Company Is Authorized To Get Bids For Bonds

The board of trustees of the Schleicher County Independent School district authorized Rauscher, Pierce and Refsnes Security Corporation to get bids for the sale of bonds to construct three new buildings. The bond election was passed by local voters this spring. The bonding company was represented by Jack Brown, during the regular meeting of the board Monday night. Bids on the bonds will be reviewed and opened during the next meeting May 14.

Also meeting with the board was San Angelo architect Gary Donaldson who discussed the three new buildings and improvements on the track and football bleachers. Donaldson will be working with the EHS coaches to iron out minor details and give a report to the board during the next meeting. The board is hoping to begin the track improvements shortly thereafter.

Truett Stanford found an interesting item when he was going through some of his old files last week. It's a notice of cattle and sheep prices from the year 1947. I thought some of you might find a comparison interesting.

Canner and cutter cattle were going for \$9-11.50 in 1947 compared to \$53-57 today; Bulls in 1947 were bringing \$14.50-16 compared to \$70-80 in 1979; stocker cows in 1947, \$10.50-12.25 and today they bring \$625-790; 1947 heifers were \$17.50-20 and in 1979 they are \$115-130; 1947 steers, 18.50-21.75 and 1979 prices are \$130-155; slaughter cows in 1947 were \$13-14.50 and today they are \$61-67.

Fat lambs in 1947 were \$18-19.25 and today they are \$75-79.75; fat ewes, \$6-7.50 compared to 1979's \$40-44; solid mouth ewes in 1947 brought in \$8-11 and today they are \$56-61.

The Schleicher County Producers Association was formed in 1975 with its purpose being control of the increasing number of predators that plague livestock producers in this area by hiring a trapper through the Texas Animal Damage Control Association.

The directors recently agreed to continue operation of the association, however, there is only enough money left in their funds to continue meeting expenses for about three months.

The county Commissioners Court has continued their support by contributing \$200 a month. The club's expense to keep the trapper runs approximately \$600 per month so the association is asking producers to pay \$15 per section dues again. This is the first time in two years that members have been assessed for dues.

Ronnie Mittel, secretary-treasurer of the association, said, "With cattle, sheep and goats selling at terrific prices, it doesn't take long to figure that \$15 per section is a good investment." Producers can send the dues to Mittel at Box G, Eldorado.

Robbers Take \$383 From Mini Mart

Local law enforcement officers are investigating the theft of \$383 from the Adobe Mini Mart. The theft was reported by Mini Mart manager Sharon Hale Tuesday morning.

According to deputy sheriff Barry Hale, the entry was apparently made through the back door and the cash was removed from a locked drawer below the cash register. The theft was made between 11 p.m. Monday and 6 a.m. Tuesday.

Another theft was reported by school superintendent Guy Whitaker Monday morning. Whitaker reported that someone broke into the money drawer of the high school library and the file cabinet in the secretary's office. About \$80 was removed from the secretary's cabinet, but none was removed from the library. The incident apparently happened over the weekend.

Also Monday, officers investigated a traffic accident in which a 1957 Chevrolet driven by Rosa Burrus was struck in the back by a vehicle driven by Joella Minter of Eldorado. Mrs. Burrus was north bound on Highway 277 and stopped to turn left, when the accident happened. Mrs. Burrus was admitted to Schleicher County Medical Center, and Miss Minter was treated and released.

Last week, sheriff Orval Edmiston investigated another traffic accident in which a car driven by Cleone Allen Sanders of Eldorado hit a tractor trailer truck driven by Marvin Lee Gibbs. The accident happened when Mrs. Sanders tried to change from

the left to the right lane. The tractor trailer was in the right had lane when the car hit it.

The sheriff's department is also investigating several dog bites in the city.

Young Track Stars Break 19 Records

Eight new records were set in the Petticoat Preakness division of the Romper Relays last week, while the boys set 11 new records in their division.

In the shot put, Jay O'Harrow set a new fifth grade record of 28' 5" and Antonio Torres set a new sixth grade record of 33' 2".

Corey Rodgers set a new fourth grade record of 12' 6" in the long jump, and Douglas Ussery set a new sixth grade record of 9.3 in the 60 yard hurdles. In the 220 yard dash, Bobby Williams set a new sixth grade record of 31.

The team of Omar Gonzales, Jason Leifester, Mitchell Bradley and Richard Gawrychowski set a new fourth grade record of 67.4.

