

# Games Will Highlight Schleicher County Days

Plans have been finalized for the games and contests to be held along with Schleicher County Days. It will be necessary to register for each contest at least 30 minutes before the contest is scheduled to begin. A registration table will be set up inside the Memorial Building for registration and entry fees. Mrs. Anne Hyde will be in charge of registration. All of the following events will take place on the courthouse lawn or parking lot in front of the Memorial Building. The following contests will be held:

1. Ladies' washer toss, ladies' horse shoe pitch, mens' washer toss and mens' horse shoe pitch.

Candy Richards is serving as chairman of these four events. They will start at 11 a.m. so you need to be there by 10:30 a.m. to register. Entry fee is one dollar per person. Two people need to enter as a team.

We still need quite a bit of help with these categories so if you are willing to help, please call Candy Richards.

2. The second contest, Jalapena Pepper Eating, will start at 12 noon on the sidewalk behind the Memorial Building. T.P. Robinson is serving as the chairman of this event for the

second year.

3. Following a delicious lunch we hope to have a large number of entries in the Tobacco Spitting Contest. Johnny Griffin has once again agreed to be chairman. Entry fee is one dollar per person. There will be age divisions for the contest this year, ten years of age and younger, 11-16 years of age and 16 years and older.

This contest will start promptly at 1 p.m. Entrants need to bring their own tobacco. Trophies will be awarded in each age division.

4. At 1:30 p.m. we will have the first Cow-chip throwing contest with Jimmy Martin serving as chairman. This contest will be determined on accuracy rather than distance. A bulls-eye will be placed on the ground and the chip landing closest to the bulls-eye will win the contest. Jimmy has very graciously offered to furnish the cow-chips so all you have to do is register by 1 p.m. Entry fee for this contest is one dollar per person. Trophies will be awarded to the winners.

5. Starting at 2:30 p.m. Jerry Swift will again be running the toe sack races. There is no entry fee for this event and it will be run by age

divisions starting out with five year olds up to 14 years and older. A first, second and third place ribbon will be awarded all contestants. You do not have to pre-register for this contest.

6. The tricycle set is encouraged to bring their tricycles for the first annual tricycle race. Bob Lester will be serving as chairman of this event. There will be categories for three, four, and five year olds. This race will be run in front of the Memorial Building. There is no entry fee and ribbons will be awarded to the first, second, and third place winners in each category as well as participant ribbons to all contestants. This is the first year for this event. You do not need to pre-register for this contest.

7. Due to popular demand, Richard McCarson has agreed to be chairman of the "ugly-face" contest. There will be four age divisions for this contest: eight years and younger, 9-12 yrs.; 13-16 yrs. and 17 and older. The object of the contest is to see who can make the ugliest face. Richard has promised to come

9. The final contest for the day will be the "tug-of-war". This contest is for teams of four and will be divided into a men's and ladies' division. Entry fee for the contest is

A long-time Eldorado resident and Schleicher County agriculture Agent, William Grady "Tiny" Godwin died Monday in Ruidosa, N.M. after suffering a heart attack.

Services have been set for 10 a.m. today (Thursday) at First Baptist Church. Burial will be in Eldorado Cemetery under direction of Kerbow Funeral Home.

Mr. Godwin was born Feb. 6, 1911 at Chappell in San Saba County. He married Martha E. Cowart in Wichita Falls June 24, 1935. He moved to Eldorado from Coleman Feb. 15, 1937.

He served with the fifth corps and combat engineers in the armed forces during World War II in the European Theatre, and then Africa, Sicily, Italy, and France for two years.

A member of the Masonic Lodge and Order of the Eastern Star, he was also a member of the First United Methodist Church.

He was preceded in death by three sisters and three brothers and survived by his wife of Eldorado and several nieces and nephews.

# From The County Agent

In a wet crop year such as 1981 has been up to now, cotton often makes a lot of vegetative growth and not much else. But use of a growth regulator can provide some relief of that problem.

