Some of West Texas' best young rodeo prospects hail from Schleicher County—a fact that was given reinforcement by several local riders' performances at the Lester Meier Youth Rodeo in Fredricksburg last weekend.

Justin Paxton copped first place honors in the junior steer riding competition totaling 139 points on two steers.

Farley Dakan tied for third place in 10 and under calf riding, totaling 135 points on two calves.

Crissi McCormick was eighth in junior barrel racing and Stoney Hariman was sixth in junior bull riding with 133 points on two.

John R. Griffin and Traci Paxton also competed at the rodeo, held Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Any youngster who qualified third place or better at a rodeo this year could enter and the top eight competitors in each event after the first go-around qualified for the finals Saturday.

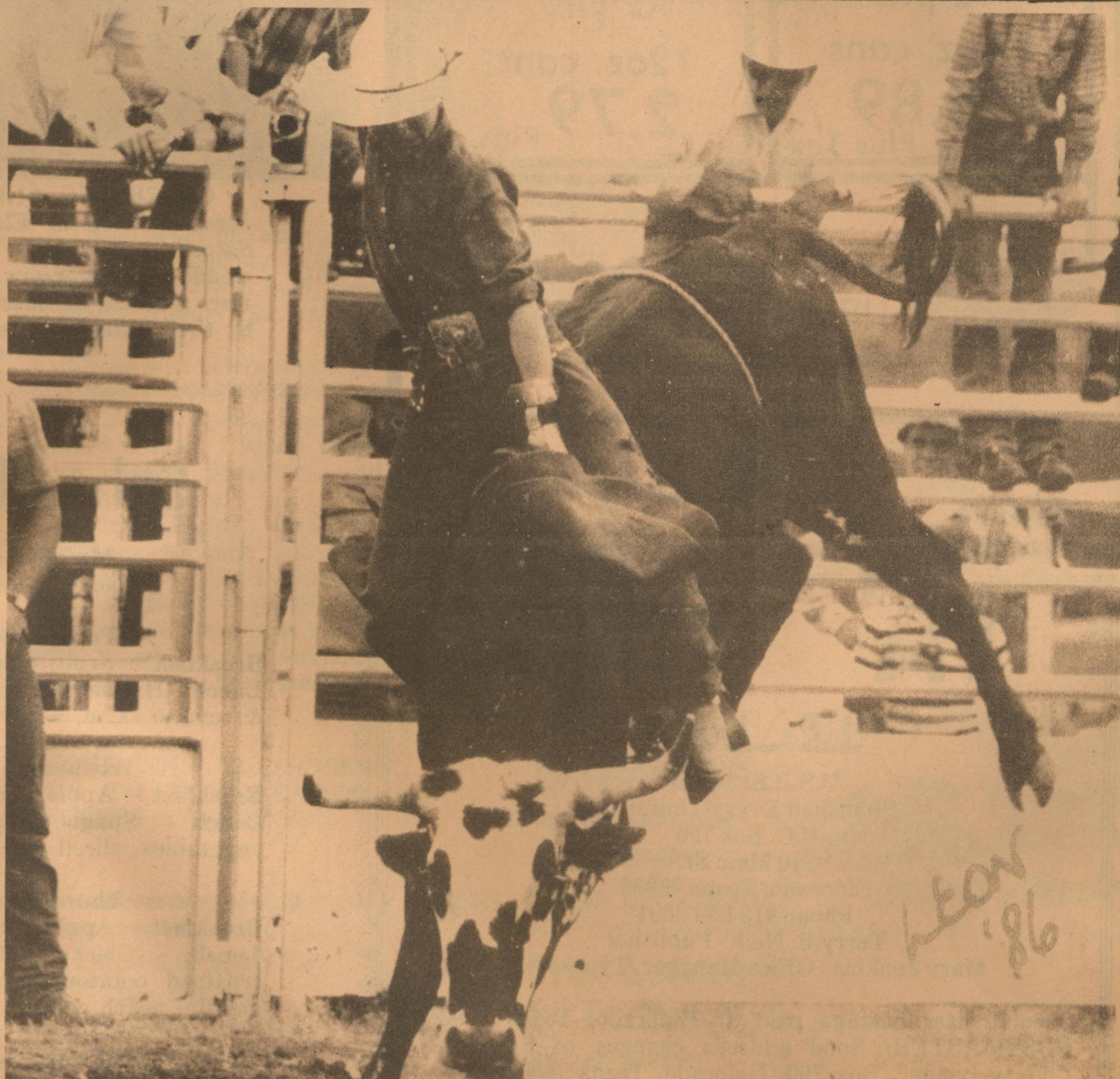
## Gazebo for courthouse lawn possible

# Drinking age changing

A different kind of dry spell is coming soon for some Texans.

