

Plateau Relays this weekend

Friday and Saturday will see much excitement at the Eagles' track with the Junior High Track Meet taking place Friday afternoon and the Plateau Relays starting early Saturday morning.

Approximately 35 teams will be represented including the host team, the Eldorado Eagles.

The Eagles didn't fare as well as expected at last week's Junction Track Meet, with only the 1600 Meter Relay bringing in a 1st place with a time of 3:32.0. Coach Larry Mitchel is expecting a good performance from this team again this week. Also, Mitchel anticipates Victor Gutierrez to excel in the Long Jump. Hopes are running

high for long distance runners and high jumpers to improve on their past performances. The Eagles' Rickey Cathey should be a major contender in the 400 meter competition.

Coach Don Richters was hesitant to make predictions on how well the Eaglettes would perform due to changes among the team members. He expects Gina and Jennifer Patton and Becky Schrier to excel in the high jump and Anna Aguilar to do well in the triple jump.

Junior High Boys' Track Coach Phillip Meyer predicted that his team should perform well Friday in at least four events. Trey Preston is expected to do well in the 100 yard Dash. Meyer's 440 Meter Relay Team and 1200 Meter Relay Team are looking

good as is Marco Martinez in the Hurdles.

Coach Teresa Baker, the Junior High Girls' Track coach, feels that the girls are stronger in the field events with Lupe Montalvo expected to take the discus and shotput. She also predicted that Sherry Field would turn in a good performance in the 100 yard dash and the 7th grade Sprint Relay should do well also.

The Junior High Track Meet will kick off at 2:30 p.m. Friday with Field Events. Preliminaries will start at 4:30 p.m. with the finals wrapping it up at 6:30 p.m. Teams expected to participate Friday are: Sonora, Brady, Junction, Ballinger, Menard, Wall, Miles and Eldorado.

