Varsity Boys Win Second

JV Eagles Win District Track Meet Here

Mother Nature held on to her beautiful weather last Friday, just long enough for high school tracksters to participate in their district meet held here. However, she turned her back to junior high school students, bringing in severely cold weather and snow on Saturday, causing the junior high meet to be postponed until this week.

But with fair skies prevailing Friday, the Eldorado junior varsity boys won their portion of the meet with 144 points. Junction came in

second with 112, Reagan County was third with 91, Mason had 87 for fourth place, Menard was fifth with 42 and Wall had 16 points for sixth place.

In the varsity boys competition, Junction was first with 121 points, Eldorado was second with 96 points, Reagan County third with 78, Mason was fourth with 77 points, Wall had 74 for fifth place and Menard was sixth with 40 points.

Junction girls won first in the girls division with 161 points. Mason girls had 121 points for second and Eldorado's Eaglettes had 76 points for third place. Wall had 73 points for fourth, Reagan County had 55 points for fifth and Menard had 23 points for sixth place.

Highlighting the meet were several new records, including several made by local boys.

In the junior varsity boys long jump, Brad Thomas was first with a 19 foot, 11 3/4 inch jump. Eagle Kirk Griffin also broke a new record in the jv pole vault with a 11 foot, six inch accomplishment. Thomas also set a new record in the 300 intermediate hurdles with a 42.9 timing.

Highlighting the meet were several new records, including several made by local boys. In the junior varsity boys long jump, Brad Thomas was first with a 19 feet, 11 3/4 inch jump to set a new record. Kirk Griffin also broke a record in the jv pole vault with an 11 foot, six inch accomplishment. Thomas also set a new record in the 300 intermediate hurdles with a 42.9 timing.

Reagan County's Thomas Baker set a new record of 117 foot, 11 1/2 inches in the discus. Brian Eppler of Mason won the high jump with a six foot, two inch mark for a new record.

Eddie Montalvo won fifth in the discus, and Gene Edmiston won third in the pole vault. James Woodward won sixth in the high jump, fourth in the 400 meter dash and sixth in the pole vault. In the long jump, Greg Davidson won third and Raul Gonzales won fourth.

Gonzales also won fourth in the 200 meter dash.

In the 110 meter hurdles, Ashley Niblett won first, followed by Montalvo, third and Jeff Harlin, fourth.

Clint Baumgardner won fourth in the 800 meter dash and Floyd Fay won fifth. Greg Davidson won third in the 100 meter dash and Gonzales won fourth.

Niblett won third in the 300 intermediate hurdles and Montalvo won sixth. Jimmy Lloyd won first in the 1600 meter run, while Kelly Kerr won fourth and Baumgardner won sixth.

The 400 meter relay team of Davidson, Thomas, Gonzales and Harlin won second with a 46.7 timing to set a new school record.

The mile relay team of Davidson, Griffin, Thomas and Harlin won second.

VARSITY BOYS

Only one new record was set by varsity boys running events, which was in the 1600 meter run. Ken Akers of Junction set a record of 4:45.57 for the district. Close behind him was Danny Pina of Eldorado who had a 4:53.08 run.

Tommy Martinez won third in the 200 meter run while teammates John Paul Joiner and Randy Morrison came in third and fourth in the 300 meter intermediate hurdles, respectively.

The last few minutes of the district junior high track meet were tense ones as the Eldorado eighth grade girls lost out on a first place win by four and a half points to the Reagan County girls team. The local girls were trailing in second place by three points and needed to beat the Owlettes in the final event, the 1200 meter relay. However, the Big Lake girls came out ahead and took a first place standing with 130 points. Eldorado had 125 1/2 points for second; Junction had 108 points for third; Mason had 85 1/2 points for fourth; wall had 42 for fifth and sixth went to Menard with 24 points.

In the seventh grade girls competition, first went to Junction with 187 points; second went to Wall with 169 points; third went to Reagan County with 87 points; fourth went to Eldorado with 38 points; fifth went to Mason with 27 points and sixth went to Menard with 17 points.

Commissioners Purchase Radar System Monday

Schleicher County Commissioners agreed to purchase a new radar system for the Department of Public Safety patrolman Buster Lamb during their meeting Monday. They purchased a radar system from Vindicator Inc. from Missouri City which includes all equipment and training for \$3,150.00.

The Court also agreed to increase deputy county and district clerk Maria Tobias's salary by \$150.00 a month, which is effective May 1. They will also advertise to increase the salary of justice of the peace

Frank Bradley from \$8,814.36 a year to \$11,214.36 a year. The salary will be officially set May 12 and will become effective June 1.

The court also voted to accept a grant from the Law Enforcement Administration Criminal Justice Department for supplies and radio equipment for the new law enforcement center. The LEAA will pay 75 percent of the price and the county will pay 25 percent, a total of \$4534.

The court discussed airport policy and reviewed the county treasurer's report.

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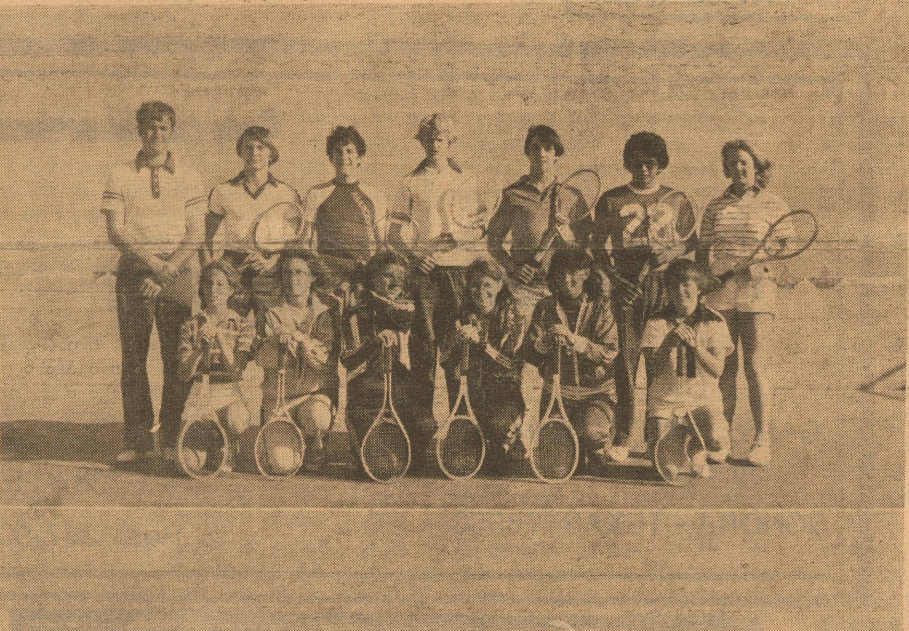
