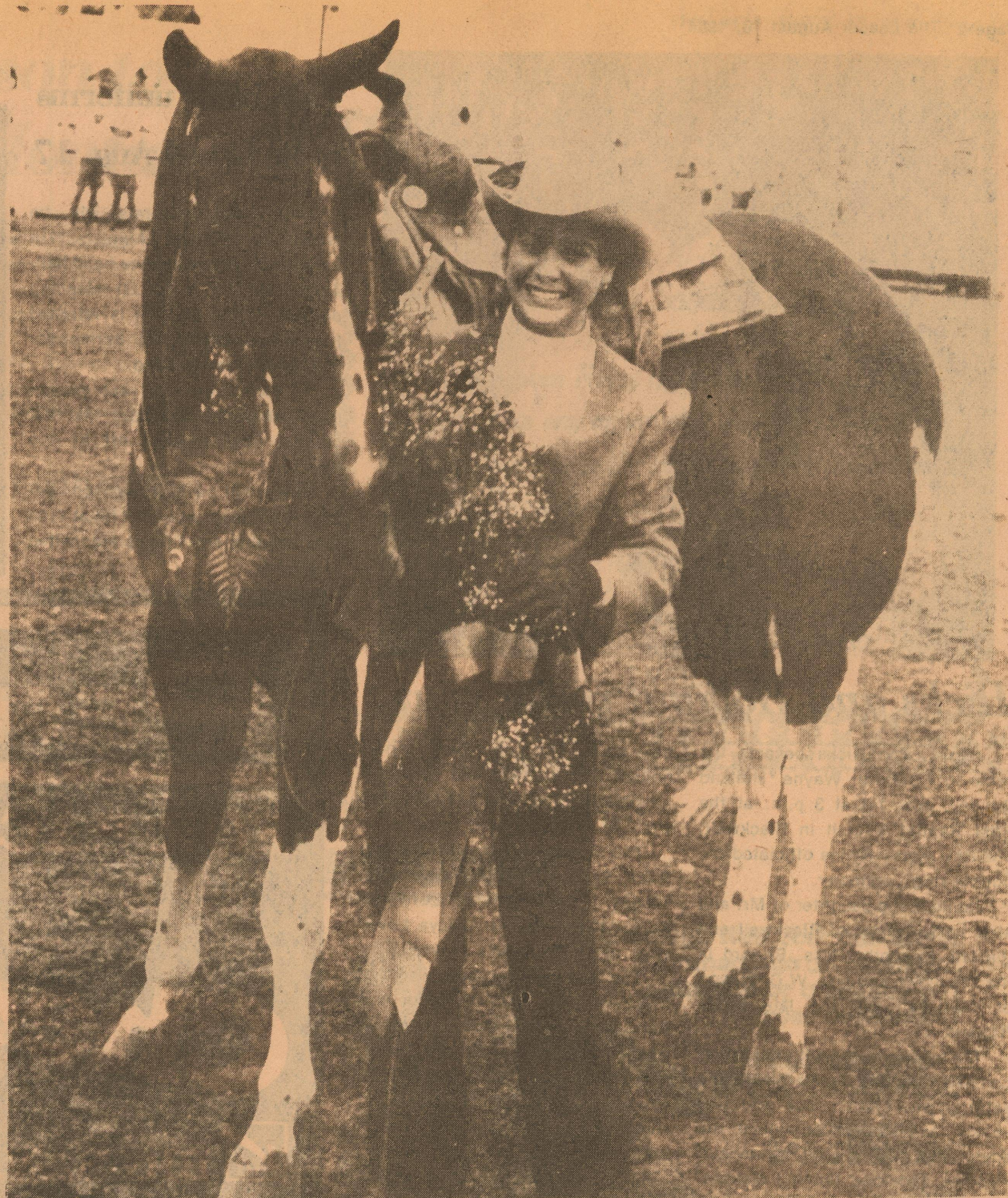


Wendi named Queen

Sewer plan bid ok'ed

In the regular meeting of the Eldorado City Council Tuesday evening August 7th, the council gave the ok to Anglin Construction for the construction of the wastewater treatment plant. Bill Foster from the engineering firm of Freese & Nichols made the recommendation to the council that Anglin be awarded the contract after reviewing all bids submitted for the job. He reported that Anglin would like to begin work in approximately two weeks. Foster also briefed the council concerning Pinetree Utilities who were supposed to begin work on the CDBG project sometime ago but have failed to begin as of yet. A question and answer period was then held concerning the wastewater treatment plant and the engineering costs for the same.

