Pakistan killing called revenge

Gunmen killed four Americans and a Pakistani driver Wednesday in Karachi, Pakistan. A police spokesman said the daylight ambush was likely linked to the U.S. conviction of a Pakistani for murdering two CIA employees. The shooting victims worked for Union Texas oil company. Security was tightened at all Western diplomatic missions in the city of Karachi following the attack. No claim of responsibility has been made for the attack but authorities say it may be revenge for this week's conviction of Mir Amaal Kasi in Fairfax, Va., for the 1993 CIA shootings. Kasi's sentencing hearing continued at press time.

Clinton, Gore questioned

The White House said yesterday that President Clinton and Vice President Al Gore were questioned separately by Justice Department investigators looking into their campaign fundraising activities. The interviews took place Tuesday and the White House said both Clinton and Gore cooperated with Justice Department officials. Attorneys for the two men said the questions pertained to telephone solicitation of funds. The interviews were part of the Justice Department's investigation to determine if an independent counsel should be appointed to look into White House fund raising practices.

Iraq remains defiant

Iraq continued to defy U.N. resolutions on disarmament hours before a Security Council vote on a petition to impose new sanctions on the Baghdad government. Once again, Iraq refused to allow American inspectors to participate in U.N. weapons monitoring, prompting the international organization to halt its efforts to find out if Iraq still has weapons of mass destruction. Saddam Hussein met his advisers after which official newspapers proclaimed that Iraq would not bow to U.N. pressure. The U.N. Security Council reached broad agreement last night on slapping fresh sanctions on Iraq, including a travel ban on officials responsible for the country's defiant stance. A vote is expected today.

Pope not feeling well

Pope John Paul, who skipped a mass Tuesday because he was feeling unwell, re-appeared at an audience yesterday but did not read an address because of a sore throat. "Because of the indisposition of my voice, I will leave the readings to my aides," the Pope told pilgrims and tourists at the Vatican. A priest then read the Pope's address in Italian to some 10,000 people attending the audience. The Pope, sitting on his throne in the Vatican's large indoor audience hall, read brief greetings in various languages.

Second place finish at Regional Meet advances team to State

Freshman runner Sammy Cabrera led the way for the Eagles Cross-Country team in Lubbock last Saturday as they placed 2nd at Regional and advanced to the State Meet to be held this weekend in Round Rock.

Cabrera finished the 3-mile course in 9th place overall with a time of 17:01. His six teammates finished in the following order: 15) Joseph Wink 17:26.8 20) Juan Sanchez 18:10.8 32) Daniel Mata 17:47.3 42) Anthony Pina 18:23.5 58) Johnny Lee Arispe 18:56.5 80) Victor Mata 19:29.3.

There were 173 runners in the field. Ryan Cruz of Shallowater High School was the overall winner in the individual standings with a time of 16:4.6. Boys Ranch won the team title with a combined score of 87 points. Eldorado's team total was 104 while 3rd place Winters amassed 121 points.

Following the race, Cabrera, who was recovering from a bout with the flu said he was pleased with the second place showing. "We're getting better all the time," he stated.

The Eldorado team had been ranked as high as 4th in the statewide polls before finishing 2nd to Winters at the district meet.

Eagles coach Harvey Wink noted that Boys Ranch is a perennial power in Cross Country track. "They're a good team," Wink said. "If we can run with them, we can run with anybody."

The Eagles Cross Country team will travel to Round Rock this weekend to compete in the Class 2-A State Meet. They are slated to run at 12:00 noon in Old Settlers Park. Everyone is encouraged to make the trip to Round Rock to support the Cross Country Eagles. Remember...wear your green!

Once more, sheep and goat referendum narrowly fails

According to a letter received from Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry, the Sheep and Goat Referendum sponsored by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association failed to receive the sixty-six and two-thirds voting percentage it needed to pass. Of the 925 people voting on the proposition,

64.3 percent, or 595 voted in favor.

Of the 1,087 ballots cast, 51 were invalid, and 111 voted only for directors and not on the proposition.

