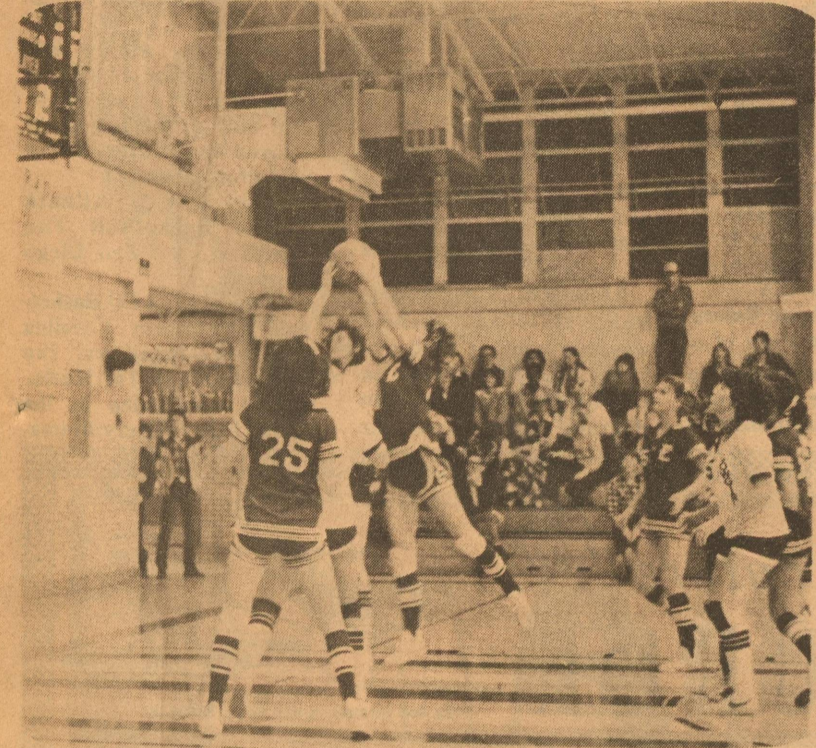

## Eaglettes Win Lions Tournament

It was a very exciting night in Eagle Gymnasium Saturday when the Eldorado Eaglettes faced the Mason cowgirls for the championship game in the Lions Club Eaglette Tournament.

The Eaglettes pulled ahead of the Corgirls early in the first quarter and maintained their lead to win 28-26, although the Mason girls put up a good fight for the title. Early in the fourth quarter, the score was 28-21 and Mason had several chances to score, especially in the very last seconds of the game. However, their efforts failed and the happy Eaglettes were victorious.

Leading the scoring for the Eaglettes was Toni Fatheree with eight points, Jolynn Jay and Lori Patton, with six each; and Lorrie Powell and Lori Griffin, two each. Sharon McFarland lead the Mason team with 11 points, followed by Lyla Keyser, seven; Teresa Ramon, four, and Nancy Starks and Donna Hohn, two each.

Third place in the tournament went to McCamey after a spirited game against Reagan County. The McCamey team pulled ahead of the

Big Lake team and maintained their lead to win 55-40.

Leading the McCamey girls was Lee Ann Ferguson with 12 points, followed by Mary Ybarra, 11; Bahola Barrandey and Lisa Steward, seven each; Jeanie fuller, four and Lupe Alvarado, Linda Myrick and Janet Warren, six.

Tracy Tatum led the Reagan County girls with 19 points, helped by Pam Colbert with 12; Miranda Armstrong and Jackie Collins, with three each and Miranda Armstrong, one.

The consolation trophy went to a lively team from Wall who won their prize after defeating Iraan in a close battle 41-40, giving the Iraan girls sixth place. Seventh place went to Junction and eighth place went to Ozona.

Leading the Hawkettes in their battle was Cindy Odell and Donna Vallandingham with six points, Kellye Powell with four points and Tana Taylor with nine points.

In Thursday's action, the scores were as follows: Bronte won over Junction, 48-36, Mason over Sonora, 63-57; McCamey defeated Wall,

55-50; Reagan County over Iraan, 52-49; Rankin over Menard, 19-18; and Eldorado over Ozona, 52-43.

In the second round for the top title Friday, Mason won over Bronte, 45-36; McCamey defeated Reagan County, 47-30 and Eldorado defeated Rankin 50-31. For the lower places, Wall beat Sonora, 71-41; Iraan over Menard 45-32; Iraan won over Ozona, 37-27 and Wall beat Junction, 48-42.

On Saturday, the final rounds saw Mason winning over Bronte, 45-36 and Eldorado winning against Rankin, 50-31.