The council discussed the eight applicants who have applied for the job of City Superintendent. The City Secretary was asked to check references and salary requirements for three of the applicants.

Elton McGinnes, representing Southwest Texas Electric Co-op,

met with the council to request their permission for the Co-op to pave the southeast portion of the street running between the current SWTEC pavement and Nikolauk property. The council gave it's okay for the improvements including the extension of the pavement and drainage maintenance.

The council viewed a film presentation on a Reclaimer I, for repairing streets. The film was presented by David Martinez, representing Kuenstler Machinery, after the film and discussion period, Martinez told the council he would get back to them at a later date concerning cost studies, demonstration of the machinery and references.

Floyd West submitted the only bid for the surplus equipment offered by the city. West's bid of \$1.00 was for the Pak-Mor tank.

The Civil Defense storage facility was reported to be in unsatisfactory condition and City Secretary Mayo reported on a proposal from a county official to locate another building to house the CD supplies.

No citizens appeared for the budget hearing and revenue sharing proposed use so the council voted that the budget be approved. The council set the tax rate at 57.8 cents per \$100 assessment.

In other business the council: read and approved the minutes from the last meeting; approved the bills for payment; agreed to execute the Texas Municipal League's Updated Service Credit Agreement; made an amendment to Traffic Ordinance #109-82 calling for a 20 mph speed zone on Western Drive and stop signs entering Murchison Avenue from Western Drive; called for the installation of a yield sign at the intersection with Cottonwood and Paseo de Vaca; and raised the beer license to \$30 per year and liquor license to \$100 per year.

With no further business on the agenda, the council then adjourned.

Co-op cook-out

The 39th annual meeting of the Southwest Texas Electric Co-op was held Tuesday evening August 14th on the courthouse lawn beginning at 7:00 p.m. with a barbeque meal prepared by D. Tyler of Sonora. Approximately 850 people were served.

The meeting was called to order by president, Fred Case. He introduced Peyton Cain, secretary, who declared there was a quorum present and the meeting could continue. He then read the minutes of the previous meeting.

Jim Martin, superintendent of engineering, gave special recognition to guests who were present. Some of those were Ron Somerville and Miké Vajdos, representing Somerville and Associates Insurance; James Smith, B&B Trailers; Wyman Stewart, Bedford (Beep) Cain - Texas State Bank, Frances Gregg and her mother and Dad, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Preston; Sonny Turner's mother and dad, Mr. and Mrs. Auti Turner, Mrs. Turner's dad, Mr. Bland Hope and Mrs. Turner's sister, Billie Gillis.

Secretary of the Board of Directors, Peyton Cain, gave a resume of work in the past, especially the past twenty years. He stressed the importance of work on rural lines and also of the danger if anything goes wrong. He appealed to customers to report faulty wires, lines down, faulty poles, etc. immediately so that they could be corrected.

He also reported that they would be helping in National defense as the Co-op will supply power for Pave Paws which has begun construction on the Jess Blaylock ranch. He commended the Co-op and manager Elton McGinnes for the work done in his tenure of office the past 20 years. He presented his resignation as secretary of the board at this time.

Vice President, W. W. Owens gave a statistical report on activities in the past and present. He gave figures of average electric bill, number of miles of line added and number of new meters added, farm, ranch, residential and irrigation meters. Also small commercial, large commercial and oil well meters.

Elton McGinnes gave the Manager's report and commended the Board of Directors for the work they have done and for the progress that has been shown through the years.

He stated that he had been with Southwest Texas Electric Cooperative for 39 years and 4 months and this was to be his last report as he would be retiring as of January 1, 1985 after sixteen years as Manager.

The Board has selected Sonny Turner, who has been assistant manager for nineteen years, to succeed Elton McGinnes as General Manager.

Wayne Mikeska presented the names of directors to serve for three years. Those nominated were: Bill Ferguson of Big Lake, Jerry Johnson of Sonora and Dick Runge of Christoval. They were elected by acclamation.

