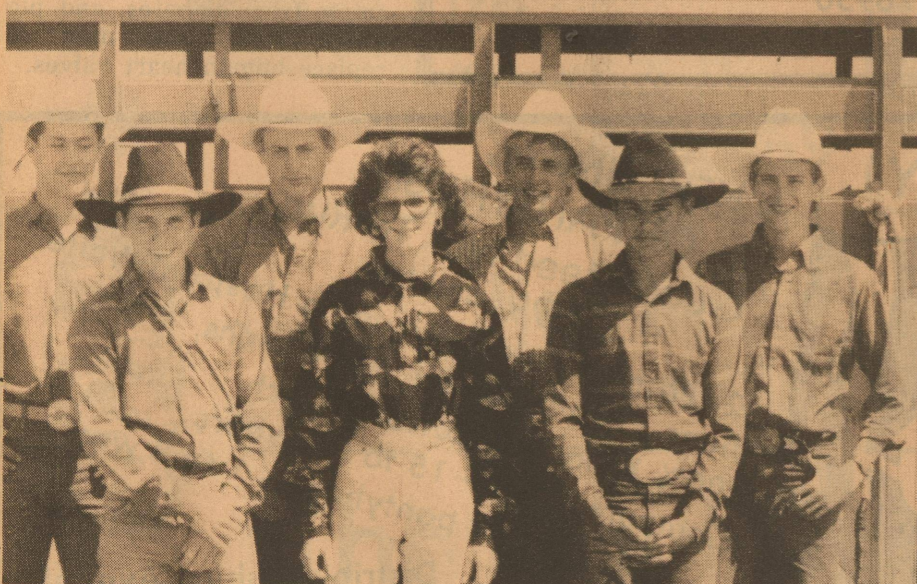
Dear Editor,

And one last thing, I write a column for you. Couldn't you have just looked over on page three and spelled it the way I do?

