## Three Youths Complete Washington, D.C. Tour

interesting themes about "My Summer Vacation" when they return to school in the fall. Kara Homer, Lou Ann Turner and Mark Wallis participated in the local Southwest Texas Cooperative-sponsored Electric Youth Tour to Washington, D.C. Kara is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenith Homer. Lou Ann is the daughter of Mr. & Mrs. A.T. Turner. Mark is the son of Mr.&Mrs. Walter Wallis.

They joined 41 other youths and chaperons in Lewisville to embark by bus on a 12-day adventure to the Nation's Capital. Southwest Texas EC is one of 15 Texas rural electric cooperatives which sponsored youths on the sixteenth annual Government-In-Action Youth Tour. Most of the youthful Texans earned the expense paid trip by winning speech or essay contests conducted by the electric cooperatives.

While in Washington, D.C., Mark Wallis was selected as Texas' representative on the National Rural Electric Cooperatives Association's Youth Consulting Board. He will assist in the conducting of the NRECA Annual Meeting in San Francisco next year. He will share with national co-op leaders the concerns of youths associated with

the rural electrification program.

Upon arrival in the "City of Trees", the Eldorado students embarked on five strenuous days of seeing their government in action. They met with Congressman Tom Loeffler and asked intriguing questions about current legislative activities. While touring the Senate Chamber, the debates regarding the draft registration were conducted.

Highlighting the trip was a special tour of the White House which concluded whith greetings from President Carter. The President told the Texans about his family's involvement with a local electric cooperative in Georgia. He commented about the urgency for the Congress war of energy independence.

The energy crisis confronting Americans was discussed during Rural Youth Day activities by Louis Strong, statewide manager of the Kentucky Rural Electric Cooperatives. The keynote speaker reported that the importance of oil results in an alarming economic drain of "\$10,000,000 per hour." He stated "that any solution to the energy crisis must address the imported oil Suply." The REC leader offered three courses which would lead the U.S. to energy independence: (1) energy conservation, (2) increase domestic production of oil and gas, and (3) shift away from the use of oil to alternate fuel sources.

History books come alive once the GAYTers entered Washington, D.C. The marble, bronze and stone reminders of the past recalled the people, places and events which gave birth to the country. The majestic monuments and shrines honor the Nation's prominent statesmen. The hallowed halls of Congress seem to continue to echo the eloquent words of Jefferson, Webster and Lincoln. The yellowing parchment of the Declaration of Indepdence, Constitution and the Bill of Rights rekindles the American spirit which built this country. The Smithsonian Institute houses man's inventions. A theatre box draped with an American Flag, the Eternal Flame and rows of marble headstones remind everyone of the contributions Americans have made to preserve the U.S. as "the land of the free and the home of the brave."

The Tour ends all too soon. Going home with souvenirs, dirty laundry and tired feet were lifetime memories and friendships. The things which only the three Eldorado students of the 1980 Youth Tour can experience.

The concept of rural electric cooperatives sponsoring youths to Washingyton, D.C. was proposed by 1957. As a keynote speaker at the NRECA Annual Meeting in Chicago, Johnson suggested that co-ops establish scholarships to send local youths to the Nation's Capital to see their government in action. In 1958, six Texas co-ops participated and sent students on a six-week tour which included actually working in the office of a Congressman.

The present statewide coordination began in 1965 to reduce lodging, meal and transportation expenses.

Many people these days seem to be perpetual search for the ultimate in leisure and recreational pasttimes; but there are some Eldorado families who think they've truly found the answer, if not the most unusual, way to spend their weekends.

The Overall Cookers enter "Cook offs" and say there's a little something for everyone. Maybe it's the travel, the food. the games, the people they meet, or just the fun, but they all think it's great fun, from the oldest, H.W. (Scotty) Scott, to the youngest, Stoney Harris. Of course. the cooking is always the foremost entry, but they seem to be very versed in their talents with trophies to prove it.