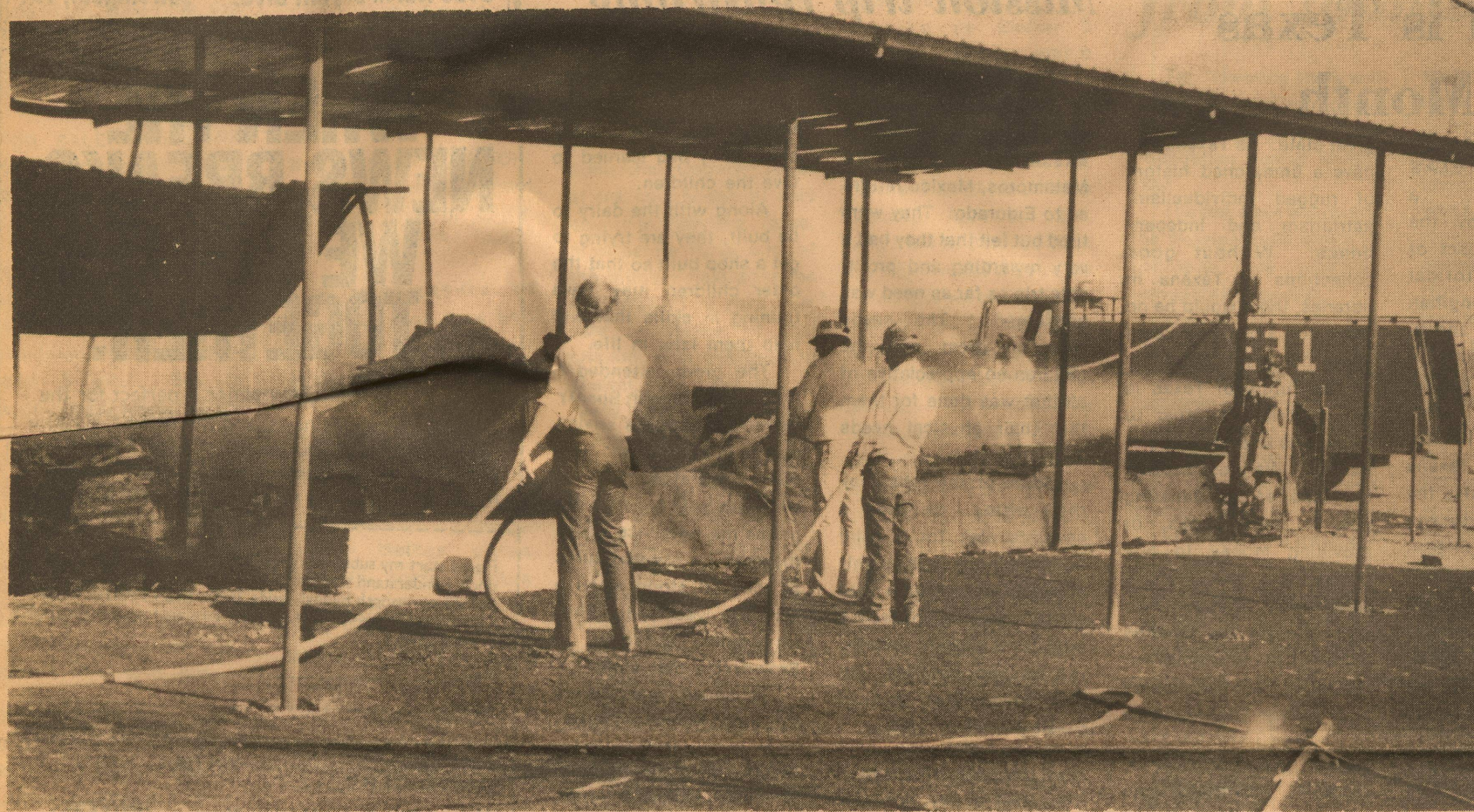

Eldorado High School Rodeo Team contends

Eldorado High School now has a National High School Rodeo Team and Club. The team consists of students enrolled in public school, from the ninth through the twelfth grade.

Each member must pay a \$60 membership fee which covers each member with accident insurance. An entry fee for each event must also be paid at each rodeo, usually \$35 to \$40 per event. The membership and entry fees are the responsibility of the contestant. Each member must maintain passing grades to be able to participate in any high school rodeo. The high school rodeo team must also have a sponsor or sponsors who travel with the team as much as possible. There is an executive committee made up of adult sponsors who make sure the rules of the association are upheld.

The rodeo rules are the same as the rules of the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association. Points are given for the first ten places in each event. The contestant will use points from the best five rodeos and points at Regional Finals to see if he or she qualifies for state competition. As of

now there are nineteen High School Rodeos for Region II, which is the region Eldorado's Rodeo Team is in. Since November there have been four High School Rodeos, one at Big Lake and Midland and two at Fort Stockton. March, April and May are loaded with High School Rodeos at Iraan, Marfa, Pecos, Andrews, Crane, Odessa, Permian, Sanderson and Fort Stockton. Most of these are two day rodeos.

Regional Finals are held at Fort Stockton. Most of the top four contestants in each event will be eligible to compete at State Finals in June in Sequin. Sequin will host the Texas High School Rodeo Finals. Six days and six go-rounds will determine the top three contestants in each event, who will qualify for the National High School Finals in South Dakota. At the present time, Eldorado High School Team is second out of the eight teams that make up Region II.

Eldorado's Rodeo Team and their points are as follows: Kelly Griffin, Calf Roping and Team Roping 120 pts.; Marty Wells, Cutting Horse and Saddle Bronc Riding 180 pts.; John R. Griffin, Calf Roping and Team Roping

150 pts.; Warren Cude, Bullriding 100 pts.; Tony Diver, Bareback Riding 90 pts. Other members are Michael Phillips, Bareback And Bullriding; Robert Reynolds, Calf Roping and Team Roping; Thomas Lee, Bullriding. The Rodeo Club consists of individuals who are interested in rodeo and helping to produce rodeos.

The Rodeo Club has meetings at school and will be helping with the Youth Rodeo. Officers and Directors for 1983-84 are: President, Michael Phillips; Vice President, Thomas Lee; Secretaries, Shanna Burleson, Vikki Cavaness and Kelly Leggett. Treasurer and Timekeeper, Charlotte Mobley.

Directors: Bareback Riding, Tony Diver; Bullriding, Warren Cude; Saddle Bronc Riding, Marty Wells; Calf Roping, Kelly Griffin; Team Roping, John R. Griffin; Barrels, Poles and Goat Tying, Ashley Johnson; Cutting Horse, Marty Wells; Optional Roping, Robert Reynolds.

Dues are not required from Club Members. Also any student from first through twelfth grades can be a member. Meetings will be announced. Sponsors for the Eldorado High School Rodeo Team are Johnny Griffin and Bill Wells.

Construction delayed

A bog down in the paper work in the health department has slowed down the construction of the new sewer treatment plant.

City Secretary Carolyn Mayo says the 60 day delay is not the fault of the city's but lies in the hands of the health department.

