

Lab to be remodeled at cost of \$16,452.⁰⁰

The board of trustees of the Schleicher County Independent School District met in regular session Monday night.

After the call to order and approval of the minutes of the previous meeting, Mr. Ken Newman reported on the results of the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills for Eldorado students. The report showed the Schleicher County students scored in the 95th percentile in math, 97th percentile in reading and 97th percentile in writing. He also reported on the Stanford Achievement Test which was given to Kindergarten through 8th graders. The Eldorado students consistently scored above the 50 percent mark which is above average.

Superintendent Guy Whitaker was appointed by the board to be the school's representative on the Joint Committee of Region XV.

Superintendent Whitaker presented the board the Accreditation Report which they approved.

The board then turned their attention to the re-vamping of the Science Lab. The members awarded a contract to American Desk to provide

the lab with a complete biology lab at a cost of \$16,452.00.

It was decided by the board to purchase business computers for the school through Region XV.

Philip Meyer was hired by the trustees as a junior high coach. The members also reviewed several applications for the Elementary Principal's

position made vacant by Richard Richey's recent resignation.

The board authorized the sale of school buses #3 and #4. Mr. Whitaker will submit the request to TEA and have it approved, the board will then advertise the vehicles for sale.

The board voted to go on the recommendation of deferred action

concerning the painting of the ceilings. The ceilings will be painted and the work will be monitored on a periodic basis to conclude if additional work is needed.

Payment of monthly bills was approved by the trustees and with no further business the meeting was adjourned.

County Commissioners let fuel contract

The Schleicher County Commissioners met in their regularly scheduled session Monday morning June 13th.

After the minutes of the special session of May 29, 1983 were read and approved, Tom Enochs and King Terry met with the Court requesting permission to put a wire gate on the road between their places. The Court denied the request. Tom Enochs asked permission to build a fence to straighten the right of way between him and the University land. Commissioner Turner made the motion that the Court grant the request to move the fence in question as long as the right of way remains the same from one end to the other, motion was seconded by Commissioner Joy and passed unanimously.

The Court next approved and signed the Texas Parks and Wildlife Proclamation for 1984.

Commissioner Whitten made the motion that the bid of Griffin Oil and Chemical Company be given the bid on regular and unleaded gasoline and diesel #2, and Halbert Brothers Fuel be given the bid on all the oil. Commissioner Joy seconded the motion and the vote in favor was unanimous.

Joë Max Edmiston met with the Court requesting permission to install some type of barricade during the little league games to stop traffic from

driving around behind the concession stand. This was to prevent an accident to a child during the games. The Court granted Mr. Edmiston to erect the barricade.

The purchase of two siren for the two new Fords in the sheriff's

department was approved by the Court.

Commissioner Paxton made the motion that Judge Griffin be given authority to get someone to repair the roof on the concession stand at the golf course, the motion was seconded

by Commissioner Turner and passed unanimously.

The Court voted not to purchase a new lawn mower but to repair the one they now owned.

With no further business, the Court adjourned.

Could it be a two county airport

Approximately 30 people, eight of which were from Eldorado, convened at the Ozona, Civic Center last Thursday to meet with the Texas Aeronautics Commission in order to update the TAC's records and data concerning the development of this region's airports. There were representatives from Schleicher County, Sutton County, Crockett County and Reagan County.

Representing the TAC was Dana Rhyne, John Anderson, Bill Snear and George Dresser. A representative from each county's Commissioners Court brought the TAC representatives up to date on where their airport

stood as well as to the condition of economics and growth rate in their specific area. The TAC representatives informed the meetings attendants of where they projected their aeronautic industry to be and what they would like each individual airport to have accomplished in order to better service it's specific needs as well as the needs of the TAC for the future.

Each county's airport was then discussed at length to make everyone aware of it's inefficiencies in the TAC's concept of safe landing strips and what each county needed to do to comply with the TAC standards.

Population growth was projected for each county and how the overall air traffic patterns for Texas would affect this specific area. At one point during the dialogue representatives from Schleicher County's Commissioners Court and the flying portion of the community discussed with TAC representatives and members of the Sutton County Commissioners Court and their respective pilots the possibilities of combining forces to develop a common airport for Sutton and Schleicher Counties. It appeared to be the apparent conclusion of the groups involved that a mutual meeting should be set up in which this train of thought could be continued further.

