

Rodeo kicks off Friday night

The Schleicher County Rodeo Association sponsored 15th Annual Eldorado Open Rodeo will begin this week-end's celebration with it's first performance Friday night at 8:00 p.m.

Lester Meier of Fredericksburg will be stock producer again this year for the two day rodeo. The rodeo events include: bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, calf roping, team roping, bull riding, steer wrestling and girls barrel racing.

All winners in each event will receive a \$600 Skyline Trophy buckle.

One hundred gallons of gasoline

will also be raffled off during both rodeo performances. Tickets for the raffle can be bought from and S.C.R.A. member or can be purchased at the gate.

The new Rodeo Queen will be crowned during Saturday evening's performance also.

Tickets for the rodeo will be \$4.00 at the gate or advanced tickets can be purchased for \$3.50 from any of the five queen candidates.

Bob Blandford will be providing the music for the rodeo dance after Friday night's performance and The Texas Time Machine will perform for the dance at the slab on Saturday night.

The fun begins with the Fun Run at 9:00 A.M. followed by the parade through downtown Eldorado.

School registration starts Wednesday

Registration for the 1984-85 school year gets underway August 15th at the high school for the junior high and high school grades.

Seventh grade will register August 15th at 9:00 A.M.

Eighth graders will register also on August 15th at 10:30 A.M.

The ninth grade will register at 1:00 P.M. on the 15th.

August 16th will see the 10th grade registering at 9:00 A.M., the 11th grade at 10:30 A.M. and 12th grade at 1:00 P.M.

The official opening of the 1984-85 school year will be Monday August 20, 1983 with a regular schedule of classes. The school buses will run on a regular schedule and will travel the routes as they did last year, although some changes may be made to accommodate new students.

Teachers have been in workshops all summer with the most recent being a three day writing workshop for language art teachers.

Several changes will be made because of House Bill 246 and House Bill 72. The state now

requires 170 days of compulsory attendance. Credit cannot be given to a student with more than five days of unexcused absences during a semester, also a student cannot miss a class more than 10 times (full year courses or 5 times per semester course) to participate in extra-curricular activities.

Lunch prices have been increased by 10 cents per lunch. Students in grades Kindergarten - third may buy lunches for 90 cents, grades four - six for \$1.00, and seventh - twelfth for \$1.10. School personnel may buy lunches for \$1.45 and adult visitors for \$3.00.

House Bill 246 has also made several changes in the essential elements. Students entering the 9th grade this year will have additional courses required for graduation. The required times for courses in the elementary school have also been changed.

A student who has not maintained a grade average for a school year equivalent to at least 70 on a scale of 100 may not be advanced from one grade level to the next.

It is the intent of the Legislature to return to a six weeks reporting period. The elementary has been on a six weeks schedule, the high school has been on a nine weeks reporting period, but will return to the six weeks reporting. Parents must sign and return a statement indicating they have received report cards for each student.

Senior exemptions are no longer permitted. House Bill 72 states a student may not be exempted from taking a final examination in any class in which any other student is required to take a final examination.

Students will be required to attend tutorials in a subject whose grade is lower than 70 on a scale of 100 during the next reporting period. The parents are required to provide transportation for students attending tutorials after school hours. Tutorials must be held twice a week. Tutorial sessions must be under the supervision of an appropriately certified teacher for each subject. Tutorials will be provided in the subjects of Language, Art, Mathematics, Science and Social Studies for grades K-12.

Tax rebates still down

According to State Comptroller Bob Bullock's monthly report, Eldorado is still in an economic slump. The city received a check from Bullock this week for \$6,304.81 for this period. Last year's payment for the same period was \$9,329.98. This latest check brings the total up to \$36,956.58 for 1984's total. Last year's total at this time was \$51,122.23. This results in a decrease of 27.71% from last year.

Our neighbors to the west in Merton have chosen to go just the other way since they show an increase of 28.28% over last year's figures. Their check this month totaled \$5,335.61 which was down somewhat from last year's check for the same period when it was \$5,581.88. Their 1984 total payments are \$36,524.54 compared to 1983's total payments to date of \$28,471.97.

