

## School District Receives Grant For Elementary

A grant for \$14,381 has been awarded to the Schleicher County Independent School District from the Department of Energy. The grant has been designated for use in making the old elementary building more energy efficient.

Grants to totaling \$3,772,235 have been awarded to 109 recipients in the State of Texas under the U.S. Department of Energy's "Grant Programs for Schools and Hospitals and buildings owned by Units of

Local Government and Public Care Institutions," it was announced last week by Curtis E. Carlson, Jr., Acting Regional Representative for the DOE in Dallas.

Under the programs for authorized by Title III of the National Energy Conservation Policy Act of 1978, DOE is making grants to eligible institutions which have applied in accordance with a state-wide plan developed by the Texas Energy and Natural Resources Advisory Council.

## Turner-Hausenfluck Win Gold Star Awards

Lou Ann Turner and Cindy Hausenfluck both received Gold Star Awards for their activities in the local 4-H organization during the previous year. A Gold Star is the highest 4-H award given at the county level.

education, home environment, and leadership projects while attending County 4-H camp, District 4-H Council, and the District Food Show.

Cindy is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Hausenfluck and a junior at Eldorado High School. During the previous year, she completed projects in foods, clothing, home environment, leadership, horse, and sheep

categories. She attended the County camp, State 4-H Round-up, State Food Show, District 4-H Council, State Horse Show, District Food Show, and the State Food Show.

## Predator Day Scheduled Friday

The Schleicher County Producers Association has announced that it will conduct a predator control day this Friday.

This action has been taken after the recent losses sustained by area ranchers and the increase in the amount of killings of coyotes. Considerable sheep losses have been recorded on the Bob Oglesby, Ed Meador, and Steve Blaylock ranches. An independent helicopter operator from Sanderson recorded 7 coyote kills.

The day will consist of a "Coyote drive" in an attempt to drive the majority of these predators from the County. Volunteers on horseback will be assisted by a helicopter from Texas A&M Predator Control Service in their attempts to drive the coyotes into open territory to be disposed of.

Approximately 75 horseback riders will be needed to aid in the drive. Riders will not be allowed to carry firearms either.

"All volunteers should meet at the

entrance to the John Rae Powell ranch on Blaylock lane at 7:00 a.m. Friday morning," according to Ronnie Mittel, Producers Assn. Secretary. A small map also appears in

## County Purchases Truck

Members of the Schleicher County Commissioners Court met in session Monday morning, October 13. Members of the Court reviewed all bids placed for the purchase of a new cab and chassis for the Volunteer Fire Department.

The Court purchased a 1981 International cab chassis at a bid of \$14,545 from Angelo Truck and Tractor Sales in San Angelo.

County Treasurer A.G. McCormack presented his quarterly treasurer's report for approval. Members also reviewed the monthly treasurers report.

Other action taken by the Court included approval of the Auditors report, Justice of the Peace reports, and the County Clerks' report. Commissioners also discussed a construction request from the City, the drainage problems in the area

adjacent to the southeast City limits, and county welfare policy.

All commissioners were present.

## New Clinic Hold Ground Breaking, Oct. 13

Ground breaking for the new clinic area of the Schleicher County Medical Center began October 13, 1980, and is to be completed by July of 1981.

The architect for the project is Donald R. Goss Associates of San Angelo, who was the architect for the original Medical Center. The Schleicher County Hospital District awarded the general contract to Owen Brothers Construction Company of San Angelo, who submitted the low bid.

## GED Classes Get Underway

Adult Continuing education classes have begun at the Eldorado Public Schools and Superintendent Guy Whitaker is very pleased with the turnout.

Of the 27 people who signed up for the courses, 15 have attended each night. An average enrollment of 7 is needed to continue the offering of the course. The purpose of the class

is to prepare adults for their General Education Development (GED) equivalency test. Whitaker also states that a class for non-English speaking people may soon be offered that would be very similar to the current class.

Whitaker also reported that attendance in the school system is at a near peak of excellence.

## Loeffler Praised By Conservatives

Congressman Tom Loeffler has been lauded by a nationwide citizen's organization for his voting record for the first session of the 96th Congress (1979).

Loeffler along with Representatives James Collins, William Archer, "Kika" de la Garza, and Richard White were all rated with 100 percent marks by the group, Conservatives Against Liberal Legislation (CALL).