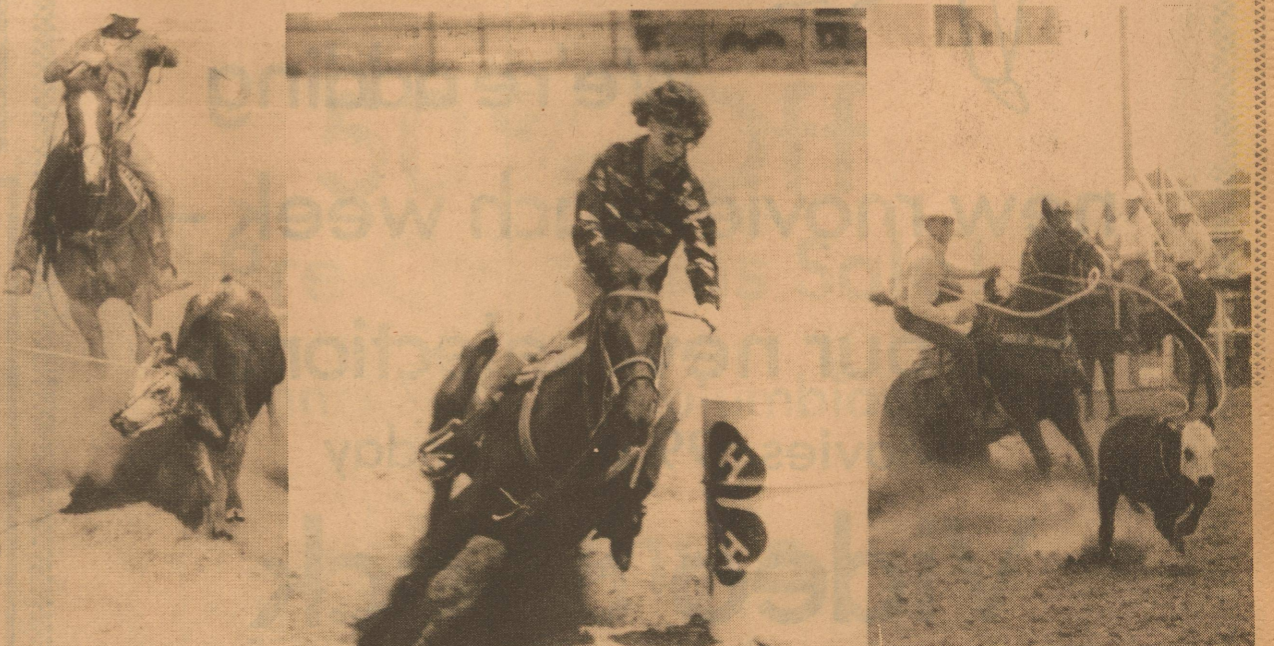

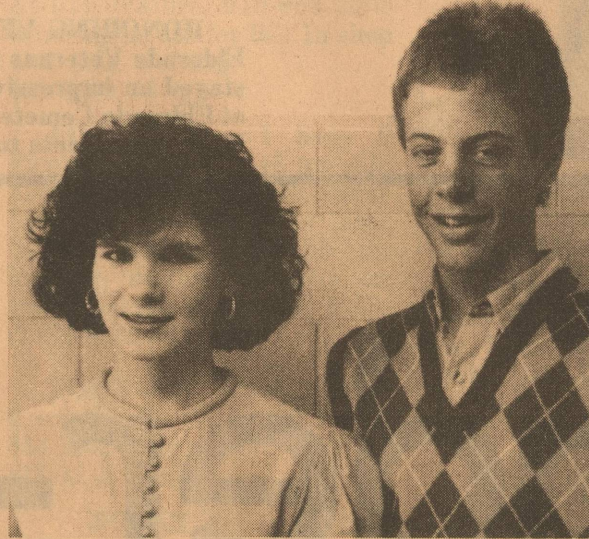
Bob Johnson.

Time is fast approaching for the season's first freeze, notes an agricultural meteorologist with the National Weather Service's Southwest Agricultural Weather Service Center at College Station. Based on past records, average first freeze dates for various regions of Texas are as follows: Panhandle, Oct. 25; South Plains, Oct. 30; Rolling Plains, Nov. 4; North Central, Nov. 10; Northeast, Nov. 10; Far West, Nov. 8; West Central, Nov. 10; Central, Nov. 15; East, Nov. 10; South Central, Nov. 23; Upper Coast, Nov. 30; South, Dec. 25; Southwest, Nov. 28; and Coastal Bend, Dec. 8.

Letter to the Editor:  
To Whom it May Concern:

When a column is written in a local newspaper, it can sometimes be very amusing or entertaining, however, when those articles begin reflecting on people's lives - lives that the writer knows nothing about, then those articles merely become a one sided opinion that deserves a second side.

In a criminal case for instance, wouldn't it be a terrifying experience to be sitting in the seat of judgement, while a prosecuting attorney tries to make us a convicted criminal! We've often wondered since the trial in Eldorado what that prosecutor must feel like if he suddenly realized that he's possibly prosecuting an innocent person and defending the ones guilty of the crime!

However, if he ever thinks these thoughts, expressions never change, he's still expected to play the part! "Oh well, it's just a thought." It certainly is wonderful though that our justice system allows us representation by a defense attorney, since our concept of the legal system is so limited. We deserve that defense when we're innocent of charges filed against us!

Speaking of our system - we tried on three separate occasions to seek help when all our lives were being threatened by an "unadjusted" person who was threatening all our lives. But you have to wait for "the dog to bite," if I recall correctly, "before it can be removed".

So, we were to continue our daily lives and told never to let down our guards, or never leave our children unattended around their own home, just waiting to see when those threats would become more than that.

Then on June 29, 1986, they made their move - only it turned out to be two "unadjusted" people instead of just

one, making the odds even worse. So, to protect himself, a man had to sit in that judgement seat, because he chose to defend himself.

It could have been any of us in that seat those three days of trial - because we would also have defended ourselves or our family if we had become their victim.

