

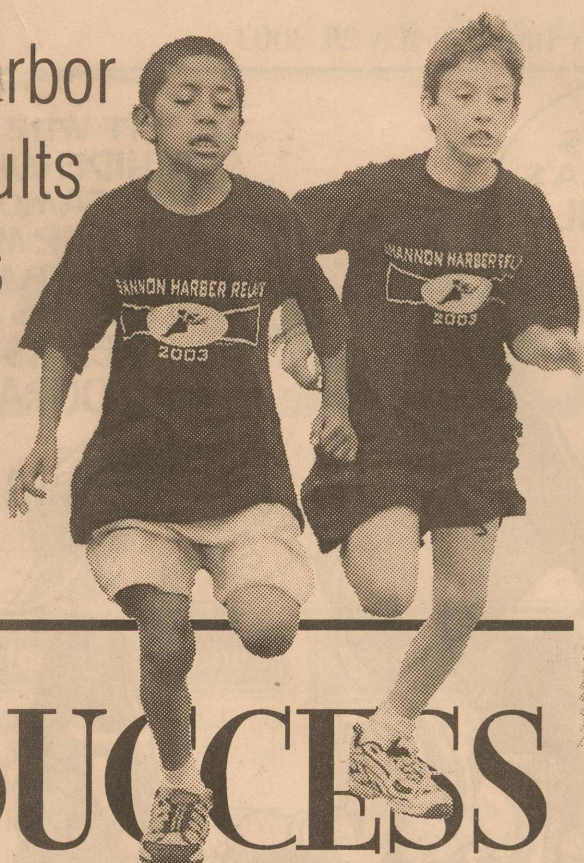

Family and friends were then allowed onto the court to meet and greet the graduates.

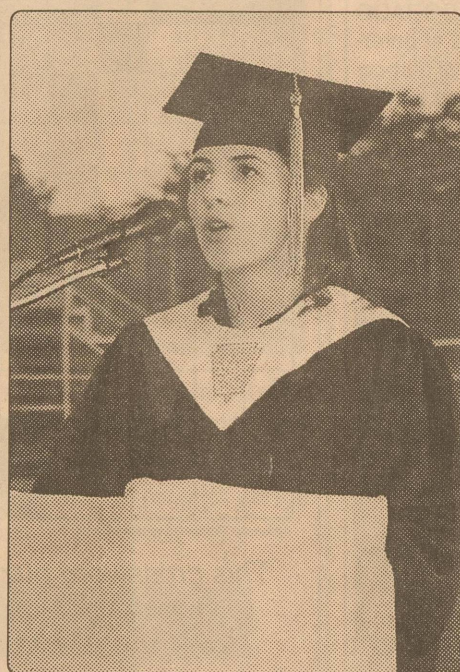

County Commissioners meeting held

Schleicher County Commissioners met Tuesday, May 27, to handle a short agenda of business. The meeting was called to order by County Judge Johnny Griffin. Commissioners Kirk Griffin and Matt Brown were in attendance. Commissioners Johnny Mayo and Bill Clark were absent.