TSGRA president Dr. Tim R. Turner of San Angelo stated the

Middle School library book draws criticism at school board meeting

Lee R. "Smokey" Taylor appeared at Monday night's school board meeting to voice concerns over a book in the Eldorado Middle School library. Taylor told the trustees that his 12-year-old son had checked out a book titled "If Rock and Roll Were a Machine" from the school library and complained to him after finding "inappropriate, vulgar and sexually explicit" words and phrases in it.

Taylor said when his son told him about the book he dismissed it at first, thinking it probably contained only mild swear words. "But when I took a look at the thing I was appalled," Taylor stated.

Taylor presented the board copies of selected pages from the book. He began to read aloud some of the passages but stopped, saying he couldn't bring himself to say the words in public.

"You've got the F-word and the CS-word in there several times and lots of other garbage," Taylor said.

Board president Ilse Williams challenged Taylor at one point, saying she had read the book after learning there was a complaint. Williams noted that in her opinion the book's storyline was appropriate and that the book should be judged by its overall message not merely a few selected passages.

Williams then noted that the school has a policy in place for dealing with offensive literature in the library. She urged Taylor to submit a formal complaint in writing so that a review process could begin.

The school's policy calls for a Request for Reconsideration Committee to review specific complaints on a case by case basis. That committee is appointed by the campus principal and consists of the librarian, the principal, two teachers from the campus and a school board member.

Taylor agreed submit a formal complaint and did so before leav-

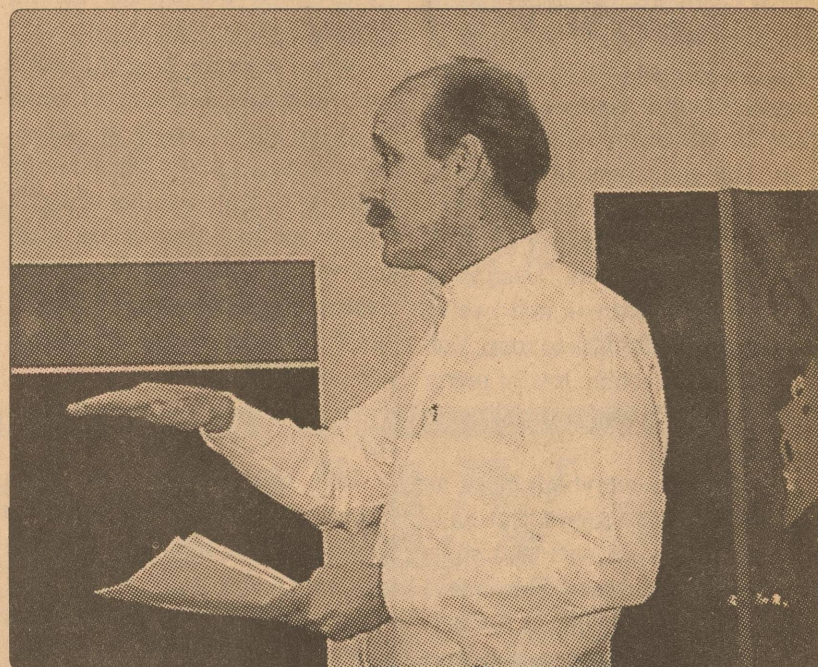

ing the meeting. However, he also called on the board to establish a second committee consisting of parents, school board members and school personnel to review the school district's policy of acquiring library books.

After further discussion, the board opted to allow Supt. Porter

and SCISD librarian Debbie Griffin to recommend a review process to them at a later meeting.

Following the meeting with Taylor, the board moved on to other items on the agenda. Board members present for the meeting included Tip Finley, Phil

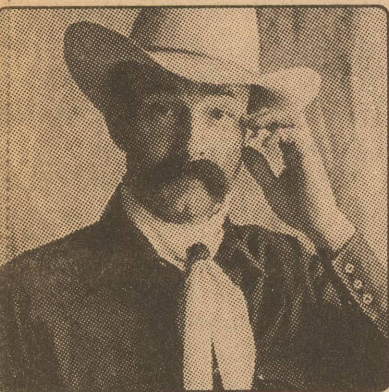

Insurance Commissioner lowers benchmark rates

AUSTIN --- Texas Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer last week lowered benchmark rates for automobile insurance.

