The Eldorado Varsity Eaglettes continued their winning ways here Thursday night in a 56-25 rout of the Sonora Broncos.

The Eaglettes thoroughly dominated play with their running and shooting game which featured the games high scorers, Lori Patton and Kim Payne with 12 points and 10 points respectively. Defensively Eldorado made frequent use of the full court press to keep their opponents off balance.

The first half ended with the score Eldorado 18 and Sonora 11. This relatively narrow margin was short lived however as the Eaglettes exploded for 22 points in the third quarter while holding the Broncos to a mere 3 points. Following this barrage of unanswered buckets the Broncos could never come close to narrowing the gap by game's end.

Along with Patton and Payne, other Eaglettes who had fine performances were Lori Whitaker, Kara Homer, Linda Gentry and Sophomore Laura Lazano.

Coach Mitchel's junior varsity and freshmen teams performed equally as well Thursday night in wins over the Broncos.

The junior varsity offensive punch came most notably from Julie Cash, who scored a game high 24 points.

She was followed in scoring by Stephanie Thomas with 12 and Victoria Powell with 11. Amy Heald also scored 9 points in the 66-43 victory.

As in the Varsity and Junior Varsity games, the undefeated Freshman team scored a resounding victory over their opponents to end their season with an unblemished record. This final game saw the frosh Eaglette cagers thrash the hapless Bronco youngsters 52-18.

The Freshman scoring leaders were Tammy Faries with 11, Missy White with 10, and Davina Vanette with 8. Also rounding out the Frosh scoring players were sophomores Tammie Hunter, Charlette Mobley, Gina Patton, and Vikkie Cavennesse who added at total of 21 points.

Coach Mitchel and the rest of the Eldorado girls coaching staff should have a very successful season this year with the talent that these girls have exhibited and should look forward to very promising years to come with the talent that is possessed by the junior varsity and freshman teams.

Thursday was the freshmen's last game. They will now move up to the JV and play out their schedule which resumes Dec. 2, against Iraan. The next home game is Dec. 9, against Wall in a 6:00 p.m. contest.

For example, this weekly column, the Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children and Agriculture News Services (A branch of

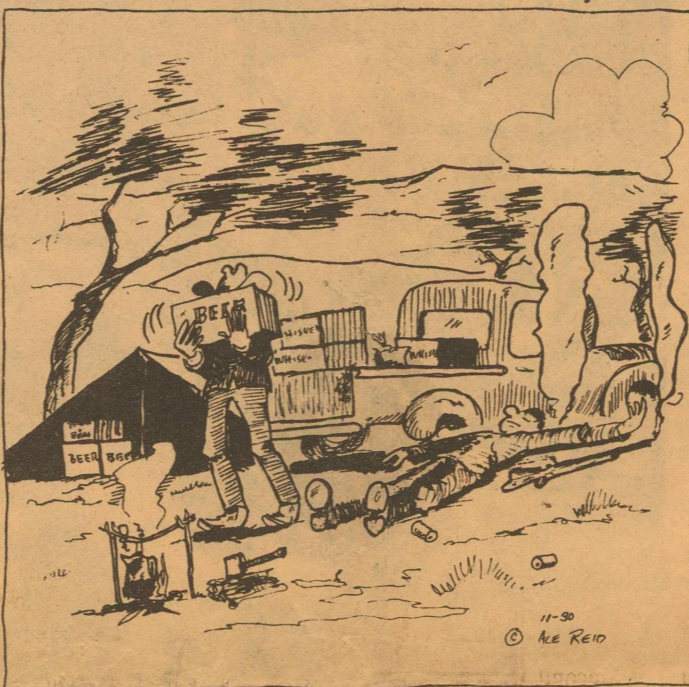
ABC offering writing and photography to cattle breeders and associations). All are inter-related.