This year the team traveled as far away as Llano to enter the "Texas Pork Cook-Out," sponsored by the Texas Pork Producers Association and the Llano Jaycees. Moore's Hog Farm furnished the team a hog, and though the top honors didn't go to the Overall Cookers, with their first place in the ribs category, and second place in the shoulder category, they did come within two points of the grand championship.

These victories gave the team their most unusual trophies -- polished granite slabs, weighing 15 pound each. There were other victories that day, too. Members Ray Standeford and Dana Ledbetter placed second in the men's horseshoe pitching. Also, Peggy Whitten and Candy Richards, and Glenda Cavness and Helen Ledbetter placed first and second respectively in the women's

washer pitching. But winning isn't new to these people. Just one week earlier at the 'Mernard Brisket Cook-off', Whitten and Richards, and Cavness and Ledbetter won first and second place, respectively, in the women's horseshoes.

The team's winning streak seemed to start with Sonora's annual "Barbecue Burnin' Hootin and Holler" goat cook off. They took third place for showmanship, encouraging them for better things yet to come at San

They really got into the spirit of things and even made their mascot lamb a team uniform. It was there that the mother-daughter team of Whitten and Richards found that their talents lie in horseshoe pitching and took first place against pretty stiff competition.

Now there were three trophies for the red and white checkered "Brag rack" that the team carries everywhere; and they were eager to add to their collection. Perhaps the most unusual thing

the team has ever had to cook was 'rocky mountain oysters' at Christoval. The oddity of this didn't discourage members though. For their efforts they walked away with a third place trophy. Whitten and Richards again took home honors with a third place in horseshoe pitching. But everyone was especially enthused over member Faye Cavness' second place win in the "Mud Wallerin"."

The Green Acres Goat Cook-off at Fort McKavett won the team two more trophies -- Whitten and Richards first in horseshoes, and one that was very special for being, "the best people there.'

The team's grand finale this year will be Brady's "World Championship Goat Cook-off", August 30. They say they've plans on winning every event -- including cooking, tobacco spitting, horseshoe pitching, egg tossing and liar's contest.

Well, whether they win or lose, maybe they really have found the answer to relaxation. But even 'fun' isn't free. Between cook-offs the Overall Cookers hire out to make the money needed for entry fees and expenses. ## Campout

Adventure...That's Scouting. No where is this time honored motto more true than in Eldorado with our own Troop 18, which has for 416 months (Boy Scouts number the tenure of their troops in months) been the inspiration of boys in Schleicher County. Throughout this more than thirty-four year life as the major scout organization in Eldorado the troop has trained and nurtured thousands of boys in the disipline and responsibility of manhood and good citizenship. In the scouting program our boys have learned skills and techniques of communication and self reliance; bravery and dicipline. At no time has this been more evident than at the time of high adventure.

We have always known that adventure is the stuff that holds life together. It is a good marriage, a healthy body, a whole outlook on life. It is by adventure that personalities are formed, capacity for concern is developed and willing service is nurtured. The scouting program with its motto (be prepared) and oath which every boy must memorize and pledge himself to sets forth the highest aspirations in this great adventure of life.

Troop 18 (our Eldorado troop) has recently been reorganized into a high adventure troop. For the last four months co-scoutmasters Lynn Meador and Dan Adams have been developing boy leadership and moral growth, looking forward to this adventure of life. Leadership comes from live action relationships out in the feild. Responsibility is learned only as it becomes necessary. And the boys learn...adventure is also

Troop 18 has become alive with outdoor adventure. In a few short weeks the troop has taken survival hikes, and camps learning about wilderness life and Indian ways. We have produced fires and food with no equiptment but a knife. We have camped where old ones (the first americans) camped, and studied

their ways. We have hiked and climbed across the rugged West Texas country and learned the skills of scoutcraft, and the skills of family living. We have attended long term camp, Studying adventure from wilderness survival to beekeeping; first aid to life saving; cardio puliminary recessitation to Indian lore. We have studied the techniques of backpacking and mountaineering. We have talked of high adventure.