The new rates, which become effective Jan. 20, are used as a price-setting guide by state-regulated insurers, who presently cover about 75 percent of the market.

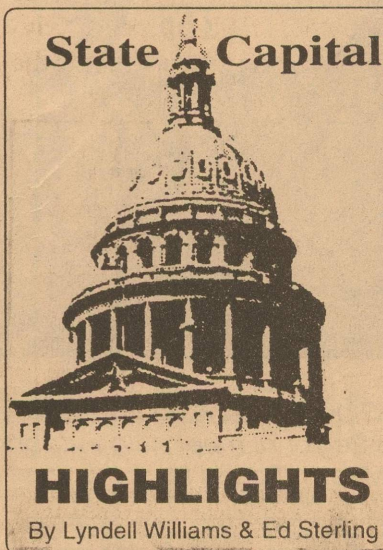
"This is good news for all motorists, especially drivers who buy only the insurance they need to obey the law and those who are concerned about being hit by the large number of drivers who carry no insurance at all," Bomer said.

Under Bomer's order, individual benchmark rates will decrease 19 percent for bodily injury and 28 percent for uninsured motorist coverage, but collision coverage will increase 8 percent and comprehensive coverage by 9 percent.

Insurers are allowed by law to charge up to 30 percent above or below benchmark, so rate decreases are not guaranteed. It's up to the insurer.

Dan Lambe, state program director of Citizens Action, told the *Austin American-Statesman*, "Texas consumers will welcome this news of rate reductions with caution, to be sure. They have heard these promises before and failed to see insurers follow through with lower rates."

Still, Bomer's order was the first reduction in the benchmark rate since the rating system was created



in 1991. Benchmark rates inched up 3 percent in 1995 and 3.2 percent in 1996.

HUB Contracts Decrease

Businesses owned by women and minorities got much less state business in 1997 than they did in 1996.

Figures compiled by the Texas General Services Commission --- the agency that oversees most state contracts --- reveal the first decline in contracts since the "Historically Underutilized Business" program was launched seven years ago.

In 1996, state agencies spent \$936 million with 6,311 woman and minority owned businesses, or about 16 percent of the \$5.8 billion awarded in contracts.

In 1997, about 13 percent of the \$6.1 billion in state contracts --- \$784 million --- went to 4,474

HUBs.

State Sen. Royce West, D-Dallas, who battled against attempts to cut the affirmative-action program in the last legislative session, said, "It's amazing to me that in a state the size of Texas, some state agencies are unable to find qualified HUB vendors."

Teacher Standards Vote Set

The State Board of Educator Certification voted in favor of proposed standards requiring teachers to renew their licenses every five years.

Certification under the proposal, would require 30 hours of training per year or 150 hours every five years. A final vote on the proposal, which will affect some 250,000 classroom teachers, is scheduled for March.

Teacher organizations rallied against the proposal before the vote and convinced the board to tentatively agree to reduce the number of training hours from 200 to 150 every five years.

No Confidence Led To Firing

Texas Lottery Commissioner John Hill said lack of confidence led to the firing of the lottery's executive director Lawrence Littwin two weeks ago.

Hill told the *Houston Chronicle*, "We had just concluded after careful evaluation that we didn't have confidence that he was the right person to lead the agency."

Littwin investigated the lottery operating company, GTECH Corp., to see if improper political contributions were made to legislators.

Littwin said the commission --- which includes Harriet Miers of Dallas and Anthony Sadberry of Cypress --- fired him because of political intimidation resulting from his investigation.

But Hill, who was not specific about the reason for the commission's lack of confidence in Littwin, said, "It had nothing to do with political issues or political pressures. It didn't have anything to do with him looking at the financial records of legislators. It was our conclusion that he wasn't working out."

The new interim lottery executive director is Linda Cloud.

