

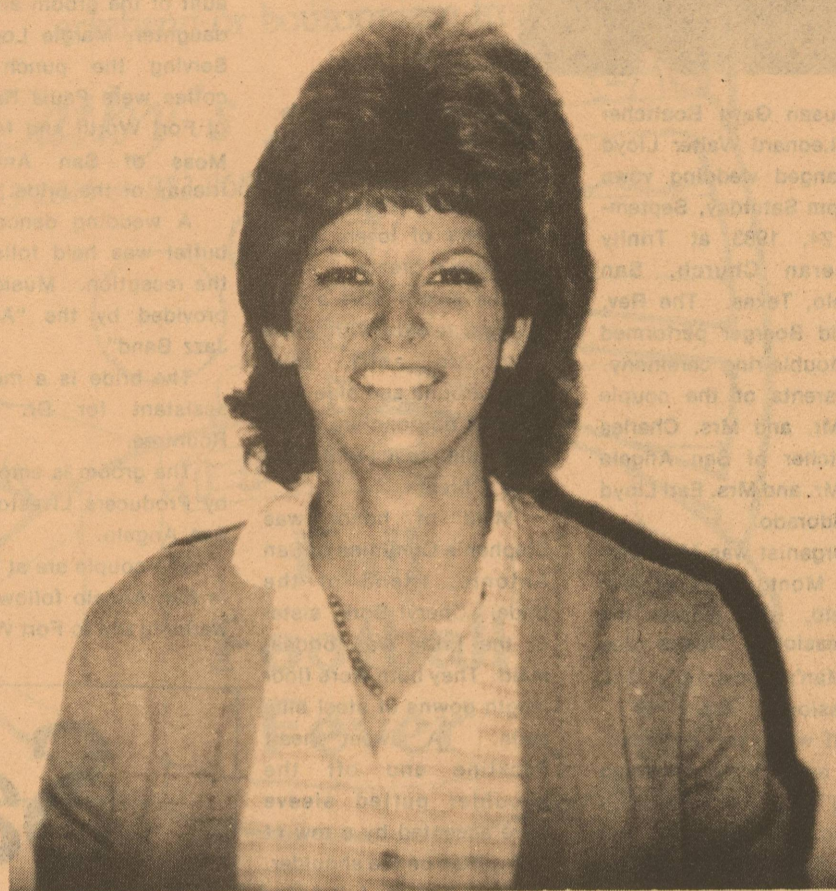

## Board acquires new relief doctor

Monday night the Board of Trustees of the Schleicher County Medical Center met for a called session in which an interim contract was entered into with another physician for Eldorado.

The contract was made between the Medical Center and Physicians Relief Group of New Braunfels. Doctor Joe

Rodriguez, a General Practitioner of Lamesa is anticipated to be practicing his skills here in 10 days to two weeks.

The agreement calls for the new physician to be on a trial basis in Eldorado with the Medical Board providing housing for him and his family, a weekly salary of \$1775.00 per

week and 50 percent of all the charges for physician calls during weekend duties. Should either Dr. Rodriguez of the Board of Trustees become dissatisfied with the agreement, another physician will be procured through the Physicians Referral Group until a resident physician is found.

### Election set for SCS zone director

An election for a director to serve in Zone 5 on the Eldorado-Divide Soil and Water Conservation District Board is scheduled for October 15, 1983 at the County Courthouse lawn announced Johnny Griffin, chairman of the board. The election will be held at 6:00 p.m. in conjunction with the cotton meeting and barbeque.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the subdivision where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district.

Zone 5 of the district includes the part of the county south of the Menard Highway and east of Highway 277.

Current members of the board of directors of the Eldorado-Divide SWCD are Johnny Griffin, Ross Whitten, De Lux, David Lloyd, and Charles Ray Pfluger.

The purpose of the Eldorado-Divide SWCD, with headquarters in Eldorado is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The district board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

