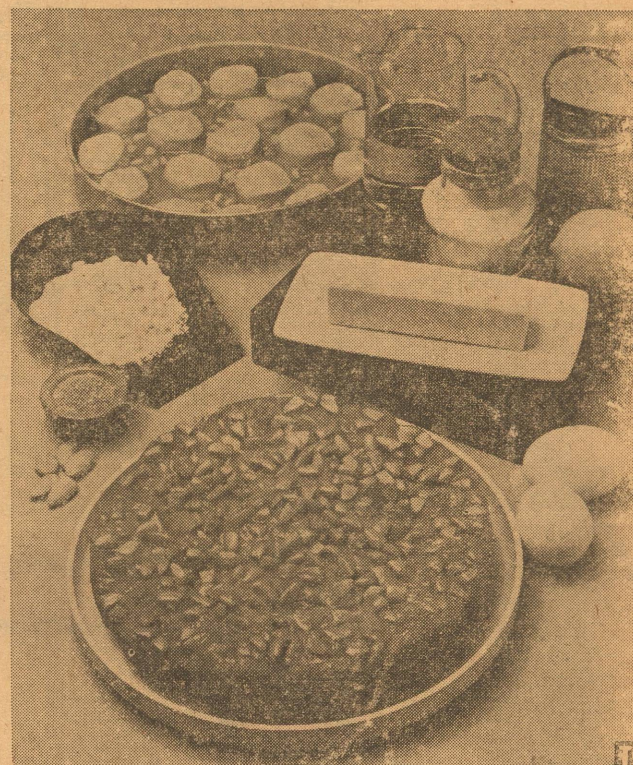
Here's an all-purpose recipe for busy cooks who like to plan ahead. It makes 4 1/2 dozen Lemon Sticky Buns and they offer a rare treat for weekend breakfasts, brunches or even a dessert for dinner. The buns are frozen before baking and may be held in a freezer for up to 4 weeks.

Many cooks have discovered that not all yeast doughs freeze well. This recipe is developed for freezing—it is higher in yeast, shortening and sugar than other bread recipes. The buns are completely prepared and placed in a baking pan with lemon flavored syrup and chopped almonds. They are frozen in the pan, ready to thaw, rise and bake before serving.

Be sure to allow plenty of time for thawing and rising, about three hours at room temperature. The dough doesn't start to rise until it is thawed, so another 2 hours should be allowed for the buns to double in size. If the time seems long, just remember, the cook's work is done. The buns need no further attention except for timing the rising and baking.

LEMON STICKY BUNS

- 2/3 cup milk
 - 1/2 cup sugar
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 3/4 cup (1-1/2 sticks) Fleischmann's Margarine
 - 1/2 cup warm water (105°F. 115°F.)
 - 2 packages Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast
 - 2 eggs
 - 5 to 6 cups unsifted flour
- Prepare pans (directions below). Set aside until ready to use. Scald milk; stir in sugar, salt and 3/4 cup Fleischmann's Margarine. Cool to lukewarm. Measure warm water into large warm bowl. Sprinkle in Fleisch-



mann's Yeast; stir until dissolved. Add lukewarm milk mixture, eggs, and 2 cups flour. Beat until smooth. Stir in enough additional flour to make a stiff dough. Turn out onto lightly floured board; knead until smooth and elastic, about 8 to 10 minutes.

Divide dough into 3 equal pieces. Roll one piece to an 18 x 7-inch rectangle. Roll up from long end to form a roll, 18 inches long. Pinch seam to seal. Cut into 18 1-inch slices. Arrange cut side up in a prepared pan. Drizzle 1/3 cup of remaining syrup over rolls. Cover tightly with plastic wrap, then with aluminum foil; place in freezer. Repeat with remaining pieces of dough and syrup. Keep frozen up to 4 weeks.

Remove from freezer; let stand covered loosely with

plastic wrap at room temperature until fully thawed, about 3 hours. Let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 2 hours.

Bake at 350°F. 25 to 30 minutes, or until done. Invert buns onto plates to cool. Makes 4-1/2 dozen small buns.

To prepare pans: Sprinkle 1/2 cup chopped Planters or Southern Belle Blanched Almonds in each of 3 ungreased 9-inch round cake pans. In a saucepan combine 1-1/2 cups sugar, 1/2 cup (1-stick) Fleischmann's Margarine, 1/2 cup light corn syrup, 1/4 cup water and 3 tablespoons grated lemon peel. Bring to a boil. Cook 3 minutes, stirring constantly. Pour 1/3 cup syrup over each pan of almonds. Refrigerate remaining syrup.

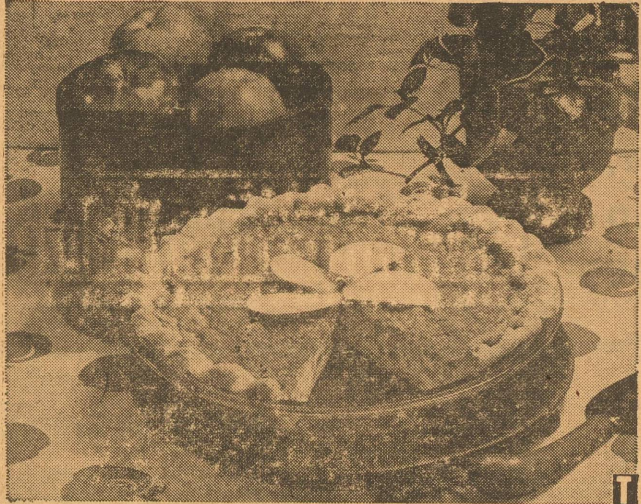

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup sour cream

- 2 cups flour

- 3 tablespoons cocoa

Beat eggs and mix in sugar, cream and vanilla. Sift and add flour, baking powder, soda, salt and cocoa to egg mixture. Drop by teaspoonfuls on lightly greased cookie sheet. Bake at 350°.

OFF BEAT APPLE PIE



It's National Apple Month which means that it's apple harvest time and fresh apples are pouring into markets across the land.

Now is the time to get out apple recipes you've been planning to try because many varieties are available. For pies, most cooks like a snappy, rather tart apple like Jonathan, Winesap, Northern Spy, Newton, Pippin and Stayman. But your own favorite is the one to use.

This recipe for Sour Cream Apple Pie is a single crust pie. The apples are chopped instead of sliced. A mixture of sour cream, eggs and sugar is poured over the apples which after baking results in a custard-like texture. A cinnamon flavored crumb topping takes the place of a top crust, complementing the fresh apple flavor.

SOUR CREAM APPLE PIE

- 1 pie crust, for single crust pie
- 2 cups pared, chopped apples
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup sour cream
- 1 egg, slightly beaten
- 1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla extract

On a lightly floured board roll out pie dough to fit 9-inch pie plate. Transfer the dough to the plate and trim edge, leaving 1/2 inch overhanging. Fold edge under and flute.

Place chopped apples into pastry shell. Combine flour, sugar and salt in a bowl. Add sour cream, egg and vanilla extract. Beat until smooth, then pour over apples in prepared pastry shell. Bake at 425°F. for 15 minutes, then reduce heat to 350°F. and bake 30 minutes longer. Remove from oven and add the following crumb topping.

Crumb Topping: Blend together 1/3 cup flour, 1/3 cup sugar, 1 1/2 teaspoons ground cinnamon and 1/4 cup butter or margarine. Sprinkle on top of pie and bake at 400°F. for 10 minutes. Makes one 9-inch pie.
