## Court discusses roads, COG and airport repair

Jim Ridge, representative of the Concho Valley Council of Governments, met with the Schleicher County Commissioners Court Monday to discuss three items.

First, he presented a resolution authorizing the council to submit a grant application to the Department of Agriculture and Farmers Home Administration for funding a rural development planning project. The court endorsed the application.

The second item was transportation of the elderly. He said that presently the council has four 12 passenger vans which are being used to transport elderly persons to and from doctors appointments or social functions in several west Texas counties. "We are proposing a van for each county in Texas," he said. The van would cost \$8,000, with the county paying ten percent, or \$800. The council would retain title to the van and provide the insurance. He said other details such as providing a driver were being worked out. The court took no action on the suggestion.

Third, Ridge told the court that although he was not trying to talk them into going CVOG, "It would make it a lot easier," if they were members. Annual dues for Schleicher County would be \$113.85.

Sheriff Orval Edmiston spoke to the court briefly, after Ridge's departure, endorsing entry into the council. He told them the council could be very useful when they had to equip the new jail facilities. He said that several new jails in the area had gone through the council for their equipment.

However, without any discussion, the court decided not to join.

Joe Lane of the Sonora Department of Highways and Public Transportation met with commissioners to bring them up to date on progress of Farm to Market Road 2596. The new road will connect the existing pavement to the Sonora-Fort McKavett highway.

Lane told the court a definite line for the road had been established and that right of way deeds would be ready for the county within two months.

The road will pass through the Jack Mann ranch, which is leased by Howard Derrick. Derrick met with the court to discuss damages which will be caused by building the road. Derrick will be cut off from his livestock pens, watering tanks and the entrance to his house. According to county attorney T.P. Robinson, these are considered elements of damage. Because of a recent injunction served against the court forbidding them to use county equipment on private property, the county cannot connect Derrick's entrance to his house to the new road, a distance of less than 400 feet.

Lane told the court that the usual practice was to reimburse the property owner a set amount of damages so that he could build the road.

No definite action was taken by the court concerning the damages.

Derrick also talked to the court about the condition of the airport runway. "It is deteriorating quickly," he told the court, "and it needs to be fixed before it takes a lot more money to repair." McWhorter told him that \$10,000 had been set aside in the county's yearly budget for repair of the airport. He said he had talked to a contractor in San Angelo who said it would take that much money to top it. Commissioners discussed it briefly, but again took no action.

They also discussed a road connecting the Huldade paved road to Runge Lane or Cliff Road which they had made public May 8. Mary Helen Stockton had submitted a request to make the road a private road again. Robinson told the commissioners that the road definitely was a public road and could not be considered a private road, because of the type of traffic it handles.

## Learning film planned for Tuesday

The Eldorado Association for Children with Learning Disabilities will present a film at 7 p.m. Tuesday in the Memorial Building.

"The film will be of vital interest to parents with pre-school children. It will help them recognize the problems their children may be experiencing," explained Pat Ragsdale, one of the group's organizers.

Function of the association in Eldorado, said Ragsdale, is to educate parents and teachers about the laws regarding programs helping children with learning disabilities in addition to helping them recognize children's disabilities. He said hopefully these problems would be noticed at an early age so that action could be taken before the child is faced with actual class room participation.

However, the association is trying to help parents with any age child with learning disabilities.

"We are not trying to make waves," he said, "but are trying to be helpful. We are trying to get parents to use specialists for children with learning disabilities so they can custom make a program for them.

The association is newly formed and had 11 members.

## Schleicher 4-Hers compete at state

4-H club members from Schleicher County participated in various activities at Texas State 4-H Round-Up held at Texas A&M University last week. Judy Pitts was a participant in the state 4-H food show that was held on Monday and Tuesday. She made Hefezopf, a German Yeast Bread, and was awarded a blue ribbon at the awards assembly. Food show participants were honored at a reception Monday night also.

The dairy cattle judging team from Schleicher County represented our district at state round-up. Team members who participated were Jed Edmiston, Jay Behrens, Todd Swift

and Curtis Griffin.

Kara Homer and Lou Ann Turner were in the "Food and Nutrition - Let's Speak Out" contest. Their demonstration was entitled "The Commercial Comedy Caper" and dealt with food advertising.

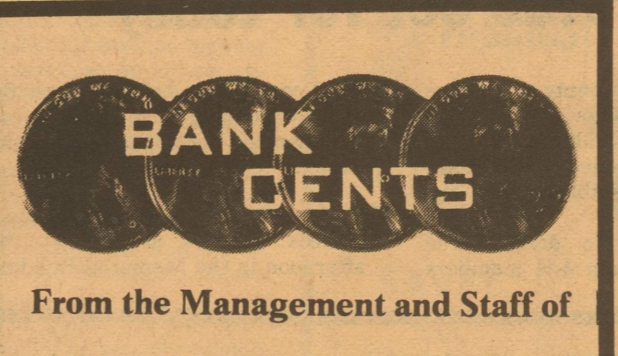

## AROUND The HOUSE and OTHER PLACES

Many people in the county have home gardens. Quite a few homemakers have already started canning and freezing vegetables and fruit. Free publications on food preservation are available at your county extension office. If you need help, please, call or come by.

