How to Buy Wood Furniture

Buying the best-quality wood furniture for the money depends on knowing about some generalities, about certain features and about your own needs and wants.

FURNITURE GENERALITIES

MATERIALS--Plastics and other imitations often are more practical than "the real thing" if the quality is good. Veneers can give beautiful wood-grain effects, and they're as good as solid wood.

"Solid" means that all exposed surfaces, tops, sides, door and drawer fronts are made of the solid wood named on the label. Even so, the wood on the inside may be a different type.

CONSTRUCTION--Grooves, screws and no-gap joints are keys to quality. On the other hand, nails, staples, gaps in joints and the absence of grooves are all signs of poorer quality.

For example, in quality construction, the backs of buffets and chests are recessed into grooves and screwed into the frame, not nailed or stapled on.

A table or chest should feel heavy and well-balanced when presses on firmly.

No spaces or gaps or glue should show where two pieces of wood are joined.

FINISHES--Finishes often are different from the wood itself--this doesn't affect quality.

Front, top and sides of a finish should blend, though in color and graining.

Patterns on door panels and drawer fronts should match, too.

Furniture should feel smooth--a poor finish is textured or uneven.

Of course, a "distressed" finish is not quite as smooth as other types, even when it is good quality. Here, black "distress" marks should look random in appearance.

Also, a good finish doesn't flake off, if lightly scratched along an edge or joint.

PRICE--Consider wood furniture a long-term investment.

Pro-rate its costs over a 15 year period before you decide you can't afford quality.

Of course, on the other hand, a high price tag doesn't automatically mean high quality or long wear. Remember both

high-quality and poor-quality furniture is available in most price categories.

Learn to tell the difference.

FURNITURE FEATURES

DRAWERS--Drawers should open and close smoothly.

Drawer bottoms should not buckle when pushed.

Inside and outside surfaces should be smooth.

Drawer panels should be held together with dovetailing--not nails. Dovetails should be will-fitted with no gaps.

When you look inside the space for the drawer, are there wood reinforcement blocks?

Also, dust panels between the drawers will keep clothing from getting caught.

DOORS--Doors should swing open evenly without

squeaking or rubbing. They should fit snugly when closed.

Catches in more than one place help to prevent doors from sagging.

Inset panels should not rattle, jiggle or feel loose.

HARDWARE--Look for well-secured hardware as sign of quality.

It should go through the drawer or door and be attached with bolts or washers to prevent falling off.

Quality hardware is cast of heavy metal and has no rough edges.

FURNITURE PIECES

TABLES--"Leaves" are important to know about in comparing prices and values--especially how many you'll get and what size they'll be.

Also, leaves should fit flush, be level and match the rest of the table.

Leaves should have an apron if the table does.

Look for drop legs, too. They'll give a table with several leaves the extra support it needs.

CHAIRS--Chairs should feel well-balanced and steady when you sit in them.

In quality chair construction, chair back, back legs,

and seat are one continuous piece of wood.

Straight legs generally are stronger than curved legs.

A connecting cross-bar gives more support.

FURNITURE DELIVERIES

If it is necessary to order furniture, ask the store to check the date of the next "cutting" to help determine your waiting time.

Also ask about the store's damage policy. Reputable stores will repair furniture delivered with scratches or other damages.