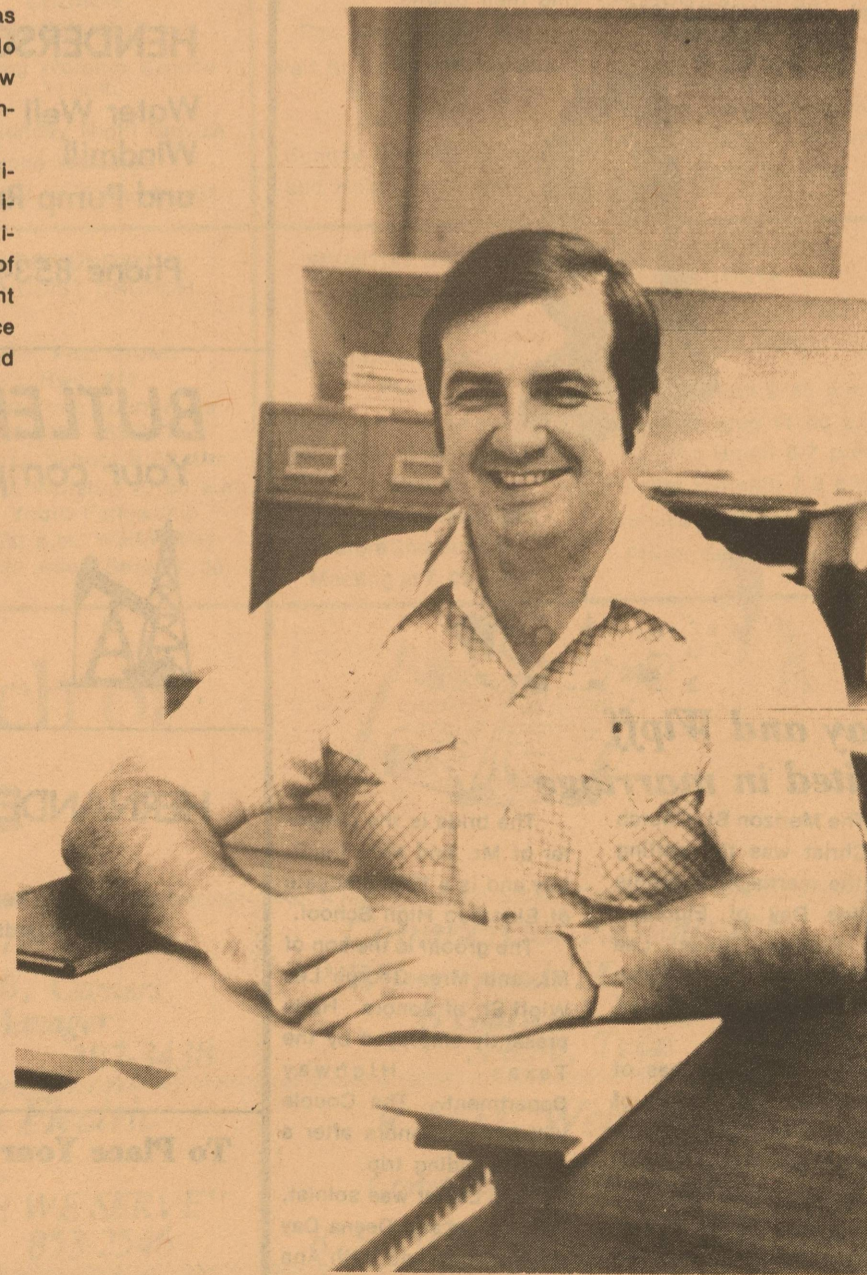

Paula Daniels of San Angelo was soloist and Mrs. Evelyn Stigler was organist.

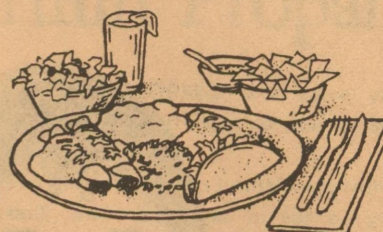

The Varsity team entered this game as 26 point under dogs. They had won their first two games by downing Rankin and Iraan, and then they lost to one of their rival teams, Sonora and had bad luck against Menard.

So the Eagles had dropped in the standings, and they started getting picked as underdogs, the Eagles proved they can win as underdogs are even heavily favored to win because 21 points under, going into a game, you may think they might just go out and lay down.

The Eagles rose to the occasion and took on any challenge that the Lions were willing to dish out, and they also dished out some punishment themselves.

Coach Mitchel took time out to visit us and share his feelings on how

Before the game the Coaches talked to the players in the locker room and Coach Mitchel must have told the offense what they needed to do, because they came out and generated alot of offense.

This game was filled with alot of excitement, the Eagles played well and they sent their faithful fans home with joy in their hearts and the feeling of "it was worth the trip."

The opening kick off went to the Eagles as they went on offense first. The Eagles moved the ball well, as the ball was handed to Bret Nikolauk looking like the work horse for the Eagles eating up ground on

his first 4 carries.

The Eagles' on their first possession got down to the Lions 25 yard line, but a penalty was stepped off against the Eagles and on the next play the Eagles fumbled and the Lions gained possission.

Ozونا moved the ball fairly well against the Eagles, they got to mid field and went to the air on the next play and it was intercepted by Victor Gutierrez who played a fine all around game. Visiting with him before the game this is what he had to say, "Right now I am feeling a little nervous but hopefully we can pull it out, they (Ozونا) are a pretty tough

The first quarter was a pretty evenly fought game with both teams not being able to score, at the end of the quarter the Eagle fans came to their feet and cheered the players on their first quarter performance.