We are all very grateful for those twelve jurors who were allowed the right by our Justice System to sit and listen to both sides of the story and hear and weigh all the evidence! We believe thier decisions to be the most valued, since they did take the time out from their daily lives to hear all the facts and make a decision regarding those facts.

Maybe they should have written an article since they did hear everything before making that decision, instead of second guessing as others may have to do that didn't sit there through those three days of testimony.

We are personally grateful for those twelve people that week because we know the man whose life they changed that day and he's certainly not guilty of any crime as they all decided that day. Now we're going to go on with our lives even though some will try to drag us down.

Some will even continue to write articles in the newspaper instead of doing the jobs they're hired to do, careless of other people's feelings. We can tell them one thing, we've finally been able to let down our guard a little and there's peace at our house now, with no more threats to all our lives.

Last but not least, we would like to say a very special thanks to all our friends for the support shown to us during this event in our lives, for without all of you, we do not know how we might have endured.

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**NOTICE OF PROPOSED REDUCTION IN AT&T's TEXAS RATES**

The Public Utility Commission of the state of Texas has entered orders in two recent cases that would substantially reduce the charges which AT&T pays to the state's local telephone companies and which could allow AT&T to reduce prices for most of AT&T's customers on calls placed within the state of Texas.

The total amount of the reduction to AT&T's customers is expected to be between \$115.3 million and \$120.6 million. This is in addition to the \$19.8 million reduction in AT&T's Texas basic long distance prices that went into effect on March 1, 1986 and is in addition to the approximately \$2 billion in AT&T interstate price reductions that took effect earlier this year.

If the changes are approved, all of AT&T's direct dialed long distance, directory assistance, WATS and 800 service customers would be affected, and would experience a decrease in their prices for these services when calling within the state of Texas. The following tables show the anticipated impact of the changes on AT&T customers by service category:

The rate reductions are presently anticipated to occur in two phases on or about October 22, 1986 and November 12, 1986. The matter has been assigned as Docket Nos. 6926 and 7113. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. ### TAX REFORM STRATEGIES

With the 1986 tax reform bill now signed into law, individuals need to start doing some serious thinking and planning regarding tax strategies before the year draws to a close, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. General recommendations include deferring income since tax rates will drop next year, making full use of a salary reduction plan, reviewing portfolios and selling certain stocks to take advantage of the long-term capital gains rate, seeking high dividend investments, avoiding investments with immediately reportable income, increasing deductions, buying big-ticket items, considering municipal bonds, taking a close look at tax shelters and children's accounts, keeping IRAs and being aware of the alternative minimum tax.