Another record fell when Gilbert Gauna set a new fourth grade record of 7.3 in the 50 yard dash. Sixth grader Tim McAngus set a new record in the same category with a 6.9 time.

In the 100 yard dash, Corey Rodgers set a new fourth grade record of 13.5 and Mitchell Bradley set a new fourth grade record of 1:50 in the 600 yard run, while sixth grader Douglas Ussery set a new record of 1:40.2.

In the girls division, fourth grader Jennifer Patton broke the Bantam 40 yard hurdle record with a time of 7.63 seconds. She also established a new record in the 220 yard dash with a time of 33.7.

Georgie Gonzalez sailed over the 60 yard hurdles in ten seconds, also setting a new record. She also took five seconds off the old mark in the

600 yard run with a 1:50.18 timing. Rita Adame, with a 10.3 time, bested the old 60-yard hurdle record and broke the 600 yard run record with a 1:47.1 timing. She also broke the long-standing running jump record with a leap of 14' 4 1/2".

The fifth grade 440 yard relay team of Odelia Garza, Georgie Gonzalez, Luz Martinez and Roseann Adame set a new record with 1:03.1.

The set of records dates back to 1964 when Mrs. Shannon Harber originated the girls division of the romper relays. More records were broken this year than any other year.

Beefed Up Budget Passes House After Long Debate

AUSTIN — After some-
times petty, sometimes pas-
sionate debate, the Texas
House this week passed a
beefed-up version, at least
where salaries are con-
cerned, of a state budget.

The price tag on the
House spending plan for
1980-81 is \$20.3 billion.
Gov. Bill Clements says
that's about \$600 million too
much. House members in-
creased various salaries by
almost \$200 million. Clem-
ents had made it clear long
before the House began its
work that he was against
many of those pay hikes.

It took the House four
days and part of a fifth to
finish the initial step in the
appropriations process that
now moves on to the Senate.
Afterwards, the budget will
probably be hammered out
in a conference committee,
and then, the governor must
approve it.

Acting as if they didn't
know Clements had threat-
ened to veto teacher pay
hikes that exceeded 5.1 per-
cent, House members voted
teachers a 7 percent raise for
1980 and 1981, on top of
step increases. That amounts
to a 20 percent increase in
pay for teachers over the
next two years. Teachers say
that will just about keep
them up with the inflation
rate.

The House also approved
raises for Department of
Public Safety troopers (40
percent, state employees who
make less than \$20,000-a-

year (seven percent), district
judges (14.8 percent) and
district attorneys (36.7 per-
cent). It must be pointed out
that everytime legislators
raise district judges salary,
they raise the amount of
their own retirement pay
which is based on a certain
percentage of a district
judge's yearly salary.

When the House was fin-
ished only \$530 million in
state funds was left unspent.
Remember, school finance is
still to come.

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a rider to the appropriations
bill that would prohibit the
use of state funds for any
primaries other than those in
May.

Clements, who in effect
killed legislation raising
home loan interest rates by
his announcement that he
would veto such a bill, said
the issue of a presidential
primary was the Legislature's
"baby," and that lawmakers
should do their duty and
vote without waiting to see
what he will do if the bill
reaches his desk.

From now on, Clements
seemed to be saying, law-
makers would no longer
have advance notice of how
the governor would act re-
garding certain pieces of leg-
islation. "We are not going
to play this game that way,"
Clements declared.

The way the Senate was
playing this week left the
governor with little to cheer
about. Senators rejected at-
tempts to bring up legisla-
tion that would have given
Clements budgetary powers.
Senators opposing the bill
said it would have given the
governor the power to al-
most rewrite the budget. Op-

position forces were quick to
point out that the Senate
also refused to give such
powers to Gov. Briscoe.

Short Snorts

Those who had been bit-
ing their fingernails over an
economy that had grown by
6.9 percent in the final quar-
ter of 1978 breathed a sigh
of relief this week when
numbers released showed a
growth rate of only 0.7 per-
cent in the first quarter of
this year. The "overheated"
economy that had been roar-
ing along at the end of 1978
was supposedly one of the
contributing factors to the
ever-increasing inflation rate.

Another economic note—
statistics released this week
show major corporations
with hefty increases in their
profits during the first quar-
ter of this year. Texaco's
profits were up almost 80
percent in that period, and
Exxon's increased by more
than 35 percent.

Finally, the Senate version
of Rep. Wayne Peveto's tax
reform bill, sponsored
Grant Jones of Abilene,
slipped out of the Senate
Finance Committee this
week.