"Pix, a growth regulator developed several years ago, holds a lot of promise for cotton, particularly in a wet year," points out Dr. Bob Metzger, cotton specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"When applied as the first few white blooms appear, Pix reduces plant

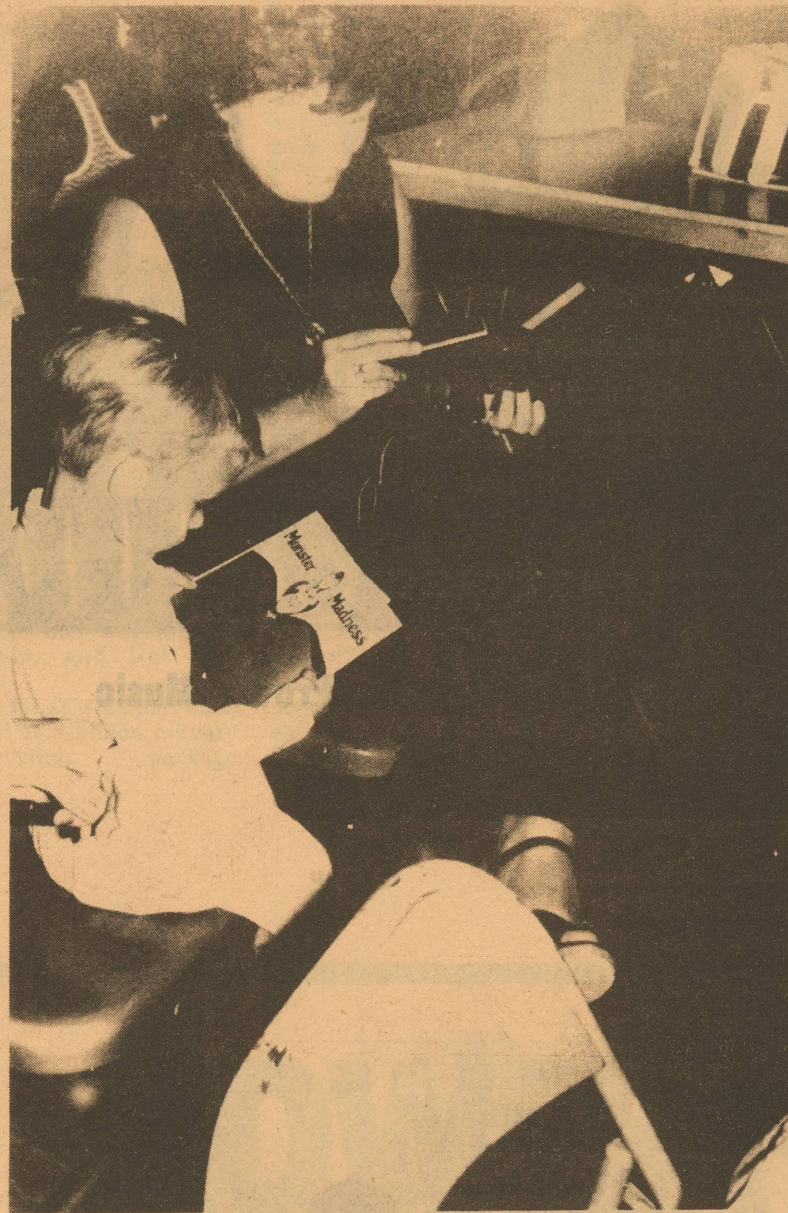
height, increases lateral branching, and makes for a more uniform cotton crop," explains the specialist.

This growth regulator has been used in studies involving both picker and stripper variety cottons throughout Texas, notes Metzger. Lint yields were equal or higher than untreated plots when adequate moisture was available during the early bloom period. However, Metzger cautions that using the product when cotton is under moisture stress can reduce yields.

In addition to having the potential for improving yields, Pix creates a more

uniform crop that enables more effective defoliation as farmers get ready to harvest. Furthermore, harvesting efficiency is increased due to the crop's uniformity, says the specialist.

"Field demonstrations and studies this year with Pix should provide a wealth of information because of the kind of weather conditions we've had," notes Metzger. "We will be able to get some good comparisons between treated and non-treated fields, and this information will help us develop better guidelines for using the product in the future."

Members of OES and Masons presented a program about the Eldorado group.

