Livestock And Food Show Highlight This Weekend

A lot of things will begin happening at the 4-H show barn beginning today as everyone prepares for the Schleicher County Livestock and Food Show, which is Friday and Saturday.

Today, entries for the women's Division will begin pouring in from 1:5 p.m. By 6 p.m., all calves are to be in ties.

Judging for the Women's division will be from 9-12 a.m. Friday and all livestock should be in the barn by 1 p.m. From 2-3 p.m., market lambs, hogs, shorn lambs and calves will be weighed, in that order. At 6 p.m., market lambs will be judged, followed by swine judging at 7:30 p.m.

On Saturday, activities will begin with the judging of shorn lambs at 9 a.m. All food show entries have to

be in by 10 a.m. and judging of food show entries will be at 10:15 a.m.

A barbecue lunch will be served at noon in the barn to aid 4-H activities.

Breeding cattle, bulls and heifers will be judged at 1 p.m., followed by judging of steers at 1:30 p.m. Champion and reserve champion steers will be announced at 3 p.m.

At 3:30 p.m., awards will be presented and the livestock premium sale will be at 4 p.m., and the food premium sale will be at 5 p.m. A Chinese auction will follow at 6 p.m. and a dance will be at 9 p.m.

Judges for the women's division will be Barbara Earwood, art; Barbara Savell, needlework and Odessa Fields, canned goods, all of Sonora.

Rex Jones of San Angelo will judge the market steers, heifers and

hogs. Tommy Everett, of Big Lake will judge lambs. Superintendents will be Billy Hausenfluck, lambs and Johnny Griffin, swine. Steve Williams will be auctioneer.

Committee chairmen are as follows: Billy Williams, livestock show; Clay Atkins, sale committee; Billy G. Edmiston and Jimmy Martin, cattle weighing; Phil Edmiston, sheep and hog weighing; J.C. Bumgardner, shearing; Dan Dunagan, barbecue; and Lora Mae Lloyd, dance.

Dump Ground Hours Repeated

To help cleanup parts of the city, the City Council of Eldorado is again announcing the hours the dump grounds are open.

The grounds are open for dumping from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Wednesday through Saturday and from 1-6 p.m. on Sunday. It is closed on Monday and Tuesday.

To reach the dump, drive six miles west of the city on the Big Lake Highway and turn right on a caliche road and drive for about one mile.

City officials are emphasizing that the illegal dumping of trash inside the city limits costs the taxpayers because these areas have to be cleaned by city personnel with the help of expensive bulldozers and/or dump trucks.

Board Hears Report, During Meeting

The new building program for the school was the major topic of discussion during the school board meeting Monday. Architect Gary Donaldson met with the board to discuss relocation of water, gas and sewer lines on the school grounds. The building program is about three weeks behind schedule because of a delay in moving power lines. However, the pad is down for the learning center.

High school principal Richard McCarron gave the board a report on attendance in high school and grade school principal Walter Wallis, who was unable to attend, sent a written report on attendance in grade school to the board. McCarron told the

board he felt there were a few isolated individuals who were missing classes more than they needed to. The board asked him to prepare a more detailed report for the next meeting.

Ray Lewis Ballew, business manager, gave a presentation to the board about the new tax law and how it will be implemented and how the school will be affected by it.

Superintendent Guy Whitaker gave a report on the monitoring visit from the Texas Education Agency which gave the school a good rating on all programs except bi-lingual education. Therefore, the school has conducted a survey on the major languages spoken in homes and is testing all elementary students to determine how many qualify for bi-lingual education. The same procedure will be done for high school students. The school is implementing a program in the elementary home rooms to give students with limited English speaking ability some assistance. As required by TEA, Personnel from Region XV in San Angelo will help with the program.

Whitaker also reported the school is entering a new accreditation stage and is required to develop student learning goals during the 1980-81 year through a self-study. A five year program will be submitted to the TEA in March of 1982.