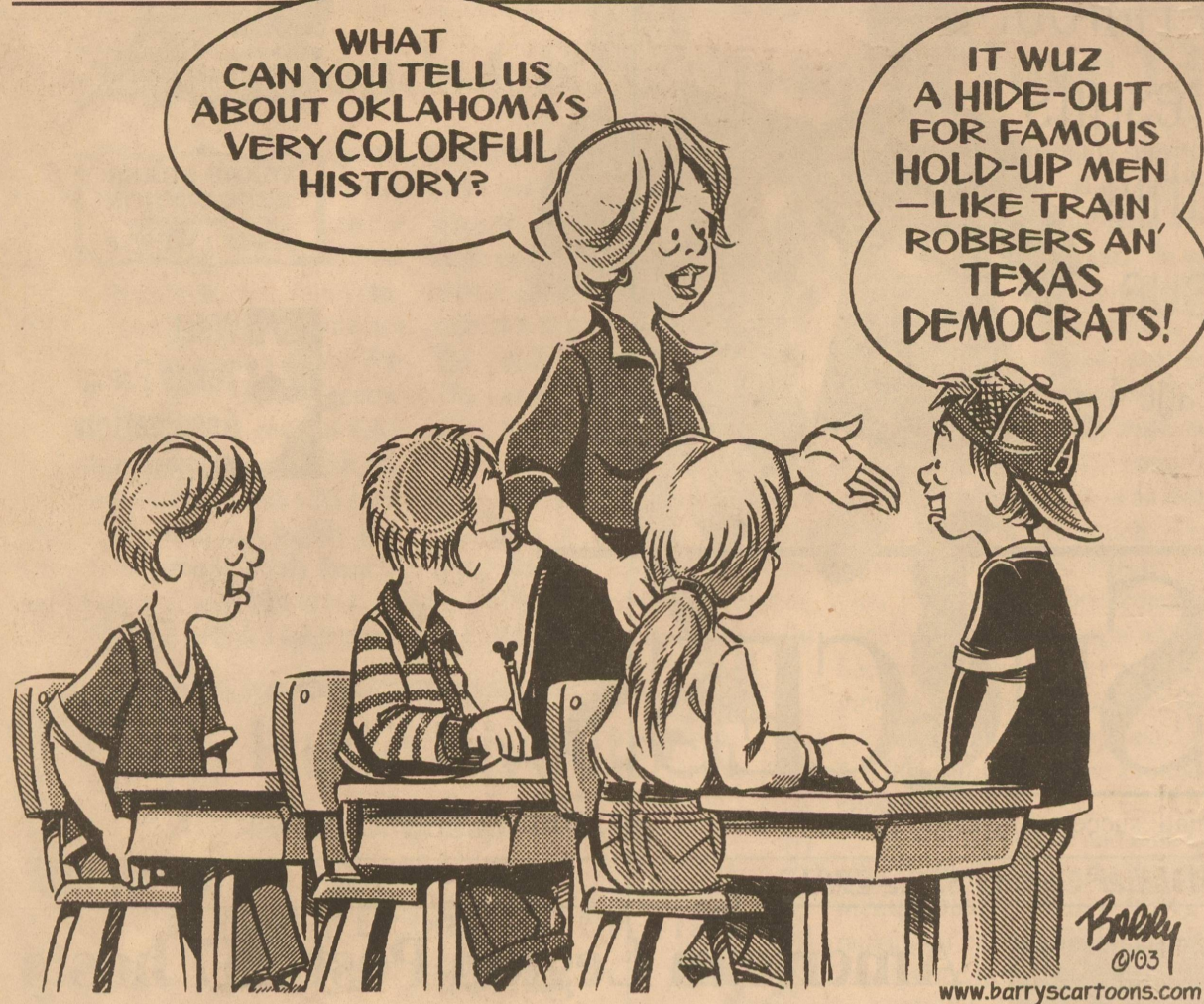
Association of Counties. Griffin said he is still waiting on a response.

The judge explained that he had requested a step-by-step procedure for abolishing the Constable's office from Allison, who represents the Texas

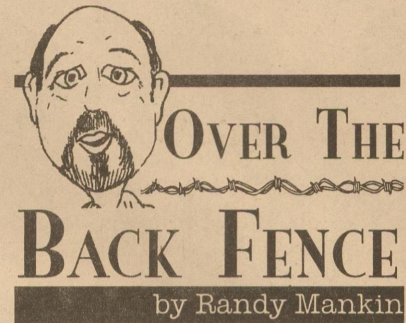
Sheriff David Doran then met with the commissioners and advised that the radio tower used by his department was painted recently. It was then noted that a call for bids for unleaded fuel had failed to draw a single bid. So, the men voted to call for bids again, this time on unleaded fuel and diesel fuel. The bids are to be opened at the commissioners next meeting on June 9th.

In response to a question from Commissioner Kirk Griffin it was noted that work has yet to begin on the renovation of the Civic Center and that the building contractor is waiting on supplies before commencing. It was explained

Remember the Holiday Inn!



Fifty-three Texas Democrats abandoned the State Capitol two weeks ago and high-tailed it to Ardmore, Oklahoma, where they holed up in a Holiday Inn. By leaving, the Killer D's, as they called themselves, prevented the remaining legislators from reaching a quorum, the number needed to conduct business. That kept the Republicans, who, for the first time in more than 130 years, found themselves in control of the Legislature, from taking up a congressional redistricting bill.

I have answered the demand with a cannon shot, and our flag still waves proudly from the walls. I shall never surrender nor retreat.