Sonora is showing a small decrease over last year's figures with

7.01%. Their check amounted to \$29,232.86. Last year at the same time it was \$34,128.05. 1984 payments to date come to \$152,104.74 while 1983's payments to date for the same period totaled \$163,563.27.

Menard is again holding steady with a 3% increase over last year. Bullock sent a check to them for \$4,841.67 bringing this year's payments to date to \$28,661.13. Last year's payments to date totaled \$27,825.96.

San Angelo is also showing an increase with .56%. Their check totaled \$604,036.19 bringing 1984's total payments to date up to \$3,410,056.52. 1983's total payments dat tallied \$3,391,189.00.

Overall, Texas has experienced an increase of 12.68% Although bookkeeping changes that were part of last year's tax deadline speedups made the August 1984 payment smaller than the previous August

payment, Bullock said year-to-date comparisons can be made accurately.

"This 12 and a half percent increase is honest growth over last year because both this August payment and last August's are based on all sales reported during the first half of both years," Bullock said.

Houston received the largest check, \$17.1 million, bringing Houston's yearly total to \$99.3 million. Dallas' check was for \$11.7 million. Dallas has received \$66.9 million so far this year.

San Antonio's check was for \$6.1 million, a 6.1 percent increase over the July 1983 payment. Austin received \$4.3 million, boosting that city's total for the year to \$24.1 million. The Fort Worth payment was \$3.5 million.

Midland received \$911,000, bringing the yearly total to \$5.3 million, ahead of last year's total through August by 10.7 percent.

Miss Victoria Powell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James L. Powell, will

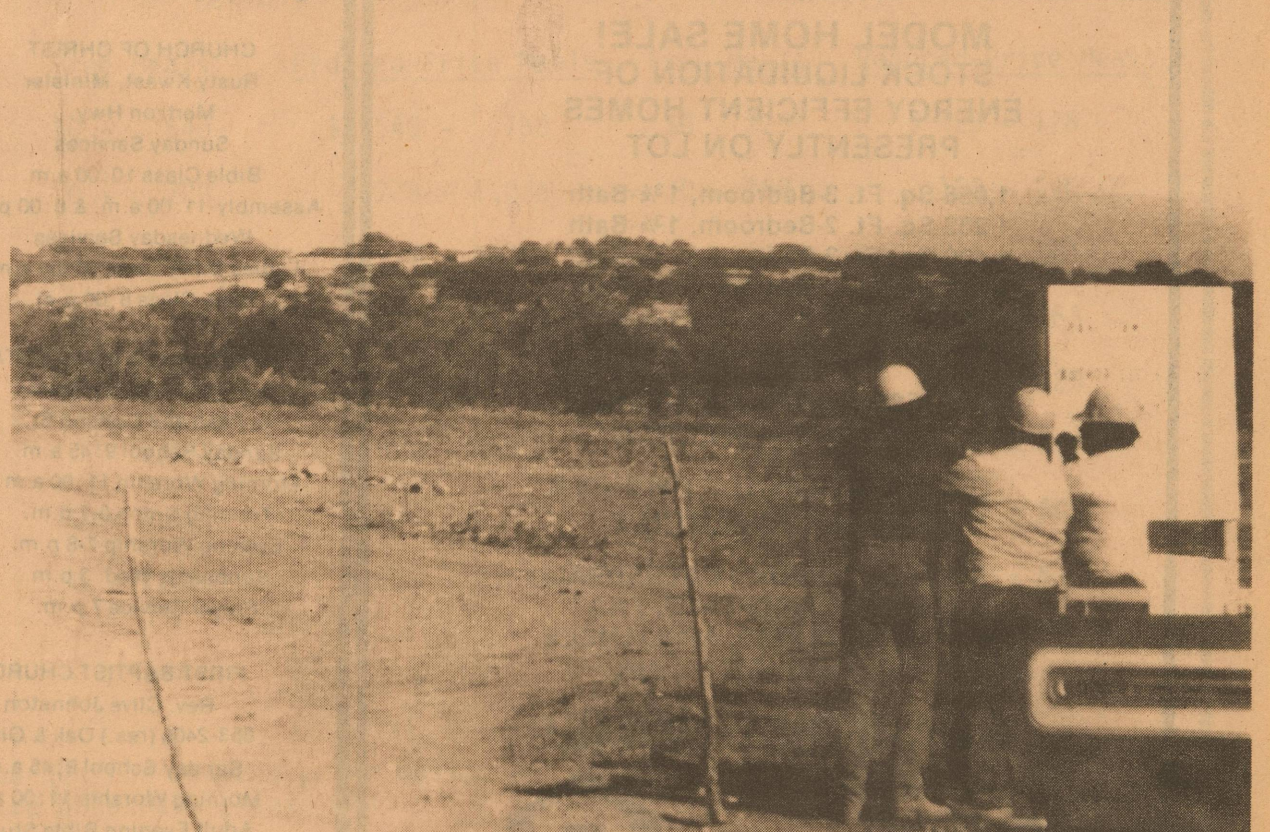
be participating in the Austin Aqua Festival. She will be one of the