Board members were informed that the cafeteria was operating in the red for the first time in several years, because of higher salaries and higher cost of supplies. Prices will now be 70 cents for students K-3; 80 cents for students in grades 4-6 and 90 cents for students in grades 7-12. Adults will pay \$1.25.

4-Hers Selling Tickets

Schleicher County 4-H members will be bustling to sell tickets for a free hog which will be given away in conjunction with the county livestock show Saturday. Tickets are one dollar each, or six for five dollars. The hog, which was donated by Mike and Henry Moore, will be ready for the freezer.

The hog will be given away at 3:30 p.m. in the show barn. Winners need not be present to win.

Proceeds from the raffle will go toward the 4-H Club activities, as well as proceed from the barbecue lunch at noon Saturday.

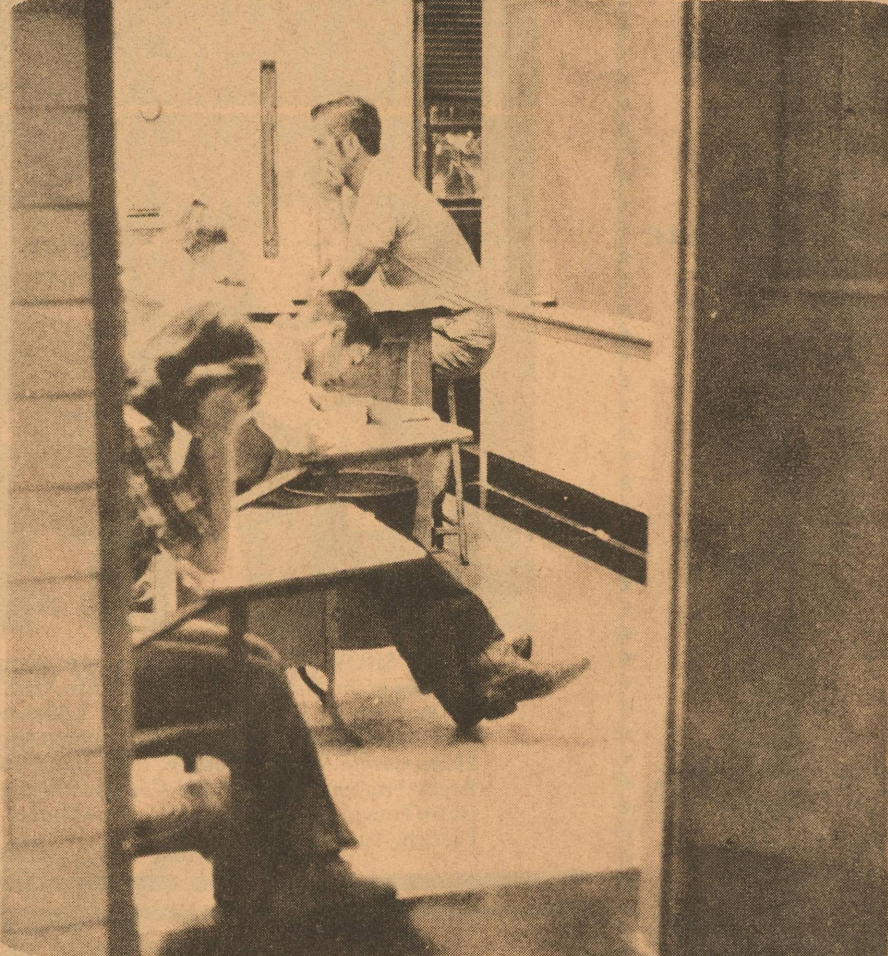

City Officials Enforcing Trash Laws

The City Council of Eldorado has been faced with a large problem for several years and is now trying to "get tough" and solve it. The problem is local citizens dumping trash, junk or garbage in and around the city limits, which presents not only an eyesore for the city, but also health problems such as a breeding ground for mosquitoes, stray animals and diseases, and a fire hazard.

During the council's meeting last week, aldermen decided to give a reward to anyone giving information leading to the arrest and conviction of anyone dumping illegally.

