

City Council orders pipeline survey for gas system

Two weeks after a meeting in which they were notified by the Railroad Commission that they would have to have a safety survey made of the gas pipeline which serves the City of Eldorado from the Page Field 9 miles southeast of the town, the City Council met Tuesday night to further consider the matter.

City Secretary Phil Olson reported that a letter had been written to the Railroad Commission that the Council is in contact with Western Catholic Inc. of Midland to do a corrosion survey of the line and subsequently install the sacrificial anodes as required.

The firm could start as early as Nov. 1st.

Mayor Pat Ragsdale presided and the aldermen present were Bill McCravy, Richard Kent, Raymond Hall, Bob Sykes, and Jimmy Doyle.

Clifton Doran was on hand and applied to work for the city driving

the dump truck, operating the maintainer, and working in the water and sewer departments. This was considered by the Council and a more detailed proposal on wage amount was to be presented to Doran later this week.

Elton McGinnes and Freddie Williams were on hand to request approval for building and setting a grade on the old Mertzson Highway to provide better drainage. Also on hand were Thomas Richard Jones and David Meador, County Commissioners of Precincts 1 and 4 respectively. The City Council voted to lend their support to this proposal, and County equipment will be used.

On the matter of a supplemental gas supply that could be burned in case of emergency, City Secretary Olson reported he had had word

from Northern Natural Gas that they could provide such only if it were for emergencies and if the City would build the pipeline.

The matter of fire trucks and equipment and housing of the fire trucks was brought up, and firemen Ted Short, Jerry Jones, Joe Edmiston, and Phil Edmiston were on hand.

It was reported there was no headway about purchasing the old Enochs building just south of the water tower.

The City Council will look into building their own building to house at least two of the trucks.

Alderman Sykes made motion, seconded by Alderman Kent, to install the new doors in the front of the present fire station and to look further into a new building.

They ordered City Secretary to write San Angelo Fire Chief about any surplus pumping trucks being

available in the future.

It was reported that there had been some complaints from gin smoke from burning of cotton trash, and the representatives from the Air Quality

Board had visited the local gin and made recommendations. The gin has installed a new incinerator.

Final item of business was approval of Tony Fay's hooking into the

sewer, if he agrees to lay his own line.

The meeting Tuesday night of the City Council lasted about three hours and the next one will be on Nov. 8th.

Nugent discusses amendments

About 15 local citizens turned out Monday morning at the Memorial Building to hear State Representative James E. "Jim" Nugent of

Kerrville discuss the seven proposed amendments to the State Constitution to be voted on this coming November 8th.

Schleicher County voters will join others over the state in going to the polls that day to decide the fate of the proposals.

Fifteen amendments were passed by the Legislature in their recent session. Seven are to be voted on next month with the remaining eight to be considered at the general election in November of 1978.

Nugent has been representative of the 56th District, which includes Schleicher County, for a number of years.

He stated that he favors the passage of all of the amendments with just slight reservations about Number 3.

Amendment No. 1 would increase the size of the Court of Criminal Appeals to nine members and would permit the court to sit in panels of three judges each. The increase of criminal cases in recent years has caused a backlog for the present court.

The second proposal, or Amendment No. 2, would provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds of the State for the Veterans Land Fund. The program was set up some years ago to enable veterans to purchase land and then the bonds sold for 4 percent to 6 percent interest. If passed, this amendment would enlarge the funding available for eligible veterans to continue to make land purchases, mainly for farming.

Amendment No. 3, if passed, would allow a District Court to deny bail to persons accused of second-offense felonies. The proposal has a 60-day limit of time such a person can be held. SEE Amendments P.10

Wednesday afternoon at about 1:15, they sent two trucks out on the Bailey Ranch road to the Valis place.

Anyone who drives south of town toward Sonora can still see the blackened evidence of the big burn of a few weeks ago. That was when acreage on the Matthews and Mertz places went up in smoke.