On the Eagle possession, they had the ball on their own 20 yard line, Mike Phillips went back to throw and it was completed to Gutierrez, he turned and ran up the side line and stepped out of bounds on the Lions 45 yard line, but the official said he stepped out on the 48 yard line of the Eagles so they marked the ball back 7 yards and right in front of the Eagle bench. Coach Richters was furious as he yelled at the official, making him uneasy, the official marked the ball back seven yards, but the crowd loved it, they got behind Coach Richters and that out burst from Coach spilled through the players and they were fired up to play ball also.

The Eagles gave up possession after a few plays with the quarter about to come to an end. The Ozona quarterback went back to pass and almost lost his head as Bret Nilolauk broke threw the line and sacked the quarterback for a 10 yard loss.

When the Lion quarterback attempted another pass Luke Brame picked it off and ran 15 yards before he was stopped with 1 second left in the half. The half came with "goose eggs" on the score board Eagle's 0, Lions 0.

The Eagles went in at half time knowing they could come out and beat Ozona in the second half. Wade Wallis felt before the

game, "If we can keep our spirit up, we can win tonight." When the Eagles returned to the field, you could feel something was getting ready to happen.

Mike Moore kicked off to start the second half and Ozona had possession for three plays when the back tried to turn the corner and was hit and fumbled the ball, it was picked up by Bret Nikolauk first in ten for the Eagles.

On the Eagles' second play Phillips pitched out to Chris Woodward, he got a block from Tom Dean and turned up the field good enough for a 30 yard pick

On the Lion's 20 yard line, Tom dean who did some fine blocking and had a good game was confident that the Eagles would do good, and could come away with a win.

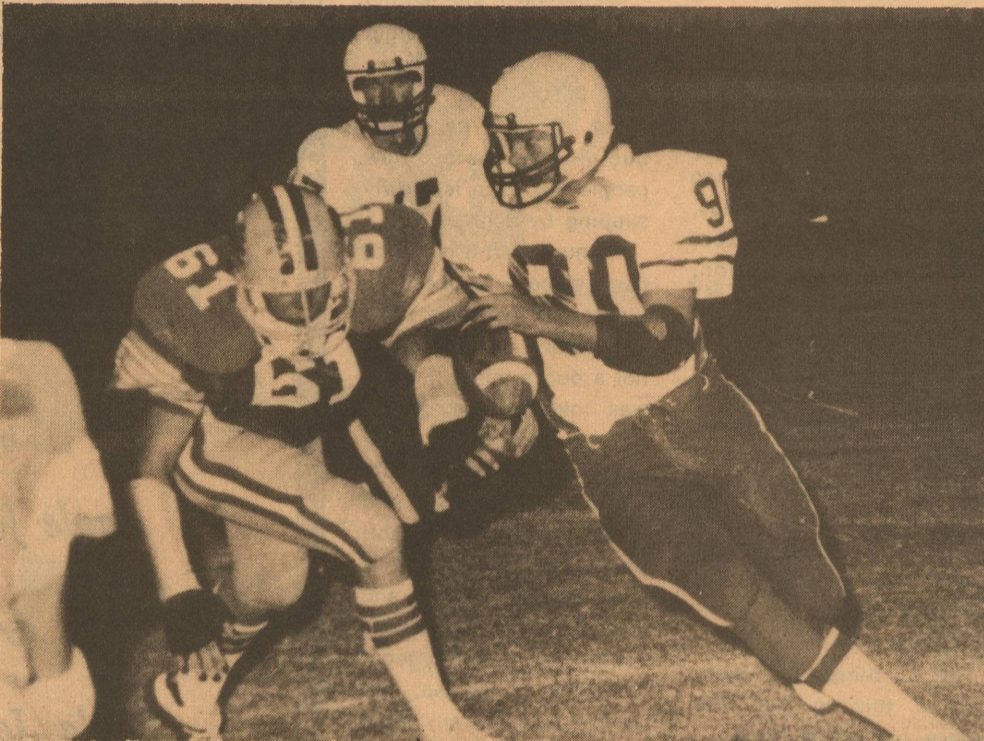

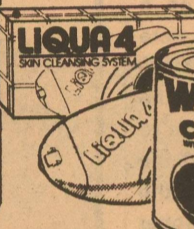
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## Smith named manager of FLBA

