RESUMEN DE LAS ENMIENDAS PROPUESTAS A LA CONSTITUCION

**ELECCION GENERAL DEL 2 DE NOVIEMBRE DE 1976**

**NUMERO UNO EN LA BOLETA (S.J.R. 49)**

Revocando Secciones 49-d and 49-d-1 del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas, S.J.R. 49 enmienda Sección 49-c del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas para disponer y autorizar \$400 millones adicionales de bonos para el desarrollo de agua en Tejas que se puede emitir a la aprobación de dos terceras partes de los miembros de cada cámara de la Legislatura para tales fines de desarrollo del agua que la Legislatura pueda prescribir. La enmienda contiene prohibición específica contra el uso de fondos del estado para el desarrollo de recursos acuáticos del Río Mississippi y también requiere que antes de que pueda encargarse de cualquier proyecto particular para el desarrollo de agua que requiere un gasto de mas de \$35 millones de producto de los bonos, debe de ser aprobado por resolución de la Legislatura.

La enmienda remueva el requerimiento constitucional que ciertas rentas deben de ser usadas para retirar bonos para el desarrollo de agua y el encarecimiento de la calidad de agua y remueva el límite constitucional de la tasa de interés en tales bonos.

La fraseología de la enmienda propuesta tal como aparecerá en la

boleta es lo siguiente: "La enmienda constitucional autorizando un incremento de \$400 millones de la cantidad de Bonos del Desarrollo de Agua en Tejas que podrán emitirse al ser aprobada por dos terceras partes de la legislatura; enmendando y consolidando disposiciones de Secciones 49-c, 49-d, y 49-d-1 del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas; y revocando Secciones 49-d y 49-d-1 del Artículo III de la Constitución de Tejas."

**NUMERO DOS EN LA BOLETA (H.J.R. 99)**

H.J.R. 99 propone una enmienda a la Constitución de Tejas para aumentar de \$100 millones hasta \$200 millones la cantidad principal agregada de bonos para el desarrollo de agua en Tejas que se puede emitir y que están en circulación por el Texas Water Development Board para proveer donaciones y préstamos para la mejoría de la calidad de agua como establecido por la Legislatura. La fraseología de la enmienda propuesta como aparecerá en la boleta es lo siguiente: "Una enmienda constitucional para incrementar desde \$100 millones hasta \$200 millones la cantidad de Bonos de Desarrollo de Agua en Tejas que podrán ser emitidos con el propósito de mejorar la calidad del agua."

**Sixty-Four Receive Supplemental Income**

As of March, 1976, 64 residents of Schleicher county receive supplemental security income of \$4704 each month. These payments are made to financially needy persons who are either over age 65, blind, or disabled. Most of the recipients also receive a monthly social security check according to Frank Upp, district manager of the San Angelo, Texas social security office. Both programs, Supplemental Security Income and Social Security, are administered by the Social Security Office.

Of the 64 supplemental security income (SSI) recipients in Schleicher county, 45 are over age 65, none are blind, and 19 are disabled. The average recipient's monthly supplemental check is \$74. The check is printed on gold paper and is received on the first day of each month.

According to Upp, the monthly supplemental check may be as little as \$1.00 per month or as much as \$167.80 per month, depending upon the recipient's other income. All SSI recipients qualify for Medicaid and may also qualify for Food Stamps and Social Services benefits which are administered by the Texas Department of Public Welfare.

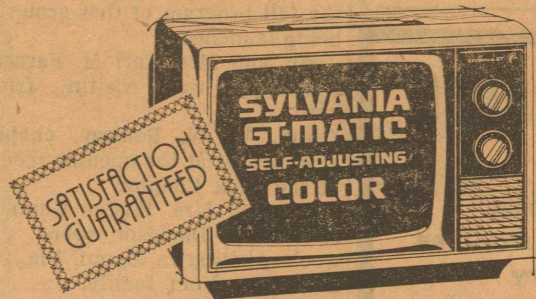

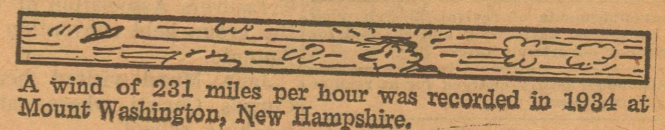

#### Texas H. D. Association Celebrates 50th Year

College Station, Tex.—About a thousand Texas hom-makers will celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Texas Home Demonstration Association (THDA) with an annual statewide meeting here Sept. 21-23 on the Texas A&M University campus.