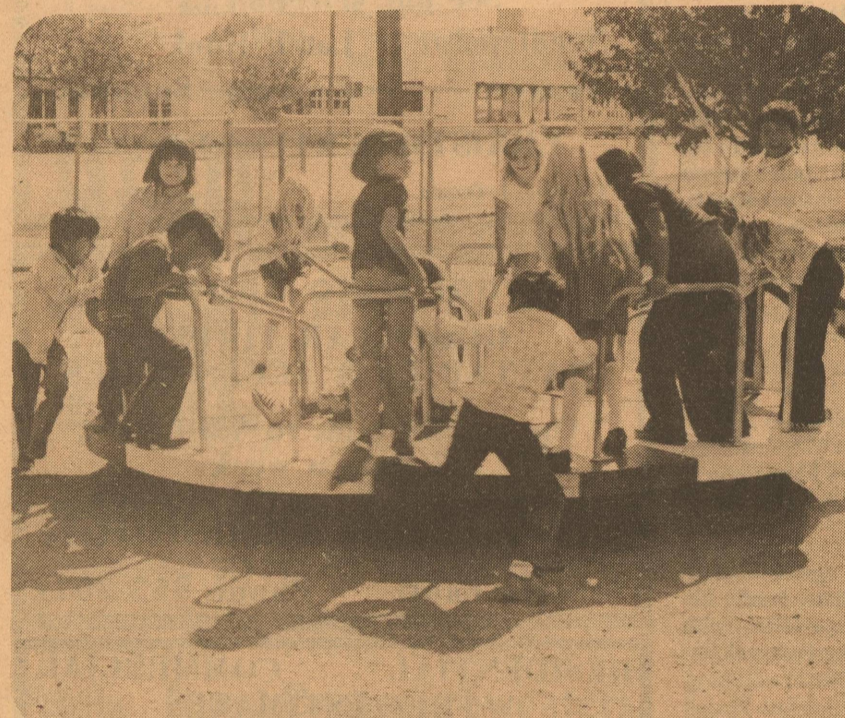
There was a big fire, too, west of Rocksprings late last week.

Sales Tax rebate show increase

State Comptroller Bob Bullock announced Friday that city sales tax rebates are running a healthy 20.8 percent over last year.

Bullock said that cities having the optional one percent city sales tax received a total of \$288.5 million to date this year, compared to \$238.8 million for the same period last year.

"This is a pretty good indicator of the strength of the Texas economy, and from an economic standpoint, things couldn't look better for the state," Bullock said.

The Comptroller also announced that his office Friday mailed checks totaling \$24.8 million to 880 Texas cities as their October share of the city sales tax.

The City of Eldorado was rebated \$1,803.21 and a total of 1977 payments to date of \$20,267.43, up 13 percent from the same period in 1976 when \$17,863.31 was reported.

Partial holiday set

It's a two-fold holiday coming up this coming Monday, Oct. 24th, but only Federal workers and school kids benefit from it.

The fourth Monday in October is designated as a Federal holiday for Veterans Day. It is understood that in a year or two, that holiday will go back to its traditional November 11th time, but for now it still comes up Monday. Federal offices such as Post Office, ASCS, etc., will be closed. Most other stores and offices will remain open.

Monday is also a day off for school students. Some teachers will be attending the District Texas State Teachers Association meeting in Brownwood and the others will have an in-service day, according to school officials.

Monday will also be the day the Fall Term of District Court convenes at 10:00 o'clock.

The Bank will take Nov. 11th as Veterans Day holiday.

Recipe Corner

CABBAGE & GREEN PEPPER SLAW

4-1/2 lbs. cabbage
2 small green peppers
1/2 cup stuffed olives (chopped)
1 pint mayonnaise
Salt and pepper
Shred or chop cabbage. Wrap in towels and chill. Chop peppers and add olives to mayonnaise. Chill. When ready to serve, mix cabbage, dressings and seasoning. Makes 25 servings, about 1/2 cup each.

