Fort McKavett comes alive the 13th

Fort McKavett State Historic Site will hold a Living History Program on Saturday, July 13, 1985 and Sunday, July 14, 1985. The Fort will come alive by featuring frontier soldiers of Company F, 16th Memorial Infantry and Company D, 4th Memorial Cavalry out of Fort Concho in San Angelo, Texas. Their activities will include drilling, inspections, cooking period foods, fatigue details (complete with a mule drawn wagon), guard posting and other daily activities of the 1870's soldier. The soldiers will wear authentic uniforms and live out of a re-furnished barracks. The formal encampment will begin at 12 noon Saturday and will conclude about 3 p.m. Sunday. Fort McKavett State Historic Site is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and admission is free. Camping or alcoholic beverages are not allowed in the park. Fort McKavett State Historic Site is located in Menard County. To get there, go 17 miles west of Menard on Highway 190, then south 6 miles on FM 864, or go 13 miles west of Junction on Interstate 10, then 28 miles north on

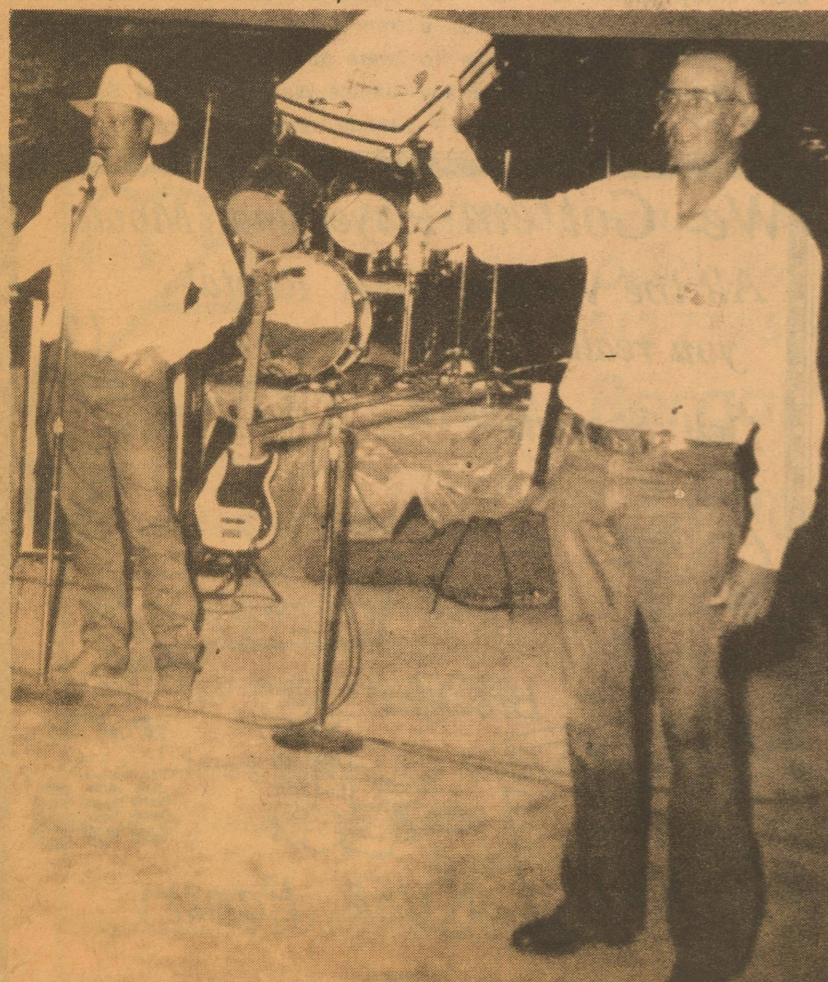

Goat Roping set....

The Brewster-Jeff Davis Adult Leaders Association will promote, advertise, sponsor, and hold the Almost the World Champion Goat Roping to be held in Alpine, Texas on August 3, 1985.

The contest will be held at Sul Ross State University Roping Arena rain or shine, according to the rules established by the Brewster-Jeff Davis 4H Adult Leaders Association for this contest. A copy of the rules may be obtained from the Adult Leaders Association.