Kelly had a cumulative grade point of 3.21 over a four year period. She graduated from Sweetwater High School in 1979.



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WTU wants rate hike

West Texas Utilities Company has filed for a general increase in its electric rates for retail customers.

Brown to speak Sunday

Rev. Fred Brown, Minister of the First United Methodist Church, will speak Sunday night at 7:00 p.m. at the First Christian Church. Rev. Brown is the third speaker in the series "The most important thing in the Bible to me is..."

Reeves said the application, filed Friday, is a systemwide request for higher rates. Simultaneous filings were made in all incorporated towns and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas at Austin for increase in rural areas, unincorporated towns and in incorporated towns which have ceded jurisdiction over electric rates.

So far, a total of 19 Municipalities served by WTU have opted to let the PUC analyze rate requests and to make decisions for them. These are Albany, Chillicathe, Dickens, Eldorado, Goree, Hedley, Lakeview, Matador, McCamey, Mertzon, Moran, Paint Rock, Roaring Springs, Robert Lee, Roby, Rotan, Rule Trent, and

Weinert. WTU has filed complete information about the rate request with each of these towns.

The principal reasons cited for the new rate proposal is that the present rates are not adequate to support the investment WTU has made in necessary new facilities since the last rate increase, Mr. Reeves said.

WTU's current construction program, the core of which is the coal-fired power plant at Oklaunion, is the biggest and most expensive in the Company's history. By the time the proposed rates become effective, WTU will have invested more than \$84.4 million in new facilities and must spend considerably more in the years ahead to satisfy the growing demand for electricity in West Texas.

The proposed rates would produce an increase in total retail revenue of \$26.6 million. This amounts to 11.4 per cent.

No major changes in rate structure are included in the proposal. For residential customers, the

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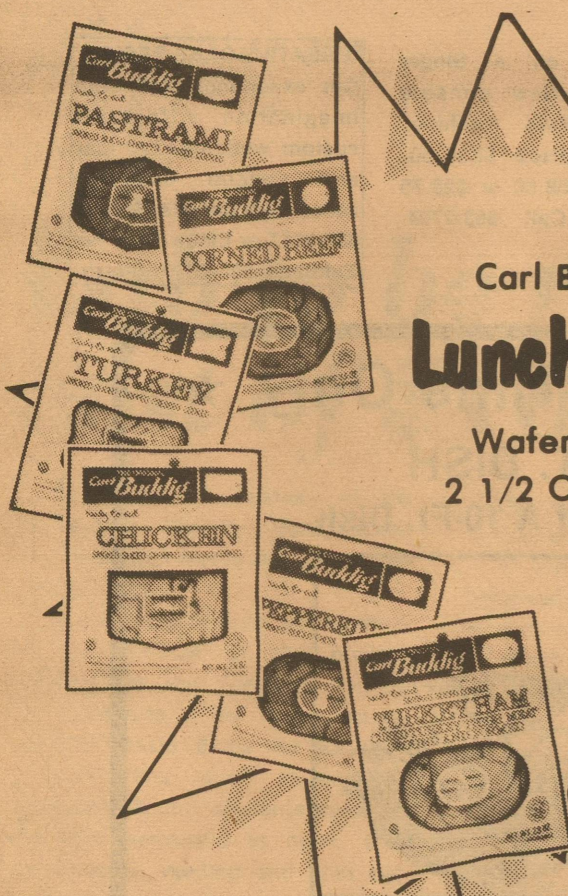

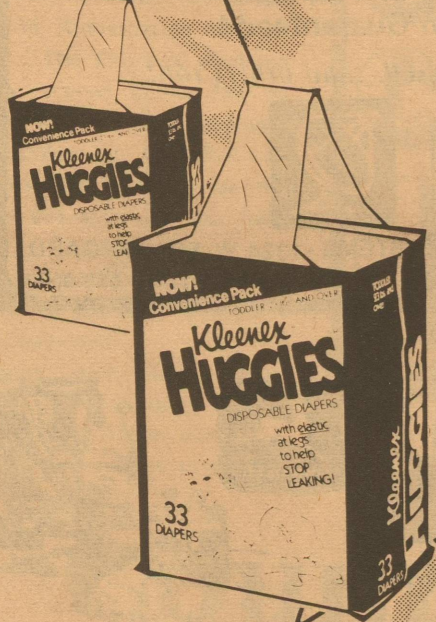