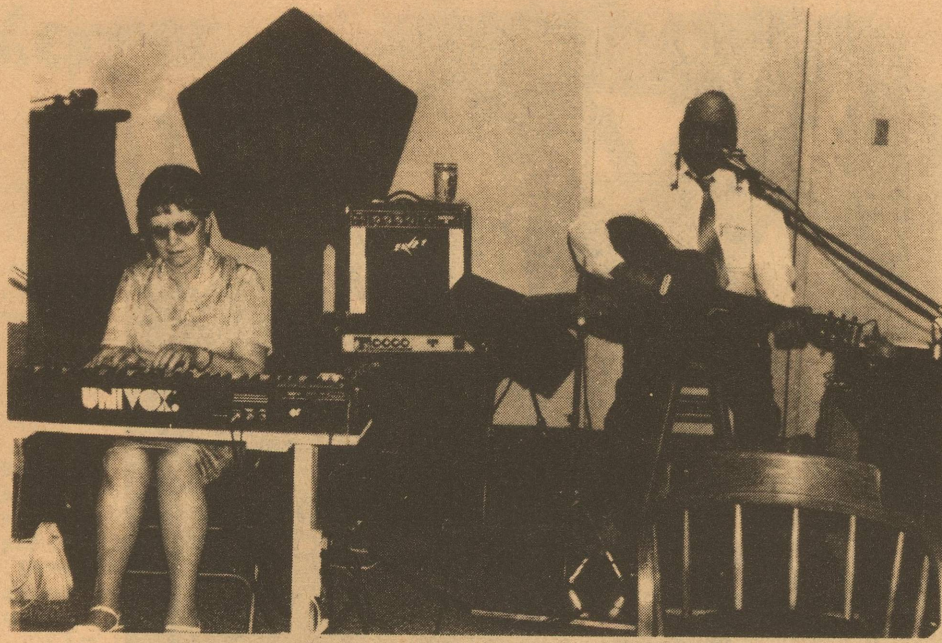
Worthy matron Mary Sofge introduced distinguished members, Nancy Bailey Allen past grand matron of the grand chapter of Texas OES and

# Medicare Covers Nursing Care

Medicare Hospital Insurance can cover care in a skilled nursing facility for people in the San Angelo area when eligibility conditions are met, Frank Upp, social security District Manager in San Angelo said recently.

Hospital insurance covers post-hospital care in a skilled nursing facility that takes part in Medicare when all of the following conditions are met:

--The patient was in a hospital for at least 3 days

in a row, not counting day of discharge.

--The Patient is transferred to the skilled nursing facility because he or she needs further care for a condition which was treated in the hospital.

--The patient is admitted to the facility within a short time, usually 14 days after leaving the hospital.

--A doctor certifies that skilled nursing or skilled rehabilitation services are needed and being received on a daily basis.

--The facility's utilization review committee or the professional standards review organizations does not disapprove the stay.

When all of these conditions are met, hospital insurance can pay for care for up to a maximum of 100 days in each benefit period, but only if the care is needed for that length of time.

Hospital insurance pays all of the costs of covered services for the first 20 days and all but \$25.50 for up to 80 more days. For more information about the eligibility conditions and the services Medicare can cover, contact the San Angelo Social Security Office. The people there will be glad to answer any questions. The office is located at 2214 Sherwood Way, and the telephone number is 949-3718.

# School Pre-Registration Dates Set

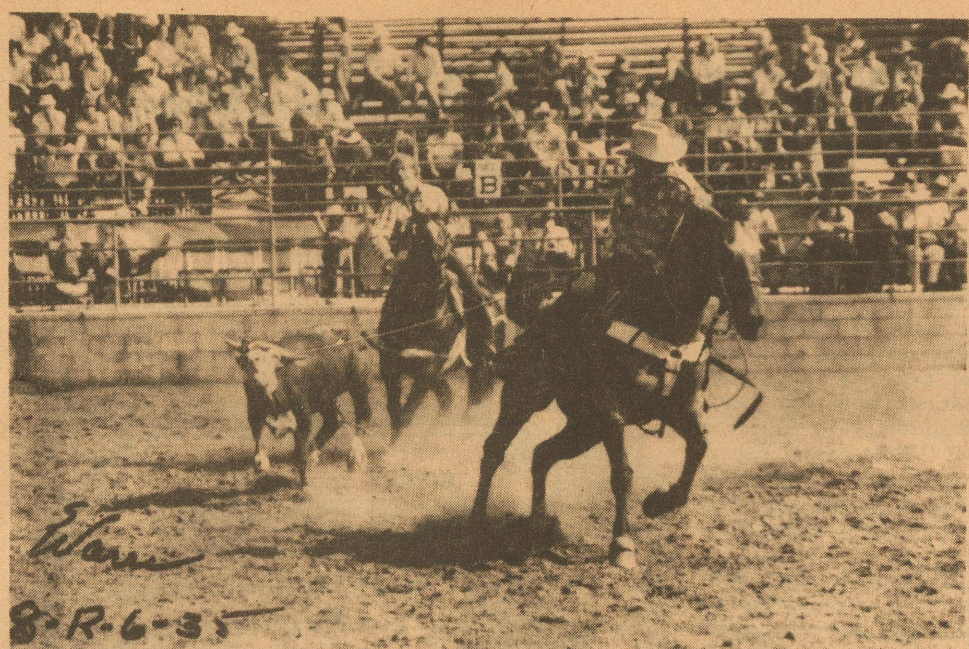
Pre-registration dates for students in the Eldorado school system have been announced by high school principal Richard McCarson and elementary principal Richard Richey.

