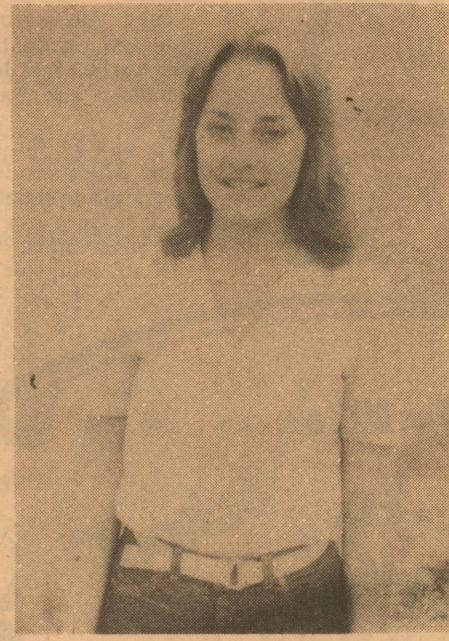

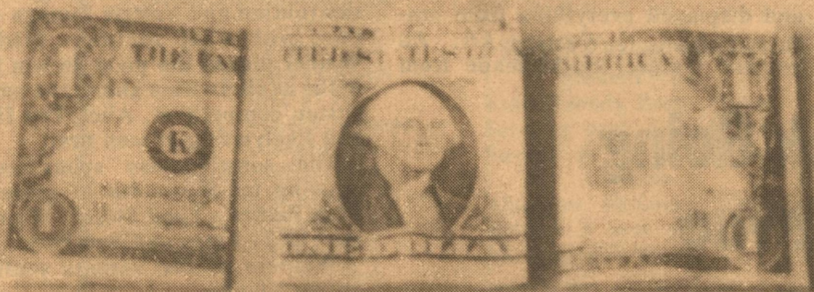

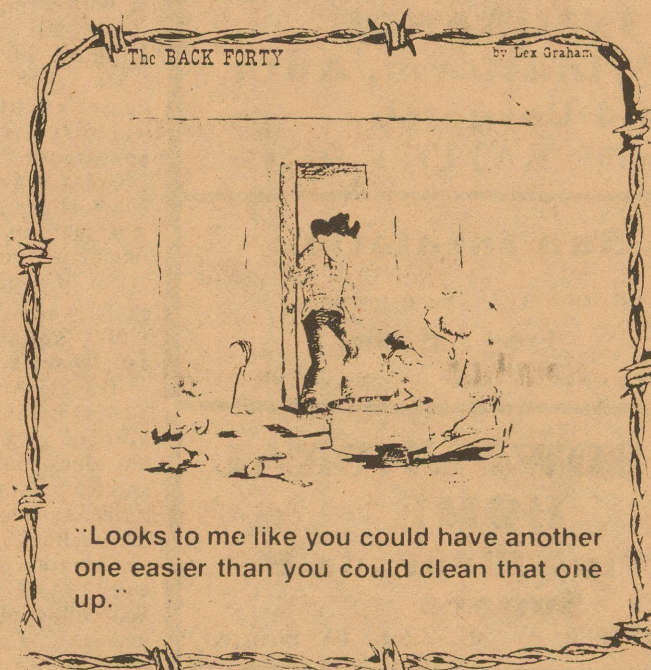
## Gifted Student Program Set

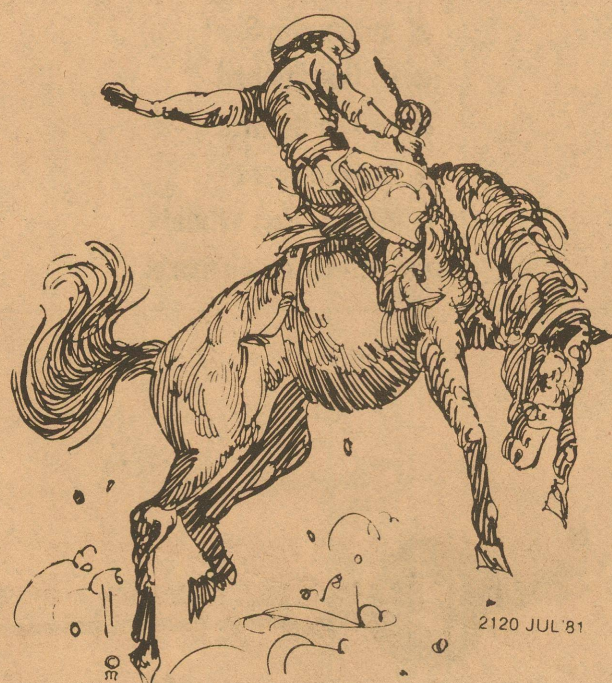

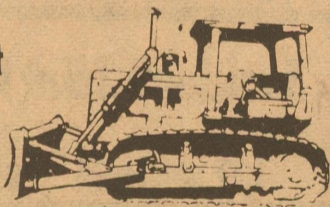

Summer means hot weather in Texas along with outdoor sports and long lazy days. It also means lawn problems--drought, weeds, insects and disease.

Lawn problems can cause headaches for homeowners unless the problems are accurately diagnosed and properly treated before they become severe.

Dry spots, thin turf and weeds can result from improper watering, fertilizing and mowing practices. Before applying a chemical to correct lawn problems, be sure to follow recommended cultural practices.

Drought stress most often occurs in mid-summer and shows up as wilted, discolored turf. Adjust watering schedules to wet the soil to a depth of four to six inches, and water only when grass shows symptoms of moisture stress. Also, raise mowing heights one-half inch to improve drought tolerance in mid-summer.

Lack of nitrogen or iron often creates a lawn problem. Grass with a nitrogen deficiency may have a pale color and be heavily infested with weeds. Abundant seedheads are another symptom of nitrogen deficiency. A light application of a nitrogen fertilizer will improve the lawn's appearance.

Grass leaves that have yellow stripes parallel to the leaf margins may be deficient in iron. An application of iron sulfate or iron chelate at six ounces per 1,000 square feet will usually solve this problem.

If a St. Augustine lawn has symptoms similar to nitrogen or iron deficiency but does not respond to applications of either material, suspect St. Augustine Decline (S.A.D.). Close examination of turf infested with S.A.D. shows green and yellow blotches on the leaves. Continue good maintenance practices where S.A.D. is a problem. Also, Floratam, a new St. Augustine grass variety which is resistant to S.A.D., may be sprigged into the infested area.