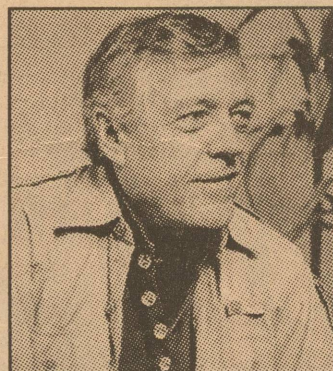
Other Capital Highlights

The Immigration and Naturalization Service has proposed giving Texas and New Mexico two-thirds of the 1,000 new border patrol agents who will be on the job next year. Federal legislation passed in 1996 requires the number of agents to increase 1,000 per year through 2001.

Insurance Commissioner Bomer approved rules carrying out a new law that gives patients the right to binding, independent medical review of decisions to deny treatment issued by HMOs and insurance companies.

He and his wife Jane and some other El Pasoans donned some Spanish clothing and went to Plymouth and told those people up there they were Johnny come latelies, that the first Thanksgiving was in Texas. They called

it blasphemy and their stiff New England backs stiffened oven more. The Texans were arrested for heresy and for spreading malicious lies and rumors.

"Send them fleeing," cried one Plymouth official. "Fill their tacos with beach sand and their fajitas with seaweed. May they thirst until they recant. History is on our side."

Sheldon invited the Yankees to El Paso and they came. When they claimed they had the first Thanksgiving, they were put into the Billy the Kid jail by a bunch of unruly gunmen. Some good guy rangers came on the scene, however and chased the bad guys away.

The mock trials and shenanigans generated millions of dollars worth of publicity for both El Paso and Plymouth.

Sheldon says those New England folks didn't eat anything on what they claim was the first Thanksgiving. They just gave thanks. All they did was pray.

El Paso, the 4th largest city in

Texas (population 700,000) celebrates the first Thanksgiving in a big way on the last weekend in April every year. They recreate the arrival of Onate and his party* In addition, there are musicians, dancers, food and fun. Next year, the Quadricentennial celebration of the First Thanksgiving, the budget for the event is a third of a million dollars.

*Onate and his followers were nearly starved when they reached the Rio Grande on April 20, 1598. They had gone without water for 4 days. Some horses ran to the river as soon as they smelled the water, jumped in and drank themselves to death. The men, women, children and animals had been existing on berries and roots. When they reached the river, they swam in the deep water and rested in the shade of the giant cottonwoods. On April 30, Onate ordered everyone to dress in their best clothes and gather for a feast of Thanksgiving.

Sen. Gramm's aide to visit Eldorado Tuesday, Nov. 18

An aide to U.S. Phil Gramm will visit Eldorado on Tuesday, November 18, to outline a new Gramm proposal that would make an extra \$2 billion in federal funds available to rebuild Texas' crumbling highways.

Gramm's regional director James Wilson is meeting with officials in several Texas cities this week, highlighting the senator's road building plan to ease the congestion that often turns long stretches of Texas' interstate highways into parking lots.

Wilson will speak to member of the public at 2:00 p.m. at the Dairy Mart.

"Heavy traffic is a sure sign of economic growth and opportunity, but it is pounding our major highways into concrete dust. Too many

parts of the main north-south artery in our state, Interstate 35, are parking lots on most days, and virtually every other big highway in Texas is in desperate need of repair and upgrading," Gramm said. "We should have started this program 10 years ago, but we can do it today."

Gramm's proposal, co-sponsored by U.S. Sens. Robert Byrd, D-West Virginia, John Warner, R-Virginia, and Max Baucus, D-Montana, will direct federal highway authorities to begin using the money collected from the 1993 gasoline tax increase.

The proposal will provide \$1.9 billion in added highway funding for Texas. It also creates a \$450 million fund to finance such programs as the special "NAFTA Highway" designations that are being sought for I-35, the planned I-69 in South and East Texas and the I-10/I-25 link at El Paso.

McCormick, Ruby Minor, Berta Nicholson, Steve Sessom and Ilse Williams. Board member Eddie Albin was absent.

One item the board discussed was a management letter which the board directed Supt. Porter to send to the school district's auditors. The letter included an attachment which outlines action taken by the board last year to correct deficiency reports from the Texas Education Agency.