From The Horses Mouth

Fall webworms will be
showing up soon on trees,
particularly pecan trees, in
Schleicher County.

Large numbers of larvae
(worms) can damage trees
by completely stripping the
leaves. Larvae group to-
gether and spin silken nests
within which they feed for
four to five weeks. Heavy
infestations can defoliate
trees and leave large un-
sightly webs throughout
the tree.

Fall webworm moths
emerge in early spring.
They have a wingspan of
about one-and-one-half
and are delicate milky
white in color. Some have
their forewings peppered
with small black dots.
Female moths lay from
500 to 800 eggs each. These
are light-green to yellowish
in color and are globe-
shaped. The eggs are de-
posited in masses under-
neath leaves, usually near
the tip of a branch. Egg
masses are covered with
hairs from the female's
body, giving them a fuzzy
appearance.

In seven to ten days the
eggs hatch into small
yellowish or greenish
larvae. Young larvae have
two rows of dark tubercles
along the back and long
hairs sparsely covering the
body. Full-grown larvae are

about one-and-one-half
inch long and vary in color
from pale green to yellow.
They have a broad dark
stripe down the back and
are covered with long
whitish hairs.

Full-grown larvae seek
out a shelter in which to
pupate (move larva to adult
stage). Pupae may be found
under bark, in cracks and
crevices, or under debris.
They are about three-
fourths inch long, reddish
brown in color and encased
in a scanty cocoon of long
hairs.

There are usually three
to four generations of fall
webworms along the Gulf
Coast of Texas and Mexico,
with pupae of the last
generation going into dia-
pause (hibernation) for the
winter.

Light infestations of fall
webworms may be con-
trolled by pruning out
affected terminals while
larvae are small and burn-
ing or crushing them.
Heavy infestations may be
controlled with malathion,
carbaryl (Sevin) or zolone.
For best results apply
insecticide when larvae are
small.

Approximately 49,000 Vietnam Era veterans in Texas will lose their entitlement to GI Bill benefits during the next year.

VA Regional Office Director, Ted W. Myatt, said the figure represents the total number of veterans who will have reached the tenth anniversary of their separation from military duty. The law provides veterans with a ten-year time limit to use educational and training benefits.

Myatt said that while some 59 percent of Texas veterans have used some or all of their GI Bill rights, there are thousands who can still make at least partial use of their remaining time.

VA estimates that on a nationwide basis more than half the number of veterans who have GI Bill eligibility today will lose it by 1984. "What we're emphasizing here," Myatt said, "is the time factor. To make maximum use of GI Bill rights a veteran must be aware of the ten-year limit and get started well before time runs out."

A typical Vietnam Era veteran, for example, might have left the service in 1973 having earned maximum training or educational entitlement. If that same veteran were to em-

bark on a full-time, four-year college program, it should be started this year so that it could be completed by 1983 when the veteran's eligibility expires. In any event, benefits would be payable only until the veteran reached the time limit no matter how far along the program was.

"There are so many ways the GI Bill can be adapted to individual needs and circumstances," Myatt said, "I hate to see anyone lose their rights to this program simply because they let time slip by."