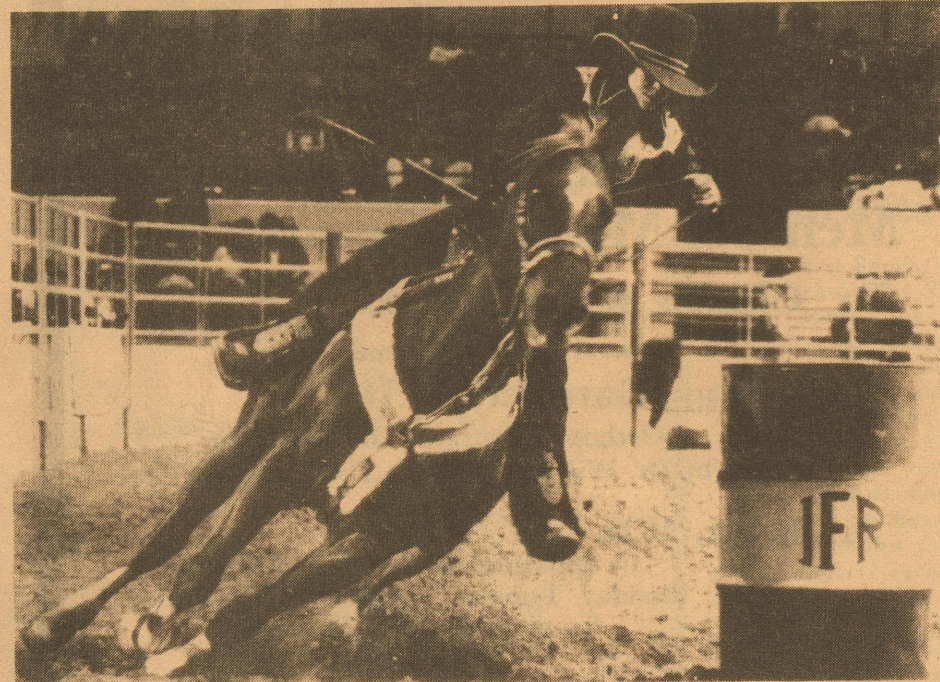

## Cotton Council Calls For Realistic Trade Policy

The National Cotton Council has called for a "realistic" trade policy that provides for expanded international trade under conditions mutually acceptable and beneficial to both exporting and importing countries.

In testimony filed here this week with Senate committees conducting joint oversight hearings on U.S. trade policy, the Council cited the Multifiber Arrangement and its bilateral examples of realistic policy.

"They provide for expanded trade...yet at the same time, they give some order to international textile and apparel trade so that it will not unduly damage the importing country's textile and apparel industries," the Council stated.

The industrywide cotton organization said this system could possibly be used to resolve some of the nation's other significant and delicate trade issues.

"Free trade is a myth in today's world," the Council said. "It is based on the premise that government regulations, monetary conditions, labor, capital, transportation, etc., are relatively similar in all countries. This is not the case now, nor is it likely to be in the future."

The Council said the U.S. should work toward more liberalized international trade on a fair and reciprocal basis without undermining or weakening its own economy.

Appropriate federal action, for example, should be taken to provide reasonable restraints against foreign imports that are disrupting or threatening to disrupt important sectors of the national economy. Import restraint is especially needed, the Council added, when the domestic industry is required by government to install expensive safety and health

equipment not required of its foreign competition.

Attention was also called to the proposal by the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development for an international cotton agreement which would include production controls, export quotas, floor and ceiling prices, and an international buffer stock.

The Council warned that this would be contrary to trade liberalization, would undermine the market-oriented U.S. farm program and would inevitably lead to limited U.S. raw cotton exports.

To increase the nation's exports, the cotton organization called for efforts to: 1. Reduce other countries' non-tariff trade barriers, 2. expand and improve the DISC program, 3. provide non-subsidized export credit and 4. correct inequitable taxation of U.S. citizens stationed abroad by exporting organizations.