According to Texas State law, anyone dumping or otherwise disposing of "trash, junk garbage, refuse, unsightly matter of other solid waste on public highways, right-of-ways on public or private property...without written consent of the owner, his agent or the public official in charge thereof shall be

guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less than \$15 nor more than \$200. Every law enforcement officer of this state and its subdivisions shall have the authority to enforce the provisions of this act." Anyone charged with this misdemeanor would be charged in the justice of the peace court.

Also during the meeting last week, aldermen, city secretary Carolyn Mayo and City Works foreman Hal Whitten discussed the purchase of dumpsters to be used in the city, with Don Foad, representative of Pak-Mor Company of San Antonio which supplies trash trucks. Foad told the council the barrels residents now use are being banned by OSHA and should be removed. He said the dumpsters would cost \$250 each and could be shared by four families.

Foad said with the dumpsters and the proper trash truck, it would take the city's crew only a day and a half to pick up the entire town where it

is now taking them five days. He added that the dumpsters would last for about 20 years, and could not be turned over by dogs and would not collect water during rains.

The council took no action on the proposal, but is looking at several possibilities.

Also during the meeting, councilmen discussed communications between the city and Intra-Tex Gas Co., which has a gas pipeline that crosses the city's pipeline. The city is talking to the company about securing gas in emergency situations such as when the gas pressure from the field now serving the city drops.

The council also made plans to auction several junk cars, office equipment and a propane tank.

The meeting adjourned until last Tuesday, when the council was to discuss the city-county work agreement.

Local Filing Deadlines Announced

Official filing deadlines for three local governing bodies, county commissioners, school board and city council, have been announced.

Positions on the school board presently held by Lynn Meador and Billy Williams will be voted on during the election. Those interested have to file before Feb. 6 in the school superintendent's office.

On the city council, seats held now by Vida Mercer, Bobby Sykes, and Ray Lewis Ballew will be opened. The last day to file applications for candidacy is Feb. 5.

Four positions on the Hospital district will be voted on during the elections, those presently held by Robert W. Page, E.C. "Pete" Peters, Mike More and Curtis An-

draws.

Those wishing to file on the hospital district board must present a petition with ten legally qualified voters to the secretary of the Board of Directors, Peters, by March 11. Peters office is in Meadors - Peters Agency across from the Courthouse.

There will be four county positions open during the 1980 election, sheriff, tax assessor-collector and commissioners of precincts one and three. Presently those positions are held by Orval Edmiston, Dorothy Evans, Richard Jones and Joe Christian, respectively. Anyone wishing to run for any of these offices has to file before Feb. 4 with Dick Preston.

Positions on the school board, city council and hospital district will be April 5 and elections for the county positions will be May 3.

Land, Building, Roads Discussed By Court

Several items were discussed during the Commissioners Court Monday, including school land in Gaines County, overtime for road employees, the new law enforcement center, and the sale of two acres of land.

Architects representing Atkinson and Atkinson met with the court to present final plans for the law enforcement center. The court reviewed the plans and is making plans for advertising for bids in the near future.

Commissioner Joe Christian noted that several roads should be paved but the work needed to be done shortly after moisture had fallen. He added that a lot of work could be done on Saturday if rain had fallen on Friday and asked if the

The court also agreed to allow the Woman's Club to plant a pecan tree on the corner of the courthouse square across from the city hall. The club plants a tree somewhere in town as a yearly project.

The court also raised the price of leasing land on county-owned property in Gaines County, and agreed to sell over two acres of land in this county to the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. The land was sold for \$2,000 an acre and is located behind the present DHPT barn on the Menard Highway.

The year's holidays were set by the court. They will be Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's.

The court also made its annual jail inspection.

No bids were received on the deputy's car; therefore, the court will readvertise for bids which will be opened during their next meeting Jan. 28. Also during that meeting, the court will discuss the city-county agreement.

Focus On Small Business

As a small business person I've often thought about trying to sell my products to the Federal Government. Do you have any tips on how I might go about it?