Junction beat Ozona for seventh place 36-27, followed by Wall winning the consolation prize.

This was the first girls basketball tournament sponsored by the local lions club which is hoping to make it an annual affair. Proceeds from the tournament will go towards the Lions Club special projects such as eyeglasses for underprivileged children and the Crippled Children's Camp at Kerrville.

Bill Gentry was chairman for the tournament.

- 2) All articles should be cleaned and in show condition.
- 3) Canned food entries should be in standard canning jars.
- 4) If you are not certain which category an article should be entered in, please bring it out Thursday afternoon and the correct division will be determined.
- 5) This show is for amateurs only. An amateur is someone who does not earn more than 50 percent of his income from this source.
- 6) All articles entered must have been completed since January 1, 1979.
- 7) There is no limit to the number of articles a person can enter.
- 8) All exhibitors in the Women's Division must be 18 years of age or older. Men are invited to enter.

All entries may be picked up after lunch on Saturday. If you have any questions about the show, please call me. I hope you will plan on entering.

In the youth division, there will be three age divisions, sub-junior, under nine years of age; junior, 9 years

or older but not yet 14 and senior 14 years or older but not yet 19.

The four entry divisions will be cakes, pies, cookies and candy and yeast bread. Entries should be turned in at the Food Show Barn by 9:30 a.m. Jan. 19 in the barn's back room.

A best of show rosette will be awarded to the top entry in each age division. Ribbons will be awarded to all other entries. Mixes may not be used.

Participants may sell one item in the Premium Sale. They do not have to be present during the judging but will have to be present if they want to sell anything in the sale, which is Jan. 19.

Entry forms should be turned in by Jan. 16. Extra forms and/or information can be obtained from the county extension for home economics Nancy Lester. This part of the show is open to all 4-H, FFA and FHA members.

In announcing her candidacy, Mrs. Evans said, "I have been a

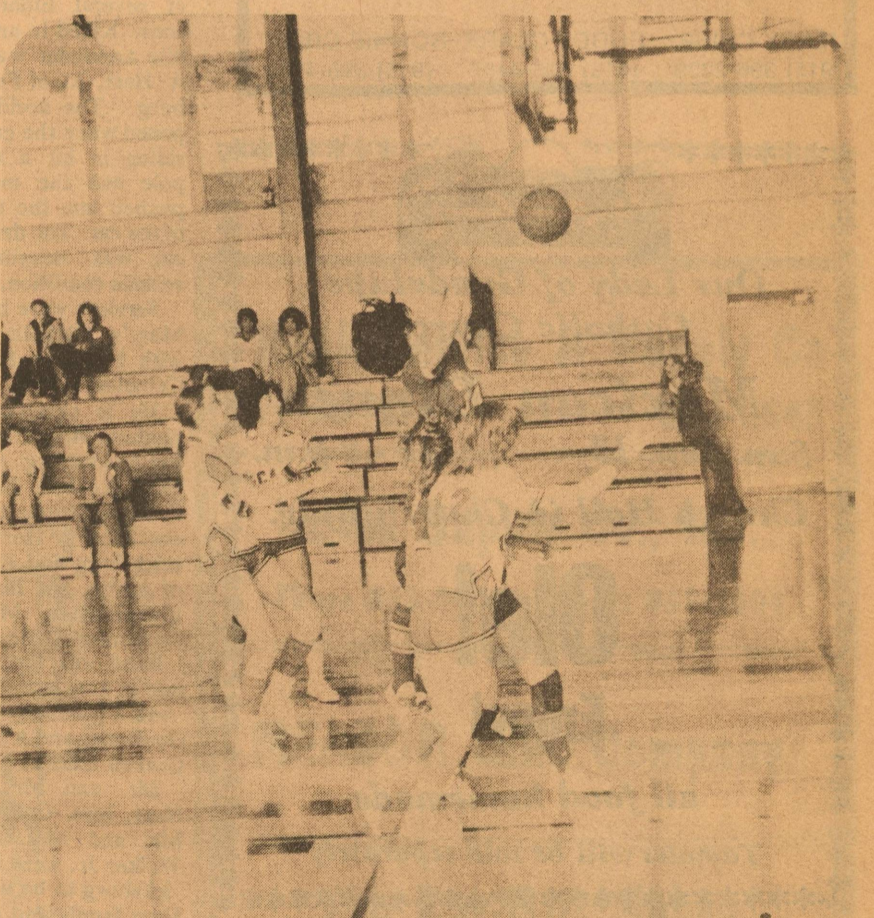

## New Tax Laws Are Good News To The Elderly

New tax law changes mean good news for older Americans. One of the concerns of everyone is whether or not he or she is required to file a return.