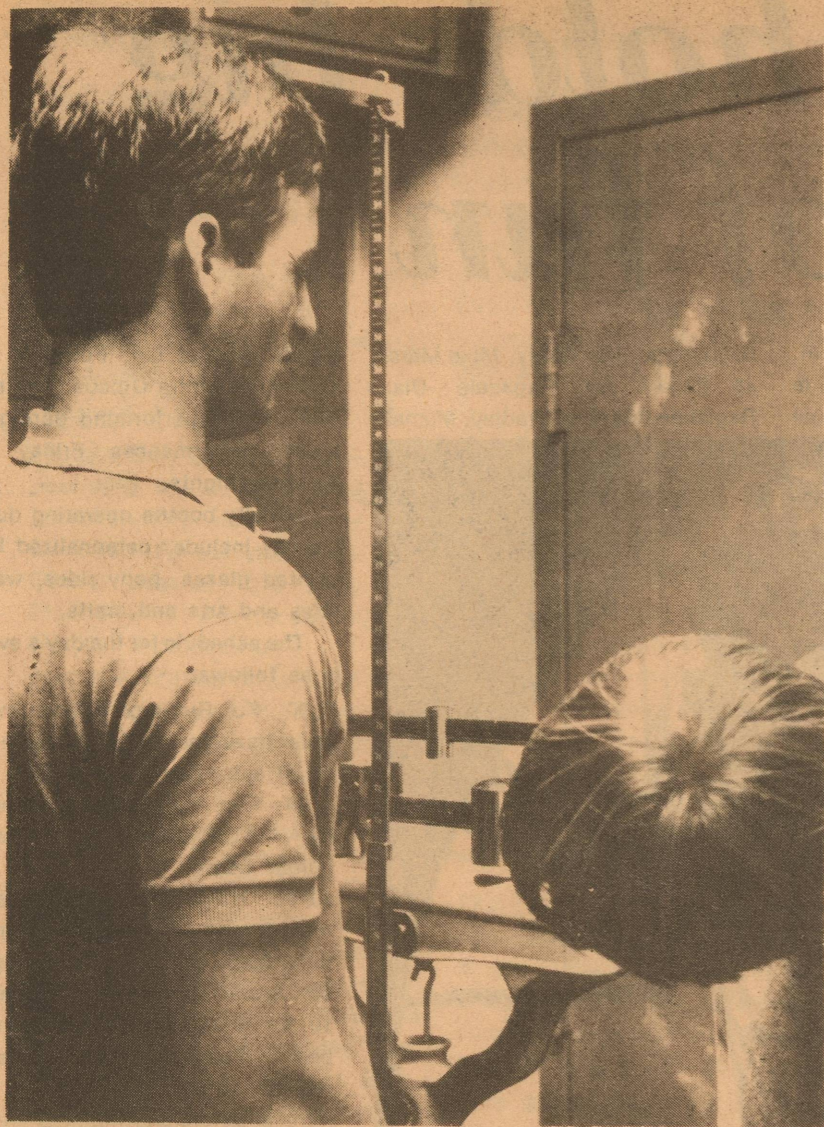

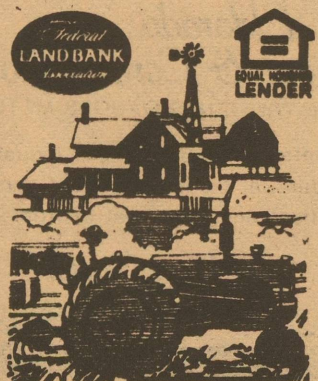
A 3-Wheeler Honda will be given away to the lucky winner, the proceeds from the tickets will go to the Christmas Decorations Fund.

Rig count up

The prospect for increased state taxes on the petroleum industry grows stronger by the month. The Texas Research League in Austin estimates the 1985 Legislature will go into its January session 1.5 billion dollars behind for the 1985-86 biennium. And, that figure is with a no-growth budget!

We reported earlier that the Legislative Budget Board is predicting a shortage of 1.04 billion dollars for 1985-86.

Depending on the economy and the price of oil and gas, the state deficit could be lower, or higher.

Since the petroleum industry did

not get nit by increased taxes in the special session of the legislature, most state government observers say the industry will be a prime tax target in 1985.

The price of oil on the spot market has been dropping recently and some companies are also lowering the price they will pay for domestic crude oil. Several OPEC countries began increasing production earlier this summer when the Iran-Iraq war heated up and this contributed to the oversupply on the market. Drilling in the Permian Basin should remain strong, unless the price falls several more dollars per barrel.