CALL Chairman Rhoda Stahlman, also issued an attack against representatives Mickey Leland and Bob Eckhardt, both of whom received zero percent ratings.

Stahlman, while blasting Eckhardt and Leland for their "antiquated" policies, had nothing but praise for Loeffler and the four other congressmen who scored 100's.

"These congressmen have done an exceptional job of representing their constituents," she said. "They have supported legislation that offers solutions to the problems created by the liberals in Congress like Eckhardt and Leland.

"We commend these conservative congressmen for their commitment to their constituents. It is not always easy to be a conservative in the thoroughly liberal environment of Washington.

The CALL rating shows that the Texas delegation is generally conservative, with 16 of the 26-member delegation scoring over 75 percent.

Stahlman, in outlining the votes on which the Texas delegation was rated, stated the votes were divided evenly among economic, defense, regulatory and social issues.

"Congressmen Collins, Archer, de

la Garza and Loeffler voted against the creation of yet another needless bureaucratic institution--the Department of Education. This vote was important. It was another example of the government's desire to control our lives, in this case, the education of our children."

"These five congressmen also voted to balance our federal budget. They voted for increased defense spending. They voted collectively against the giveaway of our Panama Canal in the interest of our national security and the stability of Central America."

As an educational organization, CALL devotes most of its time to legislative matters and to increasing citizen awareness of the voting records of members of Congress.

"We simply want to make sure the average American citizen is aware of

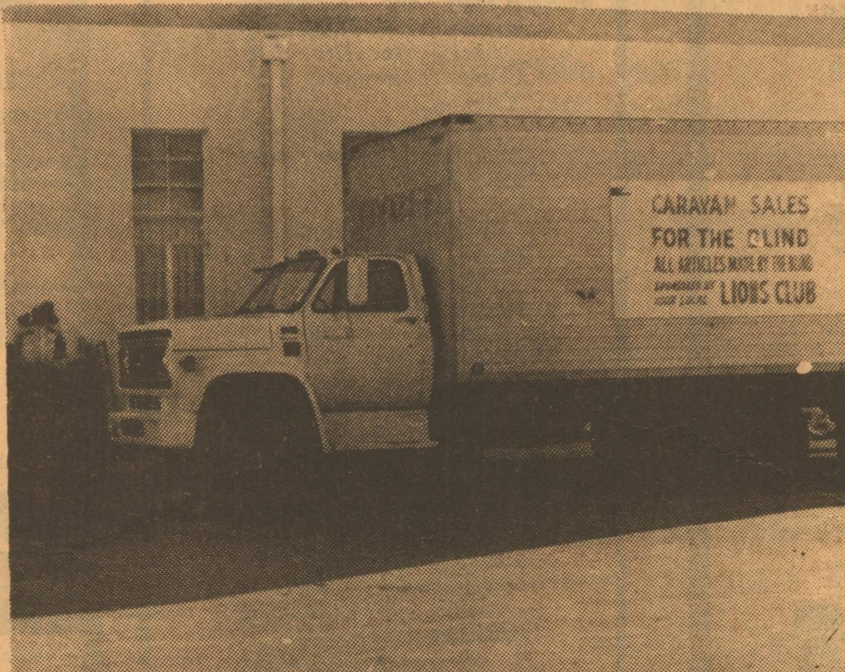
how his or her representatives are voting in Washington," Stahlman explained.

"How many citizens really know how their congressman or senators voted on an important issue? Yet this is the key to knowing your elected officials."

In rating Texas' senators, Lloyd Bentsen received 50 percent mark, while John Tower grade 84 percent.

## From City Hall

Because of public response to the situation, the City Council will be taking applications for an Animal Control Officer to alleviate the stray animal population. An agreement has been reached with the veterinary hospital in Sonora to house the animals for Eldorado until they are either called for by their owners (who must pay all expenses) or time has run out to hold them.

The Animal Control Officer will follow guidelines as set by the City Council. Currently the plans call for all loose animals to be picked up because the number is so great. Once the animals are picked up they will be taken to Sonora where they will be held for a maximum of 3 days. If not called for within the

allotted 3 days, the animals will be destroyed in a humane manner. Before an animal can be released to its owner, the owner must pay all lodging charges impounding fees, and any necessary medical expenses (shots). These are strict guidelines because voluntary control has not worked. The Animal Control Officer will work at necessary to keep the number of loose animals in control, starting as soon as possible.

