
The camp provides for over 3000 boys in Texas at no cost to the boys or the parents.

We arrived at London's Gatwick airport around 11:30 Tuesday morning and were soon met by Sue Edwards, our AIFS tour guide. The rest of the day was free to get settled into out new home for a week. 



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From City Hall

The City has finally received the shipment of special re-set regulators for gas users who have open face heaters. Although the City is considering a contract with Producers Gas Company to supply emergency fuel during cold periods, persons using open face heaters may request that their regulators be changed by City crews as an extra precautionary measure. The newer models of heaters have an automatic safety device that will not allow gas to pass with out adjustment once the pilot has These re-set gone out. regulators will be limited to persons with the older type heaters. There will be no charge for changing the regulators; however, there is a limited number of them available so they will be installed on a first-come,

first-serve basis. Did you know that our Cityb water is tested each month by the State Health Department? Due to the quality of our water, you may feel the water should not be tessted: however, an employee of the City is required by the State to gather samples, label them, and take them in person to San Angelo. If a sample fails, even due to contar nation of the container, they must be resubmitted until they pass.

Eldorado has really good quality water for which we can be thankful. Very seldom does a sample fail.

Because of increased unauthorized dumping, the Landfill is now open 7 days a week. Mrs. Claudyne Yocham and Gavino Castro, attendants, and Ted Yocham, who is in control of operating the City Caterpillar to cover refuse, really have their hands full during the spring and summer months. Even though their positions might be considered unglamorous, they are very important in the operation of the landfill - a necessity. The job is not as easy as it might seem. The City must operate the landfill under Federal

Air Control Board and Stare

Health Department regulations and keep our permits current. Recently the Federal Air Control Board reminded City officials of regulations governing the landfill. One stipulation is "No burning of oils, Asphaltic materials or vehicle tires." Another limits the burning of refuse to specific times of the day as well as only when the wind is from the South or Southwest. The wind must not be blowing less than 6 mph nor more than 23 mph during the burn period. Many times City employees find that someone has illegally entered the area and set refuse on fire. This not only violates the City permit regulations but endangers crop and pasture land adjoining the landfill. Only City personnel are allowed to start any fire. Citizens are discouraged from bringing vehicle tires to the landfill as the City must not burn them and does not have room in which to bury them. Therefore, the City must find a market for them. A dealer who sells to Pemex Oil in Mexico stated that he would pick up the tires as they are worth approximately 6 gallons of gasoline when used as fuel in Mexico. The Mexican government must not have a Federal Air Control Board! They can wisely use this source of fuel which is wasted in the United States.

Another note about the Landfill - please do not send rocks to the landfill. They fill the pits quickly and will soon cause us to have another pit dug. Citizens burning their trash may soom find themselves without a trash truck - as the fire re-ignites in the truck and several times the new truck's safety has been jeopardized. That would be \$32,000 of taxpayer's money going up in smoke! Trash cans showing evidence of recent burning will be left by the attendants no questions asked!
