## USDA issue guidelines

December 1-- The U.S. Department of Agriculture today issued eligibility and quantity guidelines for the emergency feed assistance program to sell Commodity Credit Corporation-owned low grade corn to livestock producers whose livestock feed suffered because of drought, hot weather or related disaster.

The farmer or rancher must be located in a county designated by the U.S. Department of Agriculture as a disaster area due to drought, said Everett Rank, administrator, USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conser-

vation Service. The farmer or rancher also must have suffered a loss of feed normally produced on the farm and must not have sufficient feed on hand to maintain foundation livestock and poultry through the end of the 90-day feeding period, which begins when a producer applies for assistance. Signup begins on Dec. 6 and runs through Dec. 14.

CCC-owner lower grade corn will be sold to producers at 75 percent of the current basic county loan rate for the average quality of available corn in the county where the corn is stored, Rank said.

The maximum amount of assistance that may be granted is 10 pounds of feed grain per day per animal unit times the number of days in the feeding period. The maximum amount is reduced by the amount of feed on hand and the total amount may not exceed the amount of production lost.

Rank said farmers and ranchers should contact their county offices of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service beginning Dec. 6 for further details and to make application for assistance.

## Parker's Remodels

When asked if the extensive remodeling was going to raise the prices at Parker foods, we received the answer of no with Mr. Glen Parker commenting that since there will be a neater selection of all items in the store and the new refrigeration units, that prices could actually drop slightly.

All the employees of Parker's food would like to stress that if during the remodeling period you can't find something, just ask and they would gladly assist you in whatever need you might have.

Mr. Glen Parker, Robert Parker, Clay Porter, Ethel Doran, Paula O'Connor, Dora Trevino, and Mike O'Connor all invite you to stop by and review the "new" Parker's as it develops further into the remodeling stages. What saying was that when it comes our time to die, we wanted to pass on with dignity and not die in the gutter. I suppose that most, if not all, Schleicher Countians feel the same way now as we did then.

Did you know that the major cause of death among Americans is trauma. Trauma is simply defined as the results of injury. Car accidents, accidents in the home and at the workplace account for more deaths per year than cancer or heart attacks but trauma deaths are treatable. People who have been injured do not need to die. Prompt, effective emergency medical care can save the lives of the majority of trauma victims. The key to such emergency treatment is a reservoir of trained emergency medical personnel in each community.

The best hospital, the best ambulances are all useless without people who are trained in how and what to do in emergency situations. Currently, Schleicher County has the smallest number of trained emergency care people of any county our size or smaller in the 13 county CVCOG area. The Schleicher County Emergency Service needs volunteers. We need people who are willing to take the required training, people who are willing to drop everything and respond when the beeper sounds. We need people who can keep their heads in a tight situation. If you are willing, call Dale Lipsett at 853-2688 or 853-3101 for further information. Persons who receive foodstamps, AFDC, SSI, or Medicaid (non-institutional) are automatically eligible to receive donated foods. Persons may receive food only once a month. To receive the food you must bring some form of identification with you. This might be a drivers license, Food Stamp ID, Medicaid Card, AFDC Eligibility Letter, SSI Award Letter, Social Security Card or other.

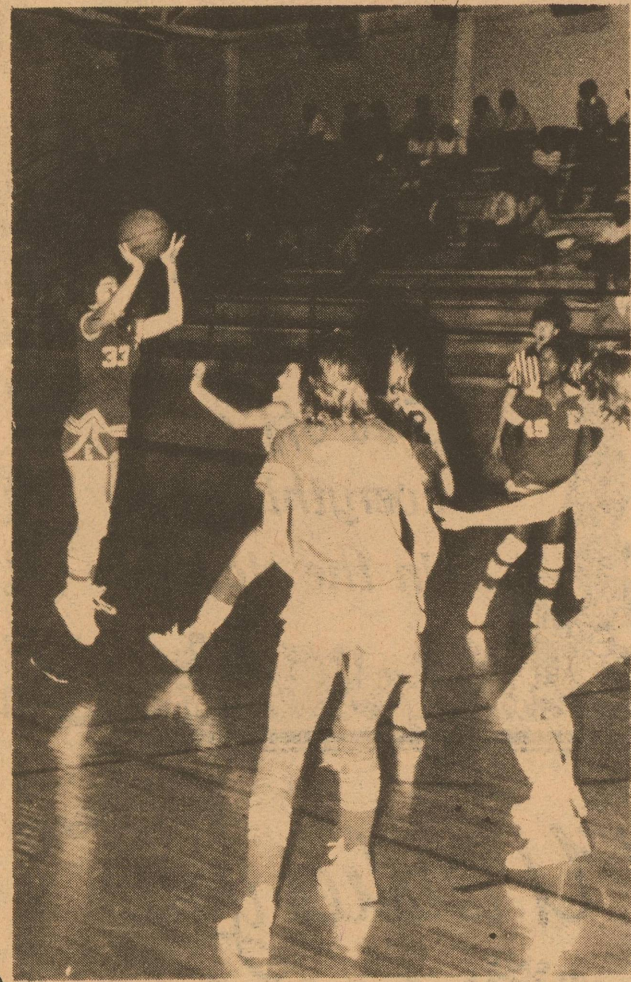