A. L. (Sonny) Turner, assistant manager, presented service awards to Peyton Cain - 20 year pin; Bill Hubble - 25 year pin and Doyle Easterwood, Western area superintendent of Big Lake, Ozona and Sheffield - 35 year pin.

Fred Case called Peyton Cain to the stand and told a few things about him such as the fact that he had never missed a board meeting in 20 years. He presented him with a Gift Certificate for \$500 and a plaque which was engraved with the words: "To Peyton Cain, secretary, in recognition and appreciation for faithful service to Southwest Texas Electric Coop from 1964 - 1984 by members

of the Board."

The president announced that Bill Ferguson of Big Lake was selected by the Board to be secretary beginning after this meeting.

There was a large and appreciative crowd to enjoy the food, fellowship and the meeting.

Sonora is gearing up for Sutton County Days which will be held August 23, 24 and 25th.

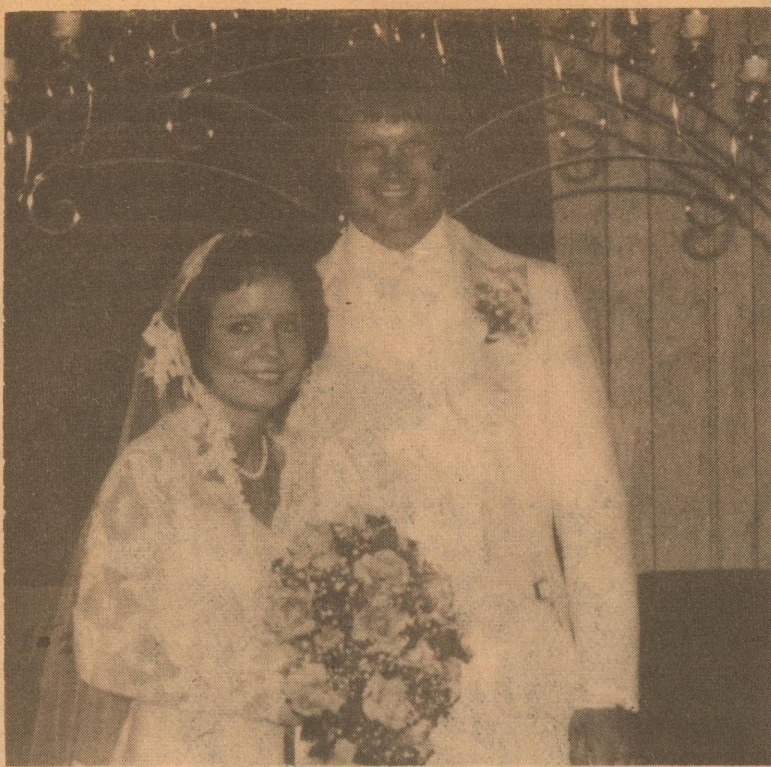

There will be drill team competition on Friday, August 17th at 7:00 p.m. Parents and friends are invited to attend.