Then, I call on you in the name of Liberty, of patriotism, & of everything dear to the American character, to come to our aid with all dispatch. The enemy is receiving reinforcements daily & will no doubt increase to three or four thousand in four or five days. If this call is neglected, I am determined to sustain myself as long as possible & die like a soldier who never forgets what is due to his own honor & that of his country.

Victory or Death
William Barret Travis Lt. Col. Comdt.

P.S. The Lord is on our side. When the enemy appeared in sight we had not three bushels of corn. We have since found in deserted houses 80 or 90 bushels & got into the walls 20 or 30 head of Beeves...Travis

Then, I wondered if a similar letter from the so-called Killer D's might read as follows:

To the People of Texas & All Liberal Compatriots

We are besieged by an ever-growing army of Republicans under the command of Tom Craddick. We have sustained a continual barrage at the ballot box for the past two decades & have lost almost everything there is to lose. We know that the enemy seeks not our surrender, but our very elimination. At this very moment he is threatening to redraw the congressional district lines wherein we have placed the last vestige of our faith. We have answered this challenge with a verbal assault and, under cover of darkness, we have redeployed our forces to the north.

So, we call on you in the name of Liberalism, of lenience, & everything else we can think of, to come to our aid and pretty darned quick. The enemy is being reinforced daily by thousands of people who actually read the news and pay attention to what is going on. If this trend continues we fear our days here in Texas...er Oklahoma, are indeed numbered. If this call is neglected, we are determined to continue our northward redeployment until such time as we find ourselves among like-minded folk, perhaps in Boston. DPS destroys records on missing Democrats search

AUSTIN — For a time last week, the world's longest windmill blade rested on a trailer parked in front of the Capitol.

Made for General Electric in Gainesville, the blade is seen by those in the growing electrical-generation-by-wind industry as a symbol of the future.

But even an unusual object more than a third of the size of a football field failed to capture much attention as fallout from the Killer/Chicken D's episode continued to generate its own electricity.

Texas Democrats, already torqued over news reports that the Department of Public Safety attempted to use the federal homeland security apparatus to find the missing House Democrats, be-

came airborne over news that the DPS had ordered the destruction of all records pertaining to its search for the House members.

That news blew all the way to Washington, where Texas Democrats in Congress called for an investigation at the national level. And in Austin, the Travis County District Attorney's Office hinted at a possible grand jury investigation.

The DPS issued a short statement that it had destroyed the documents in accordance with federal regulations that prohibit "keeping intelligence information that is not related to criminal conduct or activity."

With all that taking up most of

the spotlight, both houses continued trying to pass or block legislation as the regular session drew closer to the June 2 final gavel.

Gone fishing...

Despite all the fast-moving action going on in the Capitol, on a fine spring day, if you like to fish, it's hard to fight the urge to pack your rod and reel and head to the closest good water.

If you've caught a lot of fish in your lifetime, it may be hard for you to remember your first fish, but for a newer generation of Texas anglers, the Parks and Wildlife Department is extending that opportunity.

Through TPWD's Angler Recognition Awards, a fisherman can get an award for a first fish, a big fish, for catching and releasing and for what practically every person who ever wet a line hopes for, a record.

You have to fill out an application for any of the above, and there are rules to follow involving how

a possible record fish is weighed and photographed, but that seems a small effort to go through to get official proof that you're an accomplished fisherman.

Of course, the new program is going to make exaggeration harder. Still, there will always be that big one that got away....

Efforts to rename the El Paso portion of Interstate 10 for Star Trek creator Gene Roddenberry blew up on the launch pad this session, but two Houston area lawmakers may have better luck in getting NASA Road 1 renamed.

Assuming Gov. Rick Perry signs House Bill 1049 into law, effective Sept. 1 a 15-mile stretch of roadway variously known as Parkwood Avenue, NASA Road 1, and FM 528 will become NASA Parkway.

The Bull That Terrified New York

Dan Taylor of Doole, Texas is one of the most famous rodeo cowboys in the country. He is known in cowboy circles as Dooley Dan Taylor. He started riding at age two and roping at age five. He became the youngest roper in professional rodeo. He has won numerous awards and served as President of the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association. He has worked as a Chute Boss at the Cheyenne Frontier Days Rodeo since 1949.