The facility was scheduled to begin construction on March 1st but as it stands now the waste water plant will have to wait.

The \$650,000 plant is scheduled to begin operation in the latter part of 1984.

A City spokesman reported that hopefully the bids for the block grant improvements to the Christian Addition sewer system and the construction bids for the sewer processing plant could be let at the same time and performed by the same general contractor.

Filing for the three openings are: Joe Max Edmiston, Phil Edmiston, Bobby Helmers, Terry Green and Richard Kent, the only incumbent. The filing deadline for the board was also March 7th.

Emergency loan information

Emergency loans for farmers are available through county offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Ben Rucker, FmHA county supervisor, said today. The previous designation was limited to livestock producers and this designation is for cash field crops.

Rucker asked that those who need farm credit as a result of drought make their needs known at the Farmers Home Administration office at P.O. Box H, Eden, Texas 76837.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken counties will be accepted by Farmers Home until 8/13/84 for physical and production losses.

FmHA loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts.

"Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs," Rucker said.

Cowboys for Christ schedules West Texas Crusade

The West Texas oil and ranching community of Post, Texas, will be the site of an interdenominational Christian Crusade, sponsored by Cowboys for Christ and featuring nationally-known figures in the art and entertainment fields, according to Ted Pressley, Fort Worth, Texas.

Scheduled for March 17 and 18 in the Post Community Center, the meeting is expected to attract participants from throughout the tri-state region of Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma. Pressley, president and founder of Cowboys For Christ, will preach both evenings, and the entire weekend will be packed with Christian teaching, worship services and entertainment.

"The ministry of music" says Pressley, "will be enhanced through the singing of nationally known recording artist Barbara Fairchild, the guitar artistry of Milton Carroll, and a gospel group from Fort Worth, Bobby Miller and the New Jerusalem Singers."

Milton Carroll was one of country music's "outlaws" in the 1960's rebelling against their "Syrupy" lyrics of the music generated in Nashville.

A contemporary of Willie Nelson in Austin music scenes, he composed many songs which were recorded by some of the top stars. A gifted guitarist, he toured with Willie Nelson and fronted for him as the opening act. He also fronted for the Larry Mahan Show.

Milton's wife, Barbara Fairchild, has recorded 14 albums and has made guest appearances on many television shows, including Hee Haw and the Tonight Show. She was nominated for the Grammy Award with her number one son, "Teddy Bear" in 1972. "Kid Stuff" was also a number one hit immediately following "Teddy Bear". The International Rodeo Association named her "Entertainer of the Year" in 1983, and she has made guest appearances to sing the national anthem at the International Finals Rodeo the last several years. Both husband and wife are dedicated Christians and are active workers in their church.

Visual arts, as well as the musical arts, will have their place in the crusade as well. Nationally known artist Chuch DeHaan will bring a special message during the teaching

sessions, using examples from his paintings as emphasis and illustration.

DeHaan, a former RCA bronc rider and a well-known cutting horse trainer, now ranches near the West Texas community of Graford. Paintings by DeHaan have appeared in most of the major livestock and horse magazines published west of the Mississippi and both his prints and the original paintings are in great demand. Firsthand knowledge of horses, livestock and tack combine with his artistic gifts to produce drawings and paintings of exceptional merit. In addition to his artistic abilities, he is a dedicated Christian lay teacher, making many engagements at Christian Functions representing Cowboys For Christ.

Area rancher Riley Miller, who has been instrumental in getting the crusade started in Post, will host a Sunday morning gathering and barbecue for those who wish to visit his well-known West Texas ranch.

The initial vision for the crusade is attributed to Chuch DeHaan, who had participated in several art shows at the annual West Texas Boys Ranch benefit held at the nearby OS Ranch.

Inerrant, infallible, or what

One of the hottest debates among Christians today is over whether the Bible is inerrant, infallible, authoritative or something else. We see many new congregations spring up with names that somehow include the word Bible, names such as "The First Church of the Open Bible", for instance. It seems to me that this debate is more along the lines of putting the cart before the horse than anything else. Putting the Bible on a pedestal and carving words like infallible, inerrant, authoritative or some such around the base does nothing except fill the air waves with harsh rhetoric that does more to drive people away from Christ than it ever will to draw all men to him.

It seems to me that the central fact of the Bible is the Man-God, Jesus Christ.

