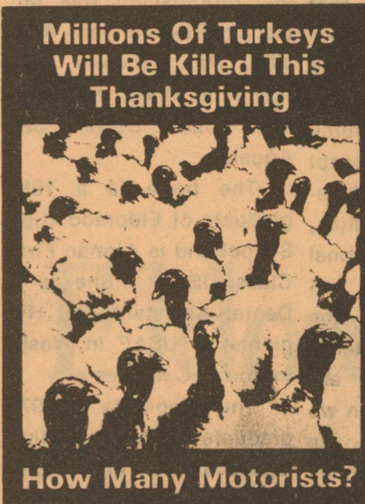
Eugene Bradshaw brought down this 30 lb. female bobcat approximately eleven miles east of Eldorado earlier this week.

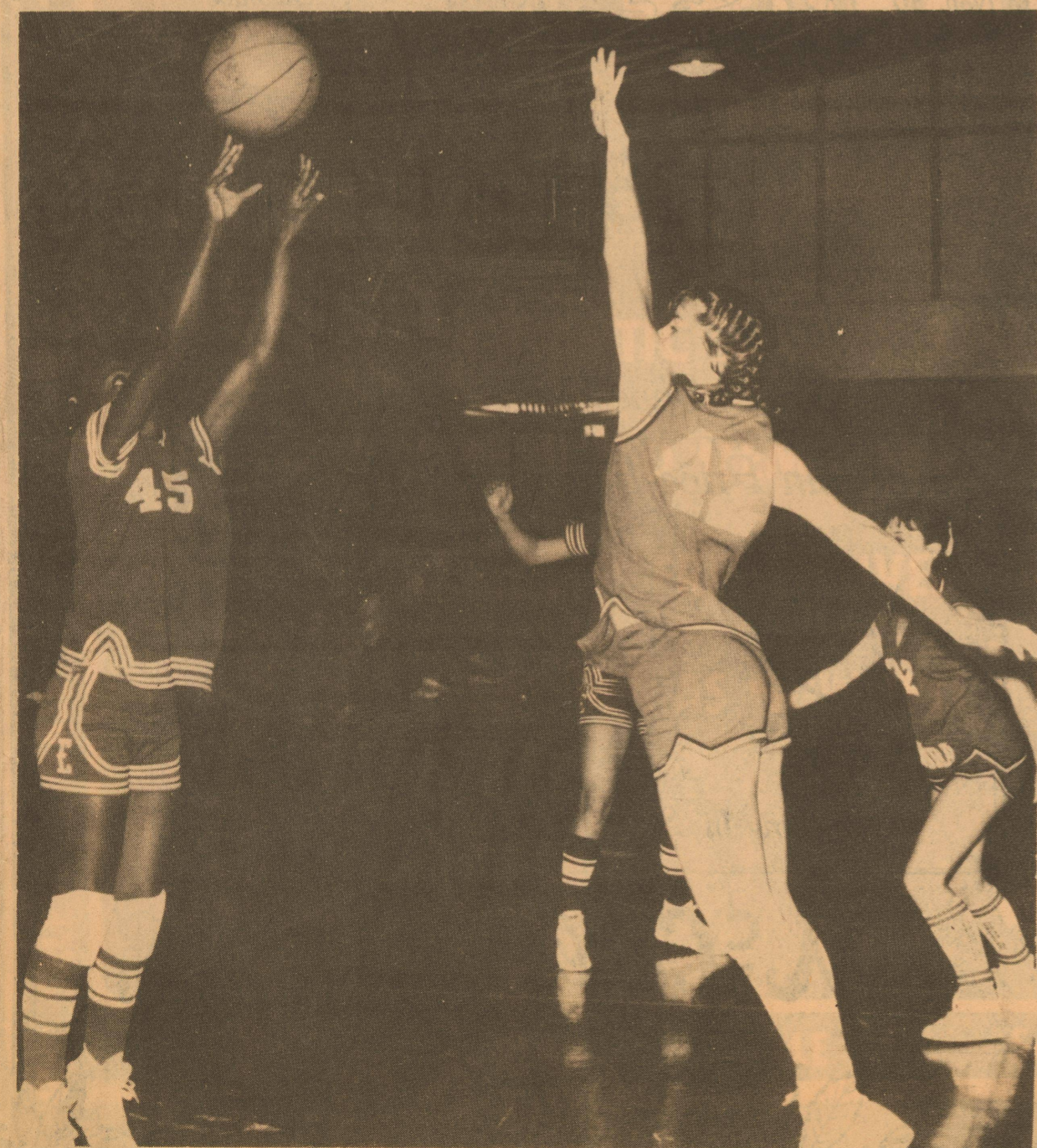


## Cathy's hosts Open House

### Reports from Washington

#### Grenada

The photograph of the young American who knelt to kiss our soil will long be remembered. In one swift, spontaneous gesture, this medical student conveyed how totally justified the President was in sending our military to participate in the rescue mission in Grenada.

From all we knew then, and from what we have subsequently learned, there is no doubt that the lives and liberty of all Americans in Grenada were imminently threatened; just as there is also no doubt that our assistance was legitimately requested. The details leading to our rescue mission are well known, but the essential facts bear repeating.

Grenada was a colony of Great Britain until 1974, when she and six other Caribbean islands gained independence and formed the Organization of Eastern Caribbean States, or OECS. In a military coup in 1979, Grenada's elected prime minister was overthrown by Maurice Bishop, who proceeded to develop very strong ties with Cuba and the Soviet Union, from whom he sought and received assistance in the construction of an airport suspiciously designed to be suitable for military aircraft rather than commercial aviation.

The People's Revolutionary Army, upset because the Prime Minister was not moving quickly enough in his "Marxist" restructuring of Grenadian society and because he had made overtures toward closer ties to the United States, ousted Bishop on October 12. The Prime Minister and three of his Cabinet members as well as other Grenadian citizens, including children, were brutally murdered October 19. A 24-hour curfew and shoot-on-sight orders then were implemented. The murders and breakdown of governmental order shocked, repelled, and alarmed leaders throughout the Caribbean.

Approximately one week later, Grenada's Governor General, Paul Scoon, confidentially contacted the OECS, describing the situation and requesting help. As the Governor General was the sole remaining source of governmental legitimacy on Grenada, his appeal carried legal and moral weight.