Now Troop 18 will practice what it has dreamed of, learn what it has studied. The time appointed has arrived. We leave for the mountains. We will see the ancient cliff dwellings of the early americans, study their life style, talk of their problems, their culture, their food, their families, their adventure. We will backpack into the back country and watch for signs of their relegion, their fun their ways. We will study their writings, petroglyphs on the walls of caves, and camp in their ancient hunting grounds. And when the nights are dark and the campfire shawdows are deep, we will talk of their ways, tell stories that make them come alive, and dream dreams of our past, our future, our lives.

After eight days and nights, hiking, camping and cooking in the great outdoors, we shall return, better people than when we left. But some of us will go on. Our senior patrol leader and patrol leaders will go to a special training camp with accent on survival techniques, pioneering and camping skills. Leadership is learned by leading. Responsibility is learned by necessity. They will return better equipped to live, to function in life, and to lead. Our troop will grow in stature and in strength.

Then on July 21 the older boys of our troop will leave for Philmont Scout Ranch and Explored Base, and two weeks of camping, backpacking and learning about life. We will learn to make arrowheads out of flint by chipping with deer horn; build with adobe after fashioning it from mud and straw; fire 58 calibre black powder rifles; dig for indian relics under the supervision of professional archeologist. We will camp at ten thousand feet...watch the sunset from Kit Carsons old camp, and catch our dinner in rugged mountain

Adventure...thats scouting. But more, growth...responsibility...disipline...training...citizenship...physical development...remember our scout law...we all pledge to live by it. A scout is trustworthy, loyal, helpful, friendly, courteous, kind, obedient, cheerful, thrifty, brave, clean, reverent. We will pattern our lives after the highest we know. No shody remarks, No garbage in our minds, No sickness in our soul...

High Aspiration? No, high adventure. Adventure, thats what life iss all about. People that have lost it have settled down into a rut. A rut is a grave with both ends knocked out. No rut here. We've been caught up into adventure... The fifty mile canoe trip coming in late August... The conservation project upon return from Philmont... The board of review in September... The court of honor July 20...The Orienteering project... The hiking merit badge...The camper award neckerchiefs... No one, nobody does it like scouting... and one day we will be grown and fathers of our sons. And the winter will set in and folks will complain and families will fail to function, and we will gather our sons from around the world and tell them of the time that we studied the way of the Indian and climbed in his hills, and camped in his camps, and fished in his streams, and life will be alive for us and our

Adventure, Thats scouting.



How to Buy Wood furniture

Buying the best-quality wood furniture for the money depends on knowing about some generalities. about certain features and about your own needs and

#### **FURNITURE** GENERALITIES

MATERIALS--Plasics and other imitations often are more practical than 'the real thing" if the quality is good.

Veneers can give beautiful wood-grain effects, and they're as good as solid wood.

"Solid" means that all exposed surfaces, tops, sides, door and drawer fronts are made of the solid wood named on the label. Even so, the wood on the inside may be a different

CONSTRUCTION--Grooves, screws and nogap joints are keys to quality. On the other hand, nails, staples, gaps in joints and the absence of grooves are all signs of poorer quality.

For example, in quality constuction, the backs of buffets and chests are recessed into grooves and screwed into the frame, not nailed or stapled on.

A table or chest should feel heavy and wellbalanced when presses on

No spaces or gaps or glue should show where two pieces of wood are joined.

FINISHES--Finishes often are different from the wood itself--this doesn't affect quality.

Front, top and sides of a finish should blend, though in color and graining.

Patterns on door panels and drawer fronts should match, too.

Furniture should feel smooth--a poor finish is textured or uneven.

Of course, a "distressed" finish is not quite as smooth as other types, even when it is good quality. Here, black "distress" marks should look random in

Also, a good finish doesn't flake off, if lightly scratched along an edge or

PRICE--Consider wood furniture a long-term investment.

Pro-rate its costs over a 15 year period before you decide you can't afford quality.