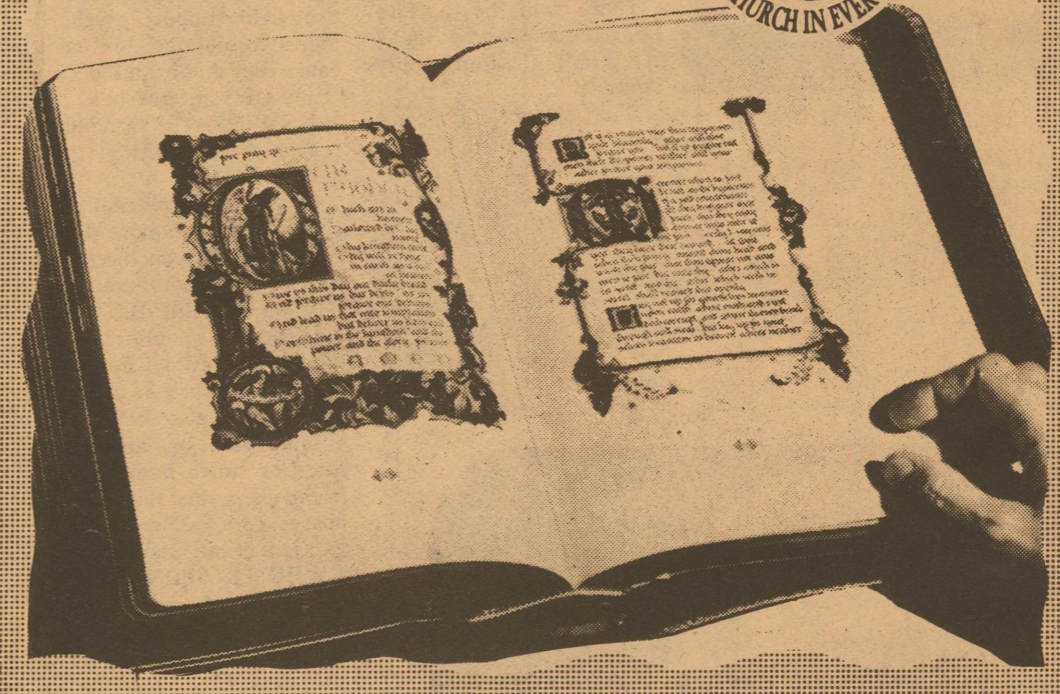

Shoplifting Is Large Menace

Teenage shoplifting, "ripping off" and "just-for-kicks swiping" present an increasing menace to society and a test for law enforcement officials, Dorothy Taylor, a family life education specialist, says.

Ten thefts amounted to more than \$6.5 billion in the United States in 1975. These losses caused merchants to mark up prices about 15 percent to cover losses from theft, the specialist points out.

Miss Taylor is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

SHOPLIFTING FACTS
The National Retail Merchants Association found these facts about shoplifting:

*Many people don't see shoplifting as a crime and don't believe they will be punished — but hundreds are every day.

*One out of 12 shoppers is a shoplifter.

*Shoplifter come from all income levels and are both male and female — but women shoplift more than men.

*The average shoplifter is female and 14-18 years old with a family income over \$10,000.

WHY SHOPLIFT
Reasons for shoplifting are as varied as shoplifters, Miss Taylor continues.

Compulsion, desire for attention, kicks, peer acceptance, revenge against the establishment, drug habit support, psychological problems, or because they don't think it's a crime are some reasons.

Need is rarely an actual reason for shoplifting, the specialist points out.

In fact, 99 percent of shoplifters have more than enough money on them to pay for the stolen item.

OTHER CRIMES
However, shoplifting is not the only crime. Removing labels or switching price tags is also theft.

In addition, buying shoplifted or stolen items from friends is against the law — possession of stolen goods, too, is a crime, she adds.

WHO'S RESPONSIBLE
Parents of minors are responsible for shoplifted goods.