Eldoradoans are asked to keep in mind any articles placed near their trashcans or in the alley could be picked up by the City Sanitation Crew. The alleys are not storage areas and the City cannot be responsible for the loss of anything stored there.

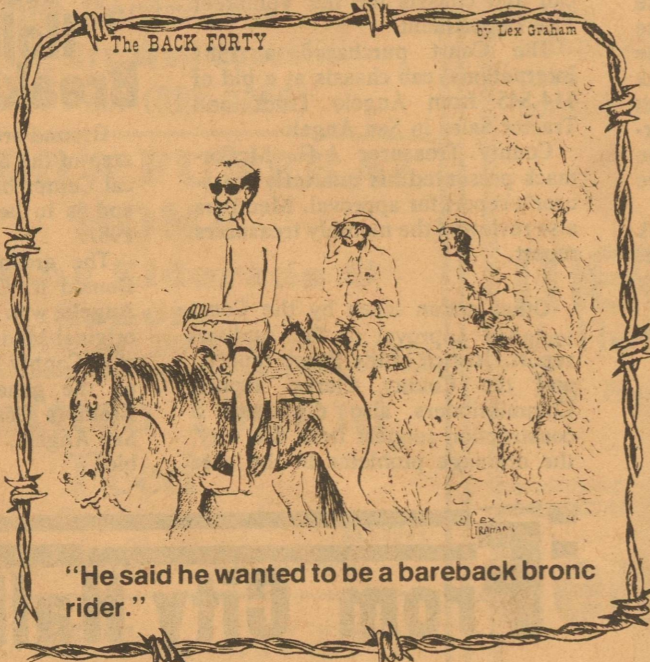

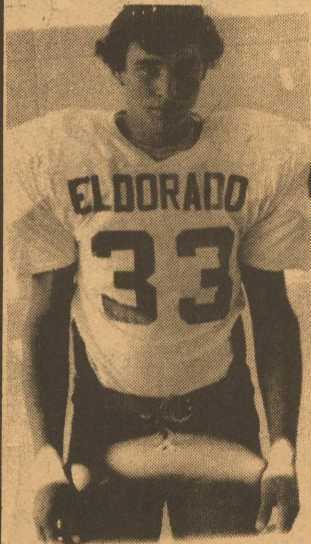

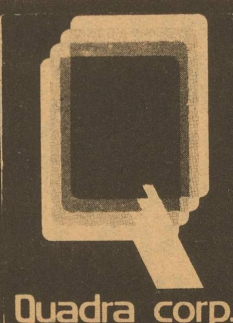

## Loeffler Receives Award

The National Federation of Independent Business (NFIB), the largest small business group in the nation, announced today that by voting in support of key small business issues 90 percent of the time during the 96th Congress, U.S. Rep. We feel, however, that NFIB members should know how their legislator voted on each of those issues which we consider of key importance to small business."

"Congressman Loeffler has served his constituency well on a

broad-based spectrum of legislation and has been an effective member of Congress in his work on the House floor and in committee," says Fisher. "He should be returned to Washington so that he can continue to fulfill the specific needs and wants of his congressional district and the nations as a whole."

NFIB, which is nonprofit and nonpartisan, presents its "Guardian Awards" at the end of each Congress to those members who vote in favor of small business on selected issues at least 70 percent of the time. A total of 195 Representatives and 30 Senators qualified for the award this year.

## Extension Notes

**DROUGHT-CAUSED LIVESTOCK SALES**—Ranchers forced to sell livestock because of decimated pastures and reduced water supplies this year should begin considering the income tax aspects of their losses, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Income from drought sales of inventory stock can be deferred for up to one year as outlined in the Farmer's Tax Guide. Both purchased and raised livestock will qualify. Sales do not have to take place in a drought area, but they must be due solely to drought conditions.

Farmers are getting good prices for their 1980 cotton crop, and if they play their cards right, they may be able to contract next year's crop at a good price as well, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas

A&M University System. This year's drought-plagued cotton crop has left U.S. supplies short, causing a stronger market. However, demand generally has been soft, with U.S. textile mills considering more polyester in cotton-polyester blends. As of Sept. 1, the U.S. cotton crop was estimated at 11.7 million bales, down from 14.6 million last year. Texas' crop was pegged at 3.6 million bales compared to 5.5 million a year ago.