The United States learned of his appeal when the OECS, joined by Jamaica and Barbados, sent an urgent request that we join in a rescue mission to restore order and democracy in Grenada, to protect the civilian population and the 1,000 Americans there, and to prevent the spread of terror in the region. These same Caribbean nations which asked for help had been threatened by Marxist groups on their own islands. And, with small security forces, many with no real military capability, these democratic islands felt helpless in the face of the overwhelming military advantage of the Soviet-Cuban arms buildup in Grenada.

On October 24, the multinational force landed. Approximately 800 Cubans and 30 Soviet advisors actively resisted but were overcome. Afterward, we found evidence confirming our worst fears: Grenada could have been used as a staging area for subversion of nearby countries, for the interdiction of shipping lanes, and for the transit of troops and supplies. This evidence is contained in agreements authorizing the secret presence of Cuban military advisors and in a large cache of arms including anti-aircraft weapons, artillery, armored vehicles, carriers, and rocket launchers.

Since the landing we have made public our private attempts prior to October 25 to peaceably extricate our Americans. The State Department was prepared to bring in either commercial or military ships or aircraft, but every suggestion was rejected by the revolutionaries. Cut off from communication with the outside world, dependent on the revolutionaries for food and water, confined in the medical facility headquarters — our embassy personnel in Barbados felt that the Americans were practically already hostages.

I salute our armed forces who performed with honor, not only in combat, but afterward as our soldiers reaped the respect and affection of the Grenadian people. I am equally proud of the leadership and courage displayed by our President, who acted correctly to protect the safety of American citizens and to reaffirm our support for democratic institutions.