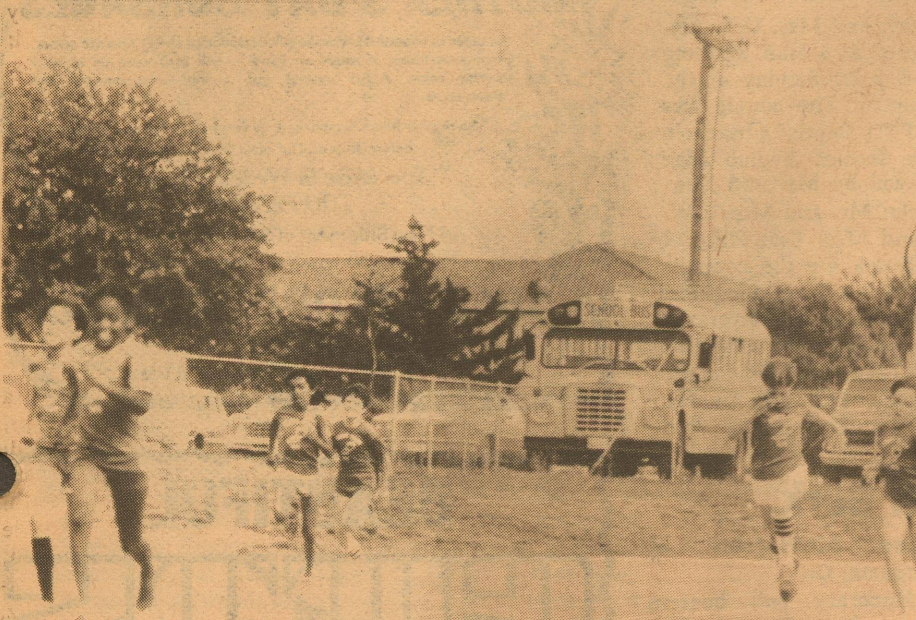

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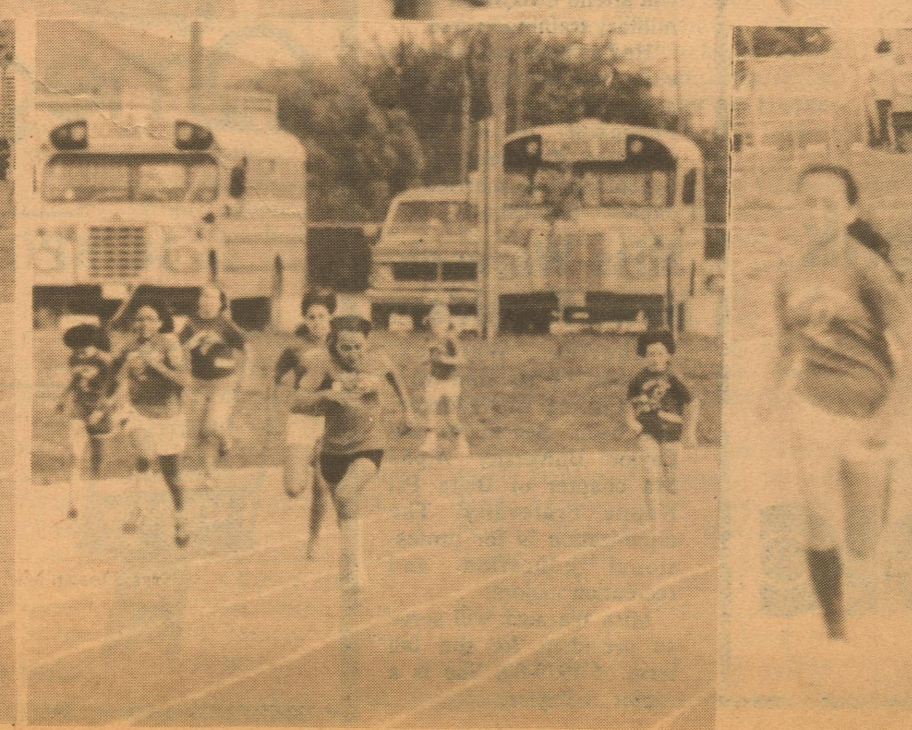
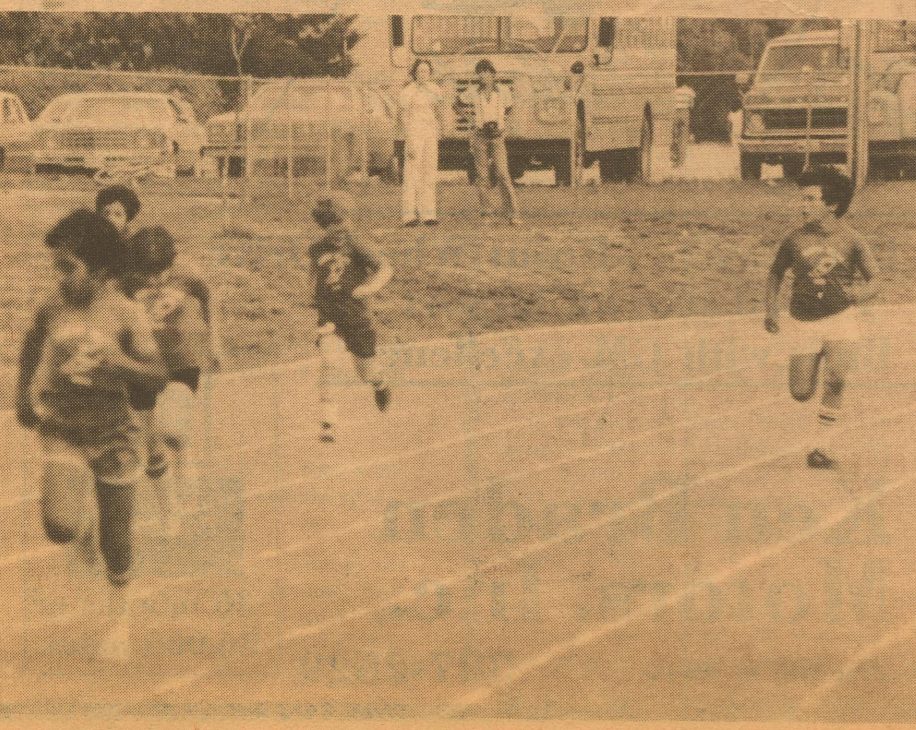