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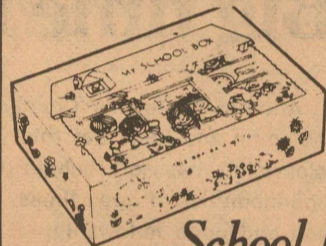
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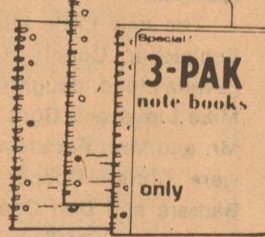
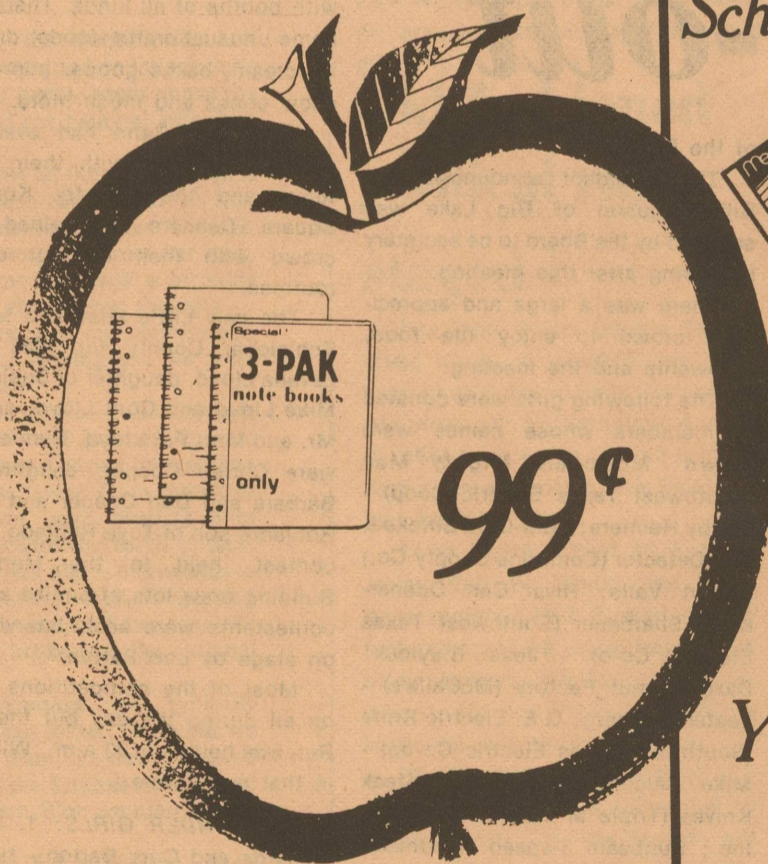
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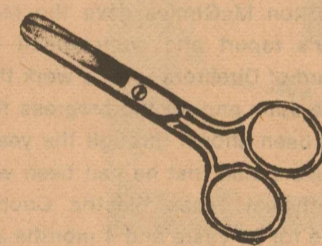
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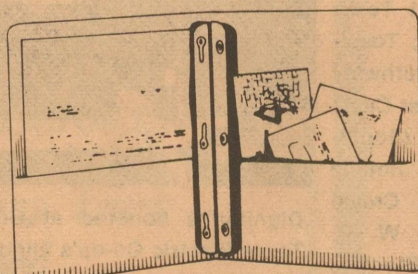
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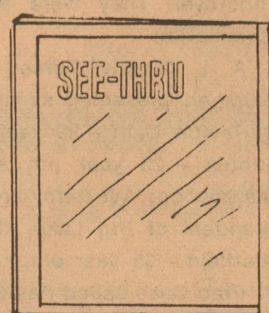
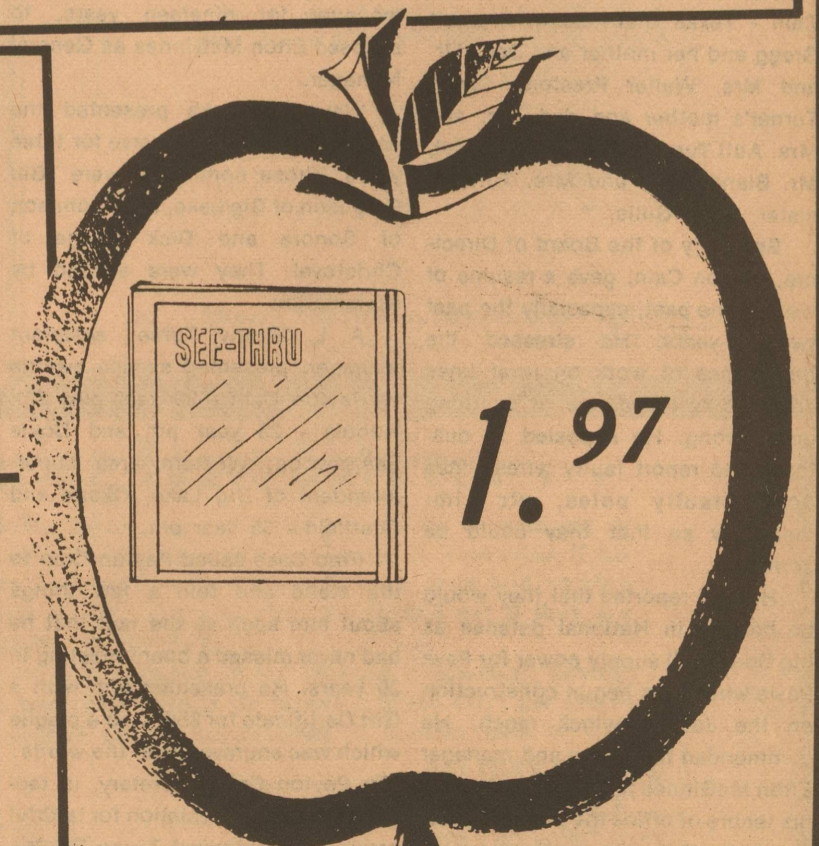

