Fort McKavett State Historic Site will hold a Living History Program on Saturday, July 13, 1985 and Sunday, July 14, 1985. The Fort will come alive by featuring frontier soldiers of Company F, 16th Memorial Infantry and Company D, 4th Memorial Cavalry out of Fort Concho in San Angelo, Texas. Their activities will include drilling, inspections, cooking period foods, fatigue details (complete with a mule drawn wagon), guard posting and other daily activities of the 1870's soldier. The soldiers will wear authentic uniforms and live out of a refurnished barracks. The formal encampment will begin at 12 noon Saturday and will conclude about 3 p.m. Sunday. Fort McKavett State Historic Site is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and admission is free. Camping or alcoholic beverages are not allowed in the park. Fort McKavett State Historic Site is located in Menard County. To get there, go 17 miles west of Menard on Highway 190, then south 6 miles on FM 864, or go 13 miles west of Junction on Interstate 10, then 28 miles north on



The Texas Department of Public Safety estimates that as many as 17 people will die in traffic accidents in the state during the 30-hour July 4 'Though this year's estimate is

lower than last year's death toll, the final figure could be even lower if Texans refrained from drinking and limit and buckled their safety belts," said Colonel Jim Adams, director of

Last year, 20 persons died in crashes on Texas streets and highways during the July 4 holiday period. Three additional fatalities resulting from serious injuries during the period pushed the final toll to

"This year's estimate of 17 deaths compared to the higher number of fatalities last year is in keeping with a downward trend in Texas traffic fatalities," said Adams. In 1984, 48 per cent of the fatalities reported during the July 4 period resulted from accidents in which speed or DWI was listed as a contributing factor.

"In an effort to limit the number of deaths, additional DPS troopers will again be patrolling rural roads and highways during the holiday period." Adams said

The Department's "Operation Motorcide," in which the number of fatalities will be reported at intervals through the period to remind Texas drivers of holiday driving dangers, begins at 6 p.m. Wednesday, July 3 and continues through midnight Thursday, July 4.



# S.S. News

You do not have to be completely without funds to get Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments. In fact, you can have monthly income of \$325 and assets of \$1600 or, if you are married, you can have an income of \$488 and assets of \$2400 and still be eligible.

Because of these limits on income and assets, you must tell Social Security if you have a savings or checking account, certificates of deposit, or a Christmas Club Account. Once these accounts have been reported to Social Security, they need not be reported again; however, you must report any changes in the accounts.

Social Security must also be told about changes in a bank account if you have a child who is getting SSI





Public Utility Commission of Texas asking permission to refund \$13.7 million in fuel costs savings and interest to its retail customers.

Glen D. Churchill, WTU president and chief executive officer, said the refund is possible because of efforts by the Company to reduce production costs by obtaining cheaper boiler fuel and buying available economy power from other companies. As result, WTU has actually been able to spend less for power plant fuel than was anticipated when the fuel factors were established by

since August 1984 when the fuel recovery account was last reconciled by the Commission. The total available for refunding includes \$12.6 million in actual savings, plus an estimated \$1.1 million in interest.

"We want to pass these savings on to our customers as quickly as possible in order to bring some relief during the season of hot weather and high utility bills" Churchill said. "While we are not yet due for a reconciliation, we are voluntarily asking permission to make refunds

Since 1983, electric customers in Texas have been charged for fuel according to fixed fuel factors set by the PUC. This method of fuel cost recovery was ordered by the PUC to replace the automatic monthly fuel adjustment which matched fuel billings to fuel expense immediately and under which utilities had operated for many years.

Under present rules, a reconciliation of the fuel costs may be required a year after the factors are fixed, but adjustments are possible

WTU proposes to make the refunds to existing customers through a one-time credit to their bills, commencing immediately after Commission approval. Refunding through bill credits would be more timely, efficient and cost effective than attempting to send customers checks, Churchill said.

The credit would be calculated on an individual customer basis using each customer's monthly kilowatt-hour consumption during the period involved.

Refund amounts will vary with the amount of the customer's usage. The average residential customer is expected to receive about \$32