Designating the week of Sept. 20 Texas Home Demonstration Association Week, Texas Gov. Dolph Briscoe noted that the association was created to serve as a cooperative and coordinating organization for the statewide activities of home demonstration clubs.

Membership of the organization is comprised of women who belong to home demonstration clubs throughout Texas. Over 24,000 women currently belong to home demonstration clubs in Texas.

#### Pickles, Relishes, Add Zest to Meals

Tired of bland, tasteless foods? Pickles and relishes stimulate the appetite and add tartness and color to meals.

Made from fruits and vegetables, pickles and relishes are sources of minerals and vitamins—especially A and C. They retain most of the vitamins because of the high acid content and short heating time in a water bath canner.

Dilled okra adds variety to a relish tray. Seasoned with pepper, garlic and dill, the spicy flavor will add a distinctive touch to a buffet supper or backyard picnic.

Pepper-onion relish made from end-of-season garden vegetables gives flavor sparkle to cooked dried pinto beans.

Here is a recipe from this publication:

#### Crystal Tomato Pickles

- 7 pounds tomatoes
- 2 gallons water
- 1 quart slaked lime
- 9 cups sugar
- 2 quarts vinegar
- 2 tablespoons salt
- 6 strips cinnamon bark, 1½-2 inches long
- 1 teaspoon grated nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon ground ginger.

Slice green tomatoes ¼ inch thick; place in glass or porcelain-lined container. Cover with two gallons water in which the quart of lime has been dissolved. Let stand 24 hours. Remove from lime water and rinse well through several cold water baths to remove all lime sediment. Dissolve sugar in vinegar; add cinnamon stick and cloth bag containing nutmeg and ginger. Heat the vinegar and spices to boiling and allow to stand for one hour.

Add slices of green tomato and cook rapidly until slices are glazed and syrup clings to the spoon. Fill hot jars with the slices, arranging cinnamon sticks attractively with the slices in the jar. Discard the spice bag. Heat spiced vinegar to boiling; pour over tomatoes. Close. Process in boiling water bath five minutes. Start to count processing time as soon as water returns to boil.

### Itinerant Salesmen And Your Rights

(The Consumer Alert, by John L. Hill, Attorney General.)

Austin, Tex.—If you answer the doorbell to find a door-to-door salesperson waiting on the front porch with a smile and a sales pitch ready, do you know your rights under the Texas Home Solicitation Transaction Act?

If not, you could be opening the door to trouble, our Consumer Protection lawyers advise. You should know that a door-to-door salesperson must tell you of your right to cancel any agreement to purchase for more than \$25 within three business days after the date of the sale.

You must also be furnished a receipt, a copy of any contract in the same language used in the sales pitch, and a written Notice Of Cancellation you can mail to the business to cancel the agreement.

If you should cancel any sale, your contract must be canceled, all payments refunded, any trade-ins returned, and any property returned to original condition.

Remember, though, that the Home Solicitation Transaction Act can only provide the RIGHT to cancel. You may have difficulty exercising that right and canceling a sale if the company you purchased from does not even exist, or if the salesperson is a con artist who gave you a fictitious name and skipped town with your cash.

Therefore, before you allow any salesperson into your home, take the following precautions:

1. Ask for identification that gives the salesperson's name and the name and address of the business. If you are suspicious of the validity of the identification, call the company to verify that it exists and that the salesperson works there. It is possible that a sales con artist may steal or print contracts on the letterhead of a legitimate firm.

You may also want to check with the Better Business Bureau or your local police before allowing a stranger into your home.

2. If the person claims to be conducting a survey, taking an opinion poll, or soliciting for a worthy cause, get proof of identity of the sponsoring organization. It might be only a ruse to get into your home for a sales presentation.

3. Finally, before allowing the person in, ask yourself if you need or want the product that is being sold, and if you can afford it. If the answer is no, do not waste your time and the time of the salesperson by listening to a sales pitch. Remember, a trained salesperson may be able to persuade you to buy even if you DO NOT need or want an item.

4. If you do talk with the door-to-door salesperson and decide to buy, be cautious if the purchase involves materials and installation for a home improvement job, and if the salesperson suggests that you pay all or part of the total cost in advance. It's best never to pay until the job is complete or at least about half-way complete. Always withhold a large portion of the total cost until the job is done to your satisfaction and the terms of the agreement.

If you do decide to give the person a portion of the money in advance, make sure you have first checked the identification and the firm thoroughly. If you have no better way of checking, at least ask for a driver's license and write down the number. Then you will have some means of contacting the person if problems develop.

If you have a consumer complaint about a door-to-door sales transaction, contact the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division.