Leaf spot diseases are generally a problem when lawns are under stress and increase with high temperatures, drought, heavy shade and close mowing. Proper mowing and watering will reduce these problems, but fungicides may be required to prevent serious damage.

Chinch bugs and white grubs feed heavily on lawns during mid-summer, and their damage resembles drought injury. If turf does not respond to applications of water, suspect these insects. Both pests damage St. Augustinegrass, but only the white grub dam-

ages bermudagrass lawns.

Chinch bugs and white grubs can be effectively controlled with insecticides. Water the lawn thoroughly prior to applying an insecticide for chinch bug control. A light watering after applying the insecticide also increases its effectiveness.

The best way to keep a healthy, attractive lawn is through proper mowing, watering and fertilization. These regular maintenance practices allow you to keep a check on lawn conditions so that you'll be able to detect a problem early should one develop.

White grub worms that hatch from eggs laid by May or June beetles will soon be feeding on roots of bermudagrass and St. Augustinegrass in home lawns. Once grubs begin feeding, control measures should be taken.

Treatment time varies with the particular area of the state and ranges from early July in South Texas to mid-August in the Panhandle. Homeowners in Schleicher County will need to treat before August 15. Timing of application is critical for adequate control.

White grubs in excessive numbers can heavily damage lawns. Check for white grubs by cutting a square foot section of sod with a shovel and examining the roots and soil to a depth of four inches. Examine at least one square foot of sod for 1,000 square feet of lawn area. Chemical treatment is needed if there are more than four grubs per square foot of sod.

Diazinon provides adequate control and should be used at recommended rates given on the chemical container label. The granular form is easier to apply and

to wash into the soil than liquid or spray formulations. After using granules drag the grass with a tow sack or waterhose to knock them down into the soil. Then apply enough water to soak the granules into the soil.