There are a few things that all home canners need to remember when putting up food. These include;

Use only standard-made jars imprinted with the manufacturers name. Check tops of jars for cracks, chips and dents, discarding those with defects that would prevent an airtight seal.

After canning food always check for an airtight seal. There are three ways to do this.

Tap the metal dish with a

spoon or fork. If the seal is good there will be a clear ringing sound. If the seal is poor there will be a dull thud.

Look at the seal. If the lid is curved down, the jar is sealed.

Press the center of the lid. If it is down and will not move, the jar is sealed.

Always use reliable, standard recipes. Check your timing carefully. Don't take a chance on guesswork.

After testing seals of the jars, store them in a cool, clean, dark dry place. Canned food kept in a warm, damp place may change in color and flavor. It is wise to use all home canned food within a year.

If you have specific questions on food preservation please call me. I will be happy to try to help you.

## Loeffler charges Carter's plans false hope, doom for cattlemen

Tom Loeffler, candidate for Congress in the 21st District of Texas, today issued a statement calling President Carter's announced plan to increase foreign beef imports by fifteen percent "offering false hope to the American consumer, side-stepping a substantive answer to our problems and signaling the end of the family-owned farm and ranch as we know it today."

Loeffler's statement was issued in response to actions recently by Carter administration officials who contacted several Capitol Hill congressmen to tell them that Carter would be formally announcing a rise in beef imports today.

Loeffler, who pointed out that America's cattle raiser had suffered a \$30 billion loss in only the last four years, called Carter's actions, "a cruel blow to ranchers who, for the first time in years, are beginning to receive a fair return for beef."

"These ranchers had the opportunity to build up domestic herds again," Loeffler said, "and in the long run, this would make more beef available with beef prices stabilizing at a price fair to both the cattle raiser and beef consumer."

"Instead, the Carter administration is tinkering with the free market by taking one more step which will force out of existence

family-owned farms and ranches. Carter has obviously written off America's cattle industry."

Loeffler, who is a rancher with farming background, said, "What we want and deserve is a fair profit and a secure future, and every time it appears we might get there, the Carter administration jerks the rug out from under us."

Loeffler noted that the live cattle market has responded to the announcement by "sharply dropping cattle prices, which will result in further shortage of beef."

"The 'hope' by administration officials that their actions will reduce beef retail prices by 5c this fall is unrealistic, and even those officials know it is not likely to happen," Loeffler charged.

"Analyzing the short and long-range effects objectively will show that this is another short-range, stop-gap approach that will raise the future cost of beef for the consumer."

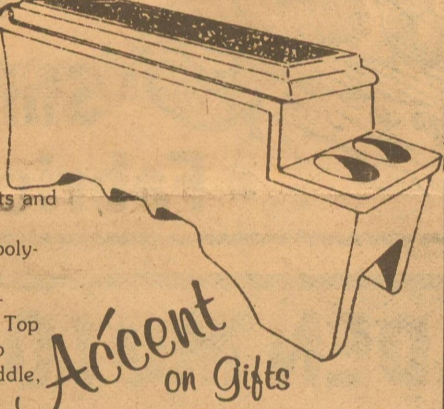
"When will the Carter forces understand that what has built this country into the strongest economic force in the world is the free market system of supply and demand, and that every action like this which defeats that basically sound and fair approach is a step backward and spells out a harsh future for all of us?" Loeffler asked.

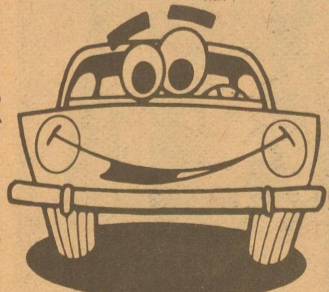

# From The Horses Mouth

**TOMATO DISEASES**  
The most widely grown vegetable in Texas gardens is the tomato. However, this popular vegetable is also subject to a number of diseases.

The first disease problem that most homeowners face with tomatoes is damping off. We advise planting in warm, well-drained soil and spraying with the fungicide Captan when the disease occurs.

Fusarium wilt is another common disease problem in tomatoes. The only control is the use of wilt resistant varieties. These include Spring Giant, Spring Set, Terrific, Better Boy, Big Set, Homestead Elite, Small Fry and Monte Grande. Small Fry is a cherry type tomato.

Root knot nematodes also attack tomatoes. Resistant varieties are the most effective means of reducing losses to these microscopic pests. Such varieties include Nematex, Terrific, Big Set, Better Boy and Small Fry.

Among common foliage diseases attacking tomatoes are early blight, late blight, Septoria leaf spot, gray leaf spot and Anthracnose. These can best be controlled by foliar sprays of an acceptable fungicide such as Maneb, Captan or Zineb. Begin applications when the disease first appears and continue at 7-to-10-day intervals for three to four applications.

