

# Sewer plant bids opened.....

In the last of four meetings held during this last week, the City Council met in a special meeting Tuesday evening July 17th for the purpose, among others, to review the bids on the sewer treatment plant construction. The bids were opened at 2:00 that afternoon at City Hall.

The previous set of bids opened April 10th proved to be so far out of line that the engineers in charge of the plant rejected them all and requested that the city advertise for bids again. The bids this time were all considerably lower due to some changes from the original plans such as: having only one large lagoon with the second one divided to make three; the clay liner was reduced from 24" to 18" and the city will furnish the clay. The bids were as follows: Seidel, Inc. of San Angelo - \$753,562.00; R.B. Butler, of Bryan - \$797,000.00; Jack Anglin Co. of Ballinger - \$539,000.00 and John Julien Co. of Temple - \$584,000.00.

The engineering firm of Freese & Nichols will review the bids and make any recommendations to the city before any one bid is selected or rejected. According to Secretary Mayo that should be within the next week or ten days.

In other business the council discussed the 1984-85 budget. It was decided by the council that, in addition to various rate changes, persons living outside the city limits pay a \$7.50 per month service charge and additional \$1.00 charge on both water and trash charges. A final draft of the budget will be presented

at the next regular meeting when a hearing will be held.

The council discussed the problem of the dumping of salt water in the north end of town. Sheriff Edmiston reported the dumping which was running into a draw. The activity has been reported to the Railroad Commission and the Department of Water Resources.

Personnel policies were once again reviewed by the council with Secretary Mayo instructed to revise them as discussed and to present them for approval at the next meeting. Vacation and sick time will, in particular, be amended.

Secretary Mayo was instructed to place an advertisement in the Leader and the Standard Times as soon as possible for an Outside Superintendent.

Bids will also be let in the near future for a 12 stage, 40 hp pump with double insulation. The pump is for Well #6.

Superintendent Whitten was authorized by the council to purchase a new lawnmower at his discretion.

Regarding the portable sewer pump/tank, Councilman Jackson reported that he had located a new tank for \$300 and that the pump needed an overhaul or replacement. Councilman

Ronnie Sauer was appointed to assist in making the repairs.

In other business, the council: discussed the old firehall's condition, the doors and windows are in need of repair; Secretary Mayo was instructed to contact the Civil Defense ad-

ministration to inventory materials in the CD storage building; refused the gin's request to haul their trash to the landfill; sold the old firetruck to the Tri-Cities Shriners Club for \$1.00 due to the fact that according to the Texas

Municipal League the city cannot donate city property. It was decided to sell the truck to the Shriners due to their restoration of the truck and interest.

With no further business the council then adjourned.

## City buys dirt

During a special meeting of the Eldorado City Council Sunday afternoon, Joe Christian was awarded the bid for impervious clay for the sewer treatment plant project.

A committee comprised of Mayor Bob Lester and Councilman Ronnie Sauer was assigned by the council at last Tuesday's council meeting to seek alternate sites for obtaining the needed dirt to line the sewer ponds. Up until this time the only land being considered was the 6.8 acres offered to the city by Dr. Wayne Williams. Due to the controversy caused by the proposed purchase of this acreage with the building of a town lake and improvements to the area, after excavation, to form a recreational area and the amount of money involved, the city fathers were legally bound to seek bids on the project. The councilmen (with the exception of Jackson) requested permission from Joe Christian to do an on-site inspection of his bid site. It was after this that, back at City Hall the bid was accepted.

Area landowners within a five mile radius that had this type soil on their

property, according to the Soil Conservation Service's soil survey of the county, were contacted by the committee in order to inform them they were welcome to submit bids to the city for the dirt. Six area landowners submitted bids for the dirt, they were: Joe Christian, with the winning bid of \$59 per yard, with the stipulation that the road to the site be restored to its original condition or better; De Lux - \$96 per yard for 25,000 yards and \$.80 per yard thereafter; Edwin Jackson, Jr. \$1.60 per yard plus finishing work on the excavated area and access from Murchison St.. Councilman Jackson was absent from the meeting when the bids were opened nor did he take part in any discussion on the bids: Gene McCalla - \$1.49 per yard plus finishing work; Jerry Swift - \$1.60 per yard and Wayne Williams - \$40,000 with the lake stipulations.

## School cafeteria price hike

In a relatively short session Monday night the Schleicher County Independent School District Board of Trustees okayed the employment of a qualified instructor for the tennis program. The instructor will be hired at a later date.

The board awarded G&G Mechanical Services of San Angelo the bid for the band hall's air conditioning unit and its installation with their price of \$6788.00.

The trustees approved the continued media services of Region IX at a cost of \$2.50 per average daily attendance.

Concerning the audit of the 1983-84 books, the board voted the retain the services of the firm of Eckert, Ingram, Tinkler and Oliphant.

Cafeteria prices were discussed by the board and it was decided that the prices will be raised 10 cents per lunch. The new prices would be: Adult \$1.45; High School and Junior High \$1.10; Fourth thru Sixth \$1.00 and Kindergarten thru Third \$.90.