GREEN GODDESS DRESSING

1 cup mayonnaise
1/4 cup (finely chopped) fresh parsley
1/2 cup heavy cream
1 tsp. chopped chives
1/8 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. dry mustard
2 tbs. anchovy paste can also be added if desired.
Mix all ingredients together, keep refrigerated. Good on any green salad.

CRANBERRY BREAD

2 cups flour
1 cup sugar
1-1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
Rind of 2 oranges and their juice
2 tbs. oil or shortening
1/2 cup boiling water
1 egg (beaten)
1 cup chopped nuts
1 cup cranberries (halved)
Combine flour, sugar, baking powder, soda and salt. Set aside. Combine orange rind and juice (this has to be ground), add water now. Beat egg and add to liquid, blend in dry ingredients and add cranberries and nuts. Makes 1 loaf 9x5x3 or 3 small loaves. Bake 350 degrees for 1 hour.

BROWN SUGAR PUMPKIN BREAD

3-1/2 cups flour, 3 cups brown sugar, (firmly packed); 2 tsp. soda, 1-1/2 tsp. baking powder 1-1/2 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. nutmeg and cinnamon, 1 cup nuts, 1 cup oil, 3/4 cup water, 4 eggs (beaten), 2 cans pumpkin. In a very large bowl, mix first 7 ingredients, make a well in the center of this mixture, add other ingredients. Stir with a spoon until well mixed. Beat until smooth. This recipe will make 2 large loaves or 3 small ones. Try 4 well greased 1 1/2 coffee cans. These make up real attractive. Bake at 350 degrees, 45 to 60 minutes. Cool well, wrap in foil and refrigerate. These freeze well too.

PUMPKIN CHIPS COOKIES

1 can pumpkin, 2 tsp. soda, 4 tsp. baking powder, 1 tsp. salt, 2 tsp. cinnamon, 4 cups flour, 2 cups sugar, 2 eggs, 2 tsp. milk, 1 cup oil, 2 tsp. vanilla, 6-oz. chocolate chips, 1 cup nuts. Mix all ingredients. Drop by teaspoon on cookie sheet and bake at 375 degrees for 14 minutes. Very moist and very good.

COUNTRY WISDOM

If you are a bird lover, treat your feathered friends during the cold weather months.

Here is an inexpensive and easy to make porridge. Combine two parts suet, 2 parts water, 2 parts cornmeal or oatmeal, 1/2 part sugar and 1 part flour. Cook in a large kettle until thick and pour into hanging containers.

Bath oil is a boon to wintry-weary skin. Save money by making your own. Using a blender or egg beater, vigorously beat one cup vegetable oil and one tablespoon herbal shampoo.

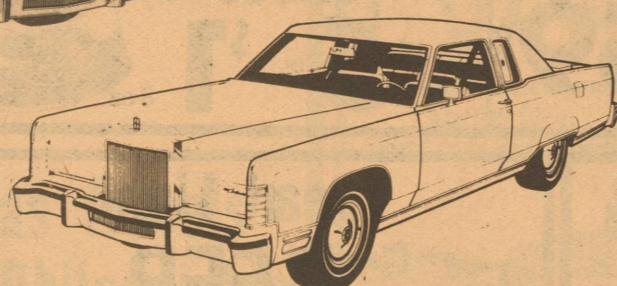
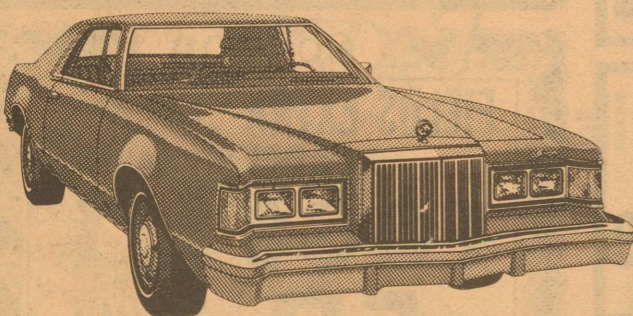
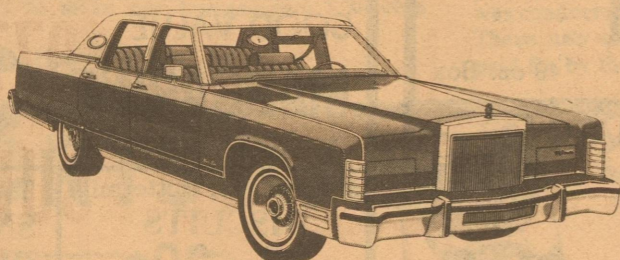