Ranchers Round-up held

Many Texas ranchers have experienced extreme drought during the past several years, and most are still facing its devastating effects. Spotty, yet sometimes good rains have come to only a few scattered areas of the state.

As a result, one of the most critical decisions facing ranchers is how to best manage the rangelands to benefit both livestock and wildlife during the drought.

Several speakers at the 4th Annual International Ranchers Roundup in San Angelo July 30-Aug 3 addressed many of these concerns.

"There are many different alternatives to consider that will assist in improving rangelands, yet each of these is important only when it benefits the entire ranch operation. The concept of holistic ranch management should be considered in determining the best alternatives for the present and future of a ranch," said Dr. Larry White, range specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

White, one of three IRR coordinators and a moderator for the

range session, related the discussions to the conference theme of "Holistic Ranch Management -- Putting It All Together."

Among critical considerations are those concerning the number of animal units a ranch can support, particularly during an extended drought.

There is probably no one best range management system that can apply to all ranches, since no two ranches are exactly alike, explained Wayne T. Hamilton, formerly a manager of a large Southwest Texas ranch and conservationist, and now a member of the Department of Range Science at Texas A&M University.

IRR coordinators also announced that the 1985 Ranchers Roundup will be held in Laredo next July 29 - Aug. 2. Besides White, coordinators included Dr. LeRoy Hoermann, district Extension director of Southwest Texas, based in Uvalde; and Robert Kensing, Extension farm management specialist West Central Texas, headquartered in San Angelo.

Commissioners call for LPG bids

In a relatively short session Monday morning the Schleicher County Commissioners court voted to call for bids for LPG for the county vehicles' use for the year.

The court voted to close off some of the alleys in the west part of the cemetery.

The budget and tax rate were next discussed at length by the commissioners.

The commissioners voted to participate in Child Support Month in Texas.

In the last item of business the court approved the insuring of the Memorial Building for the upcoming year. The court also agreed to lease the Gaines County School lands for another year.

Cheese and Butter

Commodity butter and cheese will be distributed on Wednesday August 22nd at the Memorial Building from 2 p.m. - 5 p.m. New income guidelines have been set to determine eligibility for receiving this food. The income guidelines are as follows:

Persons who receive food stamps, AFDC, SSE, or Medicaid (non-institutional) are automatically eligible to receive donated foods only once a month. To receive the food you must bring some form of identification with you. This might be a drivers license, food stamp ID, Medicaid card, AFDC Eligibility Letter, SSI Award Letter, Social Security Card or other.