The board then discussed the

purchase of real property but no action was taken by the board.

Superintendent Guy Whitaker briefed the board on the recently passed House Bill 72 and how it will be affecting the school district in the years to come. He discussed items that would need to be implemented in January '85, in September for '85-'86 and one more item that would be implemented in September for '86-'89. He discussed the career ladder and how it was funded and how it would be operated in '84-'85. The salary schedule was then discussed and how it would affect the district.

Whitaker also reported to the board on the summer maintenance program and what could be accomplished before the start of school such as the improvement of the press box at the football field.

The board hired Lana Mikeska to fill the vacancy left by Mrs. Sallee who resigned earlier in the year.

The board approved payment of monthly maintenance bills and then adjourned their meeting.

## Format change

Starting with the August 2nd issue, the Schleicher County Leader will convert to the new Standard Advertising Units system which is being instituted by most fullsize newspapers in the United States.

The purpose of the SAU system is, as its name implies, to make American newspapers uniform in size and to allow for more efficient planning of advertising by advertisers and ad agencies and coordination with individual newspapers.

The reader will also benefit from the new page columns because they will be easier to read. Newspapers presently use different column widths from six to eight columns.

There will be a slight change in the size of your newspapers to conform to the new standard. The paper's column will remain 21 1/2 inches deep and will be 13 inches wide instead of the current 13 1/4 inches.

The conversion will also effect the advertising community as to column inches. The basic unit in the new standard unit will be one inch in depth by one in width (2 inches).

The new format will mean some changes in ad sizes for some advertisers and virtually no changes for others. The six column format does not in any way reflect a rate increase for the advertiser's proportionate page impact but there will be changes in the rate card so that it can conform to the new column widths.

As an example of how the change works, consider that an advertiser previously using a 4 column by 10 inch ad will now be using a 3 columns by 10 inch ad for the same page impact and the same cost.

Advertisers who continue to use the same proportionate size ad should see little or no increase in cost. The per column inch rate will be adjusted to reflect the wider columns and allow the newspaper to retain the same revenue for current ad space.

The new rate structure is basically the same. Full page, half page and quarter page ads are unchanged. Newspapers are selling and advertisers are buying area on a page, whether that is measured in agate lines, columns of a square inch.

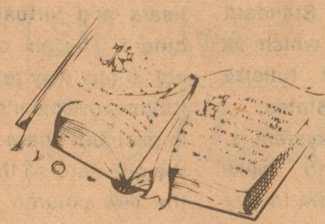

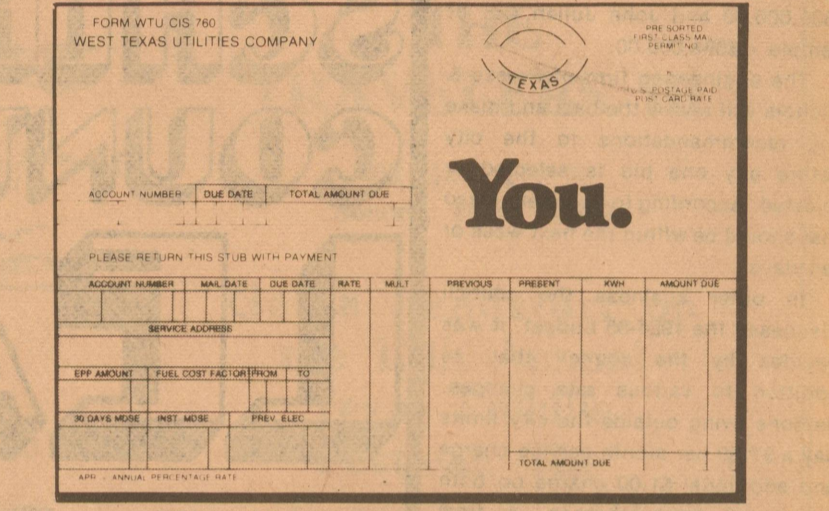

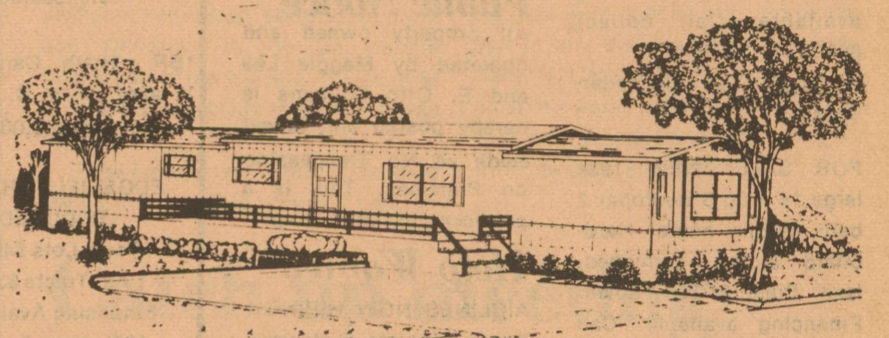