San Angelo has the nearest warehouse for this purpose. Producers need to present warehouse receipts and cotton classification cards when requesting a loan on their cotton.

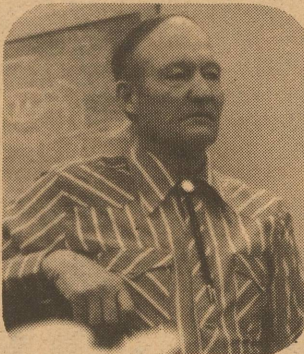
NEW FARM PROGRAM

It is official now. President Carter signed the new farm bill recently and we have a new program for the period 1978-1981.

Crop allotments as we have known in recent years will be used no longer. Rather, a farm will have what is called a Normal Crop Acreage (NCA). This base will be made up from the 1977 planted acreage of such crops as barley, wheat, oats, cotton, grain sorghum, sunflowers, rye, soybeans and other major field crops of significant acreage that are approved. Farms that have not certified their 1977 planted crops on a field by field bases should do so at once.

Information about the new program will be coming in soon and we will pass it along to you just as soon as possible.

Bumgardner completes 5 years of conservation board service



J.C. Bumgardner of Eldorado recently retired as Director of the Eldorado-Divide Soil and Water Conservation District. Bumgardner completed his tenure at the District Director Election on Thursday noon, October 13 at the Memorial Building. He has served five years on the Board of Directors. During this five years Bumgardner has served as Secretary/Treasurer of the Board.

Voy Lee Butts, Chairman

of the Board, states "J.C. has provided outstanding representation to the landowners in Zone 4. Also his record of attending all but one regularly scheduled meeting in five years is unparalleled in Texas."

Butts further states, "J.C. has been a strong advocate of helping the working farmers and ranchers and protecting their interests." Jerry Swift, County Agricultural Agent and District Election Judge, stated that Bumgardner had represented his constituents in Zone 4 well. The crowd of approximately 60 people then gave Bumgardner a rousing applause.

The Director of the Eldorado-Divide Soil and Water Conservation District would like to express their sincere appreciation to J.C. for his dedicated service on the Board of Directors.

Antlerless deer permits go on sale Oct. 28th

Landowners in Schleicher County should pick up their antlerless deer permits Oct. 28 at the Court House in Eldorado, according to officials of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Failure to pick up the permits on the designated date/dates will result in the landowner having to apply to the San Angelo office of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department at a subsequent date. So, to avoid any inconvenience later, landowners are urged to pick up their permits at the designated time and place.

Landowners should pick up the permits in person or may authorize someone in writing to act as their agent. If the landowner chooses to have an agent pick up his permits, the landowner must include in his letter of authorization the number of acres in and location of his ranch or ranches eligible for antlerless deer permits.

Permits will be issued on a per acre basis and a landowner must own or control at least the minimum number of acres, as determined by P&WD surveys, in order to receive a permit. For instance, if the issuance rate is one permit per each 100 acres and the landowner controls only 99 acres, P&WD cannot issue him a permit.

Landowners are also advised to check the issuance rate maps which have been posted at County Court-houses and designated Parks and Wildlife Department offices since the issuance rate in certain areas is likely to have

changed from last year's. P&WD wildlife personnel will be on hand at the permit issuance sites to answer any questions landowners may have.

De Lux elected to local conservation board

De Lux of Eldorado was recently elected to the Eldorado-Divide Soil and Water Conservation District Board of Directors on Thursday, October 13. Lux represents Zone 4 of the District.