All other questions depend upon how you answer this one question: who is Jesus Christ and what is his relationship to you? If Jesus Christ is your Lord and Savior then you will accept what he said about the Scriptures as being applicable to you. If Jesus is not your Lord, then your opinion of the Bible is totally irrelevant.

The Bible says that we should be doers of the word and not just hearers. What this means in plain words is that if you live according to the precepts

which are put forth by Christ in the Bible, then the Bible to you is inerrant, infallible, inspired, authoritative and the source of guidance for all aspects of your life. If, on the other hand, you do not live in the manner required by Jesus, then it matters not a bit what your opinion of the Bible may be. By your actions, you have demonstrated your beliefs much more concretely than your words ever could. Jesus said, "If you love me, keep my commandments." Do you love Jesus?

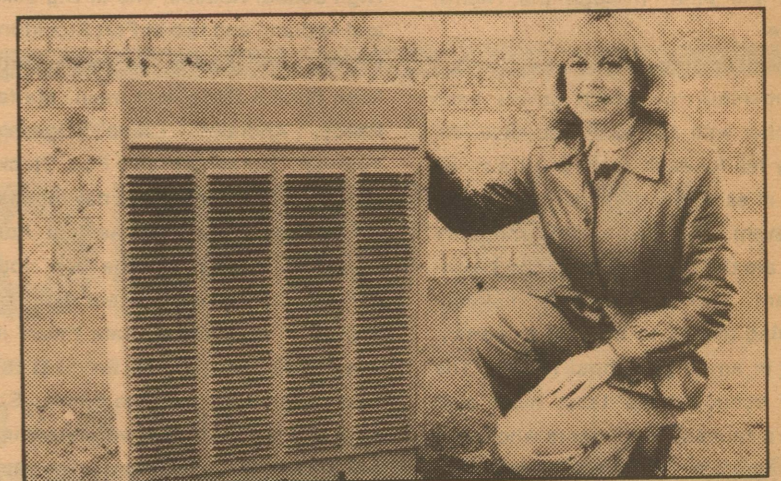

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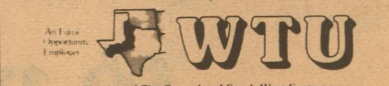


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Local Deaths

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The budget process reform needed

A decade of experience with the 1974 Congressional Budget Act reveals that while the efforts of the Congress to control the overall budget process have been partially successful, some reforms remain necessary to make the Budget Act effective in attaining true fiscal discipline and responsibility.

In 1983, for the seventh straight year, Congress failed to pass all 13 of the appropriations bills required to complete the fiscal year's annual budget process.

Consequently, in order to keep the government in operation, the appropriations bills not completed had to be combined into an omnibus spending package, which is known as a continuing resolution. The problem with this approach is that continuing resolutions have been known to contain not only appropriations but also other legislation, representing a huge package thrown together without careful consideration. Moreover, because the omnibus spending bill is needed to keep the government operating, a President must accept the entire package or shut down the government.

Because of the problems inherent in the continuing resolution, an obvious question arises: "Can the Congressional budget process ever work?" The answer is "yes," but budget enforcement reforms are essential if it is to work well.

In my judgment, events of the past several years show that the budget process is presently as flexible as the political climate dictates. Thus, the Congress must have more structured tools to use in order to make certain that fiscal discipline sticks. A number of proposals to accomplish this have been suggested.

One such reform which has my support is the proposed constitutional amendment giving the President line-item veto authority. Some 43 of the 50 states — including our own state of Texas — grant their governors the right to veto individual items in appropriations bills without having to veto an entire bill. Every President since Ulysses S. Grant has sought line-item veto authority. Furthermore, in 1981, over 64% of the American people indicated that they favored granting this authority.

I believe the line-item veto would enhance the President's ability to weed out narrow special interest items contained in appropriations bills — particularly in a continuing resolution — and would enhance his ability to negotiate with the Congress on those spending items which are necessary and in the national interest. Line-item veto authority is a much needed tool of discipline for the Congress which can have a meaningful impact on controlling federal spending.

Another reform proposal involves an expansion of Presidential authority to rescind funds. A rescission of funds involves a request by the President that funds already provided in appropriations bills by the Congress not be spent. This proposed approach would allow Presidential rescissions to take effect automatically unless Congress enacts legislation to disapprove them within 60 days. Without upsetting the necessary checks and balances between the Congress and the Executive, this proposed reform would put the burden on the Congress to overturn Presidential rescissions of funds, rather than requiring Congressional approval for the President's rescission request, as current law provides.