In the early fifties, he was competing in the rodeo at Madison Square Garden in New York City when a bull got out. "It was the last night of the rodeo and after the calf roping event, contestants were taking their horses out a side door so they could load up and leave," says Dan. "During the bull riding event, a bull jumped out of the chute and ducked out that side door."

Dan took off after the bull. "For about the first quarter of a mile or so I was just following him. People were screaming and pointing. Finally I got a chance to rope him. I roped him on the first toss of the rope right there on the Great White Way, Forty-Second and Broadway where there's a million people every night."

Dan roped that bull right in front of a hotel. "People in New York don't know much about livestock, as a general rule. They didn't know what a dangerous situation that was. That bull wasn't a fighting bull, he was kind of a bucking bull, but he was a Brangus type. He might butt you, but

he wasn't a bad hooking bull. He had little bitty short banana horns."

Dan says the police were his biggest problem. "They ran up there and was going to shoot him. They were raising cane and going on. I had him on a fairly long nylon rope and he'd head for that revolving door into the hotel. There were some cars parked in front of the hotel and I'd ride over toward those cars and pull him out of that revolving door and holler at the people to get back. Then he'd go toward the cars and I'd get in the revolving door almost and pull him back the other way."

Dan roped the bull on a street made of cobblestone. His horse's shoes created a fireworks display. "When this big horse I was riding stopped after I roped the bull, it looked like you'd lit four cutting torches. Sparks were flying everywhere. We were going at a pretty good speed and had to stop real fast."

Dan put another rope on the bull, tied it securely to a jeep and followed it back to Madison Square Garden. The next day newspapers and radio stations across the country reported the events of the previous night. The story told how this Texas cowboy had acted bravely and saved countless lives. Dan's name was mentioned prominently in the story.

Since Dan had not heard any radio or read a newspaper that morning, he didn't know he was a hero until his friends started calling him.

ASU releases Dean's List

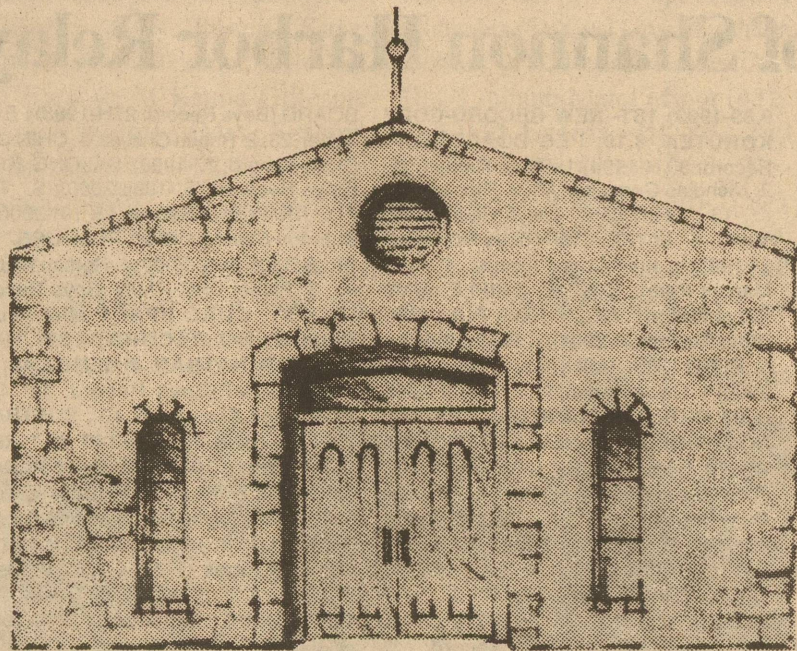
The Dean's List for the 2003 Spring Semester has been announced at Angelo State University in San Angelo, Texas.

After Sonora fell to Eastland this past Saturday in the Regional semi-finals, coaches from across District 2-2A were finally able to release the names of players on this year's All-District team.