One of the things that amazes me about Christians is the degree to which many of us expect to find perfection in the church here on earth. We accept that "secular fields of endeavor such as politics, business and our personal lives are imperfect; but when it comes to the church that we attend, everything must be absolutely perfect. When we move to a new town, we check out all the churches to see which one is the right one for us. We compare shop our churches just like we do our laundry soap.

I have heard some really neat reasons for picking a church: The minister yells; the minister doesn't yell. The church is too liberal; the church is too conservative. The people are too unfriendly; the congregation is too large. The church building is too hot or too cold. The order of worship isn't what we're used to. There aren't any of the finest families in the congregation. The people dress up too much; the people don't dress up enough. There are too many children in the church. The list is almost endless.

Now I'd like to tell you a few complaints that I've rarely heard so far: The people love Jesus more than I do. The preacher makes me uncomfortable when he preaches. There is too little Bible study there. There is too little for me to do in that church. It occurs to me that maybe our criteria for buying laundry soap is more sensible than our criteria for picking a church. We buy the soap to get our clothes clean. Apparently, we pick a church because it will make no difference in our lives. Is this the right way?

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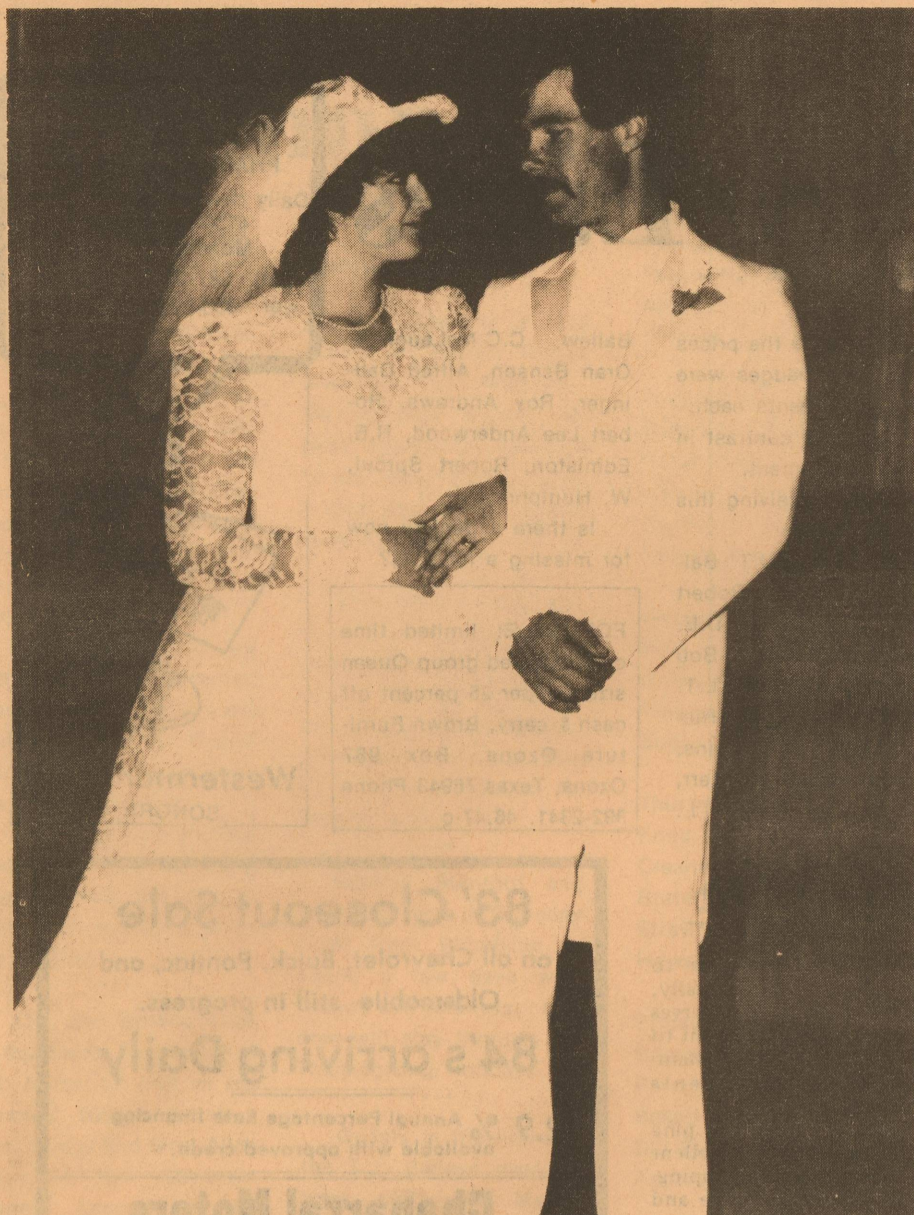