Finally, still before the Congress is a proposed constitutional amendment which not only calls for a balanced federal budget, but also limits new tax increases by restricting future revenue levels to the rate of increase in "national income." Federal spending would be limited to the amount of revenues received by the government and revenues themselves could grow no faster than the actual increase in the country's wealth — effectively capping the potential for tax increases solely to fund increased spending programs the country can ill afford.

Debate on reform of the budget process has just begun. Based on my experiences with Congressional budgeting, I do not believe the process is fundamentally unsound. It fails only because Congress has found ways to evade its intent and enforcement and because it does not go far enough in providing stringent rules to impose fiscal discipline. With reform, the process can be strengthened and the Congress and the President will be better able to respond effectively to the desires of the American taxpayer for restraint in government.

Texas dirt to N.Y.C.

The Lone Star Cafe in New York City, now recognized as an official Texas Independence Community by the Texas 1986 Sesquicentennial Commission, has been invited to secede from the city and state of New York and to join up with Texas for the 1986 celebration by Governor Mark White.

The famous restaurant represents the community of "Expatriated" Texans who now live in New York, and is known for providing a "little bit of Texas" in the midst of the Big Apple.

Former U.S. Attorney General Ramsey Clark has been designated as Attorney General for this newest Texas community, and in this capacity is researching the legal precedents for secession.

The Cafe community

will kick off its attempts at secession with a giant Texas Independence Day celebration. The party will start March 1, with the presentation of Governor White's proclamation and the Sesquicentennial flag and certificate designating the Lone Star Cafe as a Texas Independence Community. Native Texas Jerry Jeff Walker will lead the list of entertainers to appear at the secession celebration.

Mort Cooperman, co-owner and manager of the Cafe, said the Cafe "community" will include a city council made up of former Texans who have become famous and now reside in New York City. Dan Rather, CBS News anchorman, was one of the first to be invited to serve on the Council and has

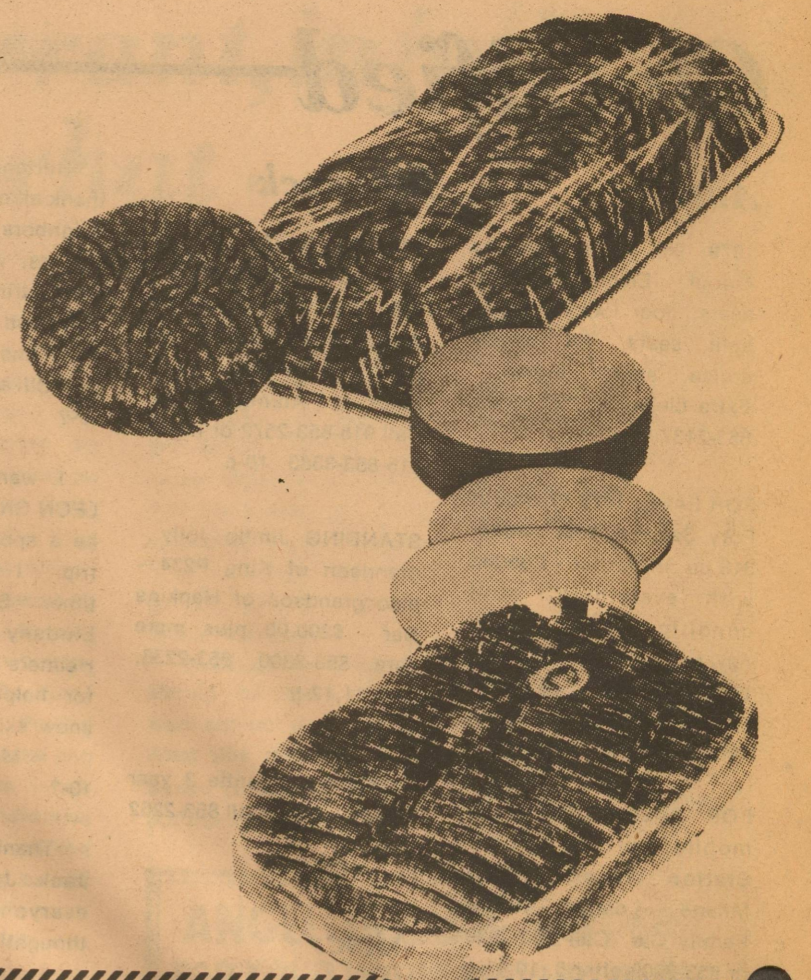
