DALLAS--Charles H. Trigg of Eldorado will be honored by the Athletic Department of Southern Methodist University at Homecoming Oct 28-30 when the 1926 Mustang Football team holds its 50th Anniversary

As a sophomore in 1926, Trigg won a starting position on the Mustang team that not only won the Southwest Conference championship but was undefeated. The outstanding victory that season was the triumph over the University of Texas Longhorns in Austin. The Steers led 17 to 7 late in the fourth quarter when a long pass from Gerald Mann to Ross Love for a touchdown narrowed the margin. On the first play from scrimmage after the ensuing kickoff, Chris Crtemeglia, SMU defensive end, caused the Texas ball carrier to fumble. Mann recovered and ran for the winning touchdown.

During Trigg's three years on the SMU Varsity, the Mustangs defeated the Longhorns 21 to 17, 14 to 0, and 6 to 2. During Trigg's senior year, SMU played Army at West Point in a game that did much to bring football recognition to the Southwest at a time when it was practi cally ignored. During the next 12 years, SMU, TCU, and Texas A&M all won national championships.

After a highly-successful career as a high school coach, Trigg returned to SMU where he served as assistant football coach and head track coach. He left SMU in 1947 to enter the business world.

OUR CHOICE FOR PRESIDENT

November 2 and the General Election are marching relentlessly toward us, and the time is short indeed for the voters of this great nation to make up their minds as to the candidate of their choice for President.

We reiterate that the time has long since passed whereby we as voters can afford the luxury of voting strictly by party label. This nation faces today the greatest challenges in its history. The question no longer is a matter of party politics but one of the voters selecting the best qualified leader possible that will enable us to survive as a democratic nation.

The EXPRESS NEWS supports the return of President Ford to the office of the Presidency to guide this nation through the turbulent four years now facing this nation.

Given the circumstances under which Gerald Ford assumed the duties of the office, we feel that he has done a superb job in leading this nation back to economic responsibility, a better measure of prosperity, and a more respected position of leadership in world affairs. We applaud the President's determination to keep this nation militarily second to none, for therein lies the survival of this nation and the Free World.

This country for many years has suffered the encroachment of Big Government into the lives of its peoples. We feel that President Ford represents the best presidential opponent to further growth of the federal bureaucracy, and the best possible choice for maintenance of the right of self-determination for the citizens of this nation.

This nation under the Ford presidency has had the opportunity to judge the incumbent president by his performance. Ford, although severely hampered by a hostile Democratic Congress, has performed exceedingly well, demonstrating time after time by his actions that the nation's welfare is first. It is our opinion that performance is a far better measure of the potential of a president than ill-conceived promises. EM

The NEWS endorses Gerald Ford for election to the presidency on Nov 2.

Our reason for this choice is based ironically enough, on the theme repeated frequently during Jimmy Carter's highly successful campaign for public support prior to and during the primaries.

We believe that the major issue of this campaign centers on the relationship between the average American and his government. This relationship has deteriorated significantly, to the detriment and disgust of the citizen.

Today the citizen sees government as a blind, deaf monster, willing and able to intrude in his personal and economic life, yet completely unresponsive to his wishes, objections and attempts to defend his individual rights. Though a citizen of a system that calls itself a republic, he sees more and more arbitrary government power exercised over both society in general and his own life, government power that is chiefly wielded by bureaucrats and judges he can neither vote for nor recall from office.

As Gov Carter himself pointed out during his primary campaign, too many Americans today see themselves as not only outsiders, but powerless, exploited outsiders.

Voters should ask themselves which candidate is more likely to improve this situation, to reduce citizens' anger and fear of the government.

Ford has not only spoken out against the growth of federal government and its pervasive influence over our lives, but as president he has acted again and again to stop legislative and bureaucratic attempts to increase government's hold.

Carter, on the other hand, has promised only to reorganize government. His intent, he says, is to reduce the number of federal agencies by combining them and making them more efficient. Neither his promises nor his record as governor of Georgia suggests that Carter would reverse the trend of government growth.

Furthermore, since the convention, Carter has increasinly identified himself with the wing of his party chiefly responsible for the rise of big government that he attacked during the primaries. Those Washington Democrats who sincerely believe that government power is the prime answer to our collective and individual problems have clearly gained great influence over their party's candidate, influence they will retain if he wins office.