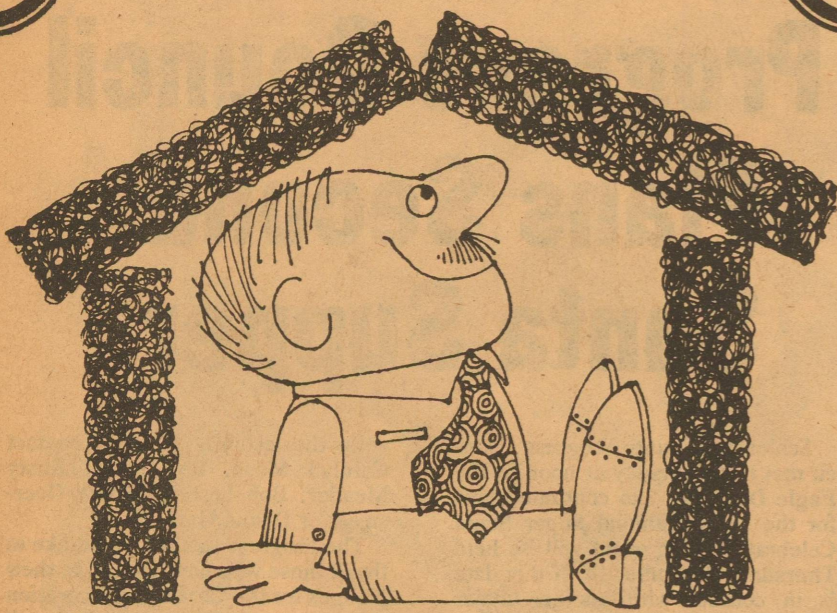

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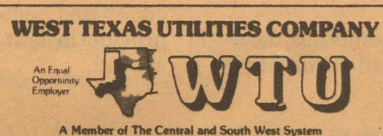
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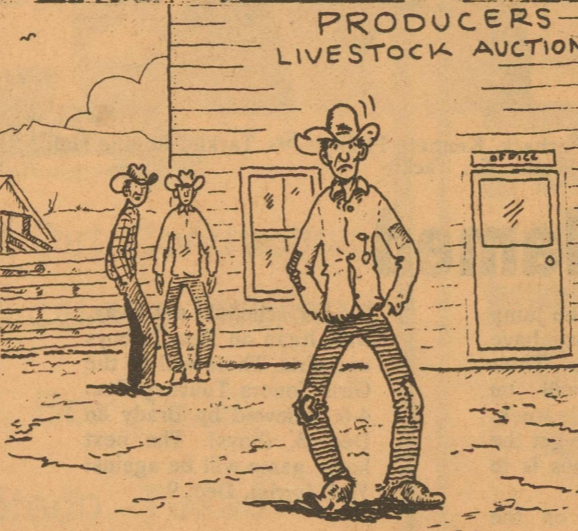

Circuit Court Rules In Favor Of Cotton Ginning

The fifth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans has ruled in favor of the cotton ginning industry in setting aside the OSHA cotton dust standard that had been applied to gins.

National Cotton Council President Herman Propst said the court's ruling is a victory for small businessmen faced with "impractical demands of government regulations."

had thrust on them an unnecessary, unreasonable set of regulations by the federal government. The ruling in New Orleans in canceling the dust standard for gins in vindication of the American principle that there must be justice and common sense in any regulations handed down by government," Propst said.

The court said OSHA had not offered "substantial evidence" that its cotton ginning regulations are "reasonably necessary and appropriate." Cotton-related dust in some processing industries has been implicated in breathing ailments but the ginners' association bringing the suit against OSHA argued successfully that employees have never been shown to develop such ailments as a result of working in gins.

"Consequently, application of the gin standard would impose unnecessary costs with no possibility for offsetting benefits," Propst said.

The court sent the standard back to OSHA "for further consideration."

Lawn Disease Preventable

Brown patch, one of the most prevalent lawn diseases in Texas, may be especially severe this fall on St. Augustine grass due to the summer-long drought that weakened many lawns.

Caused by a soil-borne fungus, brown patch attacks almost all species of grasses but is more serious on bentgrass, centipede and St. Augustine grasses.

Turf is susceptible to brown patch after an excessive application of nitrogen fertilizer because as lush growth is readily attacked.

Prolonged wet periods and late evening watering also contribute to development of the disease. We point out that a buildup of grass and plant debris (thatch) in the root and crown area are further creates a favorable environment for brown patch fungi.