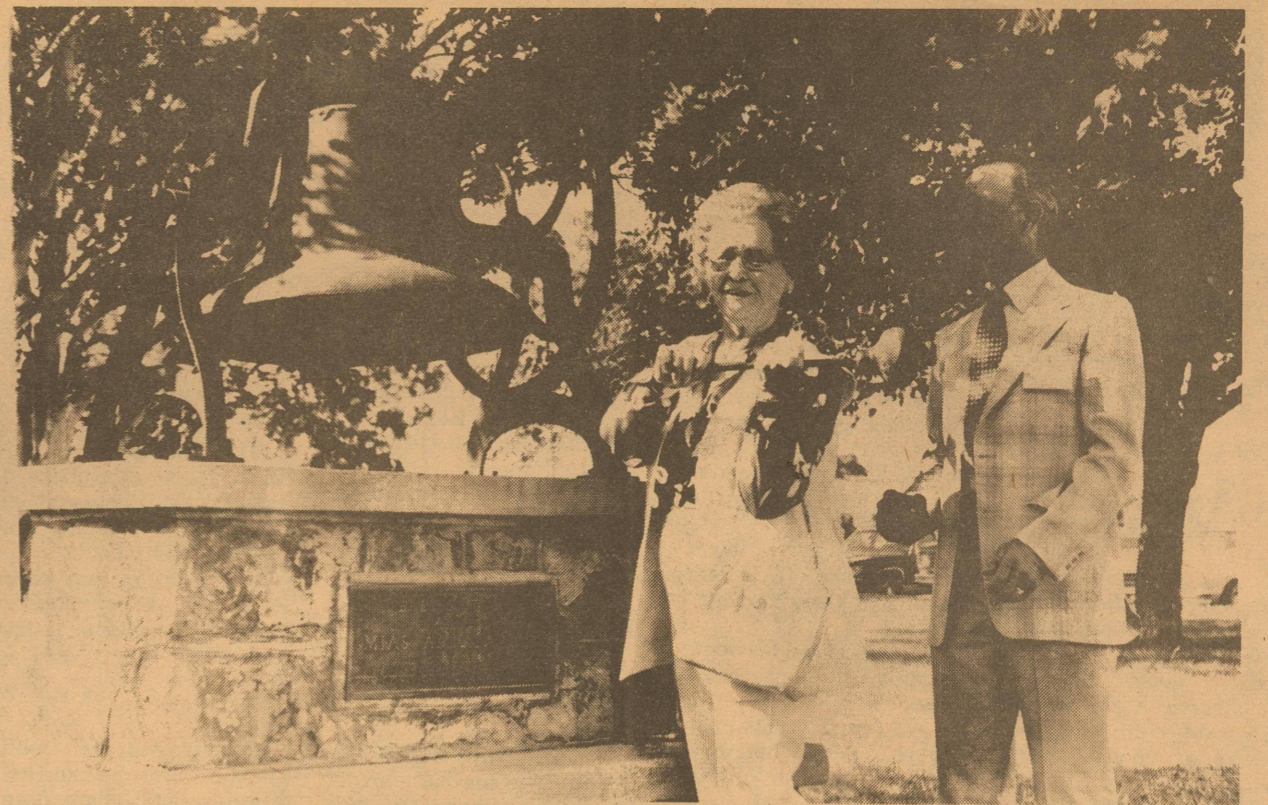

From the Horse's Mouth

Spider mites, or red spiders, are probably the most difficult pests to control in vegetable gardens. With hot dry weather approaching, gardeners should be on the lookout for this pest by checking the underside of plant leaves, advises Jerry Swift, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Although spider mites will attack almost any plant among their preferred hosts are beans, tomatoes, peas, eggplant and corn.

Actually, spider mites are not insects but are eight legged relatives of ticks and spiders. Their small size, about 1/60 of an inch, makes them difficult to see without a magnifying lens. They range in color from Red, Green, and Yellow to White and Brown. Spider mites deposit their eggs on the underside of leaves. These hatch in about five days. There may also be 10 or 15 or more generations per year, notes Swift.

Mites can cause considerable plant damage by sticking their needle-like mouthparts into leaf tissue and sucking out the juice while injecting a toxic substance into the leaf. Heavy infestations will cause leaves to appear blotched or spotted, turn pale or yellowish in color, curl up or yellowish in color, curl up, turn brown and eventually drop off. A thin webbing may cover leaves and stems.

Begin a control program as soon as spider mites are detected and before plant damage is obvious, Swift emphasizes. A light infestation of spider mites can be reduced and kept at low levels by spraying plants with a strong stream of cool water every few days.

If chemicals must be used, select from such effective materials as Kelthane, diazinon and malathion. Two to four applications may be needed at five-day intervals. Always follow directions on the pesticide label, cautions Swift.