The Almost the World Champion Goat Roping will consist of a preliminary three go-round jackpot, progressive after two head, unless over 100 ropers, then progressive

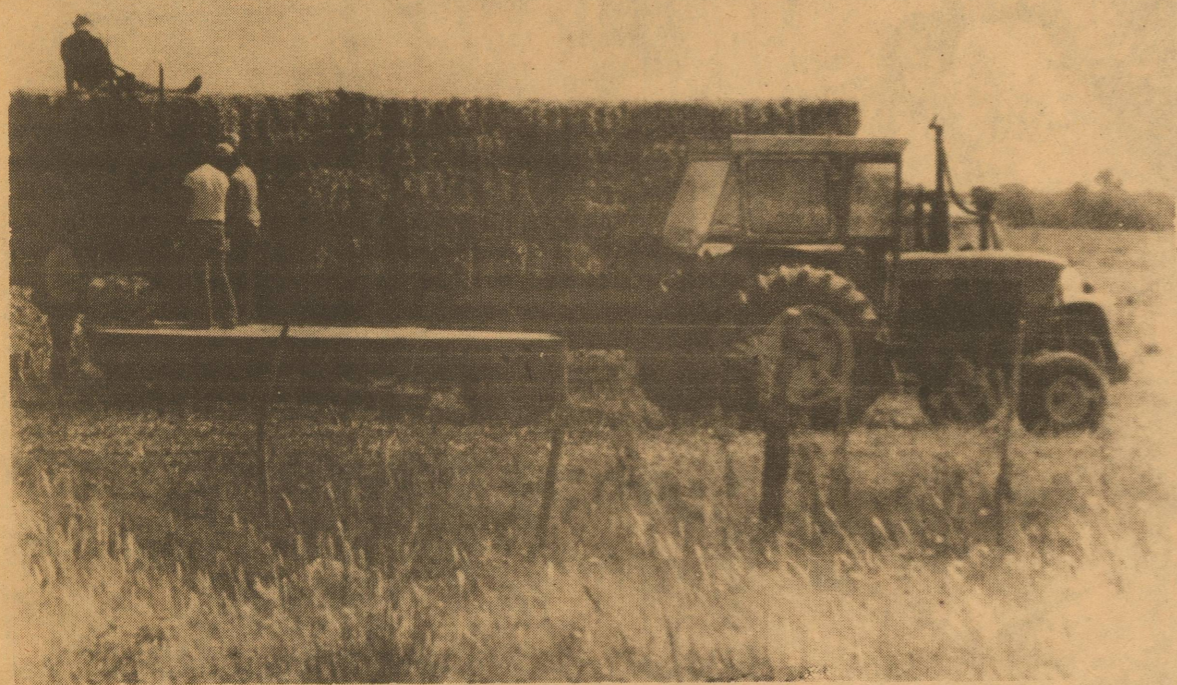
after one. This elimination jackpot will begin at 10:00 a.m. with books opening at 7:00 a.m. and closing at the end of the first Go. Each roper must have roped his/hers two goats to be entered into the final round. The final contestants will rope fast back. The roper who has the fastest time on three head will be crowned "ALMOST THE WORLD CHAMPION GOAT ROPER."

Entry fee is \$55.00 with \$5.00 going to benefit the 4H Livestock Feeders. A belt buckle and the title of "Almost the World Champion Goat Roper" will go to the winner, with a breast collar for 2nd and 3rd place ropers.

The goats to be roped will be yearling Spanish goats, sorted for even size and furnished by a rancher. Roping positions will be hand drawn by the officials running the roping prior to rope time. Goats will not have numbers, and ropers will not draw for goats. Each roper will get a fresh goat in the first go-round. The goats will be rerun for the second and third go round.

Permian basin Report

With the highjacking of TWA Flight 847, it becomes ever more apparent that we are in a continuing war with different ideologies on many different fronts.

Also, with each occurrence becoming more savage in it's make-up, we are going to have to decide just where we, the United States of America stand in all this, and what we can do to put a stop to it. The first thought is to drop an A-Bomb on the Middle-East. But this misses

the trained, and training, terrorists in Libya and Cuba. Besides, it really would kill far too many innocent victims of the various sects, groups and classes involved.

A more effective move, as President Regan has indicated, would be to cut off Lebanon from doing business with the civilized world. You do this by cutting of all U.S. financial aid, and by getting the rest of the civilized world to join in.

Of course, we'd have to do the same thing to Syria, Libya, Iran, Russia, Cuba and a few others, but this will work.

Unfortunately, we don't have enough crude oil production to quit doing business with some of these aforementioned countries. And, with passage of any of the tax proposals being offered, with the independent segment of the domestic petroleum industry as the main course, we're going to have less domestic production. Adding to this problem is the gradual elimination of independent refineries in the United States.

