## County Court Accepts Templeton Bid

Another big step has been taken in the construction of the new law enforcement center for the county, namely awarding the construction bids during a meeting of the court Monday.

Because of a large number of contractors and sub-contractors the meeting had to be held in the district courtroom. Seven firms bid on the overall construction, with the final bid going to Templeton Construction of San Angelo.

That firm presented a low bid of \$697,000, which includes the bid for steel components granted two weeks ago. They are estimating it will take 360 calendar days for construction, which might possibly begin in about two months.

The new facility will include a

detoification room, day room, cells for 18 prisoners, cells for juveniles and female prisoners, and offices for law enforcement personnel.

In other business, the court visited with Rick Sterling of First National Bank concerning money for the jail bonds and how it will be taken care of.

They also granted to give \$7,000 to Schleicher County Emergency Service which asked for funds to help purchase a new ambulance. The decision was unanimous.

Also, the court decided to pay \$25 a month to cemetery caretaker Pete Majia who has been using his car to haul dirt to fill low spots. He was also given permission to use county pickups for the work two days a week.

## Junked Autos Can Mean Extra Money

In the past and in the present, the City of Eldorado has launched a campaign to remove all abandoned and junked vehicles from our City streets, alleys and private property. As a result of the last campaign, the City now has 21 vehicles at the Old Rudd Road dump ground which need to be claimed by their owners, auctioned off or sold to a demolisher.

The process to rid Eldorado of these impounded vehicles is a rather lengthy one. First of all, you must determine whether the vehicles are "Junked Vehicles" or "Abandoned Vehicles". Junked vehicles are motor vehicles which do not have affixed to it both a current, valid Texas license plate or plates, and a current, valid Texas DPS motor vehicle inspection certificate, and which is either wrecked, partially or wholly dismantled, inoperative, or not equipped with tires affixed to all wheels. Abandoned vehicles are considered any unattended vehicle

left continuously standing, placed or parked on any public premises, or any public street, alley or way, or on any private property of another without consent of the property owner for a period in excess of fifteen days.

In the case of the automobiles impounded at this time, all are considered "junked". Owners of these vehicles must be located and given 20 days to claim their automobiles. If after 20 days these cars are not claimed and storage fees paid, the City must auction them off to the highest bidder or sell them to a demolisher.

The demolisher contacted by the City Secretary stated that he must have at least 50-60 automobiles with appropriate papers to make a trip to Eldorado worth his time. He is paying \$1.50/100 lb. weight for cars without motor blocks and \$2.00/100 lb weight for cars with motor block. An average car can easily bring \$30-\$50 less any impounding fees. All vehicles must be towed to a central location before the company can set up demolishing equipment.

Anyone knowing the location of abandoned or junked automobiles is requested to contact City Hall giving whatever information possible. Persons with vehicles parked on their property without permission should also call City Hall. The local Sheriff's office of City personnel can assist in locating paperwork required. Whenever the City obtains a listing of motor vehicles justifying the demolisher to come to Eldorado, he will be requested to come with ample notice given of the place and time.

Junked or abandoned vehicles left on our City streets and alleys and on our City lots create a public nuisance, devaluing our property and encouraging vandalism. The citizens of Eldorado are asked to take a look around and report these sore spots. That piece of junk in your yard or in front of your house could be worth some money!

straying away.

# Bitterweed Poses A Big Problem

as around feed or watering areas where livestock concentrate. The plant has an undesirable bitter taste, as the name implies, even as a seedling.

Such as noxious plant would not normally be eaten by cattle or sheep, except for the fact that it is one of the first forage plants to green up in the early spring. After a long winter on a diet of dry grass, livestock will seek out anything that is green and nutritious. This is especially true of those animals that are producing milk for newborn lambs and calves. On overgrazed and badly abused rangeland where no other forage may be available even during the growing season, the same situation might develop.

Since practically all of the country missed out on "grass-growing" rains in the late summer and fall last year, there is little grass left on the ground in many pastures. Hopefully we'll receive some late winter and early spring rains that will grow plenty of good forage so that bitterweed poisoning problems can be kept to a minimum.

The winter season is drawing to a close in Schleicher County and some green is beginning to show up in the pastures, much to the relief of local livestock operators. Feeding is still a must but in many cases, livestock aren't coming to feed as quickly as they did earlier. During this time of year when little else is available for grazing, poisonous plants become a problem.

The number one problem plant on rangeland in Schleicher County as well as the entire Edwards Plateau, is bitterweed. Bitterweed is a low-growing annual forb that belongs to the sunflower family. It grows much like an annual broomweed, growing to as high as two feet with many yellow flowers forming on each individual plant. It grows thickest in areas where there has been ground disturbance on limestone soils, in overgrazed pastures, and in barrow ditches. It can be found in almost any rangeland area where there is bare ground, such


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### Joiner Sets New Record

Joiner also won third in the 110 meter hurdles. In the mile relay, Martinez, Tommy Minor, Mertz and Joiner placed second.

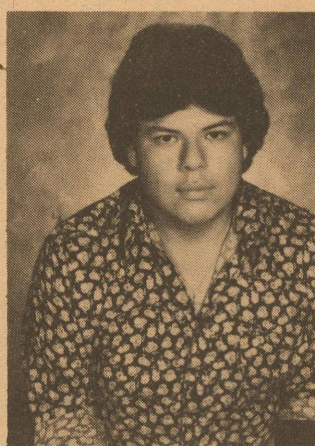