# Loeffler Announces Funds Approval

Congressman Tom Loeffler today announced that the House Appropriations Committee approved more than \$26.7 million military construction funds for Air Force and Army components in San Angelo, San Antonio, and Del Rio, Texas.

The funds were part of an overall \$6.9 billion military construction package

approved by the House committee for fiscal year 1982.

Texas military facilities statewide received approval for more than \$125 million in construction-related funding in the committee action.

Loeffler was successful in having the committee accept his amendment to earmark \$500,000 in funds to plan and design new cryptological and personal

facilities at Goodfellow Air Force Base in San Angelo.

The bases and projects receiving funding approval include \$3.5 million for an unaccompanied enlisted personnel housing facility at Kelly Air Force Base; and \$6.7 million for enlisted housing at Lackland AFB as well as \$2.2 million for a marksmanship training building.

Brooks AFB won ap-

proval for \$3.1 million for cooling/heating/air-conditioning projects while Randolph AFB received \$2.3 million for improvements at its Seguin, Texas, auxiliary field and \$990,000 for data processing improvements.

Laughlin AFB in Del Rio received \$1 million for a data processing facility, also.

In addition, the Committee approved \$1.7 million

for a "composite squad operations" for the Air National Guard at Kelly; \$1.7 million for an aeromedical evacuation training facility for the Air Force Reserve at Kelly and \$2.3 million for a fuel systems maintenance dock.

The Army Reserve in San Antonio received \$1.3 million to upgrade its maintenance shop operations.

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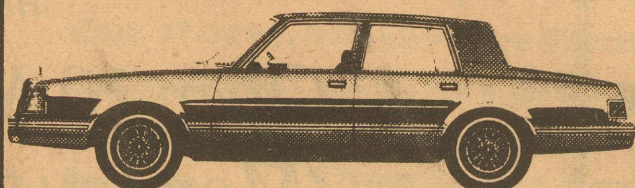

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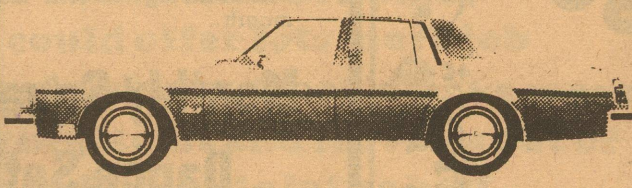
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# Nocona and Justin Boot Companies Plan Merger

## Farm Bureau Asks For More Control

The Texas Farm Bureau has asked the federal government to strengthen the quarantine on fruits and vegetables from the Mediterranean fruit fly-infested quarantine area of northern California.

"The spray area should be expanded to include a one-and-a-half mile buffer zone around all areas in which medflies have been found," TFB President Carrol Chaloupka said in a telegram to President Reagan. The Texas farm leader also told the President: "We are in complete agree-

ment with your decision to deny the request of California Governor Jerry Brown Jr. to declare fruit fly-infested areas a federal disaster area. "We believe that the California governor has contributed to the spread of the fruit fly. We feel his actions have jeopardized an important part of the nation's food supply. In our opinion, he and the misguided so-called environmentalists of his state have permitted the spread of the infestation through their inaction.

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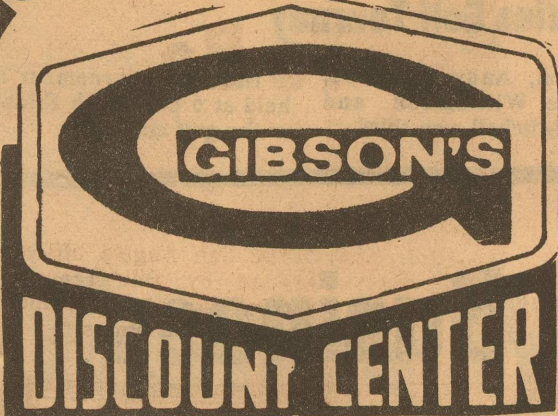

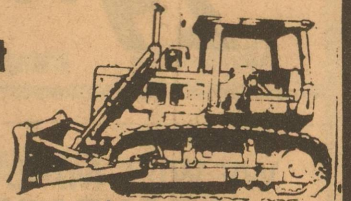

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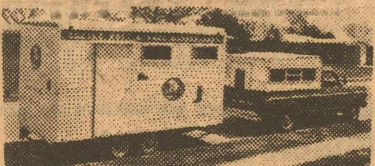