W.S. McBeath, Administrator of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission, issued a reminder that the legal drinking age will rise to 21 on Labor Day. The present legal age is 19.

At 12:01 a.m. on Monday, September 1, possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages will be illegal for any person who has not reached his or her 21st birthday. The only exception is if the underage person is in the immediate physical presence of his own parents

or spouse who is over 21. Possession of an alcoholic beverage by the underage person is a misdemeanor with a possible fine of \$25 to \$200.

It is also a crime for the underage person to present false identification or to misrepresent his age in an attempt to purchase alcoholic beverages, or to successfully make such a purchase even without misrepresenting his age. In either case, the first offense fine is the same as for possession. Giving alcohol to a minor carries a fine of \$100 to \$500.

# Smith brings campaign here

Congressman Tom Loeffler and Lamar Smith, who is seeking Loeffler's seat in the House of Representatives this fall, were in Eldorado last Wednesday as part of the second leg of their 1,250-mile, 18-stop campaign tour of the 21st District.

The pair were guests at a luncheon in their honor at the Memorial Building Library, where their hosts included Schleicher County-Republican Chairman Floyd Butler.

Campaign officials said the three-day trip was the most ambitious and important for Smith since he began seeking the Republican

nomination 13 months ago. A former Bexar County Republican chairman, County Commissioner and State Representative, Smith won the GOP nod in June.

"With Congress in recess, this is a particularly good time to let everyone I can know how important it is to elect Lamar Smith our next congressman," said Loeffler, a fellow Republican who ran for governor this year and is retiring after four terms in Congress.

"The time has come to hand the reins of leadership in this vast district to a new person,"

## OVER LABOR DAY PERIOD

# DPS says 43 will perish

AUSTIN -- Officials of the Texas Department of Public Safety estimate that 43 persons could be killed in traffic accidents across the state during the Labor Day period.

The 78-hour holiday period begins at 6 p.m. Friday, August 29 and ends at midnight on Monday, September 1.

"During this period, the Department will have additional troopers on duty," Adams said. "We know that some drivers will be determined to violate the traffic laws. DPS officers will be taking enforcement action against as many violators as they can to increase the safety factor for law abiding motorists."

Adams said the final fatality count for the 1985 Labor Day period was 52.

"Twenty-one of the 52 deaths resulted from traffic accidents in which speed or DWI was a contributing factor," Adams pointed out. "That's why our officers will be concentrating

on these violations during the upcoming Labor Day weekend."

Adams said the DPS deeply appreciates the positive response shown by Texas motorists to the safety belt law.

"We'd like to mark the first anniversary of the seat belt law by having far fewer fatalities occur than our statisticians have estimated for the holiday period," Adams said.

During the July 4th holiday period earlier this summer, eight of nine persons killed in motorcycle accidents had not been wearing helmets.

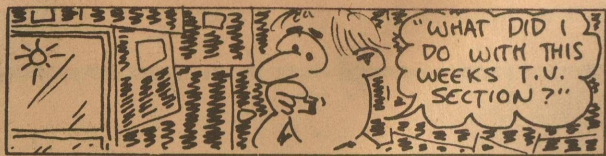
"Though only those motorcyclists 18 and younger are required to wear protective headgear, statistics show overwhelmingly that helmets save lives," Adams said.

As part of the increased driving awareness program, the DPS will furnish revised fatality counts to the news media during the Labor Day period.