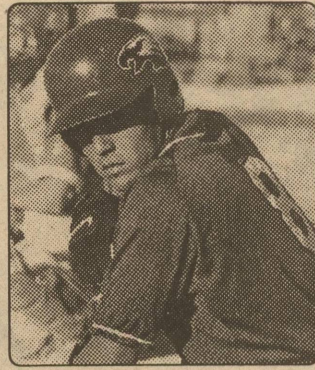

TXU Gas Company (the "Company"), in accordance with the Gas Utility Regulatory Act as set forth in the Texas Utilities Code, hereby gives notice of its intent to implement a new schedule of rates for natural gas service to be charged to all of the customers served by the Company in the incorporated municipalities and unincorporated areas in the Company's statewide gas utility system (the "System"). The proposed revisions to the respective rate schedules will impact all classes of service and all fees and charges presently being assessed by the Company on its transmission and distribution systems. As of the filing date of the Company's Statement of Intent to change rates, the proposed rates are expected to approximately produce a \$69,524,311 or a 7.24 percent increase in the Company's annual revenues from customers in the System. The proposed change will affect approximately 1,344,030 residential, 125,603 commercial, and 1,441 industrial sales and transportation customers in the System. The proposed change constitutes a "major" change as that term is defined by Section 104.101 of the Texas Utilities Code. The proposed changes will have differing impacts on individual customers, depending on consumption and current applicable rate schedules. The proposed changes in rates will not become effective for environs customers until similar changes have become effective within the nearest incorporated city or town. A residential customer receiving a bill for 6 Mcf will see a bill of approximately \$41.69, which would constitute an average increase of approximately \$3.59 per month or a 9.4% increase. A commercial customer receiving a bill for 30 Mcf will see a bill of approximately \$173.04, which would constitute an average increase of approximately \$13.91 per month or a 8.7% increase. The effect of the proposed changes to rates and services for industrial sales and transportation customers, which may be significant for individual customers, will vary depending on type of service and consumption. The proposed change would constitute an increase of \$0.00 or a 0% increase in annual revenues to the Company for industrial sales and transportation customers. A complete copy of the Statement of Intent, filed with the Railroad Commission of Texas and all of the System cities and towns on May 23, 2003, is available for inspection in the Company business office located at 1601 Bryan St., Dallas, Texas 75201. Persons with specific area questions or who want information about this filing may contact TXU Gas Company at 1-800-460-3030. Any affected persons located inside of the city limits of a municipality served by the Company may file written comments or protest concerning the proposed change in rates with their respective municipality. Any affected persons located outside of the city limits of a municipality served by the Company may file written comments or protest concerning the proposed change in rates with Docket Services Section of the Legal Division, Railroad Commission of Texas, P.O. Box 12967, Austin, Texas 78711-2967, but have a limited time to do so. Pursuant to the Rules of the Railroad Commission of Texas, Title 16 of the Texas Administrative Code Section 7.230, any affected persons may file written comments or a protest concerning the proposed change in the environs rates with the Docket Services Section of the Railroad Commission of Texas, at any time within 30 days following the date on which the change would or has become effective. The Company is proposing to have these proposed rates become effective on June 27, 2003.

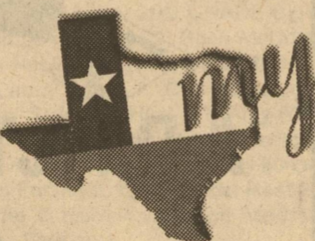

that the contract with the builder did not specify a start date. On hand for that discussion was local goat producer Jack Dean who was checking to see if the project would be finished in time for his annual goat show.

Next, Judge Griffin told the commissioners he had received a

copy of letter sent to the engineering firm of Hibbs & Todd by the City of Eldorado's engineer, Steve Dennis. The letter outlined requirements that needed to be met in order for a sewer line from the Civic Center to be connected to the city's sewer system. Hibbs & Todd are overseeing the project for the county.

The court then approved an amendment to a cooperative agreement between the county and the Texas Attorney General's office concerning the retention of records. The men also voted to reimburse a local rock mason \$550 for work he did investigating requirements for a handicap accessible ramp on the outside of the Memorial Building and to design the ramp to meet the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities

Act. It was noted that the men decided at a meeting on May 12 not to build the masonry ramp but to build a wooden ramp inside the building instead.

The commissioners then directed Judge Griffin to contact five individuals to see if they are interested in being appointed to an airport board. The five mentioned were George Spinks, Joe Christian, Jimmy Doyle, Doug Garvin and Leonard Wideman. It was noted that nomination to the board is open to anyone interested and that appointments will be made at the June 9 meeting of the commissioners court.