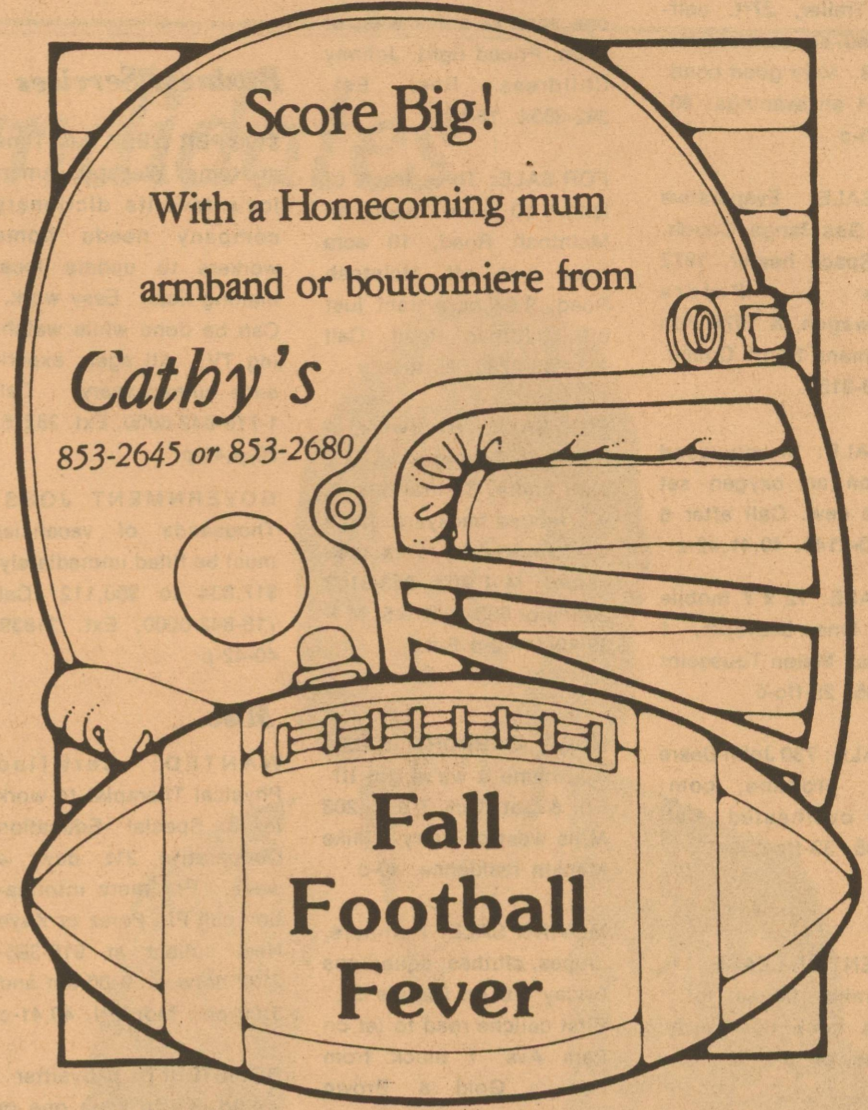

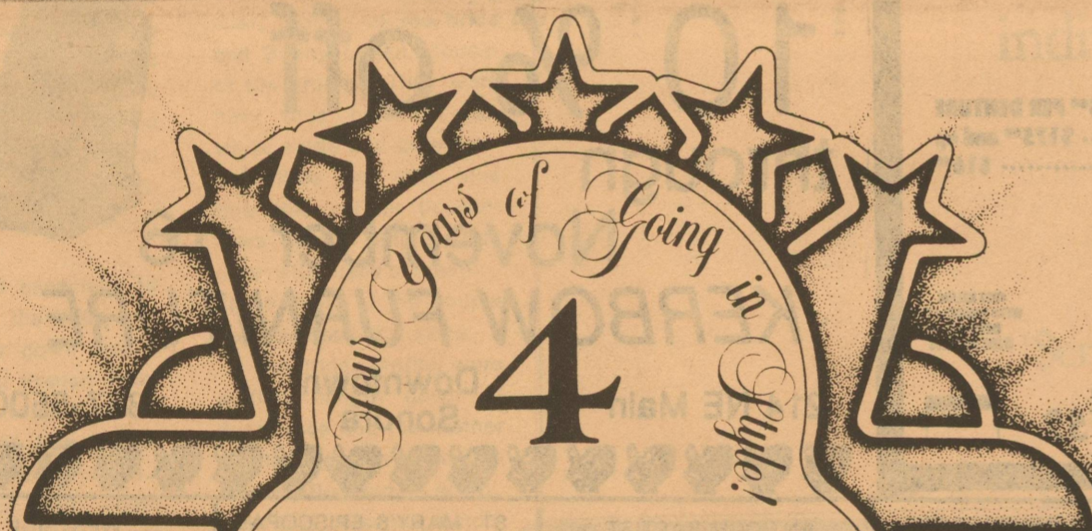