Fruit decay may also set in as tomatoes near maturity. The most effective control of this condition is to use a cage or mulch of some type to keep fruit from touching the soil. Foliar fungicides will aid in controlling various fruit rots.

Blossom end rot is another condition that often occurs, the result of improper watering or lack of uniform moisture conditions. This is identified by a brown to black area on the bottom of the fruit.

As is readily evident, a great deal of time and effort are required to produce beautiful, delicious tomatoes, with particular attention to control of dis-

eases.

**POTATO HARVESTING**  
Fresh potatoes can be harvested any time for immediate consumption once the tubers are of sufficient size.

However, yield is reduced and storage quality is lowered by harvesting potatoes before tops begin to dry down. Potatoes harvested early (immature tubers) have thin skins which allow fairly rapid water loss, causing them to shrivel and become soft shortly after storage.

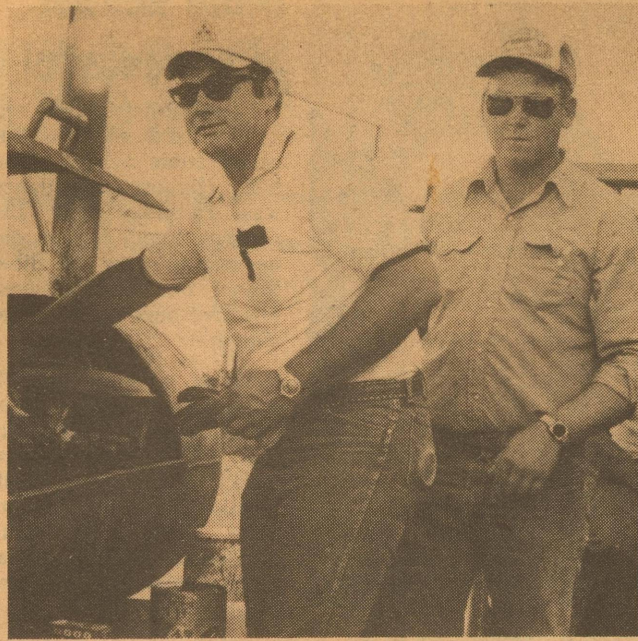
Once harvested, proper storage is important to maintain the quality of the fresh potatoes. We suggest storing the potatoes in complete darkness in moist air at about 60 degrees F. for several weeks. Lower temperatures to 38-40 degrees F. for long-term storage. Colder temperatures prevent sprouting while warmer temperatures encourage it. Whatever the storage temperature, keep potatoes in complete darkness. Exposure to light causes freshly dug potatoes to turn green and to develop an undesirable bitter flavor.

Digging potatoes at the right time and storing them properly can mean a supply of top quality potatoes for some time.

## Predator control favored in management meeting

The recent predator management hearing in San Angelo should have convinced federal officials beyond a shadow of a doubt that those who actually deal with predators are strongly in favor of predator control. Of roughly three dozen speakers, only two represented the anti-control faction.

Testimony in favor of stronger efforts almost invariably included demands for the re-certification of compound 1080 and without exception condemned the U.S. Interior Department's drift away from predator control and toward predator protection.

Examples of the testimony, both oral and written, include: A mailgram from Texas Gov. Dolph Briscoe to Interior secretary Cecil Andrus, calling for immediate experimental use of 1080 on public lands and efforts toward future registration of the compound on private land.

Briscoe also requested that Interior funding be increased to the amount needed to once again place the Department of Interior in the posture of carrying out the mandate of the Predator Control Act of 1931.

He had earlier written letters to President Carter recommending 1080's re-registration, explaining that "specialists who have worked on the problem are convinced that 1080 may be used in a controlled manner against coyotes without endangering other species or humans and with little or no adverse environmental impact." Briscoe added that President Ford's M-44-based amendment of the executive order that led to the 1080 ban was evidence enough that Mr. Carter could legally free the compound if he actually wanted to.

Texas state representative Jim Nugent called Interior's de-emphasis of predator control "extremely alarming." Nugent reminded Interior officials that their agency is compelled by law to control predators—"so why don't they get the job done?" He

recommended that Interior officials "carry out their responsibilities in accordance with the law," and suggested that 1080 might be the most efficient and effective means of doing so.

State representative Tom Massey advised hearing officials that cattle as well as sheep fall to predators, calling coyotes a "very serious problem" in the cow country of Texas' South Plains. Massey also likened predator losses to thefts in retail business; ranchers as well as retailers, he stated, "cannot tolerate any losses."

Kimble County Judge Wilbur R. Dunk submitted written testimony detailing confirmed coyote kills on 167 sheep and goats belonging to 12 Kimble County producers during a little over four months this year. This in a county that Judge Dunk describes as being coyote-free only ten years ago. As a result, he wrote, "we desperately need some additional tools to work with."

He is not alone in his sentiments.