Unless we stop the downward trend in both domestic crude oil production and the numbers of refineries, we are going to be even more dependent on those nuts, roaming the streets of Beirut and brandishing their K-47, Russian made automatic weapons in one hand, and a sign with a clinched fist and the slogan "Death to America" in the other hand. Please note that the sign says "America" not Americans. In other words, they want to kill this country!!

We've written this before, but believe it bears repeating—can you imagine the gutsy gurgles of glee Khomeini, Khadafy and Gorbachev will explode with should Congress pass any of the Tax Proposals, whether it be the Administration's; Kemp-Kasten; Gebhardt-Bradley; Ron Wyden or even Don Nickles. Because, when it happens, you can kiss the wildcatter good-bye and that means 85 percent less exploratory wells and 60 percent less new crude oil reserves. No wonder they'll be laughing!!

Reports from Washington

International Espionage — The Threat From Within

Reports of the Walker family spy ring have stiffened the resolve of many of us in Congress to — once and for all — deal with the growing problem of international espionage. In my view, this nation faces no greater threat to our security than a threat from within.

In a nation which places a high premium on individual freedoms, Congress has often found it difficult to pass laws effective in identifying, apprehending and punishing agents of espionage. For years, liberal members of the House and Judiciary Committee had blocked efforts to enact strong laws to address crime under the prosecutorial jurisdiction of the Federal government. Only after the wrath of the American public threatened to spill over into the November, 1984, election did enough moderates in the Congress join with conservatives to push through the Comprehensive Crime Control Act.

This year, armed with the "get tough" directives of the Crime Control Act, the FBI came before the Judiciary Committee of the House to request that additional agents and funds be authorized to combat crimes, including those committed by terrorists and spies. The same liberal majority which had blocked passage of the Crime Control Act for so many years refused to provide the necessary authority. The issue was recently raised to the attention of the full House of Representatives during consideration of the Supplemental Appropriations Act. The House was precluded from working its will and providing appropriations for crime control on procedural grounds since the Judiciary Committee had not yet acted on the authorization legislation. From a procedural standpoint, the House was correct in not funding the FBI request. From a policy standpoint, we were dead wrong.

With incidents of espionage and international terrorism increasing before our very eyes, it is imperative that the Congress live up to its constitutional mandate to protect the United States and its citizens from its enemies, both foreign and domestic. How can we expect our law enforcement agencies and intelligence organizations to be successful in their missions if we do not give them the necessary resources to do their jobs?

We in Congress are already taking steps to tighten our security net. I have cosponsored H.R. 1082, the Omnibus Intelligence and Security Improvements Act, which restores the death sentence as a potential penalty for espionage and treason. The bill establishes comprehensive, fair and constitutional procedures for imposing the death penalty upon those who intentionally jeopardize the security of the United States by committing acts of treason. I also support efforts to require counterintelligence polygraph tests for all those applying for security-sensitive positions within the Department of Defense, as well as random polygraph testing throughout the security ranks of DOD. According to our counterintelligence agents, such random testing would provide a strong deterrent to internal spying such as is alleged in the Walker case.

In my view, a clear deterrent may be the only real solution to the growing problem of international espionage. We must demonstrate to those who would sell the security of the United States for their own personal gain that such treason will not be tolerated. The war against international espionage is a war the United States cannot afford to lose.