Brown patch appears as a

brownish to grayish discoloration, forming irregular circles a few inches to several feet in diameter. Left uncontrolled, it can spread rapidly and can kill large areas of turf. Yellowed leaves can usually be pulled easily from stolons of runners.

Prevention is the best method for controlling the disease. This includes using grasses adapted to the area and practicing recommended watering, fertilization and mowing procedures. Take steps to avoid thatch buildup, and limit fall nitrogen fertilization if brown patch has been a problem in the past.

Fungicides available for controlling brown patch include PCNB (Terraclor), benomyl (Tersan 1991) and chlorothalonil (Daconil 2787).

Be Thankful

At the very mention of Thanksgiving brings memories of kitchens full of good things to eat such as turkey and dressing, giblet gravy, cranberries, and pumpkin pie, joyous family reunions, church services and prayers.

The first Thanksgiving observance on December 4, 1619 was entirely religious, after 39 English settlers arrived at Berkeley Plantation on the James River. The group's charter required that the day of arrival be observed yearly as a day of Thanksgiving to God.

The first Thanksgiving feast was held less than a year later after a bountiful corn harvest that brought rejoicing among the colonies. The pilgrim women spent days preparing the feast of wild turkey roasted on spits stuffed with corn-bread, venison, baked oysters, baked sweet corn in their husks, and baked pumpkin with maple syrup flavoring. The feast was served outdoors at big tables to their Indian guests.

The observance of Thanksgiving has been changed many times since then, but Congress finally ruled that after 1941 the fourth Thursday of November would be observed as Thanksgiving Day and would be a legal federal holiday.

With prices going up, the value of a dollar going down, American hostages in Iran, the depletion of our energy, unrest in the middle east and our own unsettled government, do we still have something to be thankful for?

Yes!! We still live in a country where we have freedom of choice in voting, jobs, religion, speech, who we marry, who our friends are, and where we live. There are not many places left in the world that can make that statement.

A little closer to home we have our families, friends, and a good way of life.

This Thanksgiving, think about what you have to be thankful for.

Taxpayers Should Compile Receipts

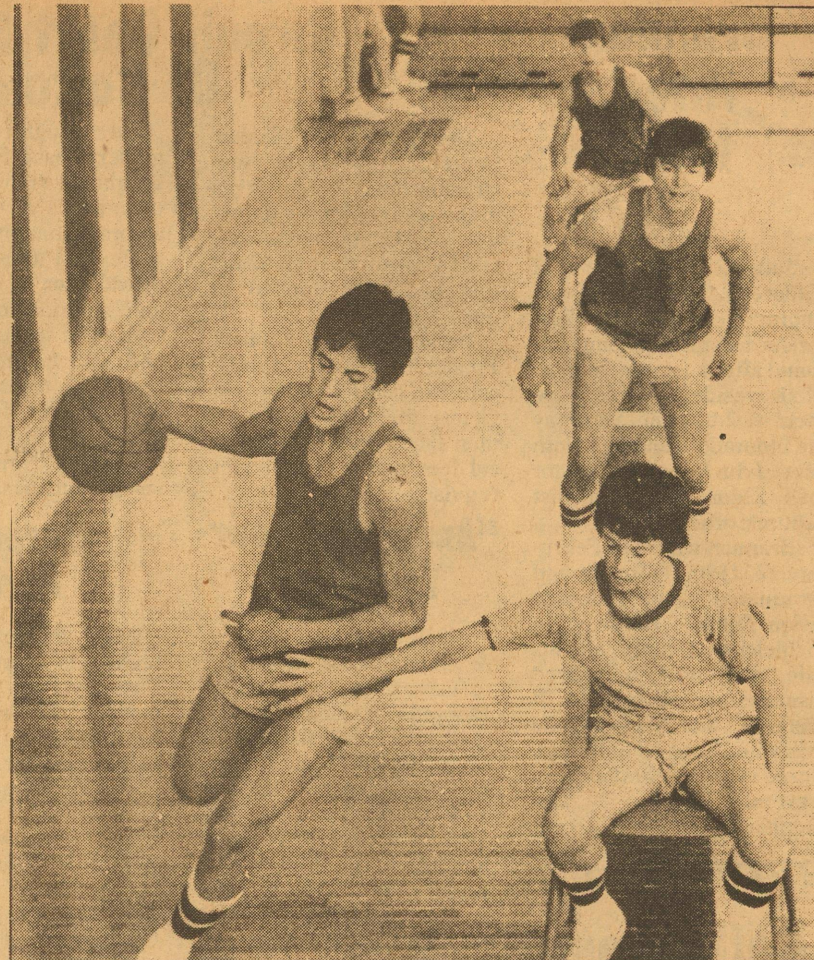
Taxpayers, especially those who itemize, should begin compiling receipts and other records to support claims on their Federal tax returns, the Internal Revenue Service advises. These records can be used to back up claims in case the return is examined and also assist taxpayers by reminding them of potentially overlooked deductions.