The purpose of the Eldorado-Divide SWCD, with headquarters in Eldorado is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The Board of Directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, State and Federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

As one of five individuals serving on the District Board of Directors, Lux will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas Soil Conservation District law.

In other areas of leadership, Lux is a County Board member, Schleicher County ISD and a Director of the Schleicher County Cotton Association.

De Lux is married to the former Sherry Yates. They have two children, Teresa and Stuart. In Texas there are 198 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of State government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board. Unlike most other legal subdivisions of State government, SWCD's do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

Extension Service will honor retirees

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Alpha Zeta Chapter of Epsilon Sigma Phi, the honorary Extension fraternity, will honor those Extension staff members who have retired during the past year at a special luncheon at Texas A&M University, Oct. 27. Twenty-eight professionals with more than 710 years of

combined service will be honored. Each retiree will receive a special plaque provided by the County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas.

Turkey talk session scheduled

Discussions on turkey production, marketing and processing will highlight the 1977 Texas Turkey Industry Day, Nov. 3, at the Texas 4-H Center at Lake Brownwood, says a poultry marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. John Klenk with Swift Dairy and Poultry Co., Temple, will be the keynote speaker and will discuss "Growing Market Turkeys."

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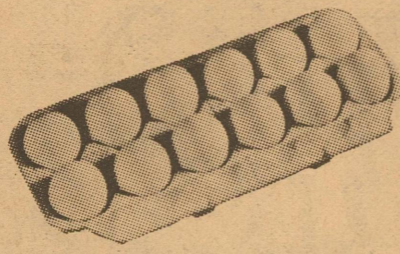

The Eldorado Eagle defense overcame a 14 point first quarter scoring burst by the Robert Lee Steers last Friday and held the Steers the rest of the night to boost the Eagles to a 25-20 victory.

The Eagles, now 2-1 in district play, fought back all night. A hard hitting defense held Robert Lee to 8 first downs in the second half, while the Eagles made 8 first downs in the final period alone.

Two TD passes by Robert Lee made the score 14-0 with five minutes left in the first quarter.

But with 1:05 left in the first half, the Eagles scored on a 25-yard run by Mike Lux to make the halftime score 14-6.

The third quarter was all Eldorado, as the quick Eagle defense kept the Steers inside their own 35-yard line for the entire 12 minutes.

Michael Mertz led the Eagle defense in the third quarter by intercepting a Robert Lee pass on the Steer 30-yard line, and causing a fumble on a punt return by Robert Lee.

Midway through the third quarter David Robledo returned a Robert Lee punt 27 yards to set up an Eagle 1st & 10 on the Steer 18 yard line.

Six plays later quarterback Ernesto Martinez pushed into the end zone from the 5 yard line. The PAT was no good. But Eldorado had closed the gap to 14-12 with 5:40 left in the third quarter.

The fourth quarter again was all Eldorado. One lone run of 28 yards with 1:45 left in the game boosted Robert Lee's total to 20 points. But it was all too late, for the Eagles had 25 points already on their side of the scoreboard.

A 32 yard pass and run play from quarterback John Cheatham to David Robledo took the Eagles ahead 18-14 with 7:05 left.

Three minutes later Eldorado scored again on a 3 yard dive by Sam Whitten. Cheatham kicked the PAT and Eldorado led 25-14.

The win gave Eldorado a 2-1 district record, and enables the Eagles to move into second place with a victory over Wall tonight in a 7:30 game in Eldorado.