Next, the board heard from Supt. Porter that SCISD had been awarded a \$290,490.00 Rural Challenge Grant through the Annenberg Foundation. It was noted that the grant will span a three-year period with the money being forwarded to the district in yearly increments.

Phil McCormick voiced his concerns about the Rural Challenge grant. "I still want to know where the element of responsibility lies and what steps are being taken to make sure, if this thing dissolves, we don't go through what y'all went through when the Eagle Excellence deal fell apart."

Ilse Williams noted that the Rural Challenge committee has been working on structuring an organization to administer the grant. "We were waiting to see if we got it, first," Williams said.

Porter then told the board that he and County Judge Johnny Griffin were jointly pursuing a Texas Parks & Wildlife Dept. grant which

might help SCISD upgrade some of its athletic facilities.

Next, the board authorized budget amendments required to pay for recent and upcoming trips by the high school band, cross-country team and football squad. The trustees then voted to cast their votes for Schleicher County Appraisal Board members as follows. 1024 votes for William Edmiston, 1024 votes for Phil McCormick and 1023 votes for Raymond Mittel.

It was also noted during the meeting that some college level Political Science and English classes may be offered at SCISD beginning in the spring. Supt. Porter said he would be teaching the Political Science class while EHS

principal Ken Newman was still looking for someone to teach an English class.

Before the meeting adjourned, it was explained that the district had contracted with ABC School of Driving in San Angelo to provide Drivers Ed. for EHS students. Drivers Ed. will be offered in both the fall and spring semesters.

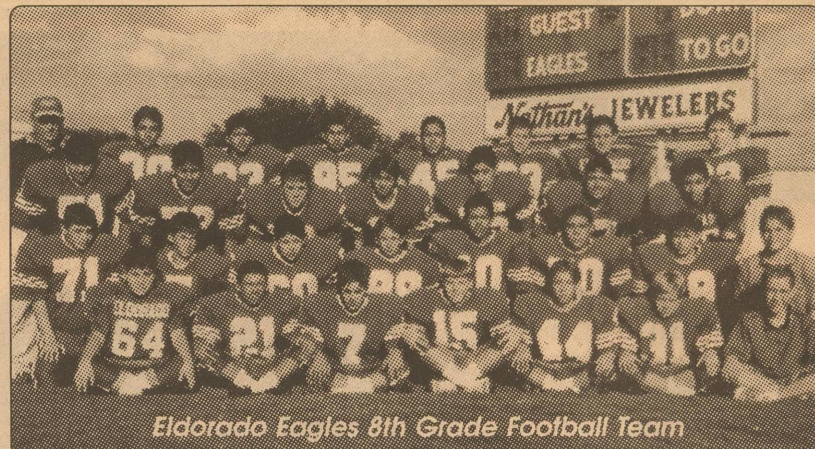
Between the two ropings will be an auction with donated items such as home made tack, home cooked cakes and grill guard, etc.

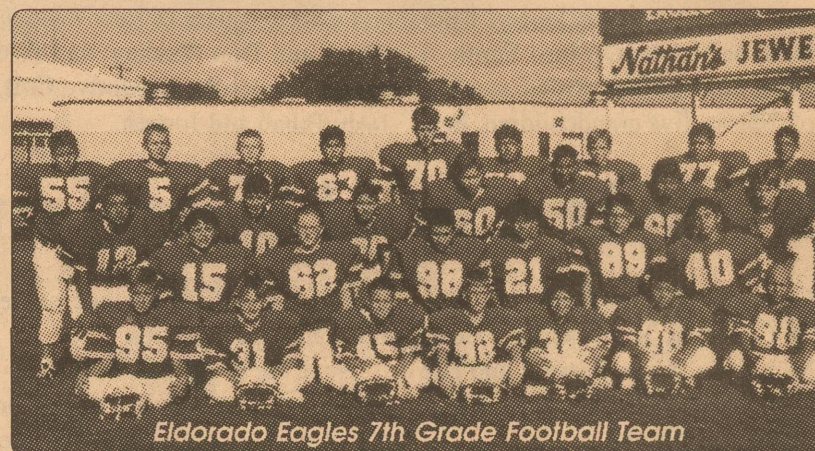