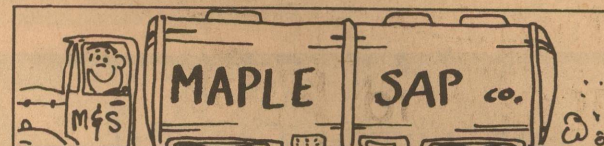


**WILD BEAUTY** - It's wild and beautiful up the Devil's River on Amistad Lake this time of year. Towering cliffs and huge caves wet

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## Hunting law changes told

The 69th Texas Legislature passed several laws concerning licenses which will become effective with the 1986-87 license year. Changes resulting from passage of these laws and their effect are especially important to the young and elderly.

All persons hunting any bird or animal in Texas will be required to possess a valid hunting license. Texas residents in the following categories will be able to purchase a Special Resident Hunting License for \$6 (currently called Resident Hunting Exempt License):

- (a) Residents under 17 years of age.
- (b) Residents 65 years of age or older.
- (c) Certain disabled veterans (service connected disability of 60 percent or more or less of a lower extremity and receiving compensation from the federal government).

Texas residents between 17 and 64 (inclusive) hunting on land where they reside will not be able to purchase the Special Resident Hunting License.

## Rex Thompson services held

Lt. Col. Rex M. Thompson died at Schleicher County Medical Center in Eldorado at 8:35 p.m. Friday, August 22. Graveside services were held in Waco, at Oakwood Cemetery at 4 p.m. Monday, August 25. Services were conducted by Co. (Ret.) George Warner.

Rex Thompson was born in Dublin on August 25, 1911. He completed high school in Mission; was graduated from the University of Texas and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary and studied at Baylor and Harvard Universities.

As a Southern Baptist minister, he was pastor of churches in Texas, Mississippi and Florida before enlisting in the U.S. Air Force Reserves as chaplain. He served at bases in Europe, Japan, Korea and

California for 20 years until his retirement in April 1968, with the rank of lieutenant colonel. He resided for the past 14 years in San Angelo, where he became a member of St. Mark's Presbyterian Church.

Lt. Col. Thompson was preceded in death by his first wife, Mary Lee; his father, Charles Wilbert Thompson; his mother, Lola Mankins Thompson; and four brothers.

He is survived by his wife, Lois Mitchell Thompson; two sons, Rex M. Thompson, Jr., and David Lee Thompson; two daughters, Annis Kay Thompson and Bonnie Turner; two stepchildren, Pam Newton White and Mitchell Newton; and 12 grandchildren. He also is survived by one brother, Charles Noel Thompson; two sisters, Beryl E. Cameron and Sandra Bramlett; and four nieces and nephews.

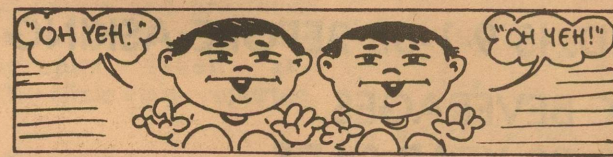
The Rev. Billie Daniels, pastor of the church, officiated at the ceremony.

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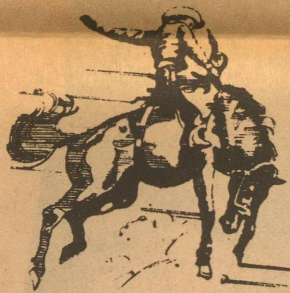

## Sonora site for '86 Circus

The Tri-City Shrine Club will be hosting the Shrine Circus in Sonora on Saturday, September 13. Two performances are set for 2 and 7 p.m.

This year's event will be dedicated to the late Les Robertson of Sonora. Shriners from Eldorado, Sonora and Ozona make up the club, which is a member club of Suez Temple in San Angelo. The Suez Temple includes 32 counties in West Texas and 2600 members.

Officers of the Tri-City Club in 1986 are Bob Halbert, president; R.L. Murph, vice president; Herb Kirby, secretary; and Pete Anderson, treasurer. Circus chairman this year is Eddie McReynolds.

Shriners are best known for their funding of the Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children, which have been assisting more than 300,000 burned and crippled children since 1922.

During the 63 years the hospital system has been in existence, the Shrine of North America has spent approximately \$988 million operating Shriners Hospitals and nearly \$214 million on construction costs.

Since the first hospital opened there have been approximately 383,208 operations performed, 7,089,669 physical therapy treatments given, 372,095 braces and prosthesis applied, 4,522,525 x-rays and photographs taken and 3,009,230 clinic visits reported.

