After an update by the tax assessor on delinquent taxes, a letter was read for consideration and discussion. The letter will be sent to seriously delinquent accounts along with the delinquent tax statements. Statements will be mailed within the next two months. Interest and penalty rates will go up next year and every effort will be made to collect as many deliquent taxes as possible.

Federal income tax returns must be signed and dated, the Internal Revenue Service said. In the case of married taxpayers who file jointly, both spouses' signatures must appear on

the form. When married taxpayers file joint returns, lack of income or absence from the home of one spouse is not a valid excuse for a missing signature on the return. Both spouses must signed regardless of their individual incomes. If one spouse is away from home, the return should be sent to him or her prior to filing,

Form Must Be Signed

according to the IRS. Spouses who cannot sign due to disease or injury may have their husbands or wives sign for them. After signing the infirm spouse's name in the proper space, the words "By (name of the spouse signed), Husband (or wife)" should be added.

The spouse who signed should also attach a dated statement to the return that includes the following information: the name of the return, the tax year, the reason the other spouse cannot sign, and that the ill or injured spouse has agreed to having their name signed.

talent Mrs. Whitten put into the picture. **Raising Beautiful Tomatoes Isn't Very Hard**

To many of us, gardening simply means growing tomatoes. A few tomato plants in the backyard garden can be a fascinating and rewarding adventure or they can be diaster. Sickly tomato plants which produce few, if any fruit, certianly do not help the gardening spirit. Some simple advice might help those growing tomatoes for the first time and perhaps even increase yields and satisfaction for you experienced gardeners.

First, you should not attempt to grow tomatoes unless they can be placed in an area that receives sunlight at least six hours a day. They will grow with less light but simply will not produce much of a crop placed between tail shrubs, beneath trees or between buildings.

Secondly, soil that has been well prepared and properly fertilized is essential for good growth and high yields. Poor soils can be improved with liberal amounts of crgnic matter and proper fertilization. A dark, heavy clay or even a fine sand can be improved by working 3 to 4 inches of organic matter and a small amount of fertilizer such as 10-20-10 or 12-24-12 into the area where your tomatoes are to be planted.

Trapping Dues Payable

During that time, the trapping club and ranchers in that area hired a helicopter and a number of covotes were exterminated. Another coyote was caught in a trap on Nov. 5, on the Blaylock ranch.

last five years, retired earlier this year. He is being replaced by Willis Reber who has been employed in Runnels County.

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

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
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