Single people 65 and over do not have to file a tax return unless their gross income for 1979, excluding Social Security and Railroad Retirement payments and public assistance, was \$4,300 or more. That figure goes up to \$6,400 for a couple with one spouse 65 and over and \$7,400 for a couple with both spouses 65 and over. Of course, even if you are not required to file, if you had tax withheld, you should file to get any refund you may have coming.

In addition to the higher filing requirement, the "Tax credit for the Elderly" provides another tax benefit for some older taxpayers with some taxable income and a tax liability.

There are limitations, however; persons who receive the maximum Social Security payments, for example would not be eligible.

A further benefit is the once-in-a-lifetime \$110,000 exclusion of the gain on the sale of a personal residence. Taxpayers who are at least 55 before they sell their residence which they owned and lived in at least 3 of the 5 years prior to the sale can exclude \$100,000 of the gain realized.

There are several free publications available which detail tax benefits for older Americans. Use the order form in your tax package, or contact IRS and ask for Publication 523, "Tax Information on Selling Y OR Buying Your Home," Publication 524, "Credit for the Elderly," Publication 554, "Tax Benefits for Older Americans" and Publication 575, "Pension and Annuity Income."

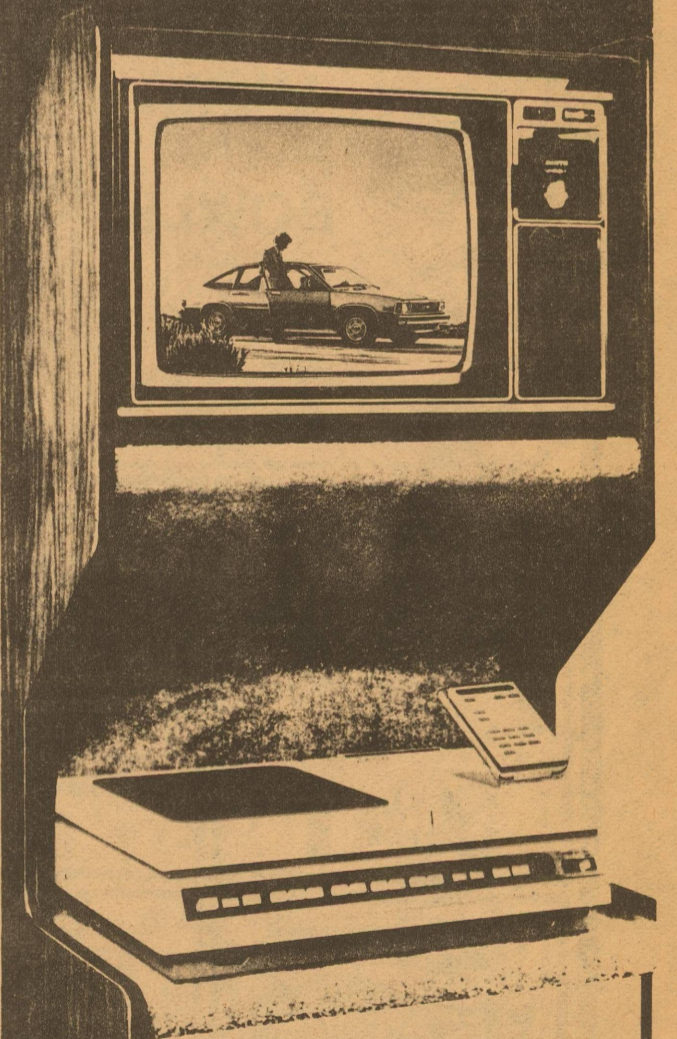

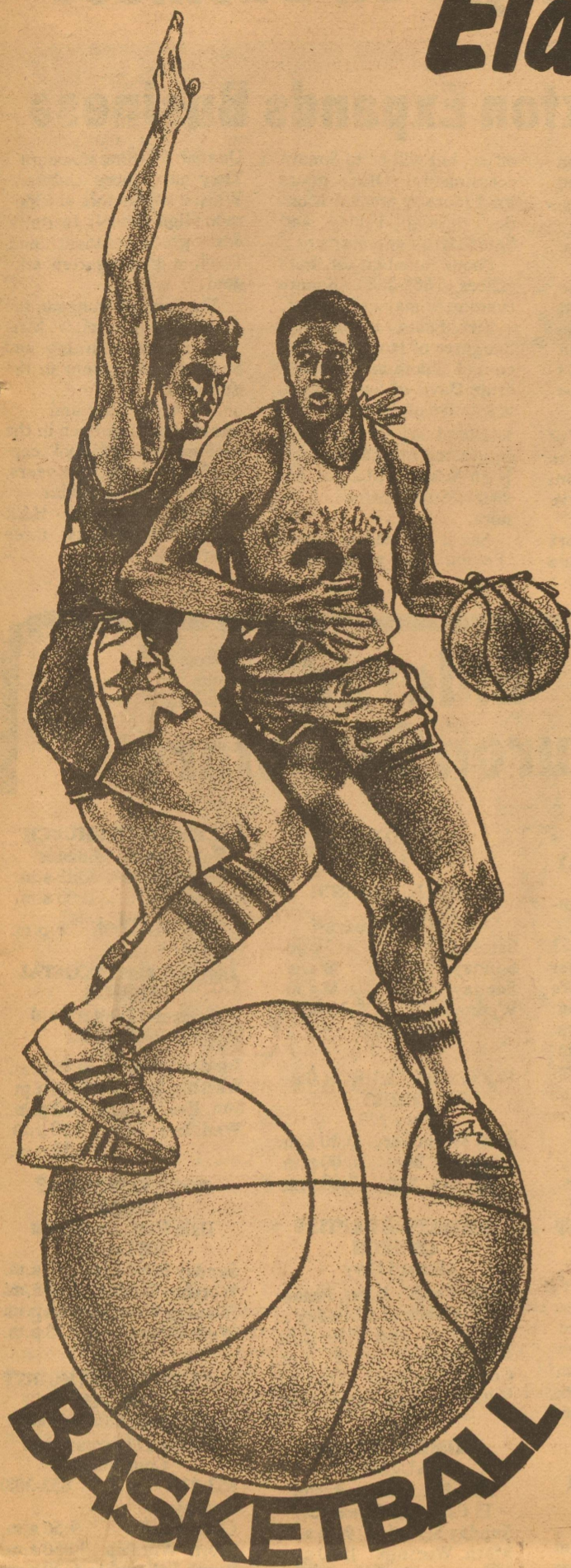

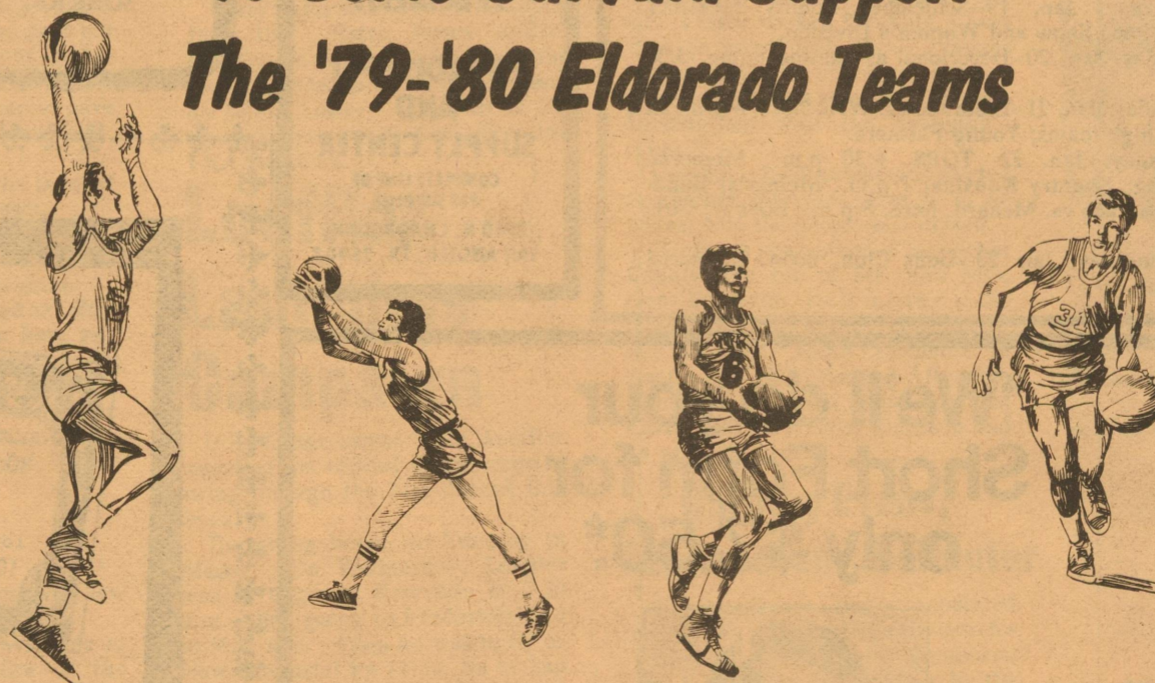