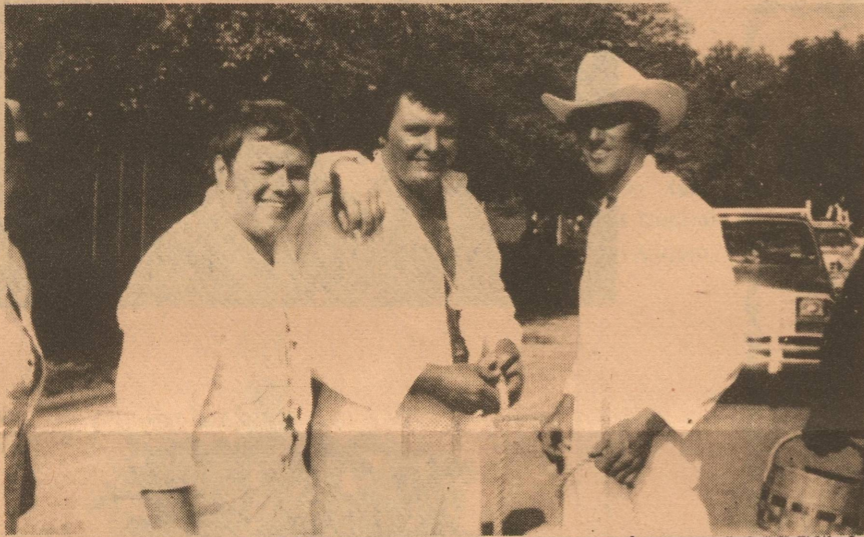
Shriners create new Nobles

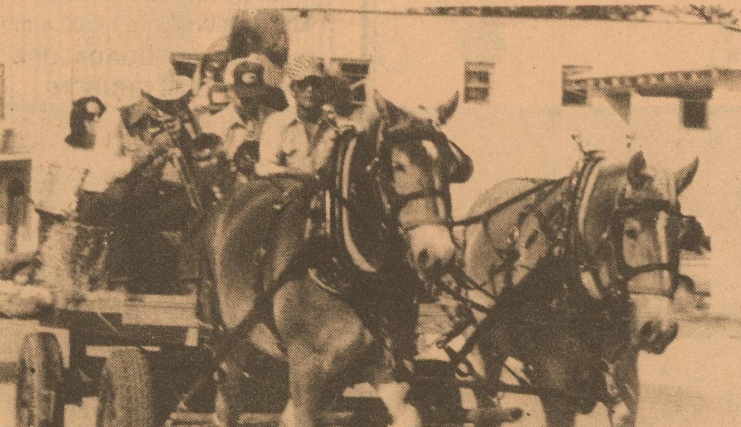
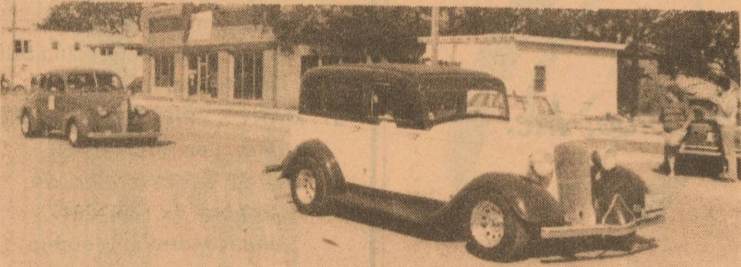

The 1984 Summer Olympics

Olympic competition always brings out our deep respect for the dedication and devotion required of our nation's athletes.

We appreciate the long hours of intense training, the pain, and the sacrifice required to even be selected to represent our country. And, win or lose, we know that these competitors have given their best.

But it would be impossible to deny the special pride and patriotism that we feel when America's best stand on the winner's block, Olympic gold medals around their necks, heads above the others, as the American flag is raised and our national anthem is played.

And what has made the summer of 1984 all the more special is that this proud patriotic spirit has not been confined to the first summer Olympics in half a century on America's shores. There is, without a doubt, a new patriotic spirit sweeping across our land.

On the Fourth of July this year, America threw a birthday party that — with huge, happy crowds throughout the land — seemed to reflect a sense of shared pleasure in our country and what America represents. From sea to shining sea we were treated to spectacles of joyous celebration.

Despite intense Soviet efforts, 140 nations, a record, sent competitors to Los Angeles. The 1984 Summer Olympics have been an enormous and moving success — truly exemplifying the motto of the games: "Swifter, Higher, Stronger."

To that motto could easily be added: "Together." For, among the unforgettable scenes played out during the Olympics is the memory of Peter Vidmar of the United States and Li Ning of the People's Republic of China — young athletes from different cultures, whose governments embrace totally different political philosophies.

Yet they stood together, smiling with joy and mutual respect because both were awarded Olympic gold medals in recognition of individual gymnastic perfection. In such sharing by these young competitors lies the hope of future sharing and further understanding in a world we all hope to make a better, safer place. In this Olympic summer, we celebrate not only America's Olympic efforts — but a renewed appreciation for the greatness, opportunity, and generosity of spirit that is truly American.

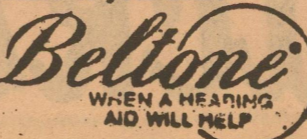