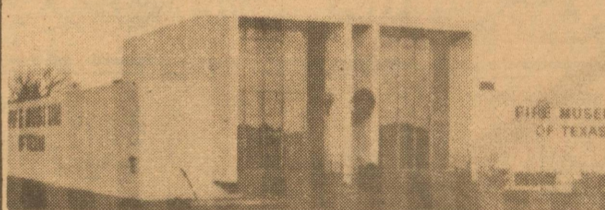

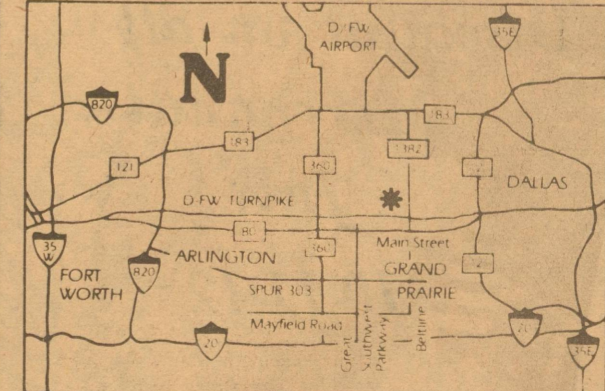

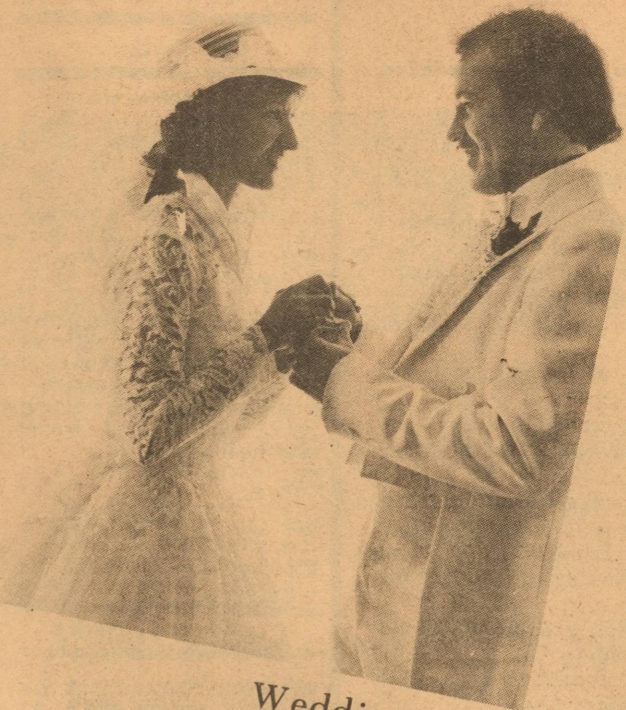

These gas regulators are in short supply and are reserved only for customers with the older model open-face heaters. The newer heaters are equipped at the factory with automatic re-set regulators. These manual re-set regulators the city now has in stock will cut off all gas to the residence or business. Once the gas comes back on, either the customer or a city employee will have to reset them and pilots will have to be relit by the customer. The city was only able to obtain 50 reset regulators on its initial order.

The next meeting of the city council is Tuesday, July 15 at 7:30 pm, in the city hall. Citizens are welcome to attend this meeting as well as any other meeting of the council. A replacement for councilmember Frank Williams will be appointed July 15. Mr. Williams and his family are being transferred to Fort Stockton.

Mr. Williams, an employee of Northern Natural Gas Company, is an operations and maintenance supervisor and this transfer is a promotion for him. He and his wife, Clarence, and their children will be missed by our community but are wished the best of luck in their move.

The new councilman appointed Tuesday will complete William's term which was scheduled to expire April 1981.

In last week's article we mentioned the fact that some citizens are burning their trash. This does in no way mean that burning of trash is acceptable. Not only is burning of trash prohibited within the city limits, but the dry weather makes this a very dangerous situation.

There should be no reason for trash to be burned -- the garbage truck is running its route each week on schedule and the city landfill is open seven days a week, 10 am to 6 pm Monday through Saturday and from 1 pm to 6 pm on Sunday.

The sanitation workers have been instructed to leave any trash showing evidence of recent burning, as on several occasions they have picked up a customer's trash and soon found that coals or smoldering trash had ingited other trash within the garbage truck. This type action could result in the loss of the truck and possible the loss of life!

Also in last week's article we asked for response from gas customers using open-face heaters. The regulators to be installed will not be installed inside homes inside homes as some customers have understood. They will be installed outside at the gas meter. Each home currently has a gas regulator. This new safety regulator will replace existing regulators.

President of El Camino Girl Scout Council Attends Special Reception at Washington White House.

Marilyn Flage, president of the El Camino Girl Scout Council, attended a White House reception in Washington, D.C., on June 10 at which Rosalyn Carter previewed new Girl Scout uniforms, badges and top awards. The event marked completion of a modernized Girl Scout program of activities in step with changing times.

Mrs. Orville L. Freeman, president of Girl Scouts of the U.S.A., introduced the innovations to Mrs. Carter, who is honorary president of the national organization.

A framed set of 76 new proficiency badges for nine to eleven year-old Junior Girl Scouts was presented to Mrs. Carter. Mix-and-match uniforms for teenage members of high school age, and the Girl Scout Silver Award, available also to girls in the early teens, were unveiled for the first time at the White House.

Presidents of 341 Girl Scout councils across the nation were invited to the reception, along with women government officials, congresswomen and the Girl Scouts' national board of directors.

New proficiency badges for Junior Girl Scouts include such timely topics as "energy saver" and "computer fun". Girl Scouts earn these badges by completing activities they choose from a wide range of subjects and flexible requirements. Juniors wear the colorful embroidered cloth symbols of new knowledge and skills on a shoulder sash over their uniforms. The set of 76 new badges will be introduced in September.

Teen-age Girl Scouts may begin working toward the two top Girl Scout Gold and Silver Awards this Fall.

The new uniform is designed for the action-packed lifestyle of teenagers today. In tune with fashion trends of the times, mix-match coordinates consist of a bright green poly/twill A-line skirt, straight-leg pants, fitted vest and insignia sash worn with a long-sleeve tailored plaid blouse. The uniform will be available in September.

This is the first major update of the Girl Scout program since 1963. It began in 1977 with a new handbook for six to eleven year-old Brownie and Junior Girl Scouts entitled Worlds to Explore. The handbook introduces girls to simple scientific experiments and career prospects for women, among other innovative features. Careers to Explore is a workbook published last year to supplement the handbook with activities and interviews designed to show young Girl Scouts what it's like to be a state trooper, energy scientist, train conductor and other kinds of working women.