The voter's choice, then, is between a candidate whose performance proves his intent to slow the growth of government power and a candidate whose promise is, not to curb the growth, but to manage it more efficiently.

We do not believe that making the federal government a more efficient monster is the best answer. What is needed. The News believes, is a president dedicated to making the federal government less monstrous.

In our opinion. Gerald Ford is such a president.

My football weekend was not highly satisfactory as SMU and my three alma maters -- Trinity, Northwestern and Wisconsin, all lost by close scores.





#### **CANDIDATE CARTER ENERGY**

Mr Carter would de-emphasize oil and nuclear energy and increase the use of coal and solar energy. He wants continued Federal price control on oil and natural gas. He supports restrictions on the right of a company to own all phases of production and distribution of oil. He also wants to restrict oil companies to own OTHER types of energy sources.

#### THE ECONOMY

Candidate Carter favors and vigorously supports Federal job handouts to lower unemployment.

He would like to have stand-by "wage & price" controls that he could use to stop inflation in the areas

#### TAX REFORM

Mr Carter wants to reduce taxes and increase government hiring. He wants to lower taxes on those who are below the median income level of approximately \$16,000. Above that...well? He wants more tax reform; not satisfied with the tax reform bill created this year by the Democrats in the Congress.

#### **GUN CONTROL**

Carter favors registration of handguns, and a ban on the sale of "Saturday Night Specials."

#### HEALTH

Mr Carter supports a mandatory national healthinsurance program financed by general tax revenue and employer-employee payroll taxes. He would like to see the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) expanded and strengthened.

#### WELFARE

Carter favors Federalizing the welfare programs of the Nation, with a national standard rate adjusted to cost-of-living differences.

#### DEFENSE

He sees no need for "exotic" weapons like the B-1 bomber. He also wants to cut defense spending by 5 to 7 billion dollars.

#### **FOREIGN POLICY**

Mr Carter says our country is loosing respect abroad. He would involve the American Public in all foreign policy decisions. He would have the U.S. insist that other nations should recognize the human rights of their citizens.

#### THE ENVIRONMENT

Candidate Carter favors Federal Land Use legislation. He favors strict enforcement of existing Federal standards on clean air & water.



#### **ENERGY**

The President supports price deregulation of all oil and natural gas. He asys conservation measures should be stepped up in the private as well as the industrial sector of the economy. 





#### SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

Quarterly wage reports and social security contributions for household workers are due by November 1. according to Franklin Upp. social security district manager in San Angelo. Texas.

"If you pay a household worker \$50 or more in cash wages in any 3-month calendar quarter for work around your house, you must send a report of the wages and the social security contribution to the Internal Revenue Service within one month after the end of the quarter." Upp said.

Quarters are January-February March. April May June. July-August-September. and October-November-December. Wage reports and social security contributions for the third quarter of 1976 are due by November 1. The date would be October 31, but that falls on a Sunday this year

The reports may be tiled on a form available at any Internal Revenue Service -er's Quarterly Tax Return for Household Employees (for Social Security).

Under the current social security contribution rate, the employer and the employee each pay 5.85 percent of covered wages. Social security contributions

help build retirement, disability. survivors. and Medicare protection for 112 million household workers, including maids, cooks, cleaning women. gardeners. handymen. and babysitters, according to Upp. People who employ household workers can get a free copy of the leaflet. "Social Security and Your Household Emploat any social security

WIND EROSION CONTROL PRACTICES

Several months ago we announced a program whereby producers could earn cost shares to the tune of 90 percent for planting permanent grasses on cropland acres. This program was designed for the Great Plains States where wind erosion is possible in dry years.

Added to this grass practice is cost sharing for drilling livestock water wells, building water storage tanks and establishing livestock water pipelines. The rate of cost sharing for these practices is 50 percent of the cost.

When a producer applies for any of the above mentioned practices, the SCS technician will visit the farm or ranch to determine the need and eligibility for the practice and make recommendations to the producer and the ASCS county committee.

Funds are now available and the county committee encourages county farmers and ranchers to inquire about earning a cost share for carrying out one of these conservation practices.

Funds earned under this program are charged to the 1976 program year and producers would have until June 30, 1976 to complete the work.

