



# **New Tax Laws Are Good News To The Elderly**

New tax law changes mean good news for older Americans. One of the concerns of everyone is whether or not he or she is required to file a return. Single people 65 and over do not have to file a tax return unless their gross income for 1979, excluding Social Security and Railroad Retirement payments and public assistance, was \$4,300 or more. That figure goes up to \$6,400 for a couple with one spouse 65 and over and \$7,400 for a couple with both spouses 65 and over. Of course, even if you are not required to file, if you had tax withheld, you should file to get any refund you may have

In addition to the higher filing requirment, the "Tax credit for the Elderly' provides another tax benefit for some older taxpayers with some taxable income and a tax liability.

There are limitations, however; persons who receive the maximum Social Security payments, for example

A further benefit is the once-in-a-lifetime \$110,000 exclusion of the gain on the sale of a personal residence. Taxpayers who are at least 55 before they sell their residence which they owned and lived in at least 3 of the 5 years prior to the sale can exclude \$100,000