**Pennington to fill term**

Mickey R. Pennington, Uvalde attorney has been appointed by Gov. Mark White to fill the unexpired term of Judge Jack Woodley as judge of the 38th Judicial District which includes Uvalde, Medina and Real Counties.

Announcement of the appointment was made Monday morning. The vacancy occurred with the death Oct. 31 of Judge Woodley, who had held the position for eight years, since being appointed by then Gov. Dolph Briscoe in 1975.

Pennington was sworn in at 10:30 a.m. Friday in the District Court room, Uvalde, with former Associate Justice of the State Supreme Court, Ross E. Doughty, administered the oath of office.

Rev. Fred Martin, pastor of the First United Methodist Church of which Pennington is a member, gave the invocation. A reception followed the swearing-in.

"I will give my full energy and time to the judgeship," Pennington told the Uvalde Leader-News during an interview following announcement of his appointment.

The first court at which he will preside is a criminal jury trial set for Nov. 17 in Uvalde. Next on the docket will be civil suits on Nov. 28.

He will have offices in each of the three court-houses in the 38th District.

**Qualifications**  
Since August 1977, Pennington has been with the firm of Kessler, Kessler, Vaughan & Pennington. After becoming District Judge, he will no longer be permitted to be in private practice, but will devote full time to the judgeship.

Pennington received his J.D. Degree in 1977 from

St. Mary's University Law School, San Antonio. Prior to that he was graduated from Schleicher County High School in Eldorado, Schreiner College in Kerrville and the University of Texas at Austin where he was awarded a B.B.A. degree in finance in 1972.

The 33-year old attorney is married to the former Barbara Amstead and they are parents of a daughter, Sarah Jane, 2.

He is a member of the State Bar of Texas, American Bar Association, Association of Trail Lawyers of America, Border Bar Association, and Uvalde County Bar Association. He was admitted to the practice of law in the State of Texas in 1977, and the United States District Court, Western District of Texas in 1982. Pennington has participated in numerous continuing legal education programs of the State Bar of Texas.

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# Economist reports outlook "bullish"

The market for fed beef looks "bullish" down the road, says an economist in livestock marketing for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

This outlook stems from the latest cattle-on-feed report issued by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The report points toward lower fed beef supplies for the rest of this quarter and on into the first part of 1984, notes Dr. Ed Uvacek.

"With feeders facing higher feed grain costs this winter and currently registering losses, it's easy to see why the incentive to feed cattle is lacking," Uvacek says. "It will take a radical change in the price of fed cattle to drastically alter that feeder attitude."

Ultimately, he says, these lower placement levels will mean reduced fed cattle marketings for the first half of 1984. That should bring higher fed cattle prices and could boost prices at the super-market. Fed cattle prices could even improve sooner, points out the economist. In fact, the market could turn around in a matter of weeks and that would radically change feedlot operator attitudes.

"It is unlikely that placements will increase enough to cause any real problems for feeders (over-production) by the first

quarter of 1984," Uvacek adds. "Thus, any price gains through the rest of this year likely will carry into 1984, with some additional price strengthening then."

Feedlot operators estimated a 1 percent reduction in fed cattle marketings for the final quarter of this year even though weight groupings showed that only the heaviest steers on feed were above last year's level on Oct. 1. This suggests that any

increase in fed cattle marketings may have already taken place by mid-October. "That should leave supplies quite light for the

rest of the year and promote a 'bullish' outlook for next year," Uvacek points out.