Apply diazinon sprays at the rate of 25 gallons of water, including the insecticide, per 1,000 square feet to wash the insecticide into the soil. Wetting the lawn before spraying helps also. Always keep children and pets off the treated lawn until the grass is dry.

The key to white grub control in home lawns is proper timing of chemical applications and getting the insecticide through the grass to the root zone where grubs are feeding.

Further information is provided in the publication, "White Grubs in Texas Turfgrass," available at the county Extension office.

MARKS AND BRANDS—RECORDING AND RE-RECORDING IN ALL COUNTIES

Section 1. (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this State. In all counties each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 of Title 121 of the Revised

Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Act takes effect have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the County Clerk of the

County. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have previously been recorded or not.

(c) After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act all records of marks and brands now in existence in the County shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the County.

Section 3. All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Act shall be re-registered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Act.

This act was effective August 30, 1971.

IN ACCORDANCE WITH ATTORNEY GENERAL OPINION #MW-289, which states: "Article 6899, V.T.C.S., requires that all marks and brands registered prior to AUGUST 30, 1981, must be re-registered within six months of that date, and that the re-registration process must be repeated at subsequent ten-year intervals for then-current owners."

THE SCHLEICHER COUNTY CLERKS OFFICE will commence re-registering brands on Monday, AUGUST 31, 1981, and all brands presently on record will be held for the record owner to re-register through February 28, 1982, at which time the un-registered brands on record will become open to the general public for registering.

# Spotlight On Business

Individuals or small groups needing an office building, recreational building or even a home may be interested in what Ascot Building Corporation and its president, Larry McCommas, have to offer.

Ascot sells and builds steel buildings of all kinds and shapes, at a price that makes them very attractive, noted McCommas.

The tall Fort Worth native explained that the buildings can be either straight walled or domed, very small or gigantic. The inside can be left "as is" or finished the same as a wooden frame structure. The outside walls can be bricked or left "as is" or the building can have a

combination of both ideas.

McCommas added that the price is very attractive because the cost of labor, steel and concrete have increased two or three times in the past few years. However, these buildings are easy and fast to build; therefore, their cost is lower than regular buildings.

Since the firm has had its office in Eldorado, located on south Main, in the old James Williams office, it has sold five buildings in Schleicher County. The front structure is an office building that will include a lounge and shower for drivers, restrooms, a lobby and two offices.

Another Ascot building is for Primitive Baptist Church and is located on the northwestern edge of Eldorado. Ascot built the shell of the building and did the concrete work and church members will complete the inside. The building which is 30X84 feet has an auditorium on one end, a foyer, restrooms and a recreational room with a kitchen.

Another Ascot building was built on the Emmons farm south of town. It is also a 40X70 foot structure but does not have as high a dome as the Quadra building. The front of this building will be used for offices and recreation and the back half will be used for storage.

McCommas began this corporation at the first of the year after 18 years of teaching music in California.

Ascot sells products from PermaCanUs, a firm with offices in several western states. The steel is made in Canada and comes to the location in bundles. In fact, McCommas was in Canada

at the same time the Summit talks were being held.

McCommas began Ascot at the first of this year after 18 years of teaching music in universities in California. When he has not been teaching, he has been doing architectural design work for different firms.

In fact, he has just completed architectural plans for a three bedroom, two-bath home with 1440 square feet in it. "I would like to build some of these in Eldorado," he said. "They are economically ideal for young couples just starting out or for young couples."

He and his wife and their two sons returned to Texas to live in Abilene. He is on the road much of the time, beginning offices in Temple, Fort Worth, Midland, Lubbock and in the Valley. He says the reason Ascot has an office in small Eldorado is because there was a definite need for his steel buildings here. He tries to get to Eldorado at least twice a week, but messages can be sent to him at his Abilene number, 915-677-4714.

The versatile Ascot buildings will be on public display during an open house from 9 a.m. to noon Saturday Aug. 29. McCommas will be on hand for the event to explain how the buildings are built and give some price ranges for them.