Northern Natural Resources has announced that a 135-mile Central Basin CO2 pipeline will be built to carry gas to Andrews, Crane, Ector and Gaines Counties for oil recovery projects. Northern says it will cost about \$100 million to build and operate the pipeline.

The Permian Basin rig count for this week is 346. Last week 333 and one year ago 243.

Three screwworm cases found

Confirmation of three screwworm cases about 100 miles south of Rio Grande City in Mexico should concern livestock producers in this area, Dr. John W. Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission, said today.

The three cases are in an area about 30 miles southeast of Monterrey in Mexico.

"Cattlemen in this area need to again be on the lookout for possible screwworm infestations. Producers are encouraged to submit any suspected screwworm cases to the fly lab in Mission. Take a sample of the infestation. Sample kits are available from Texas Animal Health Commission area offices, county agent offices, and other outlets," Dr. Holcombe said.

The last confirmed screwworm case in Texas was Aug. 31, 1982.

"It has been nearly two years since we have had a screwworm case in Texas," Dr. Holcombe noted.

"This is due in large part to the cooperation of livestock producers in checking for possible screwworm outbreaks, and continued vigilance is needed now," he said.

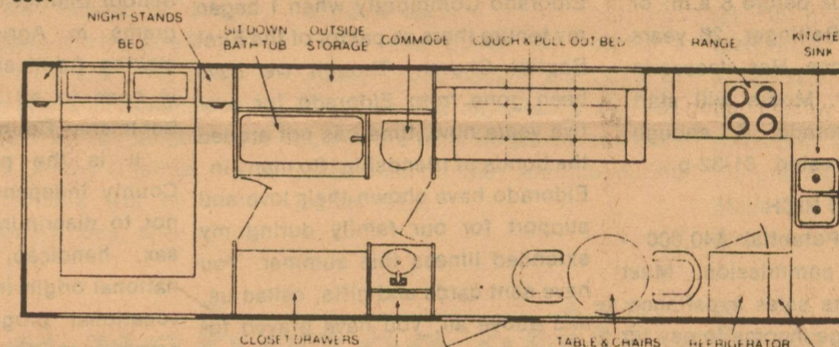

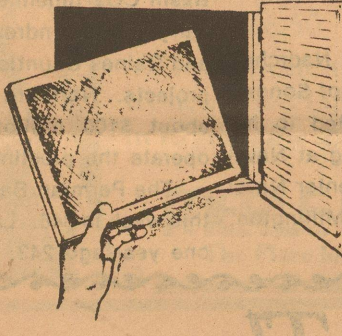