Before adjourning, the commissioners discussed maintenance of the courthouse phone system. It was noted that the phone provider is offering a service agreement with a \$76.49 monthly price tag. The men instructed Judge Griffin to determine if other contractors may be used to maintain the current system and to contact local businesses with similar systems in order to find out how much they are paying for maintenance.

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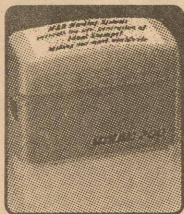

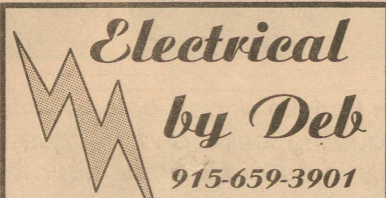

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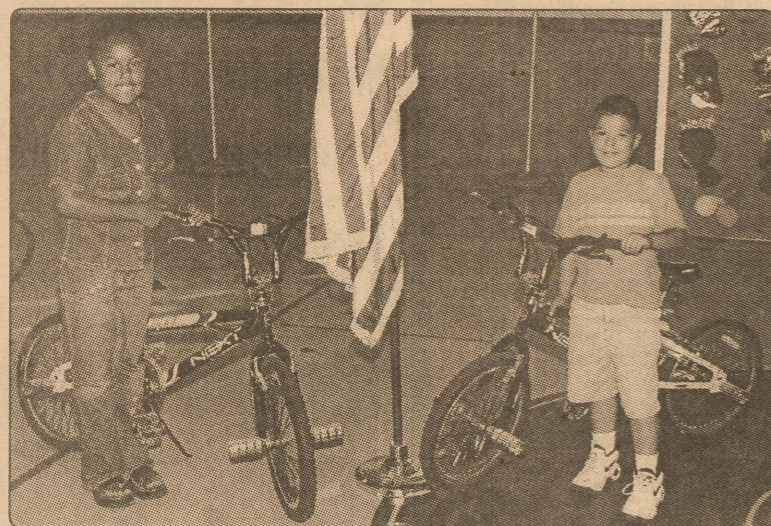

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USDA extends CRP sign-up to June 13

ELDORADO — The sign-up period for the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) has been extended from May 30, 2003 to June 13, 2003 announced Jan Wanoreck, County Executive Director for the Schleicher/Sutton/Val Verde County Farm Service Agency.

"Interest in the general CRP sign-up has been strong. This extension gives busy producers more time to enroll in this highly successful, environmentally beneficial program," said Wanoreck.

CRP is the nation's largest pri-

vate lands environmental improvement program—it protects millions of acres of topsoil from erosion, provides valuable wildlife habitat and safeguards America's ground and surface water quality. The 2002 Farm Bill authorized CRP enrollment up to 39.2 million acres. For fiscal year 2003, Schleicher County CRP participants have received \$92,550 in rental payments as of May 2003, and approximately 2,743.4 acres are currently enrolled in the program.

CRP participants voluntarily

remove environmentally sensitive land from agricultural production by entering into long-term contracts for 10 to 15 years. In exchange, they receive annual rental payments and a payment of up to 50 percent of the cost of establishing conservation practices.

Current participants with contracts expiring this fall—covering about 1.5 million acres—can make new contract offers, which, if accepted, will become effective on Oct. 1, 2003. All other contracts awarded under this sign-up will become effective either at the beginning of the next fiscal year, Oct. 1, 2003, or the following year, Oct. 1, 2004, whichever the producer chooses.

FSA will evaluate and rank eligible CRP offers using the Environmental Benefits Index (EBI), a ranking of environmental benefits to be gained from enrolling the land in CRP. Decisions on the EBI thresholds will be made by the Secretary after the sign-up ends and after FSA analyzes the EBI numbers of all the offers. Those who would have met previous sign-up EBI thresholds are not guaranteed a contract under this sign-up.

"Producers who enroll acreage in CRP promote conservation and stewardship by protecting sensitive land for future generations and reduce production of surplus commodities. In return, producers receive needed income support through program payments and use of the land for recreational purposes," said Wanoreck.

Aside from the general sign-up, the CRP continuous sign-up program is available on an ongoing basis for private lands currently in production. FSA has reserved 2 million acres for the continuous sign-up program, which protects the most environmentally desirable and sensitive land. FSA is making a special effort to help enhance wildlife habitats and air quality by earmarking 500,000 of these acres for hardwood tree planting.