Of course, on the other hand, a high price tag automatically doesn't mean high quality or long Remember both

Learn to tell the differ-

**FURNITURE FEATURES DRAWERS--Drawers** should open and close smoothly.

Drawer bottoms should not buckle when pushed. Inside and outside sur-

faces should be smooth. Drawer panels should be held together with dovetailing--not nails. Dovetails should be will-fitted with no

When you look inside the space for the drawer, are there wood reinforcement

blocks? Also, dust panels between the drawers will keep clothing from getting

DOORS--Doors should swing open evenly without

when closed. Catches in more than one place help to prevent doors

from sagging. Inset panels should not rattle, jiggle or feel loose. HARDWARE--Look for well-secured hardware as sign of quality.

It should go through the drawer or door and be attached with bolts or washers to prevent falling

Quality hardware is cast of heavy metal and has no rough edges.

**FURNITURE PIECES** TABLES--"Leaves" are important to know about in comparing prices and values--especially how many you'll get and what size they'll be.

Also, leaves should fit flush, be level and match the rest of the table. Leaves should have an

apron if the table does. Look for drop legs, too. They'll give a table with several leaves the extra support it needs.

CHAIRS--Chairs should feel well-balanced and steady when you sit in

FURNITURE DELIVERIES If it is necessary to order furniture, ask the store to check the date of the next "cutting" to help

#### From the Horse's Mouth By Jerry Swift, County Extension Agent

Spider mites, or red spiders, are probably the most difficult pests to control in vegetable gardens. With hot dry weather approaching, gardeners should be on the lookout for this pest by checking the underside of plant leaves, advises Jerry Swift, county agent fr the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Although spider mites will attack almost any plant among their preferred hosts are beans, tomatoes,

peas, eggplant and corn. Actually, spider mites are not insects but are eight legged relatives of ticks and spiders. Their small size, about 1/60 of an inch, makes them difficult to see without a magnifying lens. They range in color from Red, Green, and Yellow to White and Brown. Spider

Mites can cause considerable plant damage by sticking their needle-like mouthparts into leaf tissue and sucking out the juice while injecting a toxic substance into the leaf. Heavy infestations will cause leaves to appear blotched or spotted, turn pale or vellowish in color, curl upm yellowish iln color, curl up, turn brown and eventually drop off. A thin webbing may cover leaves and

Begin a control program as soon as spider mites are detected and before plant damage is obvious, Swift emphasizes. A light infestation of spider mites can be reduced and kept at low levels by spraying plants with a strong stream of cool water every few days.







Mrs. Orville L. Freeman, president of Girl Scouts of the U.S.A., introduced the innovations to Mrs. Carter, who is honorary president of the national organiza-

A framed set of 76 new proficiency badges for nine to eleven year-old Junior Girl Scouts was presented to Mrs. Carter. Mix-and-

reason for trash to be burned -- the garbage truck is running its route each week on schedule and the city landfill is open seven days a week, 10 am to 6 pm Monday through Saturday and from 1 pm to 6 pm on Sunday.

The sanitation workers have been instructed to leave any trash showing evidence of recent burning, as on several occasions they have picked up a customer's trash and soon found that coals or smoldering trash had ingited other trash within the garbage truck. This type action could result in the loss of the truck and possible the loss of life! Also in last week's article

we asked for response from gas customers using openface heaters. The regulators to be installed will not be installed inside homes inside homes as some customers have understood. They will be installed outside at the gas meter. Each home currently has a gas regulator. This new safety regulator will replace existing regulators.

These gas regulators are in short supply and are reserved only for customers with the older model openface heaters. The newer heaters are equipped at the factory with automatic reset regulators. These manual re-set regulators the city now has in stock will cut off all gas to the residence or business. Once the gas comes back on, either the customer or a city employee will have to reset them and pilots will have to be relit by the customer. The city was only able to obtain 50 reset regulators on its initial

order. The next meeting of the city councel is Tuesday, July 15 at 7:30 pm, in the city hall. Citizens are welcome to attend this meeting as well as any other meeting of the council. 