Uncle Sam is the world's biggest buyer. Military and civilian agencies buy everything from complex space vehicles to paper clips and also buy a wide variety of services--from janitorial help to technical studies. The Federal Government also contracts for construction projects, including housing, offices, warehouses, bridges and dams. It buys from giant corporations and small businesses like your own. In fact, under President Carter the government has set up special programs to buy more from small firms.

A small firm wanting to sell to Uncle Sam must get its name on appropriate lists of bidders. Even before that, you must find out which agencies buy what goods or services. A good source for this information is the Small Business Administration's publication called "U.S. Government Purchasing Sales and Directory."

Copies may be purchased from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402. Stock No. 1978-247-747. Cost is \$4.00. Another source is the business Service Centers of the General Services Administration, which lists purchases of agencies buying a long list of equipment and supplies. These GSA centers are in Atlanta, Boston, Chicago, Fort Worth, Denver, Kansas City, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Philadelphia, Seattle, New York City and Washington.

Also, the Commerce Department publishes "Commerce Business Daily," listing, among other things, proposed Government purchases and subcontracting leads. Reference copies of the Daily are available at SBA offices. Or the Daily can be purchased from the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402. Annual subscription of \$105.00 first class and \$80.00 second class mail.

Specifications and standards for items bought by military and civilian agencies may be obtained from the Naval Publications and Forms Center, 5801 Tabor Avenue, Philadelphia Pa. 19120. The center supplies limited copies of specifications and standards without charge. After you study specifications and standards, you should request specific buying agencies and departments to place your name on appropriate bidders' lists. In your contacts with Federal agencies, write up your concern's capabilities in the clearest, most persuasive way possible. Prepare your bids and proposals with utmost care.

The Small Business Administration works closely with Federal purchasing agencies and with the Nation's leading private contractors to develop policies and programs that enable small businesses to win greater Federal contracts. SBA also provides a range of services to small firms to help them win Federal contracts and subcontracts. SBA works to see that Federal contracts have certain "set aside" items specifically earmarked to go to small firms.

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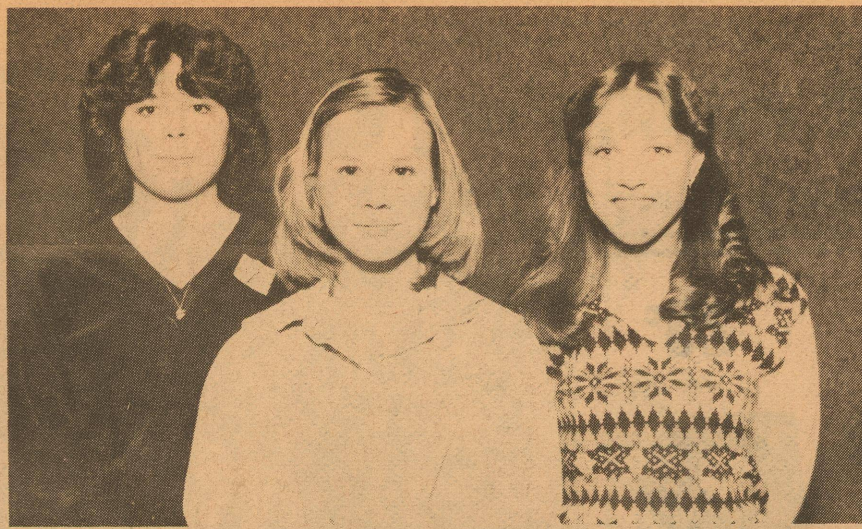

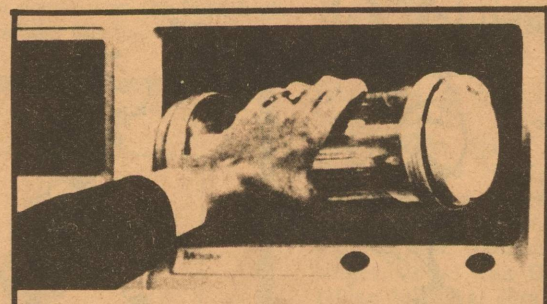