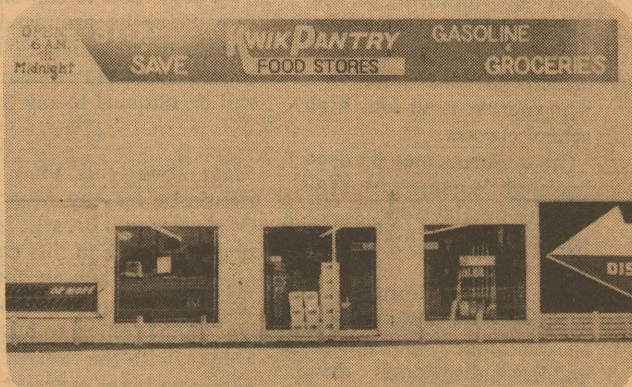

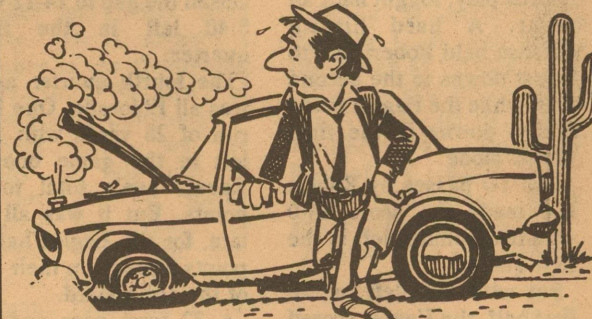
Robinsons return from trip to Germany

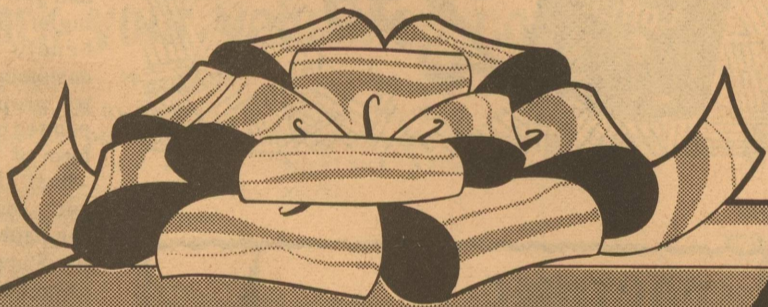

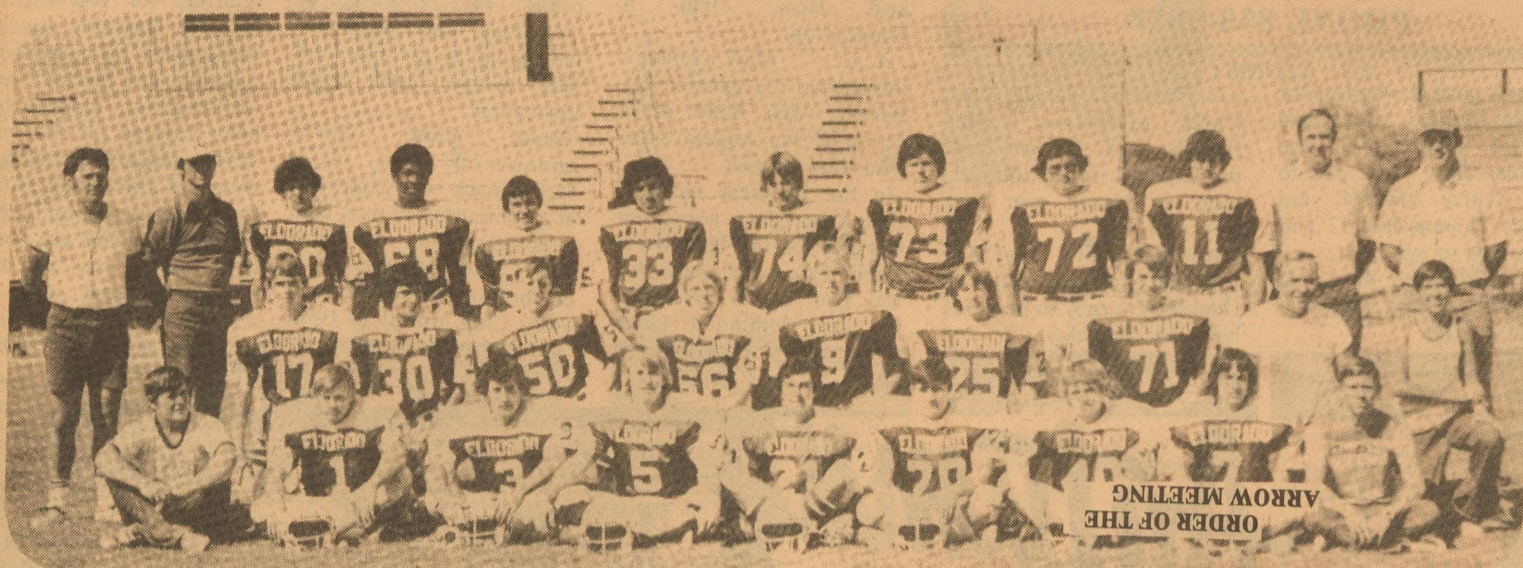

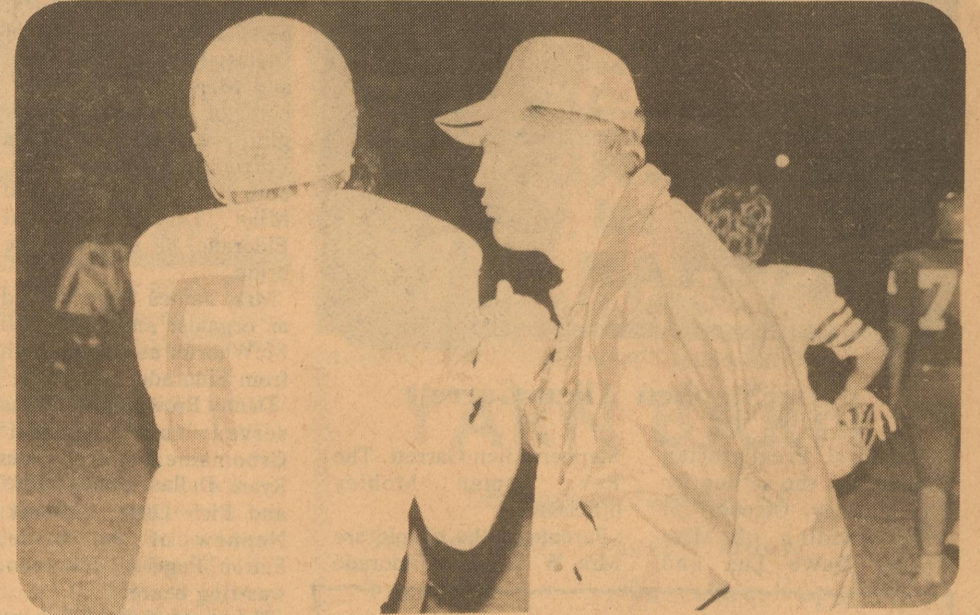

Nugent discusses amendments from page 1

Amendment No. 4 would provide for property tax exemptions to encourage the preservation of cultural, historical, or natural history resources. It would expand the basis for which relief from State and local ad valorem taxes could be granted to historic sites. Nugent pointed out that each local governing body is given the authority to determine which local sites are to be designated historic and to work out the necessary details.

Amendment No. 5 would grant the legislature power to allow agricultural producers to create associations for research, education and promotion, and to levy assessments on the product sales to finance such groups.

Amendment No. 6 would give banks power to conduct business by use of electronic devices at remote locations. Electronic banking terminals are gaining in popularity in other States and the immediate detecting of "hot checks" would benefit merchants and customers alike, according to proponents. Nugent pointed out that this is not a form of "branch banking" which State law prohibits, and that bank holding companies have gained in the State in recent years.

Amendment No. 7 alters the powers of the Judicial Qualifications Commission and also changes the membership, powers and proceedings of the group. Proponents say that if passed, this amendment would make the Commission more open to public reprimand, by providing a quicker and more efficient method of disciplining judges.

A few persons present asked questions about the amendments in which they were most interested and Nugent's talk was well received.