For easy reference, the records should be sorted into the categories which appear on Schedule A Form 1040, the IRS says. When itemizing, taxpayers should bear in mind interest paid on loans and mortgages, as well as payments for medical insurance which are documented on various financial statements. These amounts are often deductible, and frequently overlooked.

Medical expenses, union dues and charitable contributions are a few other commonly claimed deductions for which IRS examiners often request supporting evidence. Keeping cancelled checks, pay stubs, and bills can be helpful in supporting these claims. However, the IRS notes that taxpayers should not attach receipts or cancelled checks to their tax returns.

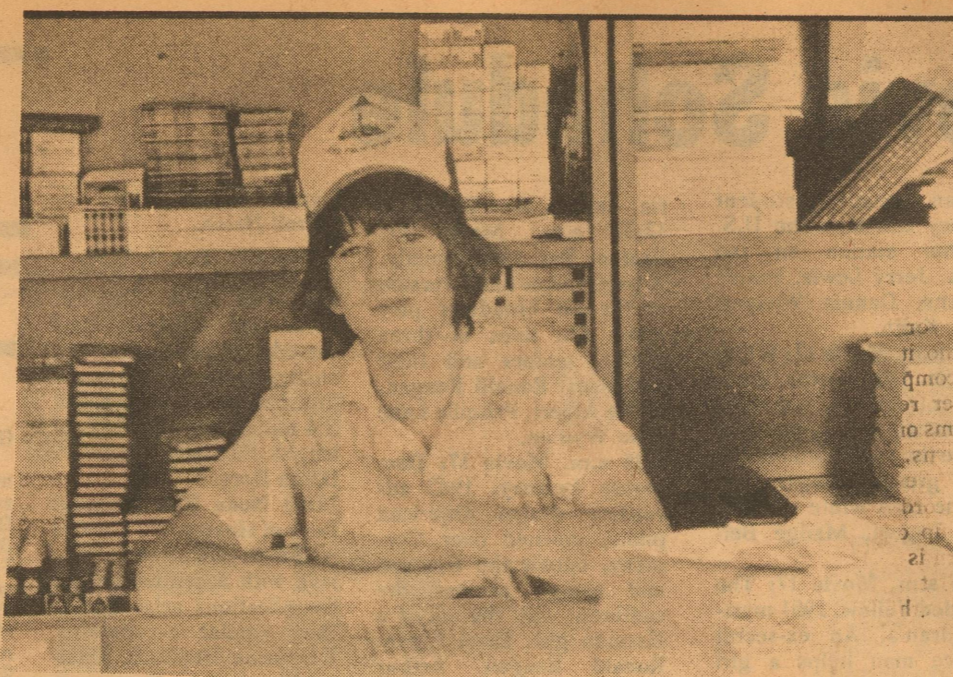
their game, 43-39.

Texas reported 31 gas and 31 oil discoveries during the November 1-15, 1980, period, the Railroad Commission's Oil and Gas Division announced recently.
 In the year earlier period, 45 gas and 32 oil discoveries were filed with the state's energy regulatory agency.
 Though the first ten and one-half months of 1980, operators have reported 1,228 gas and 636 oil discoveries, against 1,041 gas and 461 oil discoveries in the year-earlier period. Successful exploratory and field completions in the ten and one-half months of 1980 total 10,730 oil and 4,821 gas, against 7,334 oil and 4,777 gas completions in the same period last year.
