Three Men Running For Board

Three men have filed to run for two open positions on the school board. Incumbents Billy Williams and Lynn Meador have filed as well as Dan Griffin who had been on the board several years ago.

Williams was born and raised here and is a farmer and rancher. A past member of the Army Reserves, he and his wife Peggy, have three children, Jeff Leggett, Doug Leggett and Kelly Leggett, who all live in Eldorado.

"I want to see the building program completed and help maintain the quality of education at our school," explained Williams.

Griffin is also a native of Eldorado, who returned to his hometown in 1964 to open a Gulf Station. Today he is owner and operator of Griffin Oil, on the Mertzson Highway. He and his wife, Judy, have three children, Curtis, Craig and Kelly and one granddaughter.

"I am interested in a good school system and whatever is right for the students," said Griffin. "And I am in favor of supporting the school system and whatever it takes to make it good. I support the faculty

and the school."

Meador is also a native of Eldorado and a graduate of Southern Methodist University with a bachelor of business administration in field and finance and real estate. Holding a teaching certificate from Angelo State University, he taught junior high social studies in the local school system for four years. In 1973, he joined his father in Meador Land Company and then went into the real estate business. He had been on the school board for six years, is a member of the Eldorado Lions Club, First Methodist Church and the Schleicher County Emergency Service.

Meador says the board should

have four top priorities. The first being to "provide the best education facility for our children, a good and up-to-date facility with the best personnel. The second priority is to be aware of teacher's welfare and as a former teacher, he knows the wants and needs of teachers and school personnel. Thirdly, he wants to see the building program "carried through to the goals we have set up for it." Last of all, Meador says he feels the school is in a "state of change due to outside factors such as state and federal standards and requirements, and the board should be aware of the factors involved in carrying out the business of the school."

Chamber Names Committee

The newly reorganized Eldorado Chamber of Commerce appointed a steering committee to begin a membership drive during the meeting held last week. Carolyn Mayo, Rusty Meador, Ron Sutto and Johnny Griffin were named as members of the committee.

They and other members of the new chamber will be contacting

Six Persons File For Four Places On Hospital Board

Six persons have filed for four open places on the board of directors of Schleicher County Medical Center. Filing for the places are incumbents Mike Moore, Curtis Andrews, and E.C. "Pete" Peters, as well as Sam Henderson Jr., Joseph A. Andrews and Dawn Meador.

Curtis Andrews is a native of Dallas where he attended high school. He worked three years in Dallas for an oil company and was transferred to Shreveport, La., where he served as general accountant and later as manager of the equipment department. He then sold office machines for five years and began work with a tile firm in Shreveport and later in Palestine, serving one year as president of a subsidiary company. He affiliated with Ratliff Insurance Agency and Kerbow Funeral Home here ten years ago, and has served as secretary and president of the Eldorado Lions Club. He and his wife, Billie, have two children, Linda Bentley of Magnolia, Ark., and Nick Andrews of New York City and two grandchildren.

Andrews, who has served as a director for the past six years, states he would like to remain on the board to "assist in programs already initiated to up-date hospital equipment and enlarge the clinic so that this community can continue to have the best hospital and nursing home care available."

Peters is a native of Oconomowoc, Wisc., where he attended school. He served four and a half years in the Army Air Force during World War II. He has been a resident of Schleicher County for the past 33 years. He is self-employed in insurance and has been an active real estate agent for the past 20 years. He and his wife, Francis,

have two children, Kay of Portland, Oregon and Ken Peters of Jourdanon and one granddaughter, Whitney.

Peters states he has always been interested in and worked make Schleicher County a better place to live. He has served as president of the Chamber of Commerce and during his term of office, several improvements were made, with the biggest project being the promotion of the hospital and securing a resident doctor. "I feel that great improvements have been made during the past six years that I have served on the board as the hospital is now in sound financial condition. New and better equipment has been purchased and other improvements are planned to provide the citizens of Schleicher County the best medical care that can be provided in a rural community."

Moore moved here with his parents in 1950. He graduated from high school here and from Texas Christian University in Fort Worth with a bachelor of business administration degree. He returned to Schleicher County to go into the farming and ranching business. He is a member of the Baptist Church, on the Agriculture Service Committee for seven years and on the hospital board for six years. He and his wife, Becky, have two children, Michelle and Brent.

"I enjoy working with the doctors and Miss Kroeger," he said, adding, "I want to be a part of the continued growth of the hospital and think the new addition will be an asset to the community."

Mrs. Meador is a native of Detroit, Mich., where she received a bachelor of science degree and a master of business education degree from Michigan State University. She has worked in Atlanta, Ga., as a buyer and then for a "medical and

dental corporation in Houston, Phoenix and California. She is married to Rusty Meador and has one son, Regan, and is teaching Aerobic dancing.

"Rusty and I like living here and I want to become active in the community. I have a background in medical and dental management and want to see that good health service is maintained during the upcoming growth of the community."

Joseph Andrews is a native of Fredericksburg where he graduated from high school. He attended North Texas State University and served five years with the U.S. Air Force. He has worked for General Telephone for the past one and a half years, and is in charge of installing and repairing phones in all of Schleicher County and Christoval. He and his wife, Jan, have two daughters, Teressa and Joslynnnda.

He is a member of the volunteer fire department and an elder of the First Presbyterian Church.

Andrews said he felt "the hospital served the community well, medically speaking, and would like to see the hospital modernize its facilities and services."

Henderson is a native of Eldorado and graduated from Angelo State University with a degree in business. He worked at First National Bank for a short while and then began working for Northern natural Gas Company. He also ranches and is in the windmill and pump business which he just began. The father of a son and daughter, Houston and Amy, he is married to the former Karen Griffin. He is a member of the Jaycees and enjoys hunting and fishing.

"I want to run for the hospital board to get involved," he commented, "I think I can give a lot of input in the board and have some ideas for the hospital."