### NO EVIDENCE OF CAT LEUKEMIA

Veterinarians at Texas A&M University say there is currently no evidence that a leukemia virus in cats poses a threat to humans. Feline leukemia virus (FeLV) is in the same virus family that causes leukemia and AIDS in humans. Because of this relationship, some people may be concerned that exposure to FeLV infected cats could be a health hazard for humans.

Children eligible for the treatment should not have reached their 18th birthday. The treatment is 100 percent free of charge, paid for by the Shriners' various fund-raising activities such as the circus,

etc. "If you know of a child that would benefit from such treatment, please contact any shriner and please attend our circus," a local Shrine spokesman said.

Loeffler said, "and I want to make it perfectly clear that it's into Lamar's hands that I want those reins placed.

"This trip is evidence that I'm doing everything I can to throw my support to Lamar," he said.

Smith said, "I am grateful for such a strong vote of confidence, and I am especially happy to have an endorsement from somebody of Congressman Loeffler's stature.

"As Tom and I travel the district, I want to make it clear he will be my role model when I get to Washington," the candidate said. "His integrity and leadership in the House is something we should all admire."

Flying in a chartered King Air turboprop plane with a campaign staff of four, Smith and Loeffler travelled approximately 370 miles and made stops Tuesday in Boerne, Fredericksburg, New Braunfels, Mason, Menard, Junction and San Angelo.

Sale of alcoholic beverages to an underage person is the most serious offense. A fine of \$100 to \$500 and/or a year in jail is the penalty for the first violation. A second violation can result in the same jail term and/or a fine of \$500 to \$1,000.

McBeath also cautioned that the age change will affect persons entering package stores. Liquor stores may not allow underage persons to even enter the store, and most such establishments having warning signs prominently posted.

"Many young people do not realize it is a criminal offense to ignore the warning signs and enter a liquor store," said McBeath. "It is criminal trespass under Section 30.05 of the Texas Penal Code, which is a Class B misdemeanor."

Another common misconception is that drinking age violations only apply to public places. "That's not true," said McBeath. "It will be just as illegal in a party barn, a fraternity house or a car parked on private property," he said.

McBeath urged voluntary compliance on the part of both licensed and underage former customers. Anyone who has a question about the upcoming change can obtain clarification from the nearest District Office of the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission, or at the Main Office in Austin, telephone (512) 458-2500.

As school opens next Tuesday, so does the cafeteria. Lunches for the 1986-87 school year will be: Kindergarten - third, .90; fourth - sixth, \$1; seventh - twelfth, \$1.10; adults, \$1.45; and visitors, \$3.

Lunches need to be paid in the school cafeteria in the mornings from 7:30 a.m. till 8:45 a.m. The only way students can pay in the line is if they are only paying for one day, otherwise they need to pay in the morning from 7:30 a.m. until 8:45 a.m. before class begins.

A simple method for paying is to put the money or check in an envelope, seal it and list each child's name, grade and teachers name, then send it with the child and encourage them to bring it into the cafeteria, as soon as they arrive at school.

"You can make one check for all your children and put it

in the same envelope with each child's name, grade and teacher listed on the outside and let them bring it into the cafeteria that morning before class

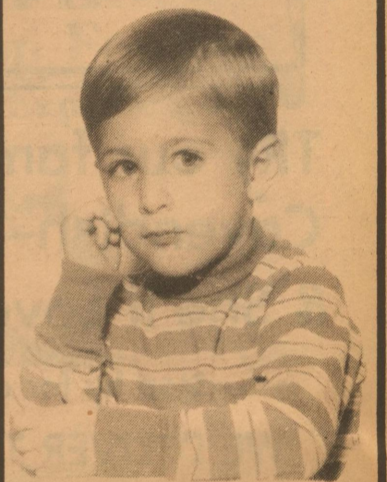

Schleicher County Hospital District will use rules and procedures found in the County Indigent Health Care Program Handbook published by the Texas Department of Human Services. In summary, these are the rules:

1. Application forms must be completely filled out.
2. Verification of income, termination of income, residence, household composition, and resources is required, if questionable.
3. Net income cannot exceed the following:

5. Eligible persons must be a resident of Schleicher county.

7. Applicants have the right to appeal adverse decisions.