**"CATTLEX" OFF TO A GOOD START**—"Cattlex" the computerized cattle marketing program recently initiated as a pilot project by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, is off and running. The first lot of "on ranch" cattle owned by B.E. Hanson of DeLeon (70 steers averaging 670 pounds each) was bought by Bob Bliss of Friona Industries. Bliss also bought the first lot of "delivered" cattle, 19 Charolais bull calves averaging 536 pounds owned by Dr. O.D. Butler, associate deputy chancellor for agriculture at Texas A&M University. Cattlex is a nine-month project and involves computer terminals at 18 different locations over Texas to link together feedlots, order buyers and auction markets, says an Extension livestock marketing economist.

**Help With Community Problems**—Community leaders facing any of a number of problems are encouraged to contact their county Extension office for assistance. Plans out a state community development leader with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Community development committees are now meeting with county Extension agents across the state to plan and conduct more than 40 different types of educational programs designed to "help people help themselves." Area of concern include manpower, industrial development, beautification, parks and recreation and rural housing, fire protection and crime prevention.

With only 3:38 left to play in the first half, Santellano galloped 65 yards for yet another score. The PAT failed and the Eagles led 13-0.

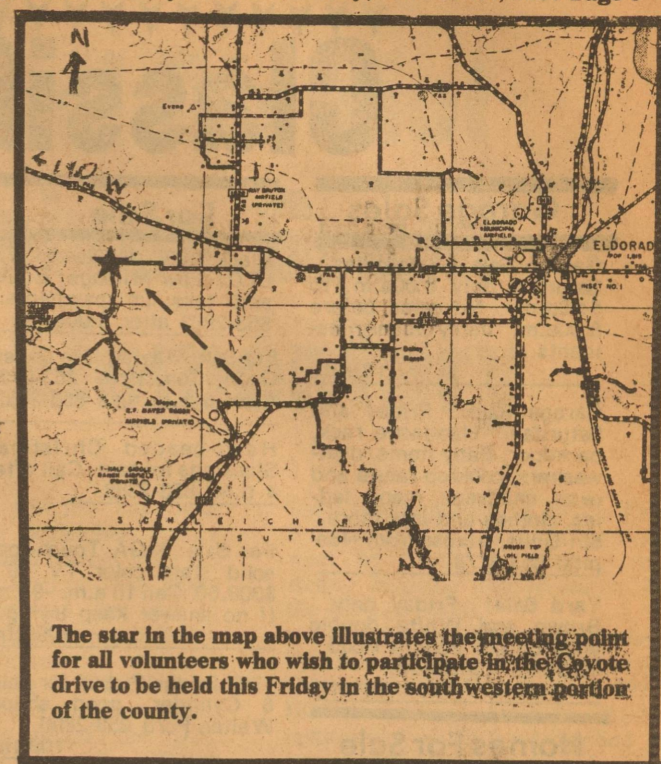
Some 13 seconds later, once again Santellano scored when he intercepted a Punched pass and returned it for a touchdown. The PAT brought the

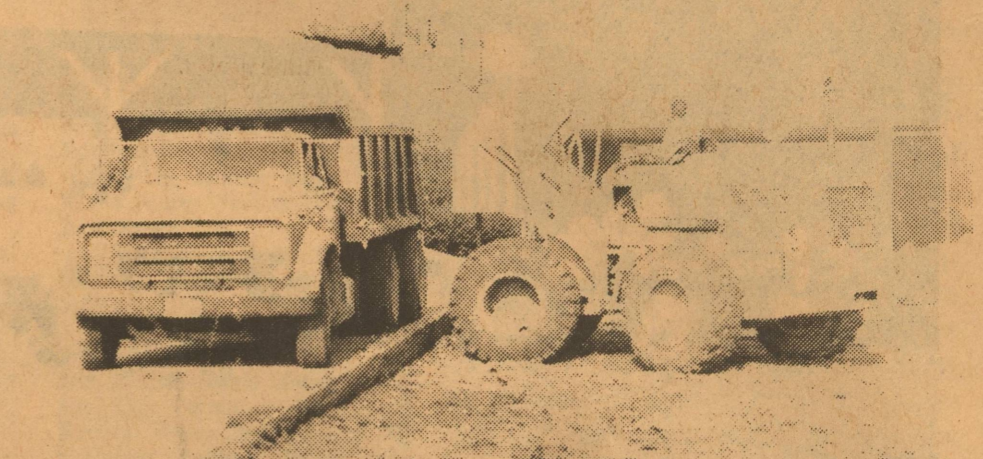