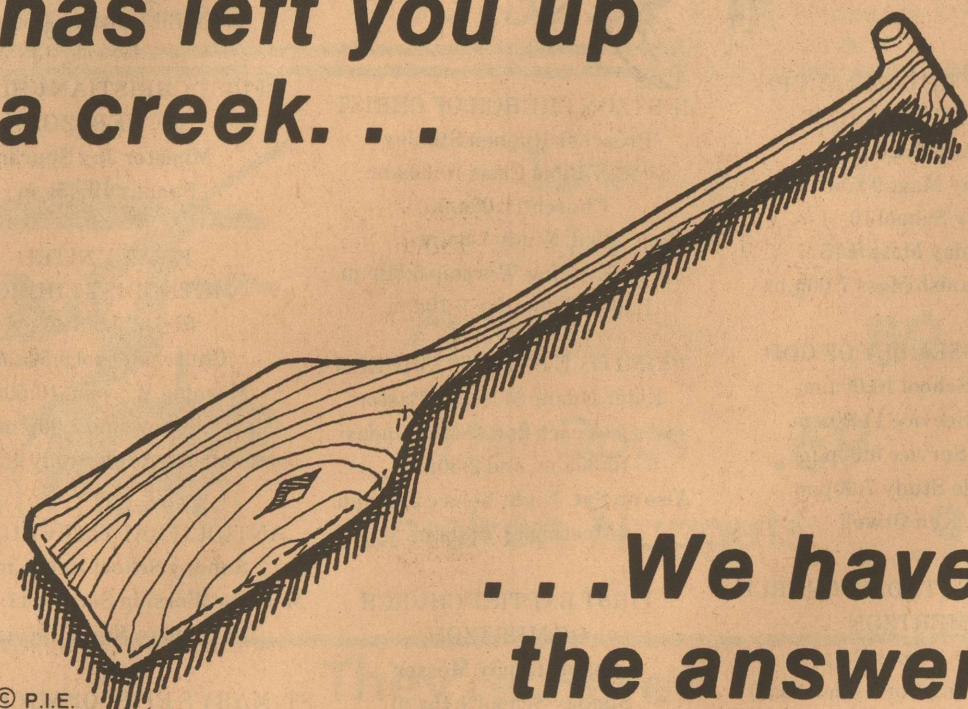

## Top of The Divide

Not having television has its good points but it also has its drawbacks. With the Christmas season fast gaining on us I will miss seeing the Ronco advertisements. Over the years I have received a few of their wonderful items and marveled at their inventiveness.

That company must have hired every itinerant inventor they could find. Each creator was, I am sure, convinced that his contribution to the quality of our lives was the ultimate. Even the man who did the voice over on the ads sounded so convinced that we just could not live without one of Ronco's widgets.

One Christmas my dear mother bought me a Ronco Battery Operated Lint Remover. I'm sure my mother noticed a considerable amount of lint accumulating all over me. To be perfectly honest, I had not noticed the lint, at least, that it was any sort of problem. I figured any crimp in my social life was probably due

to my lack of money rather than an excess of lint. This machine was sort of a little battery operated vacuum cleaner.

### CHECK HEAT SYSTEM

Cooler weather has brought relief from both the heat and high air conditioning bills. But another kind of heat -- from the furnace -- will begin to drive utility costs up again. Fine-tuning your heating system may help hold utility costs down by increasing its efficiency, says Dr. Susan Quiring, a housing specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. Gas heating systems should be checked and cleaned at least every other year, she explains. Dirt accumulation inside the furnace is difficult to remove and reduces heating efficiency, she adds. Electric furnaces don't need much maintenance, but heat pumps require periodic servicing. A trained technician can clean and adjust your system to assure maximum efficiency.

## Checkoff dollars scheduled

As the first month of the new \$1/head beef checkoff comes to a close, Monthly Report forms will soon be arriving at The Texas Beef Industry Council. Many questions are now surfacing concerning these forms, some of the more common being the following:

The collecting person (Order Buyer, Trader, Dealer, Auction Market, Feedyard, Packer, individual acting as collecting person for purebred sales, and buyer in the country) is responsible for completing the Monthly Report form.

It is for all cattle for which you had the responsibility for collecting the \$1/head check-off. If you are in the position of buying and selling cattle, it is important to know that this form is for only the cattle you bought, not for cattle you sold.

The market will serve as the collecting agent and complete the Monthly Report forms. You will therefore have no forms to complete as the buyer.

Supplies of forms as well as informational pieces may be obtained at local farm bureau offices and extension service offices. You may also call the Texas Beef Industry Council in Austin at (512) 345-3531.

The Monthly Report for October must be completed and postmarked by November 15.

Along with the white copy of the Monthly Report, include all yellow copies of the Request For Non-Producer Status forms that you received in place of the \$1/head checkoff.

Also include copies of all brand inspection certificates that may have been given you in place of the \$1/head check-off. And, then be certain to include a check for the total

dollars you collected during October.

Indicate the total number of cattle purchased through an auction market in the third column (along with the non-producer status cattle and the brand inspected cattle) as you will not have collected any dollars on these cattle. In order to help clarify this figure, beside your total non-producer cattle, state the number of

cattle from the auction market with an "A" beside that number. For example: Number Non-Producer Cattle - 200 (80-A).

In other words, you had a total of 200 non-producer cattle, 80 of which were purchased from an auction market which collected the dollar from the seller. You will not be required to account for "auction market" cattle with any type of paper-