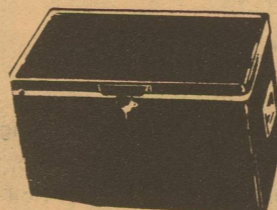

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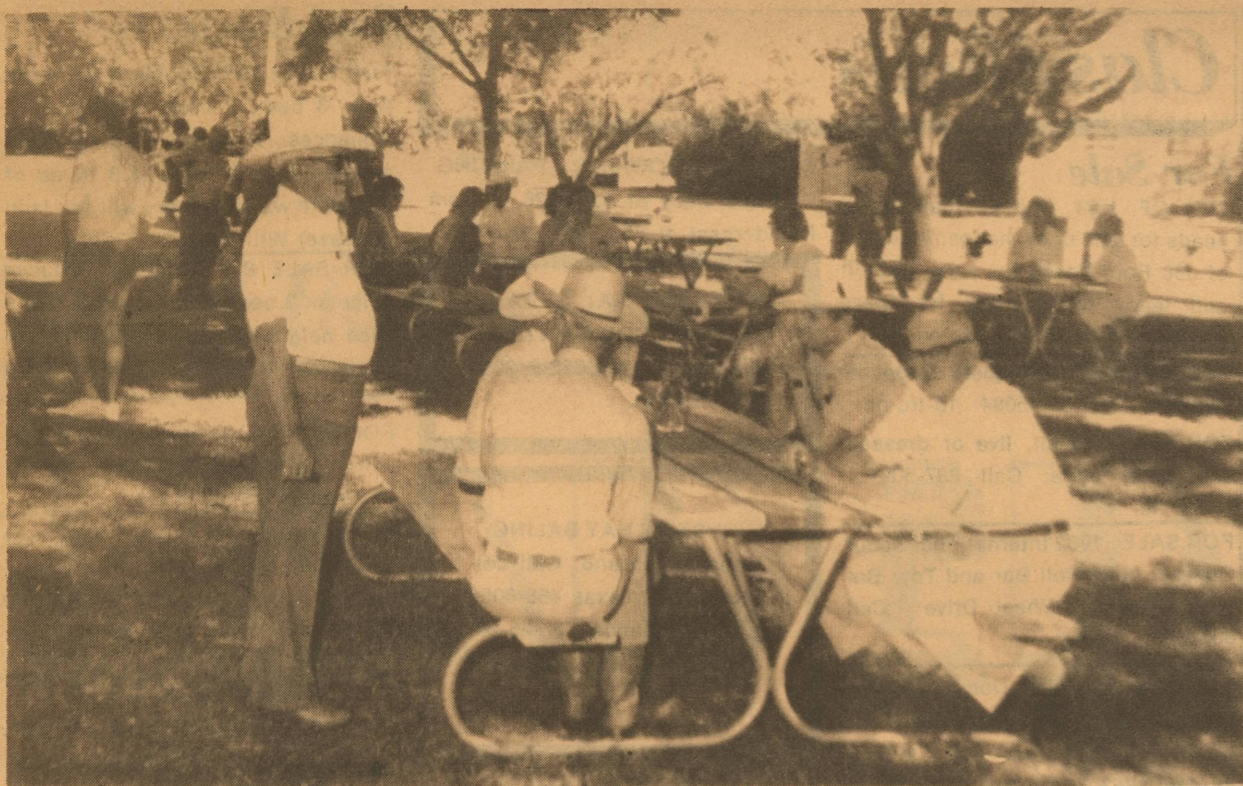

Masters Track Meet shaping up

A very large group of top quality athletes will be traveling to Ozona, Texas to participate in the West Texas Masters Track Meet, Texas largest Masters meet. Confirmed invitations are as follows: Dr. Charles Beaudry, who holds 11 world and American master meet records, Wendall Palmer, who holds 3 American records, Dr. Fred White, who holds 2 American records, and Dr. Hector Cisneros, who holds a world record in the decathlon. Those invited to Ozona who, as of this date, have not been confirmed, are Thane Baker of Dallas, a gold, silver, and bronze medal in the 1952 and 1956 Olympics and also holds 10 world and American masters records, J.E. Alexander from McCamey, who holds 4 world and American masters records, and John Artfield who holds a world record in the long jump and the high jump.

432 invitations have been sent to all parts of Texas, New Mexico, Kansas, Louisiana, and as far north as Woodstock, Illinois and Ontario, Canada. In 1984, the West Texas Masters registered 176 participants who entered one to thirteen events. Eighty four new division records were established and eight new overall records were replaced.

The West Texas Masters is the only masters track meet that rewards a team trophy to the team accumulating the most points. It is also the only masters meet that is an entire benefit for some young person in West Texas who is a victim of an unfortunate accident or illness. All

proceeds for the 1985 meet will be given to a 9 year old girl who is a victim of cancer, Michele Marshall in Ozona. A fund has been formed at the Ozona National Bank in Ozona.

There will be 13 mens divisions and 3 womens divisions. In the mens divisions, there are 9 running, and 7 field events. Entry fee will be \$5.00 for the first event and \$1.00 for each additional event, enter as many events as you wish. After July 6th, late registration will be \$7.00 for the first event and \$2.00 for each additional event. Deadline for all entries will be at the beginning of each event. The field events will begin at 2:30 p.m. and the running events will begin at 5:00 p.m. A 10 Kilometer run will be held at 9:00 a.m. A concession stand will be open all day for your convenience. Cold drinks, chips, sandwiches and fajitas will be served.
