Presbyterian Ordination Is Scheduled For Sunday

The Rev. Ron Sutto will be ordained during a ceremony at 3 p.m. Sunday in the First Presbyterian Church. The Rev. Sutto moved here in December after he was called by the pulpit committee here.

On the commission will be the Rev. Charles Hollingsworth, executive pastor of Trios Rios Presbyterian Church and moderator for the ceremony; the Rev. Jim Mills, pastor of the Church of the Good Shepherd in Sonora; the Rev. Harold Odum, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in San Angelo; James Powell and Paul Page, ruling elders and Nelson Stubblefield, of Sonora.

Invited to sit with the commission are the Rev. Charles R. Fisher, Jr. of Honey Grove, the Rev. Edward Salvant Jr. of Austin, the Rev. Juan Trevino, Jr. of Del Rio and ruling elders Julius Sutto, Rev. Sutto's father, J. Donald Sutto, his brother and Richard E. Leach Jr., all of Saginaw, Mich.

Music will be presented by Debbie Joy, organist and Mrs. Maxine Page, music director. Rev. Sutto's daughters, Debra Jean and Amy Lyn, will be acolytes. Ushers will be John Pitts, Marvin McAngus and Rev.

Sutto's son, Ron.

Rev. Sutto grew up in Spaulding Township, Mich. and graduated from Saginaw High School in June of 1959.

He enrolled in Michigan State University for two years and then returned home to farm with his father. He returned to college in 1972 attending the winter terms at Saginaw Valley State College each year. He graduated magna cum laude from SVSC in May of 1976 with a bachelor of arts degree.

In 1963, he married Jean Ann Reinke of Saginaw, who is a registered nurse.

In 1965, Sutto was awarded a three year fellowship grant from the Kellogg Foundation and Michigan State University. He has been active in community affairs, joining the fire department and the Jaycees. He was secretary of the Spaulding Township Planning Commission and was elected trustee on the Township Board.

He is a life-long member of the Washington Ave. Sunday Presbyterian Church in Saginaw where he was

a Sunday school teacher, senior high youth advisor, member of the board of trustees and ordained as a ruling elder.

In September of 1976, he enrolled in Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary in Austin. He completed all his requirements for his degree in January.

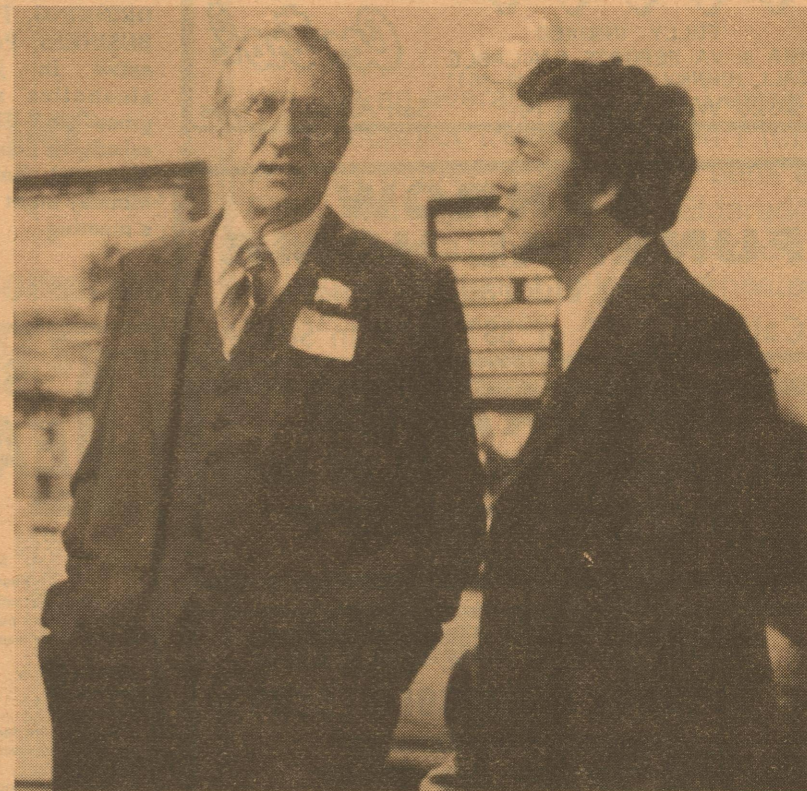
The life-pack monitor was given in memory of Phil Olson, who was instrumental in founding Schleicher County Emergency Service. Olson died in September.

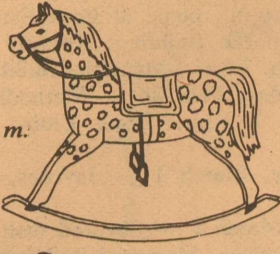

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**History Books
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The final phase of the "History of Schleicher County" which is being published by the Schleicher County Historical Society, has been completed, at least from this end of the project. The final chapters of the book were turned in to the printer this week, as was half of the money needed to print the book.

The society has sold 555 books so far, but ordered 1,000. Orders for the books will be taken for several weeks at \$24.95 each. After the book arrives, the price will be increased.

The books are expected to be delivered sometime this summer, perhaps as early as June 1. At that time, the society will have to make another \$10,000 payment to the printer.