#### 1977 ACP PROGRAM

We will begin taking applications on December 1, 1976 for all phases of conservation work except aerial spraying of mesquite. The county committee has determined that 50 percent of the county allocation will be held in a reserve for aerial spraying. Applications to spray mesquite will be taken beginning next April 1, 1977.





EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the last of a seven-part series on repainting a house, both interior and exterior. This part deals with painting the

Painting a home's interior can lend a 'pick me-up" touch to the house itself and the people living there - in fact, they can do the job themselves for far less money than it costs to hire professional painters if they are willing to do the job correctly.

Painting is a step-by-step process, that starts with reading labels and mixing paint properly.

READ LABELS, MIX PAINT Read manufacturer's directions for mixing instructions. Most paints must be mixed well

however, some others should not be mixed. If paint needs mixing, have the paint dealer do it on his machine when you buy the paint. Before painting, check to see that paint is well mixed Stir with a paddle to see if the heavy pigment has settled to the bottom. If so, pour most of the liquid into another can. Stir the thick part until smooth Do not stir in a circular motion - stir from the bottom of the can to the tip.

Add a little of the liquid you poured off and stir Repeat until evenly mixed. Thin only under special conditions. Thin water base paints with water use turpentine or thinner for oil-base

PAINTING A ROOM - THE ORDERLY WAY Paint parts of a room in this order: ceiling.

woodwork, walls HOW TO FILL A BRUSH

Dip the brush down into the container to about one third or one-half the length of the bristles. Slap sides of bristles gently against the inside of the can. Then apply to wall.

APPLYING PAINT TO CEILING, WALLS Remember, if walls - and ceilings - are to be

painted, do the ceiling first In painting, hold brush comfortably near the base of the handle and exert light pressure with your fingertips. Unload the brush with sweeping, crescent shaped strokes in a small square area. Then finish stroke all the same direction for uniform appearance. Always finish stroke into the previously painted area - not out to the unpainted area

'CUTTING AN EDGE' NEXT TO WOODWORK

Remember, if woodwork and walls are to be painted, enamel the woodwork first. Then apply a strip of paint around edges of woodwork where wall and ceiling meet and down wall HOW TO FILL A ROLLER

Roll the roller slowly into well - or lower end of tray. Roll back and forth until roller is well covered with paint. Roll back onto ridges in slanted upper portion of tray, and lightly roll back and forth to remove excess paint

PAINTING A CEILING WITH ROLLER

Use a ladder or long-handled roller to paint ceilings. Always start in a corner and work down the width of the room. Paint as wide a strip as possible Avoid spinning roller - don't go too

PAINTING WALLS WITH ROLLER

Paint a large "V" or "W" in a two- to three foot-wide area of wall. Then roll crosswise to spread paint evenly. Finish with light up and down strokes. Do not move roller too quickly. because it will spray droplets of paint everywhere

When painting walls, start in one corner. Complete rolling paint on by rolling up to the strips you previously painted in corners and around woodwork

TOUCHING UP

If you missed a spot - for roller painting, go over the spot with very light. slow strokes. For brush painting, use the tip of the brush to cover the missed area.

**CLEANING UP EFFICIENTLY** 

Clean brushes or rollers immediately after use Good brushes and rollers are worth caring

Brushes and rollers used in oil-base paints come clean with turpentine followed by detergent and water

**CLEANUP FOR OIL-BASE PAINT** 

The following are steps for oil-base paint cleanup. Roll or brush out excess paint. Remove roller from handle and wash in turpentine until no more paint comes out; wash brush the same way Wring out excess liquid from the roller by squeezing the fibers between your fingers. Remove excess from brush by using painting motions on newspapers.

Next clean with powdered soap, liquid detergent or cleaning powder rubbed into the bristles Rinse in warm water until all soap is

Allow brush or roller to dry. Then wrap brush n foil and store it on its side or hang it. Hang the roller do not lay it on its end or nap.

CLEANUP FOR WATER-BASE PAINT

The following are steps for water base paint cleanup Roll or brush out excess paint from brush or roller. Wash by rubbing powdered soap liquid detergent or cleaning powder into the pad or bristles. Rinse in warm water until all soap or detergent is removed. Rinse a second

time in warm water. Allow brush or roller to dry.


